Senator Thomas Fischer, Chairman of the Senate Natural Resources Committee opened the hearing on HCR 3039 urging appropriate state officials to take aggressive action against individuals, organizations and entities interfering with the development and progress of state water projects, especially the Northwest Area Water Supply Project.

All members of the committee were present.

Mike Dwyer representing the North Dakota Water Users testified in support of HCR 3039 stating this resolution is directed at Canada who has no scientific basis but is only being political about this issue as they have with several other water issues.

Representative Merle Boucher of District 9 the sponsor by HCR 3039 stated this resolution has attracted a lot of attention from some groups from North Dakota and hopefully some groups out side of the state especially Canada. The wish would be that the Manitoba premier would leave the water issues in North Dakota to be determined and debated by it's people and the United

States. Canada has filed suit to take action against the NAWS project that has been proven safe.

This is critical because if a project can be stopped as safe as this one then water development in North Dakota will encounter difficult times. He admitted the language in the resolution was very strong and would note be offended it is was amended to make a little more consumer friendly.

Senator John Traynor noted the resolution only addresses state people and nothing about Canada.

Rep. Merle Boucher added he was fine if the committee wanted to amend the resolution to contain Canadian entities.

Attorney General Wayne Stenehjem testified in a neutral position on HCR 3039 stating he simply wanted to assure the committee that the direction of the executive branch and his office concerning the water projects is quit clear. They will vigorously defend the water issues for North Dakota in its management plans for the water program. He stated that maybe an amendment is needed on Line 24 to change to a "continued" not just "aggressive" action be taken. He also gave the history of the law suit filed by Canada concerning the NAWS project.

Dale Frink. State Engineer with the North Dakota Water Commission testified in support of HCR 3039 stating that the NAWS project is proceeding. He stated that although Canada has filed a permanent injunction, what they really want is a full environmental impact statement other than just an environmental assessment. This would delay the project at least 3 years and also would provide them with opportunities to further slow down the process. He stated he had no problem with the aggressive language being added to the resolution.

Rocky Thomas representing the McLean-Sheridan Rural Water System testified in a neutral position of HCR 3039 (See attached testimony).

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3039

Page 1, line 1, after "resolution" replace the remainder of the resolution with "strongly encouraging appropriate state officials to take aggressive action against individuals, organizations, and entitles interfering with the development and progress of state water projects, especially the Northwest Area Water Supply Project, and urging the Environmental Protection Agency to relax the recently promulgated rule lowering the allowable level of arsenic in drinking water for the city of Devils Lake and other similarly situated cities in North Dakota.

WHEREAS, areas of the arid west-central region of North Dakota do not enjoy safe drinking water and do not have sufficient quantities of water to ensure a dependable, long-term supply of water that areas to the south currently enjoy; and

WHEREAS, many cities and rural areas in the Northwest Area Water Supply Project have domestic water supplies of less than desirable quality; and

WHEREAS, the Northwest Area Water Supply Project will pump Missouri River water from Lake Sakakawea as far north as Sherwoori, as far east as Bottineau, and as far west as Divide County and supply water to the city of Minot; and

WHEREAS, using Missouri River water to supply the Northwest Area Water Supply Project will be advantageous in that it will supply a clean and abundant supply of water to the residents of North Dakota, including the far west, providing a more inviting home for potential businesses and industries and strengthening local economies resulting in more and better jobs for North Dakotans; and

WHEREAS, a safe dependable supply of water is critical to the economic viability of the state and to future economic development; and

WHEREAS, individuals, organizations, and entities have opposed North Dakota water projects for political rather than scientific reasons; and

WHEREAS, the Environmental Protection Agency has recently promulgated rules reducing the allowable level of arsenic in drinking water from 50 parts per billion to 10 parts per billion; and

WHEREAS, the city of Devils Lake and other similarly situated cities in North Dakota meet the current drinking water standard for arsenic; and

WHEREAS, the city of Devils Lake and other similarly situated cities in North Dakota are being challenged to meet the stricter drinking water standard for arsenic; and

