

Rep. Carlisle This moves the crime lab into the Attorney General's Office. 'The funding for that is in the executive recommendation for the AG's office.

Rep. Warnke The question is we deleted 14 FTE's to the Health Department, but we are adding more than 14 to the AG's budget. They added more for operating to the AG's budget than we deleted from the Health Department's budget.

Allen Knudson, LC The first two items on the green sheet for the Attorney General talk about the transfer of the 14.5 positions from the Health Department, and in addition to that there was an increase in funding to the Attorney General's budget of about \$300,000 for additional operating costs and for the new FTE that is added in.

Rep. Delzer We have to ask questions on this.

Chairman Traynor and members of the Senate Judiciary Committee and Chairman DeKrey and members of the House Judiciary Committee, good morning. I am Edward Erickson and I am an Assistant Attorney General. Senate Bill 2151 transfers the Forensic Science Division and the State Toxicologist from the Department of Health to the Attorney General's Office in order to form the State Crime Laboratory. This bill requires the State Crime Laboratory to be kept administratively separated from the Bureau of Criminal Investigation. No other substantive changes are being made and the State Forensic Examiner will remain with the Department of Health under this bill.

Sections 1 and 2 of the bill make amendments to Title 19 of the North Dakota Century Code, which addresses foods, drugs, oils, and compounds. The State Department of Health will continue to perform laboratory testing of foods and beverages but laboratory testing concerning criminal investigations, including illegal drugs, will be transferred to the State Crime Laboratory under the Attorney General.

Section 3 of the bill changes a reference to the State Toxicologist from being part of the Department of Health to being under the authority of the Attorney General. The specific law being changed exempts the State Toxicologist from the Administrative Agencies Practice Act. This amendment does not change that present law.

Sections 4 through 10 of the bill change references to the Forensic Science Division of the Department of Health to the State Crime Laboratory throughout

chapter 31-13, which governs DNA testing for law enforcement purposes. Another bill, House Bill No. 1235, makes substantive changes to several of these statutes, and those changes are compatible with this bill.

Section 11 of the bill makes a change from the Forensic Sciences Division to the State Crime Laboratory concerning alcohol or drug testing in Title 39 of the Century Code, which concerns motor vehicles. Other references to alcohol or blood testing in Title 39 did not require changes because they referred to the State Toxicologist but did not refer to the Department of Health or the Forensic Sciences Division.

Section 12 of the bill creates the State Crime Laboratory Division in the Office of Attorney General. This section was modeled after existing legislation creating the Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division of the Attorney General's Office, and also includes provisions taken from existing law at section 23-01-09.1, which created the State Toxicologist and defined the State Toxicologist's duties. The Division Director serves at the pleasure of the Attorney General, but the State Merit System covers all other employees, including the State Toxicologist.

Section 13 of the Bill repeals three sections. Sections 12-60-21 and 12-60-22 relate to laboratory functions being performed by the Bureau of Criminal Investigation. Section 23-01-09.1 created the Office of State Toxicologist in the State Department of Health. As stated previously, this language was transferred to the Attorney General in section 12 of the Bill.

Section 14 of the Bill operates to transfer existing administrative rules regarding the State Crime Laboratory to the Office of Attorney General and allows references within those rules to be changed to conform to this Act. This section also provides that

any certifications, designations or approvals made by the State Toxicologist before the effective date of the act continue to be valid after the effective date. This continued validity is necessary so that the legal authority for officers who have been trained and certified to perform blood alcohol testing will continue uninterrupted.

Section 15 provides an effective date to coincide with the fiscal year and section 16 deciares the act to be an emergency measure. The fiscal note on the bill shows the transfer of the Forensic Sciences Division budget from the Health Department to the Attorney General's Office for the State Crime Laboratory.
