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#### House Concurrent Resolution No. 3008

Thank you Chairman Traynor and members of the Senate Judiciary committee. My name is Rep. Mike Grosz from District 42.

House concurrent resolution number 3008 is a study resolution requesting the Legislative Council to study the use of electronic home detention for nonviolent offenders. I submitted this bill at the request of one of my constituents, Sargent Thomas Brockling of the University Police Department.

I would like to use his words in explaining the purpose of this bill. Sargent Thomas Brockling wrote, "I would really appreciate it it someone could review this section of the law to see if more could be done in the use of electronic incarceration for non-violent convicted offenders. I am aware that a precise definition would have to be put in the law in regards to what exactly would be considered a non-violent offender but I think the state may be able to save some money if they could adopt a more extensive program for electronic incarceration for non-violent/non-dangerous offenders. There are some people here in Grand Forks already that are being monitored electronically by the Grand Forks Correctional Center so you may want to check with them for their input if this program could be expanded? Not only could it save the state money but it also could provide more room in the state prison for violent offenders whom are a danger to society." Thank you for your consideration, and I would be happy to answer any questions.



### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3037

Introduced by

A concurrent resolution directing the Legislative Council to study the state's criminal justice 1 process from arrest to release, including the cost-effectiveness and efficiency of incarcerating 2 large numbers of inmates in a large facility, the use of electronic monitoring as an alternative to 3 incarceration, and the effectiveness of sentencing laws, incarceration, and treatment. 4 5 WHEREAS, a seamless transition through the criminal justice process from arrest to 6 release should be the goal of the state's courts and correctional system; and 7 WHEREAS, the average daily inmate population in North Dakota prisons nearly doubled 8 from 1993 to 2001, rising from 567 in 1993 to 1,099 in 2001 and is projected to increase to an 9 average daily population of 1,257 inmetes in 2007 and 1,417 inmates in 2012, an annual 10 Increase of 33 inmates or 2.7 percent per year through 2012; and 11 WHEREAS, the state's female inmate population is projected to increase to an average 1 12 population of 163 in 2007 and 208 inmates in 2012, an annual increase of 8 inmates or 13 5.3 percent per year through 2012; and 14 WHEREAS, during the 2001-03 interim, the Legislative Council's Interim Corrections Committee studied the facilities and operations of the Department of Corrections and 15 Rehabilitation and continued study should be made of the use of available correctional facilities; 16 17 and 18 WHEREAS, the privatization of the state's correctional facilities has been reported to be 19 a cost-effective and efficient method of housing a state's inmate population; and 20 WHEREAS, a study should be made of the property tax impact of constructing private 21 correctional facilities rather than additional public correctional facilities; and 22 WHEREAS, concerns exist with the escalation of methamphetamine and other 23 controlled substance use and the adequacy of the state's sentencing laws to deal with this 24 problem; and

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1	WHEREAS, treatment and other programs that provide alternatives to incarceration
2	may reduce the number of inmates and reduce recidivism;
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#### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES 3 OF NORTH DAKOTA, THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN:

That the Legislative Council study the state's criminal justice process from arrest to release, including the cost-effectiveness and efficiency of incarcerating large numbers of 6 inmates in a large facility, the use of electronic monitoring as an alternative to incarceration, and 7 8 the effectiveness of sentencing laws, incarceration, and treatment; and 9

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Legislative Council report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the Fifty-ninth Legislative Assembly.

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
