

Rep. Niemeier to Dr. Smith: are you comfortable with going to 2 yrs? Answer: Yes, standards are consistent.

To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing in support of HB 1436. This bill addresses the physician licensing of graduates of medical schools not located in the United States.

I am the administrator of Mountrail County Medical Center in Stanley, North Dakota. We are a small, rural, eleven-bed hospital in the Northwest part of the state. My experience with recruiting and staffing a rural facility like ours leads me to support HB1436. Our hospital has historically had difficulties recruiting physicians and staffing our emergency room on a 24/7 basis. We only employ two physicians and a midlevel practitioner. It is difficult for two physicians and a midlevel practitioner to staff an emergency room 365 days per year without us hiring other physicians occasionally to help out. It is also very difficult when a physician leaves to replace them in less than a six to twelve month period. There are very few physicians and/or their families willing to locate in small communities.

Our facility in the past two years had to replace both of our physician positions. This was a very daunting task. We have had an ongoing relationship with the residency program in Minot that is part of the UND School of Medicine. One of the physicians that we recruited last year was from this program. I sincerely believe we were able to recruit this physician because he was working for us on a regular basis in our emergency room. This gave us a chance to see him work and him a chance to get to know our facility. I do not think we would have recruited this physician if it were not for him working here helping to cover our emergency room.

During the past five years that I have been involved in the hospital in Stanley, there have been at least three or four foreign graduates that we would have had work for us if they had been able to under the licensing regulations. I am aware of at least one in the Minot program currently that is not able to work here due to the licensing regulations. Not only are they not able to work here, but also we are denied the opportunity to develop a relationship with these physicians and use that relationship to help recruit them if the need arises.

I would support HB 1436's intent to allow the third year residency students to be licensed in North Dakota if the terms were met. I see it as a benefit to the physicians, facilities and communities that would profit from this change.

RE: Change to amend and reenact subsection 3 of section 43-17-18 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to licensure of physicians

Dear Mr. Sletten:

I have proposed a change relating to the licensure of physicians. I hope this letter will explain why this change would be beneficial for the residents of North Dakota. This proposed change would relate to foreign medical school graduates and their ability to obtain an unrestricted medical license after the completion of two years of graduate, clinical medical training. The license would be conditional and would require the physician to remain in good standing in residency in North Dakota. It could also stipulate that before the license could be converted to an unrestricted and unconditional license, the physician would have to complete his/her third year of graduate, clinical medical training.

As you are well aware, medical licensing requirements vary from state to state. The states in this region require graduates of foreign medical schools to complete either two or three years of US/Canadian graduate, clinical medical training in order to be eligible to obtain an unrestricted and unconditional medical license. Our intensions are not to reduce these requirements by allowing physicians without three years of graduate medical training to come to North Dakota to obtain permanent or temporary jobs. Our intent is to provide an opportunity for graduates of foreign medical schools that have completed two years of US/Canadian graduate, clinical medical training and who are enrolled in good standing in an accredited residency program in North Dakota to obtain a medical license.

This change will result in creating the same opportunity that US medical school graduates have in working outside the residency programs to obtain additional compensation in the third year of residency. More importantly, these residents, during their third year of training, could work in North Dakota healthcare facilities on their time off from the residency program. This is important, as this would significantly enhance their rural experience and their overall experience in North Dakota. It would provide opportunities

Historically the Board of Medical Examiners has been adamantly opposed to any bill that could be construed as relaxing the standards for obtaining a medical license in this state. The legislature has consistently supported the Board's position in this regard. The result is that high licensing standards have been maintained over a period of many years.

This bill is different than other proposals that have been made in the past. It affects only a very small group of physicians, only graduates of international medical schools who are enrolled in their third year of residency training in programs in North Dakota. The license granted under this section is a temporary license which is valid only so long as the incensee continues to maintain his/her enrollment in the program. All of the physicians who are eligible for this license have met all of the regular licensing requirements except that they have not completed the third year of residency training. They are enrolled in that third year of training in North Dakota by the time they become eligible for this license and they must maintain satisfactory progress in the program to keep the license. The Board feels that this very limited change in the licensing laws will not jeopardize the public.

During the hearing before the House Human Services Committee all kinds of reasons were advanced as justification for this bill, e.g., that the residents can use the money and that these residents will be able to lessen the load on other licensed physicians. Those are not valid reasons for making the change. Those are only matters of convenience.

The Board of Medical Examiners supports this change in the law because:

- 1. We believe that the group of physicians affected by this bill are well enough trained and well enough supervised to consistently provide high quality care to patients.
- 2. This bill is good for all of North Dakota in that it will help North Dakota residency programs attract good applicants.
- 3. This bill will enhance the quality of the experience available to residents during their third year of training in this state.

For these reasons, the Board urges you to support HB 1436.
