

Senator Karen Krebsbach, Chairman calls committee to order beginning with SB 2050-- Senators Krebsbach, Chr, Dever, Vice Chr., Brown, Wardner, Fairfield, and Nelson present.

Discussion began with Jay E. Buringrud the Asst. Director of the Legislative Council, appearing on behalf of Senator Stenejhem, took the podium and explained the bill and the reasoning for the bill to the committee. He explained that this bill required the governor to accepted delivery of bills at the Legislative Assembly and present it during regular business hours. The governor must coordinate ways to receive bills outside normal business hours or when the governor must leave the state. This bill arose as a result of the former Minnesota Governor Jesse Ventura, the Minnesota Legislature was working after hours and on a emergency basis towards the end of the session, and they presented a bill to Governor Ventura at about 5:20 PM and the doors where locked. Jay Buringrud: It is legislative branch authority not executive branch authority. The houses should work it out with the governor's staff.

Senator Dever: When the governor is our out of state does the LT. Governor have authority to receive bills?

Jay Buringrud: Yes, but the governor does not usually give up that authority to let the Lt. governor sign or veto a bill. Governor is usually not gone long enough because he has 3 legislative days to veto a bill.

Senator Krebsbach: That 3 days begins when the governor receives the bill?

Jay Buringrud: Yes, not including the day of delivery.

Minutes: Chairman Klein: called the hearing to order. All committee members were present.

Jay Buringrud, Asst. Director of Legislative Council: appeared on behalf of the Legislative

Management Committee which is the interim committee that recommended this bill.

I'm appearing just to explain the bill, not in favor or against. It is a bill that is called the Jesse

Ventura Bill. If you remember last spring, Minnesota LC sent a bill down to the governors office
that was after 5:00, the Governor locked the doors, and they had to cut the bill, it hit the news and
the next day the Governor received the bill. Can that happen in North Dakota? Yes it could, we
reviewed the Constitutional Provision, there is no requirement in the Constitution that the
Governor accept bills, there is a requirement that Legislature presents bills to the Governor, and
there also is a provision in the Legislation Article that says the Legislation shall enact laws that
carry out the constitution so in the past the Legislation has enacted a law requiring the Governor
to file a bill to the Secretary of State.

This law right here says the Governor shall accept the delivery of bills presented during regular business hours. Also the Governor may coordinate with the presiding officer of the House or Senate with the respect of receiving bills when the Governor is going to be out of town. This has happened in the past when the Governor has locked the door, and Legislature wasn't able to get that bill to the Governor, its usually when there is a new Governor, new Governors staff doesn't talk to the House or the current staff. Court cases in other states say that do present to the Governor or a member of the Governors staff is recognized as valid presentment of bills to the Governor. The main thing this bill encourages is, communication.

Representative Klemin: when was it in the past that this was presented?

Jay Buringrud: 1993.

Representative Tieman: made a motion to **DO PASS** on SB 2050.

Representative Amerman: SECOND the motion.

VOTE: 14-YES 0-NO 0-ABSENT.
