There are a couple of amendments that will be coming forward from the minority leader.

Shelly Peterson: We don't have that data.

Shelly Peterson: under the bed buy out program you will get \$15,000 a bed, if you remove 8 or more beds you would receive up to \$12,000 and under 8 beds a facility could buy around \$8,000 or below. Price will go down considerably.

Representative Amerman: If facility sells the bed can they later on down the road buy another bed back for the one they sold?

David Zentner: probably not.

Minutes: Shelly Peterson was asked to address the committee and give explanation of the sale of beds. We send out information to everyone that someone has a bed for sale and if interested to contact them directly. We don't get involved in the actual contract. Doesn't feel we should put that in that in as a statute. We will continue to send out information regarding sale of beds and information as we have always done. She recommends that the committee not accept the second part of the amendment.

Rep. Price and Shelly Peterson noted that the basic problem with the Tribes was that they just weren't ready and were not able to come though with the money. The tribes also indicated that 24 months was a problem.

Shelly Peterson addressed the issue of raising the years to 2007. Right now under the law, once a bed is sold to another entity, it has 24 months to be put into service. Because you have renovation or in the Tribes case, you'd have to build a facility. Changing it to 2007, would take it out of the 4 year, this would allow rather than a 24 month period to put a bed into a service

after you've purchased it, would give you 48 months, which give you more than adequate time for renovation or construction or if you were in the process of trying to accumulate a number of beds and didn't want to start until you had a certain\_\_\_\_\_.

Rep. Amerman: There isn't anything that says you have to get rid of unused beds, is there? No Rep. Devlin moves amendment to make the date change from 2005 to 2007 and take out both paragraphs, second by Rep. Kreidt.

Rep. Niemeier asked about who the other interested entity would be? Answer: whoever is interested, a consulting firm could come in and would charge for their services, that would make the beds even higher.

Rep. Devlin feels that the Tribes real concerns were being addressed, one was the date change to 48 months and the other thing that the bill originally did was that before you could sell a bed, you had to give up another one. The Tribes really didn't like that at all and though it would make beds more difficult to get and more expensive. So we are giving them that.

Rep. Kreidt noted that the Tribes did hire someone to come in and negotiate for them in getting beds.

Motion passed on Amendment.

Rep. Kreidt moved a DO PASS as AMENDED, second by Rep. Potter. 12 - 0 - 1.

Rep. Kreidt will carry the bill.

Good morning Chairman Price and members of the House Human Services Committee. It is a pleasure to appear before you again this morning. For the record, I am Rep. Bill Devlin, District 23 from Finley.

For the past several years we've had a restriction on adding new nursing facility or basic care beds in North Dakota. We wanted to bring some balance into how we've provided services to elderly and disabled persons in North Dakota. This bill extends that moratorium for another two years.

It will also make a major change in the requirement which allows a facility to give up a bed to another facility. In the past the facility had to give up an additional bed to transfer one to another facility. The change proposed would make it a one for one transfer.

Those of you that have served on this committee before know that we don't have too many nursing home beds in the state but instead don't have them located where they are most needed. We need to be more flexible in allowing a nursing home in a town with a growing need to be able to purchase or transfer a bed from another facility where the need is declining without making the penalty too severe. I believe a one for one transfer will more adequately meet your the state's needs for the next biennium.

I am committed to provide a full continuum of care, so we can care for individuals in the most appropriate setting.

In the past two bienniums and today we have substantially increased funding for in-home services:

Increases in funding SPED and Expanded SPED

1999-2001

25.5% increase

2001-2003

12.2% increase

2003-2005

41 % increase proposed in SB 2012

As a side note, IGT dollars were utilized to provide these significant (proposed) increases.

Since the moratorium and bed buy out program we've reduced over 500 nursing facility beds. Some communities such as Fargo and Bismarck suggest they need more nursing facility beds to care for their older population. The Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa Tribe in Belcourt has

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indicated they want a nursing home. I continue to believe we should not add more institutional capacity to North Dakota, however we may need to redistribute the beds we have and help with moving beds around in North Dakota. HB 1400 would help accomplish that objective.

