Minutes: The hearing on SB 2133 relating to Military Selective Service Act registration was opened by Chairman Senator Thomas Trenbeath. Roll call was taken with all committee members present.

Colonel Jerald Engleman: (North Dakota National Guard) Represented the North Dakota National Guard as the sponsor of the bill. See attached testimony.

Keith Magnusson: (Deputy Director for Driver and Vehicle Services, DOT) The drivers license division has worked with the Adjutant General's office and the local Selective Service office to make this bill workable.

Senator Mutch: Requested information from the National Guard as to which states have passed similar legislation. (Meter 3190)

National Guard will provide the information to the committee.

Senator Bercier: Can a person choose to defer registering for selective service?

LTC Alan Dohrmann: (Judge Advocate with the ND National Guard) The federal law as written now does not give the option to register in the window between the ages of 18-26. There is a requirement right after the 18th birthday to register with the selective service. There are potential penalties it a person does not register. (Meter 3685)

Nancy Carlson: Testified in opposition of this bill. (Meter 4060) The idea behind the bill is correct but the wording to make it dependent on age and sex with the denial of a drivers license is wrong.

Senator Bercier: Does federal law still state only male?

LTC Dohrmann: Yes. Mandatory service under the draft is only males 18-26.

Senator Nething: Was it a requirement that the General sponsor this legislation?

LTC Dohrmann: This is a nationwide effort. Every region is being asked to look at this and consider it. One of the duties of the Adjutant General is to oversee the Selective Service

### **SENATE BILL 2133**

Mr. Chairman, Members of the Committee, good morning.

This Bill requires the registration of males between the ages of 18 and 26 with the Selective Service System when applying for an operator's license, permit, or identification card. As you may be aware, male residents within this age range are required, under Federal law, to register with the Selective Service System. This Bill simply provides these individuals with another convenient method to fulfill this obligation. This Bill also benefits the Federal Government by providing a cost effective method for enrolling young men in the Selective Service System.

Over the past several years, the Selective Service System has been working with states to pass legislation like the Bill before you today. To date, over 27 States, Territories and the District of Columbia, have passed laws that tie issuance of an operator's license to registration with the Selective Service System. Some of these states needed this legislation due to the low percentages of registration within their state. Although, this is not the case in North Dakota, with a registration rate of over 95%, this Bill may capture a portion of the remaining 5% and help ensure these individuals are not in violation of Federal law.

Under Federal law [50 U.S.C. App. Sec. 453], all male citizens and other male persons residing in the United States, between the ages of 18 and 26, must register with the Selective Service System. Failure to do so is punishable, following a conviction in Federal District Court, by five years imprisonment, a \$10,000 fine, or both. Additionally, failure to register with the Selective Service system disqualifies those required to register from receiving education assistance under the Higher Education Act of 1965, Federal job training programs, and certain federal and state employment. While this Bill helps the Selective Service System, we believe it also helps the individuals in this State who are required to register. The bottom line is males between 18 and 26 are required to register. By passing this Bill, we will save some of these individuals a trip to the Post Office and ensure that they are in compliance with Federal law.

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We have coordinated this Bill with the State branch of selective service, the Regional Office in Colorado, the North Dakota Veterans Coordinating Council, and the North Dakota Department of Transportation. Each of these entities supports this Bill as filed.

Finally, I would like to draw your attention to the attached fiscal note, which was prepared based on information provided by the Driver's License Division. While I cannot guarantee it, the Selective Service System has provided its 99% assurance that they will reimburse the state of North Dakota for the amount of this fiscal note. They have done this for similar states, with similar expenses, in the past, and assured us that they would do the same for the state of North Dakota.

SUBJECT: SB 2133—States that have Enacted Selective Service Legislation

1. At this mornings hearing, the Transportation Committee requested information on which states have enacted legislation similar to SB 2133. The following states and territories have enacted a law similar to SB 2133.

Alabama, Arkansas, Colorado, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Idaho, Illinois, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri New Hampshire, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma Pennsylvania (Passed; awaiting Governor's signature), Rhode Island, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas Utah, Virginia, West Virginia, Wisconsin, District of Columbia Northern Mariana Islands, Virgin Islands

- 2. Senator Nething also requested some information on Selective Service registration rates for the states that have enacted a registration law. Please find attached information provide to me by Ms. Debby Bielanski, Deputy Director, Region III, United States Selective Service. I have marked those states that have passed registration laws with an asterisk. Senator Nething specifically asked whether any states with registration numbers as high as ours have passed a law. A review of the attached "Selective Service 'Report Card'" shows that only New Hampshire has a registration law and a rate in excess of 95%. Several states with registration rates in the low 90% range have also passed laws. With that said, I need to inform this Committee that since these numbers were release in May 2002, North Dakota's registration rate has slipped over 3% and now stand at 96%.


