Rep. Porter: Asked Rep. Sandvig, on lines 20, 21 & 22 (justice resolution) the whole meat of the study is whether or not the Legislature should require someone to report an already reportable crime. How would we go about making it that someone would report abuse or suspected abuse of a vulnerable person more so than it already is by law?

Answer: They are not nearly as strict as they are in MN and I wanted to make it more like the recording for child abuse and neglect.

Rep. Porter: Your saying right now that there are abuse situations going on now that medical professionals in the hospitals are not reporting.

Answer: I'm not sure if they are all obliged to report or not, most facilities do it because they feel the need to but they are not enforceable then.

Rep. Wieland: Is it primarily that people are not reporting because people aren't educated to know what they are seeing. I can't imagine, seeing somebody if a child, adult or elderly or whatever as seeing somebody being abused that somebody around that person is not going to interfere in someway or at the very least report it. They can report it anonymously.

Answer: Sometimes it is the family members that are doing the abuse. So if the person is in their home and they are almost keeping the person at home and in seclusion and they are not getting out so other people would see them and report what is going on. A lot of incidents where it could happen. Hopefully a doctor or someone would see it and report it.

Rep. Weisz motioned for a DO PASS and placed on the Consent Calendar motion, second by Rep. Amerman.

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Senator J. Lee (mtr #630) - Opened hearing on HCR3062. All committee members are present. This resolution directs the Legislative Council to study vulnerable adult abuse and neglect with an emphasis on whether certain individuals should be required to report suspected incidents of vulnerable adult abuse and neglect.

Representative Sally Sandvig (mtr #679) - Introduced the bill and explained its intent. This issue came to my attention when working at a health care facility. Minnesota has much stricter requirements for reported suspected adult abuse than ND does. Also provided written testimony from Kari Thrift regarding an adult abuse case. Testimony attached.

Senator Fischer (mtr #779) - Would this fit in with Guardianship Association of ND (GAND)?

Representative Sandvig (mtr #803) - Have not discussed with GAND at this time.

My uncle who had down syndrome suffered from neglective while living in a group home. Those actions contributed to his death but did not cause it. I started writing letters in 1998 about this problem and have written them off and on since. Protection and Advocacy investigated my uncle's case and verified the neglect. They made recommendations to the agency that ran the group home. What we were told by Protection and Advocacy is that they could make recommendations but had no power to enforce the recommendations. I have asked over and over again, who does have this power. I have not been able to find this out. So I urge you while this area is being looked into, please look into what happens after the abuse and/or neglect is reported and verified. Thank you once again. It is my understanding that most money used in the Vulnerable Adult programs is from the Older Americans Act, and does not focus on young and middle aged adults. All of these vulnerable adults could benefit from earlier reporting. P&A will cooperate with other agencies in reporting and protective services.