#### In HB 1400:

- 1. A basic care or nursing facility could sell or transfer beds across the State and not lose a bed in the process, which is the current requirement. This will help redistribute beds, but only if a facility is willing to give up their beds to another community.
- 2. The provisions of a nursing facility converting a portion of their beds to basic care for a twelve-month period of time would still be allowed. I understand this has been only used by a few facilities.
- The provision for reservations remain intact and if any nursing facility or basic care facility sell their beds to a reservation, again they would not need to give up another bed in the process.
- 4. HB 1400 proposes to remove the requirement that nursing facility beds converted to basic care be in the same wing, in a continuous row. I support removing this State requirement. I understand the Feds have a rule on this and we may still need to follow the rule. However, removing the language from our statute will give facilities flexibility should the Federal government ever change their position.
- 5. The exception process for adding basic care beds to under served areas would continue. My fellow colleagues I ask for your support on HB 1400. There are others here that will provide more information and I hope answer any questions that you might have. I too would be happy to answer any questions you may have now or later during committee deliberations.

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## Testimony on HB 1400 House Human Services Committee January 28, 2003

Chairman Price and members of the House Human Services Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify on HB 1400. My name is Shelly Peterson, President of the North Dakota Long Term Care Association. We represent nursing facilities, basic care facilities and assisted living facilities in North Dakota.

## HB 1400 accomplishes four objectives:

- 1. The moratorium on basic care beds and nursing facility beds would be extended to July 31, 2005.
- 2. Basic care and nursing facilities would be allowed to transfer or sell beds to another community and would not be required to give up another bed in the transfer / sale.
- 3. The transfer of basic care or nursing facility beds from one entity to a tribal reservation could also occur without the existing requirement of losing an additional bed in the transfer.
- 4. Currently a nursing facility may convert nursing facility beds to basic care beds on an annual basis. In making this conversion you must notify the Department of Health 90 days in advance of the transfer. There was an additional requirement that all the converted beds must be located in the same block of rooms within the facility. In HB 1400 we are deleting the requirement that all the converted basic care beds must be in the same block.

In the past 18 months we had one case where a couple was admitted to the nursing facility with different care needs. After numerous years of living together the couple wanted to continue to share a room in the long term care facility. The requirement of having the converted basic care beds in the same wing, in a continuous line made it difficult to accommodate the desire of the couple to live together.

The Health Department has indicated even if the law is amended they will not allow us to deviate from the continuous room requirement. A federal rule exists which makes this change almost impossible. Despite the federal rule we would still ask that you take this requirement out of state statute. We have been working with the federal

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government for four years to allow nursing facilities to use feeding assistants and finally now in 2003 rules should be forthcoming. We will advocate with the federal government on the continuous bed issue. By removing the state requirement one obstacle would be removed.

The moratorium, bed buy-out program and requirement that one bed be eliminated when you want to transfer one has been effective in lowering North Dakota's bed capacity. A few years ago, we had 89 nursing facilities, today there are 84 nursing facilities. The highest nursing facility bed count we ever recorded was in 1996 at 7,146 nursing facility beds. Today we have 6,633 beds, a reduction of 513 beds. The last time we were this low was 1984. We feel we may have a sufficient number of nursing facility beds, however there may be a mal-distribution of beds. Bismarck and Fargo may need additional beds and some very rural areas may not be able to support their facility at their current capacity. We do not support increased capacity in North Dakota, not even for the cities. Allowing beds to be transferred, without losing one in the transfer, would allow the major cities or reservation and a rural facility to negotiate a re-distribution of current capacity.

In 2001, you made an exception to the basic care moratorium. In your exception you allowed an applicant to prove to the Department of Health and Department of Human Services that a need for additional basic care bed capacity existed. If such a need existed and was proven, additional bed capacity was to be approved. HB 1400 does not change that exception process. It is our understanding that seven new facilities have been approved in the past 18 months (not all are operational and licensed yet). From the seven new basic care facilities, 126 beds will be added. The new facilities are located in Minot, Williston, Dickinson, Fargo, Bismarck (2) and Valley City.

