(0.0) CHAIRMAN GLEN FROSETH: We will open the hearing on HCR 3055.

(0.4) REP. PAM GULLESON: In the opening paragraph of the resolution that the goal exists to establish a study so we can look at the patterns of migration from rural to urban area's throughout this state and other states. CHAIRMAN COOK called the committee to order. All senators (6) present.

CHAIRMAN COOK opened the hearing on HCR 3055 which is a resolution directing the Legislative Council to study the patterns of migration from rural to urban areas experienced by this state and other Midwestern states.

REPRESENTATIVE MUELLER, District 24, introduced HCR 3055 which is to suggest to legislative council to consider an in-depth look at the rural population decline in North Dakota. He didn't think anyone would disagree with the concept that we are losing the people, young, old and in between in rural North Dakota. We think there are some things that we can do about that. Possibly looking at some of the things that are happening in other states as to how they are working with this problem. The resolutions intent is not about taking away from our bigger city cousins, it is an attempt to look in a positive way as to what we can do and what we haven't done yet. As a legislature I think we can encourage people to come back and live in the rural area. The

legislature has instituted some technology systems and applications that we could develop on a larger scale in the rural country side. Maybe we could look at the concept of retailing and distribution and put some incentives in place. Young people need a reason to be here. He urges the committee to give HCR 3055 a favorable consideration.

REPRESENTATIVE BOUCHER, District 9, worked with the bill and encourages support on HCR 3055. The single most critical issue that is facing the people of North Dakota in this legislative assembly is our population and what is happening to the population and the trends in the state of ND. It disappoints him that the focus seems to be on unemployment and the bad things. In Rolette County, in the midst of the poverty and fifty percent unemployment, and social problems, they have four hundred ninety five registered Indian businesses plus other business in the surrounding areas. This is an example to ND that if there is a will and resources put on the table to do something, we can accomplish it. It is all about will, initiatives and encouragement that we can create and send forth in a message from the legislature assembly.

SENATOR SYVERSON said he appreciated his words and that he had visited his district. He said that Rep. Boucher had mentioned that initiatives and will could be lacking in many instances and wanted to know how the legislature would go about legislating in tiative and will.

REPRESENTATIVE BOUCHER answered that we can not legislate initiative and will but he thinks as a legislator when the people come with a project it is incumbent upon the legislature to pay attention. We can utilize our time by looking at any issue that has been a success in other places and pick and sort out what would work.