WHEREAS, the city of Devils Lake water supply is currently quadruple the new arsenic standard that is scheduled to take effect on January 23, 2006, and the degree of this concentration above the new standard may prevent the city of Devils Lake from obtaining a compliance deadline extension that is available to other cities that exceed the arsenic standard but to a lesser degree; and

WHEREAS, as many as 30 public water systems in North Dakota that currently comply with drinking water standards may find it extremely difficult to comply with the new drinking water standard for arsenic in the short timeframe before the rule takes effect;

#### TESTIMONY ON HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 3039

#### House Agriculture Committee

#### Todd Sando, Assistant State Engineer State Water Commission

#### February 14, 2003

Mr. Chairman and Members of the House Agriculture Committee, I am Todd Sando, Assistant State Engineer. I am appearing on House Concurrent Resolution 3039.

House Concurrent Resolution 3039 encourages state officials to take aggressive action against individuals, organizations and entities interfering with the development and progress of water projects, especially the Northwest Area Water Supply (NAWS) project.

I am not exactly sure what aggressive action means, but I assume it means that we should vigorously defend our rights to develop projects in accordance to appropriate laws and requirements. In the case of the NAWS project, we are vigorously defending the lawsuit filed by Manitoba against the Secretary of the Interior and the Bureau of Reclamation.

The Secretary of the Interior and the Bureau of Reclamation have filed their answer to the Manitoba complaint. The North Dakota Office of Attorney General has filed a request to intervene in the case. We are cautiously optimistic, although these types of cases are difficult to predict.

The Manitoba lawsuit did not request a temporary restraining order that would immediately stop construction. If the lawsuit would be successful, construction likely would be stopped until an environmental impact statement (EIS) was completed, which could take several years.

The State Water Commission is certainly not stopping. In fact, we just advertised for bids on another ten miles of pipeline. Last year, seven miles of pipeline was completed and another two miles of pipeline was added as a change order.

Funding for the project remains a concern, especially for 2004 and beyond. However, Governor Hoeven is working with the Bureau of Reclamation, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) in Washington, DC, and the North Dakota Congressional Delegation to obtain funding for the NAWS project and other municipal, rural and industrial (MR&I) projects.

# SCR 3039 Testimony of Rocky Thomas Natural Resources Committee Hearing 3/20/03

Mr. Chairman, members of the Natural Resources Committee, my name is Rocky Thomas; I am manager of the McLean-Sheridan Rural Water System and I serve as Secretary/Treasurer of the North Central Rural Water Consortium Board.

I would love to stand before you today and preach the ills of HCR 3039, gentlemen. Unfortunately were I to do such that could be construed as speaking out against the NAWS project itself, and as such interfering in that project, wherein under the provisions of the legislation being considered here today, "Appropriate Officials" would be required to take "Aggressive Action" against me, for exercising the rights guaranteed me under the first amendment of the constitution of the United States of America.

Instead gentlemen I shall exercise what few rights I have left in this matter by the legislation at hand, HCR 3039, by asking 3 questions of the members of the Natural Resources Committee.

In review of HCR 3039, I would ask gentlemen -

- 1. Is there anyone amongst you that standing alone in representation of your elective district; that cannot be considered an individual? By definition of Webster, I would assert that no you cannot.
- 2. Are you the elected legislators of the state of North Dakota, not collectively, an entity? Again gentlemen, by definition of Webster I would assert that you are in fact collectively, an entity.
- 3. Are you the State Legislature not charged with approving or rejecting the budget of the State Commission, including funding at a state level that is slated for the NAWS project? To the best of my knowledge gentlemen, I believe you are.

Having established those facts gentlemen, I would urge you to think long and hard about the vote you are about to east on HCR 3039, at some point in time you may have to east a vote that could be construed by others as interfering with progress of the NAWS project, and your vote today will in fact have determined whether you as an "individual," or the legislature of the state of North Dakota collectively as an 'entity," may have "aggressive action" brought against you for acting in your capacity as an elected official of the state of North Dakota.
