<u>Senator Thomas Fischer</u>, Chairman of the Senate Natural Resources Committee opened the hearing on SB 2242 relating to nonresident waterfowl hunting licenses.

All members of the Committee were present except Senator John Traynor.

Senator Joel Heitkamp of District 26 cosponsor of SB 2242 introduced the bill stating there is problem of depredation of grain fields caused by Canadian geese. It was suggested there be a spring hunt but because of federal law this can not be done so the bill really did nothing. So he submitted an amendment that takes things back to the fall season and it allows nonresident hunters to have no limits. This will cause hunter pressure on the geese and reduce their numbers.

Rep. Pam Gulleson of District 26 testified that about a year ago a group got together to discuss the problem of the over population of geese and the depredation they cause. She presented a binder that contained photos of the depredation. She stated this bill might be the solution to the problem of the over population.

Chair Nelson called the hearing on relating to hunting of Canada geese by nonresidents; and to provide an expiration date to order.

Sen. Heitkamp: Introduced SB 2242. The problem is pretty simple to explain but hard to solve. The geese have multiplied in drastic numbers and are damaging crops. They are doing a lot of crop damage. One idea we have is to have an early season goose hunt. We cannot have it count against nonresident hunters. Unfortunately when you are losing you livelihood you will defend that. Some of these people are taking matters into their own hand. I don't think we need to do that. We want to allow them to get the help they need. We want more of these harvested.

Rep. Klein: why can't the local resident take care of this. Aren't there enough residents to hunt?

Sen. Heitkamp: They can. If it is designated area they can. The goal is to put enough pressure on them as we can. The one thing we have learned about this session. The word that keeps coming up is access. Access is not a problem in my area. Bring as shot gun and come on down.

Rep. Hanson: I have an amendment for Richland and Sargent Counties that will take care of your problem right now. If you get your problem solved then you can take it off in two years.

Sen. Heitkamp: I knew an amendment may be surfacing like this. While it would take care of the people we are aiming at. It seems to me that we need to take care of the people in the rest of the state. I know it is a problem in my area, and if it is as problem in my area it is likely a problem in other areas.

Sen. Hanson: We can add more counties to it if you want.

Sen. Heitkamp: We will know not know the factor. The weather forecasts I have heard pushes this drought further east.

Rep. Norland: It looks like this is done in the spring of the year. They prefer to eat grass.

Sen. Heitkamp: We cannot do it in the spring. Federally, we can only do it in the fall.

Rep. Norland: It seems to me we are tying to fix the problem in the wrong season.

Sen. Heitkamp: These geese were introduced unnaturally. This is happening because someone decided to start a goose hatchery. Now we have a problem. Where I differ from you is the fact that if you shoot them in the fall they will not be back in next spring.

Rep. Gulleson: Testified in support of SB 2242. 10 years ago we did not have a population of Canadian geese. Fish and Game and US Fish and Wildlife and local landowners worked together to allow this population to grow. They now ask us legitimately for help today. Be careful what you ask for. Million dollar cost to area farmers. They are trying to fix the problem in a proactive way. A large group of farmers have all chipped in the pool to build a case. This is a win-win situation. There is increased access and the farmers relieve this problem by cutting down on this problem.

Chair Nelson: I would not have a problem giving your department the authority to set zones to respond to areas with depredation problems and mitigate areas where nonresidents are not welcome. How bad does it have to get before you open up an early season.

Randy Kreil: Noted earlier testimony where an advisory board helped to bring about an early Canada goose season. There has been some concern about totally wiping out the population.

Chair Nelson: Asked game and Fish to draft an amendment relating to zones.

Rep. Porter: How do you track the success and failure of this.

Randy Kreil: We may be able to do that with nonresident hunting questionnaires.

Testimony from the North Dakota Game and Fish Department

Hunting of Canada Geese by Nonresidents in the Early September Season Senate Natural Resources Committee February 13, 2003

30 We Arm

The purpose of Senate Bill 2242 is to allow nonresident hunters to participate in the early September Canada goose hunting season without the days counting against their 14 day, two seven day, or statewide seven day restrictions. Since their reintroduction in the mid 1970s, Canada geese nested in relatively small numbers in North Dakota until 1994 when an unprecedented 10 year wet cycle began. This wet cycle resulted in increased wetland habitat and the Canada goose population responded by expanding to the point that crop depredation by nesting and brood rearing geese became a problem in certain parts of the state.

The early September Canada goose season was first implemented in 1999 in an effort to reduce the resident Canada goose population. The first season was open in only Richland and Sargent Counties and ran from September 1 through the 15th. The next year the season was expanded statewide and a third week was added along with a liberal bag limit of 5 birds per day. In each of the past two years over 38,000 Canada geese have been killed in this September hunting season. The department will continue to offer this hunting season until such time as resident Canada goose numbers decline to a level where depredation are reduced to a more acceptable level.

In addition to this special hunting season, our department has been working with landowners in the southeast part of the state to develop methods to manage resident goose populations and reduce the damage caused by these geese to crops such as soybeans and corn. One of the tools being used is involving more people in the September hunting season. This bill would allow nonresident hunters to participate in the September season without the days counting against their regular season hunt. The number of people we would expect to participate in this opportunity may be relatively small but the additional harvest would be welcome by the landowners.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

Cass County Wildlife Club opposes SB 2242 because this bill could allow nonresidents up to 35 days of Canada goose hunting depending on the length of the season in September.

If this bill were to pass, we fear outfitters could tie up known areas where local Canada's exist. This could be to the demise of the local hunter. If nonresidents had to be selective in the use of their 14-day limit, it would seem more reasonable.

If depredation is the problem in a local area, it would seem the local hunters could help reduce the problem through cooperation with landowners.

The Cass County Wildlife Club therefore opposes SB 2242.