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
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Nursing Facility Beds in North Dakota



Testimony of Three Affiliated Tribes Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation Tex G. Hall Chairman HB 1400 January 28, 2003

Dosha! (Hello) Good morning, Madam Chairman, members of the Committee. This testimony is being offered by Chairman Tex Hall of the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation in support of HB 1400.

As you all know, in order for anyone to successfully operate a nursing home in North Dakota, it must be able to receive medicare payments for those residing there, to partially offset the cost of the home. As Tribes have discovered, that means the nursing home beds that are on reservations or operated by the Tribes are counted against the state maximum total of beds allowed for which Medicare payments may be received from the Federal government. Therefore, it is necessary for Tribes to either obtain a waiver of that requirement or to exchange beds with other nursing home facilities in order to have a nursing home on the reservation that would serve our members.

Elders are honored in our culture, and are not generally warehoused in nursing homes. But when the time comes for assisted care living, or even the more intensive care provided in a nursing home, Tribal elders must go off the reservation. That is unfortunate and hastens the end of life for many of our Tribal elders. Thus we are interested in improving our ability to have assisted care living facilities on the reservations.

This bill changes a provision in current law which was very detrimental to Tribes that wanted to place a nursing home on the reservation that was operated for the benefit of Tribal members. Current law, enacted in the last legislative session, permitted Tribes to purchase two beds for each bed they wanted to have on the reservation. That seems quite unfair, and frankly, I do not believe that provision of the law was used by any Tribe in North Dakota.

The current bill would change the requirement to a one-for-one bed purchase, which, while not a waiver of the moratorium that we are seeking, does make the exchange an even one. Therefore, we think the change is a reasonable one, and we support this bill's passage into law, and appreciate the sponsorship of legislators who have introduced this bill.

I urge a DO PASS recommendation for this bill from this Committee.

## Testimony on HB 1400 Senate Human Services Committee March 5, 2003

Chairman Lee and members of the Senate Human Services Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify on HB 1400. This testimony is given on behalf of Shelly Peterson of the North Dakota Long Term Care Association. She is unable to be here today and has asked me to deliver this testimony on their Association's behalf. My name is Arnold (Chip) Thomas of the North Dakota Healthcare Association.

HB 1400 accomplishes four objectives:

- 1. The moratorium on basic care beds and nursing facility beds is extended to July 31, 2007. (Although we believe the House only intended to extend the moratorium 2 years, either is acceptable to us.)
- Basic care and nursing facilities would be allowed to transfer or sell beds to 2. another community and would not be required to give up another bed in the transfer / sale.
- 3. The transfer of basic care or nursing facility beds from one entity to a tribal reservation could also occur without the existing requirement of losing an additional bed in the transfer.
- Currently a nursing facility may convert nursing facility beds to basic care beds 4. on an annual basis. In making this conversion you must notify the Department of Health 90 days in advance of the transfer. There was an additional requirement that all the converted beds must be located in the same block of rooms within the facility. In HB 1400 we are deleting the requirement that all the converted basic care beds must be in the same block.

In the past 18 months we had one case where a couple was admitted to the nursing facility with different care needs. After numerous years of living together the couple wanted to continue to share a room in the long term care facility. The requirement of having the converted basic care beds in the same wing, in a continuous line made it difficult to accommodate the desire of the couple to live together.

The Health Department has indicated even if the law is amended they will not allow us to deviate from the continuous room requirement. A federal rule exists which

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makes this change almost impossible. Despite the federal rule we would still ask that you take this requirement out of state statute. We have been working with the federal government for four years to allow nursing facilities to use feeding assistants and finally now in 2003 rules should be forthcoming. We will advocate with the federal government on the continuous bed issue. By removing the state requirement one obstacle would be removed.

