

Chair Nelson called the hearing on HB 1453 to order relating to the requirement that game and fish violators complete a hunter safety education course.

Rep. Sandvig: Introduced HB 1453. This bill would require the completion of a hunter safety course for violators of hunting regulations. The bill was introduced on behalf of a constituent. This is not unlike a driving violation requiring the retaking of a driving course in order to reissue the license. I am open to other ideas relating to this. Roger Rosvitt did send me some information on problems with the bill. I am open to amendments.

Rep. Hunskor: Would a life jacket violation require the taking of a hunter safety course?

Rep. Sandvig: Right now it would that is the problem with the bill. This needs to be for major violations.

Dennis Daniel: Testified as to the problems with catching these offenses and the difficulty in providing the extra hunter safety courses to all these people. The judge should decide this.

Rep. Nottestad: What do you think about throwing someone who is upset about having to take this course and throwing them into a group of enthusiastic 12 and 13 year olds.

Dennis Daniel: It would totally destroy the purpose of that class. They would be very upset about having to be there if it were a minor violation. If it were a major violation you would not want them being looked up to by the young people.

Rep. Hanson: I am sorry my name is on this bill.

Harold Neameyer: Testified in opposition of HB 1453. (See Attached Testimony)

Roger Rosvitt: Testified in opposition to HB 1453 (See Attached Testimony)

Chair Nelson (2983) closes the hearing on HB 1453.

Rep. Rep. Klein: moved a Do Not Pass on HB 1453.

All game and fish law violators would be required to take the hunter education course before they could again purchase hunting or fishing licenses. As written this includes angling, boating and trapping violations as well as hunting violations.

TESTIMONY OF HAROLD NEAMEYER CASS COUNTY WILDLIFE CLUB

PRESENTED TO THE HOUSE NATURAL RESOURCE COMMITTEE ON HB 1453, FEBRUARY 6, 2003

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

I am Harold Neameyer speaking on behalf of the Cass County Wildlife Club. The Cass County Wildlife Club is opposed to HB 1453 for a number of reasons.

- 1. There is no indication of the type of violation that is being addressed. Some are serious, but many are minor.
- 2. There are hundreds of violations each year, and this requirement would over crowd already full classes in the larger cities.
- 3. Must the hunter safety instructor pass the violator even if they chose to be inattentive and belligerent?
- 4. The bill does not identify if the violator had hunter safety previously.
- 5. Would we want to mix the beginning hunter with game violators?

This bill is a stigma for the hunter safety program. This is a good idea, but until solutions are found to some of the above problems, we oppose HB 1453.

HB 1453 may have some unintended consequences that may not have been envisioned when drafted. The concept has merit, however as written this is what would be required and situations to consider.

- All violators of Game and Fish law would be required to take Hunter Education (HE). This would include minor boating and fishing violations.
- If a minor violation was to occur, HE would be required before a person could buy a license that he is not normally required, such as a boat license, fishing license, etc.
- On average over 1,500 additional people would be required to take HE each year.
- Currently there are 5,800 students taught by civic and conservation minded **VOLUNTEER** instructors
- May be a real challenge for volunteer instructors in rural areas who normally only hold one class a year to accommodate a violator who has a violation and wants to get back in the field immediately.

The need for penalties for violations of Game and Fish laws is apparent. In this case using the Hunter Education Program as a punishment tool, may not be the best route to take.

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
