HOUSE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE REPRESENTATIVE DUANE DEKREY, CHAIRMAN FEBRUARY 17, 2003

Chairman DeKrey and members of the House Judiciary Committee, I am Karen Romig Larson of the Department of Human Services. I appear before you today to support HCR 3034.

The North Dakota Mental Health Commitment Law is a very good one. It has evolved over time to reflect changes in care and service delivery for persons with mental illness or substance abuse. Close attention has been given to maintaining the balance between the rights of the person to be committed and the safety of that person and the community.

Once again, with changes in service delivery, the increase in community based services, and increased knowledge of these illnesses and disorders, it would seem time to thoroughly study and recommend necessary changes to the law.

There is need for many stakeholders to be part of such a study: the judiciary, providers, law enforcement, states and defense attorneys, advocacy groups, family members and consumers have need to be a part of the review, analysis, and recommended changes to the current law. By providing an inclusive approach, we can assure that those with the most interest and use for the law will have a voice in any changes to be made.

Thank you for the opportunity to appear before you today. I will be pleased to respond to any questions you may have.

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House Judiciary Committee Testimony Sheree Spear HCR 3034 February 17, 2003

Chairman DeKrey and Members of the House Judiciary Committee,

My name is Sheree Spear. I'm speaking in support of HCR 3034 as a family member. I've dealt closely with loved ones with severe mental illness for over 35 years. I've watched 3 generations of people suffer unbearable inner torment and pain. I'm extremely protective of those people and of the Commitment Law that so profoundly impacts their lives. And the lives of those of us who struggle to help them.

I've also watched not only the shift in society from institutionalization to community based care, and have see how that has often failed those with chronic mental illness. Simultaneously, we've all watched as enormous medical advances, primarily in the past 10 years, have brought us medicines which enable suffers to experience lives that they could once only dream of.

But what is most glaring today was probably best summed up by President Bush last April when he introduced his new President's New Freedom Commission on Mental Health. He said, "Remarkable treatments exist, and that's good. Yet many people – too many people remain untreated. Some end up addicted to drugs or alcohol. Some end up on the streets, homeless. Others end up in our jails, our prisons, our juvenile detention facilities."

He would have been accurate if he had added that many also end up dead. He is asking that states find ways to close that gap.

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SB2296, of which I'm a proponent, needs to be passed <u>yesterday</u> as an emergency measure to close a gap that has resulted in numerous deaths and preventable tragedies in this State. But many changes that need to be made could be done through better procedures and an educational campaign throughout the entire treatment system.

If the proposed study in HCR 3034 is headed by Karen Larson, Dir. Of Mental Health and Substance Abuse, I have every confidence she will successfully sift through these issues and deliver to this body recommendations next session that will ensure our loved ones the highest quality lives possible. And that should be the #1 goal.

I was scheduled to fly to D.C. February 5th to present public comment to the President's new commission. I had to reschedule because I needed to be here to testify at a hearing. But in April when I do present to them, I'd like to say that North Dakota has heard the President's message. And, by passing both HCR 3034 and Senate Bill 2296, has demonstrated its willingness to join other states in the nation in moving toward closing the gap between great medicines and services and those who need them most.

Please vote DO PASS on HCR 3034. Thank you.

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