The moratorium, bed buy-out program and requirement that one bed be eliminated when you want to transfer one has been effective in lowering North Dakota's bed capacity. A few years ago, North Dakota had 89 nursing facilities, today there are 84 nursing facilities. The highest nursing facility bed count we ever recorded was in 1996 at 7,146 nursing facility beds. Today there are 6,633 beds, a reduction of 513 beds. The last time we were this low was 1984. We feel we may have a sufficient number of nursing facility beds, however there may be a mal-distribution of beds. Bismarck and Fargo may need additional beds and some very rural areas may not be able to support their facility at their current capacity. We do not support increased capacity in North Dakota, not even for the cities. Allowing beds to be transferred, without losing one in the transfer, would allow the major cities or reservation and a rural facility to negotiate a re-distribution of current capacity.

In 2001, you made an exception to the basic care moratorium. In your exception you allowed an applicant to prove to the Department of Health and Department of Human Services that a need for additional basic care bed capacity existed. If such a need existed and was proven, additional bed capacity was to be approved. HB 1400 does not change that exception process. It is our understanding that seven new facilities have been approved in the past 18 months (not all are operational and licensed yet). From the seven new basic care facilities, 126 beds will be added. The new facilities are located in Minot, Williston, Dickinson, Fargo, Bismarck (2) and Valley City.

We also understand the Representative Boucher will be proposing an amendment regarding extending from 24 months to 48 months, the time allowed to put purchased beds into service. We are not opposed to that amendment.

Good morning Chairman Lee and members of the Senate Human Services Committee. It is a pleasure to appear before you again this morning. For the record, I am Rep. Bill Devlin, District 23 from Finley.

For the past several years we've had a restriction on adding new nursing facility or basic care beds in North Dakota. We wanted to bring some balance into how we've provided services to elderly and disabled persons in North Dakota. This bill extends that moratorium for another two years.

It will also make a major change in the requirement which allows a facility to give up a bed to another facility. In the past the facility had to give up an additional bed to transfer one to another facility. The change proposed would make it a one for one transfer.

Those of you that have served on this committee before know that we don't have too many nursing home beds in the state but instead don't have them located where they are most needed. We need to be more flexible in allowing a nursing home in a town with a growing need to be able to purchase or transfer a bed from another facility where the need is declining without making the penalty too severe. I believe a one for one transfer will more adequately meet your the state's needs for the next biennium.

I am committed to provide a full continuum of care, so we can care for individuals in the most appropriate setting.

In the past two bienniums and today we have substantially increased funding for in-home services:

Increases in funding SPED and Expanded SPED

1999-2001

25.5% increase

2001-2003

12.2% increase

2003-2005

20 % increase proposed

As a side note, IGT dollars were utilized to provide these significant (proposed) increases.

Since the moratorium and bed buy out program we've reduced over 500 nursing facility beds. Some communities such as Fargo and Bismarck suggest they need more nursing facility beds to care for their older population. The Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa Tribe in Belcourt has

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indicated they want a nursing home. I continue to believe we should not add more institutional capacity to North Dakota, however we may need to redistribute the beds we have and help with moving beds around in North Dakota. HB 1400 would help accomplish that objective.

#### In HB 1400:

- 1. A basic care or nursing facility could sell or transfer beds across the State and not lose a bed in the process, which is the current requirement. This will help redistribute beds, but only if a facility is willing to give up their beds to another community.
- 2. The provisions of a nursing facility converting a portion of their beds to basic care for a twelve-month period of time would still be allowed. I understand this has been only used by a few facilities.
- 3. The provision for reservations remain intact and if any nursing facility or basic care facility sell their beds to a reservation, again they would not need to give up another bed in the process.
- 4. HB 1400 proposes to remove the requirement that nursing facility beds converted to basic care be in the same wing, in a continuous row. I support removing this State requirement. I understand the Feds have a rule on this and we may still need to follow the rule. However, removing the language from our statute will give facilities flexibility should the Federal government ever change their position.
- 5. The exception process for adding basic care beds to under served areas would continue. My fellow colleagues I ask for your support on HB 1400. There are others here that will provide more information and I hope answer any questions that you might have. I too would be happy to answer any questions you may have now or later during committee deliberations.
