The original version of this bill would have increased auctioneer and auction clerk license fees from the current level of \$35 per year to \$60 per year. The first engrossed version of the bill leaves annual license fees at their current level.

The fee increases originally proposed by this bill would have increased general fund revenues by approximately \$29,000 per biennium. Approximately \$18,000 of this amount would have come from auctioneer licenses and \$11,000 would have come from auction clerk licenses.

Since the first engrossed version of this bill leaves license fees at their current level, the net revenue change from current levels is zero.

Rep. Kelser: What does the bond cover? Mielke said that if there is a complaint, they have to have a hearing. Then they mediate between the buyers and the sellers. The clerk is responsible for a bad transaction.

Rep. Boe: Explained that a bond covers the auctioneer if they misrepresent the items. If you lose your bond, you lose your license to be an auctioneer.

Rep. Kasper: Concerned with the size of the bond because he had an experience with getting counterfeit items at a sale.

Rep. Boe: You rarely need a certified check for auctions. Most auctioneers know people in the small towns.

Rep. Nottestad: Added that most times, the bank will be called for large pieces of equipment.

TESTIMONY

Mr. Chairman and committee members, my name is Jon Mielke. I am the Public Service Commission's executive secretary. I also serve as the director of the Commission's Licensing Division. This bill was introduced at the request of the Commission and the agency's oversight of the auction industry.

The first revision being proposed at lines six and seven will make it easier for licensees to submit their annual renewal applications. The law's current wording makes it necessary to have renewal applications notarized. This creates problems for licensees and we believe that it is unnecessary. This bill would revise the law to make it necessary to have only the licensee's initial application notarized.

On line 11 of the bill, the Commission is recommending that the Legislature consider increasing annual license fees from \$35 to \$60 per year. These fees were last increased in 1987. The increase will make it possible for fee increases to cover more of the direct costs associated with providing related services. This

increase is equal to about 3% per year since the fees were last adjusted.

On line 13 of the bill, the Commission is suggesting that the law be revised to require that application renewals be <u>received</u> by January 31st rather than <u>submitted</u> by that date in order to avoid a late filing penalty. We encounter a variety of problems with the "received" language. Some applications come in without the necessary bond or fee, some get faxed in, some are not signed, etc. It will just be far cleaner if we can require that complete applications must by received by a date certain.

The last change proposed by this bill is on lines 20 and 21. State law currently requires that there must be a written contract between the between the licensee and the seller. We believe that this contract should contain language concerning the size of the licensee's bond. Auctioneer bonds are only \$5,000 and clerk bonds are only \$10,000. This provision will help avoid any misperceptions or false senses of security on the part of the seller.

RE: SENATE BILL 2114

In regards to Senate Bill 2114 which pertains to increasing auctioneers and clerks fees from \$35.00 to \$60.00 per year. This is an increase of 58% on license fees.

There are currently 381 auctioneers as of 11-8-'02 that are licensed in North Dakota. Many of these licenses are issued to auctioneers and clerks who are not active in the auction profession. Current applicants generate approximately \$21,945.00 with the auctioneer and clerk licenses of another 246 clerks for a total licenses issued of 627 x \$35.00 = \$21,945.00 for the Public Service Commission.

The auctioneers and clerks are regulated by the Public Service Commission and other than the licensing process for auctioneers and clerks, I believe the Public Service Commission spends little time dealing with the issues pertaining to auctioneers. This is why I believe the increase in fees is questionable. This 58% increase would generate over \$15,000.00 in additional fees collected by the Public Service Commission.

The other parts of Senate Bill 2114 changes of wording, etc., we have no problem with those issues and would be in support of the changes.

TESTIMONY

Mr. Chairman and committee members, my name is Jon Mielke. I am the Public Service Commission's executive secretary. I also serve as the director of the Commission's Licensing Division. This bill was introduced at the request of the Commission.

The first revision being proposed at lines six and seven will make it easier for licensees to submit their annual renewal applications. The law's current wording makes it necessary to have renewal applications notarized. This creates problems for licensees and we believe that it is unnecessary. This bill would revise the law to make it necessary to have only the licensee's initial application notarized.

On line 13 of the bill, the Commission is suggesting that the law be revised to require that application renewals be <u>received</u> by January 31st rather than <u>submitted</u> by that date in order to avoid a late filing penalty. We encounter a variety of problems with the "submitted" language. Some applications come in without the

necessary bond or fee, some get faxed in, some are not signed, etc. It will just be far cleaner if we can require that complete applications must by received by a date certain.

The last change proposed by this bill is on lines 20 and 21. State law currently requires that there must be a written contract between the between the licensee and the seller. We believe that this contract should contain language concerning the size of the licensee's bond. Auctioneer bonds are only \$5,000 and clerk bonds are only \$10,000. This provision will help avoid any misperceptions or false senses of security on the part of the seller.

We would also like to point out that the original version of this bill recommended that annual license fees for auctioneers and auction clerks be increased by \$25 per year. These fees are currently \$35 per year and were last increased in 1987. The increase would have made it possible for fee revenues to cover more of the direct costs associated with providing related services. This increase would have equaled about 3% per year since the fees were last adjusted and would have generated an additional \$29,000 in biennial revenue for the General Fund. The House amended this proposed fee increase out of the bill.
