

Minutes: Chairman Mutch opened the hearing on SB 2037, an act to restrictions on the information a business may include on an electronically printed credit card receipt. All Senators were present.

Testimony in support of SB 2037

Market Market State of the Stat

The bill was introduced by Jennifer Clark of the Legislative Council. It is sponsored by the Family Law Committee. She was not in support or opposition of the bill. She explained that the bill applies to electronically printed credit card receipts. She pointed out line 9 and 10. Those lines read: This section does not apply to a credit card transaction in which the sole means of recording the customer's credit card number is by handwriting or by an imprint or copy of the credit card. She stated that the customer's copy should include no more than the last 5 digits of the credit card account. Also the expiration date should not be printed either. The above stated would have an effective date of January 1, 2004.

Senator Klein asks if the bill is because irresponsible customers leave their receipts behind.

She answered that there would be a variety of concerns involving the credit card number being displayed.

Senator Dever speaks in favor of the bill. He stated that there are other states using the new credit card equipment and it is proven to be beneficial to them. He stated it is not an expensive change, but a software adjustment. He stated he loses his receipts at the gas station quite often. He feels that it is not necessary to print the customer's name, account number and expiration date on the receipt.

Senator Klein expresses that perhaps a solution is to not shop at the business that prints all of the customer's information on the receipt.

Senator Heitkamp states that lately he has been getting 3 copies for receipts and asks Sen. Dever if that is a concern of his committee. Senator Dever responds that it is not.

Senator Dever adds that this is not an expensive proposition. Senator Krebsbach states that the bill would be a personal protection.

Tom Woodmansee of the ND Grocer's Assoc. wanted to go on record that they were neutral. He supported Senator Klein's views on the matter.

Russ Hanson of the ND Retailers Assoc. wanted to go on record as neutral. He offered to pass some information on regarding the cost and changing process to install the new software.

The hearing was closed. The bill was deferred and no action was taken.

Sen. Dever: Introduced bill to explain to not have the full credit card number on the receipt.

Any machines bought after Dec. 31, 2003 must have the new software. For existing machines, they have until 2007 to comply. This does not require a change in software, but an adjustment.

Rep. Ekstrom: Is this a software problem or a form problem? Sen. Dever said that the bill excludes equipment that requires imprints or handwritten receipts.

Rep. Klamin: Half of the businesses do this already and it should be easy for the rest.

Rep. Dosch: Noted that when you are at a restaurant, the store copy has all digits, the individual copy does not always have all numbers. Did this come up in family law? Sen. Dever did not know.

Jennifer Clark (Legislative Council): This is modeled after what other states are doing.

Rep. Severson: Does this include debit cards? Clark said that debits are used like credit cards, but they also fall under federal law. Rep. Keiser said banks will treat them as a different entity.
