SB 2301

Good morning, Mr. Chairman and members of the committee. I'm Tim Horner, Director of Transportation Programs for the North Dakota Department of Transportation. I'm here to give background about and to testify on behalf of the department in support of SB 2301. This bill would allow "EXEMPT" signs to be used at highway-rail grade crossings where the track is no longer in use. The Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) does not allow a state to use the "EXEMPT" sign unless the state has a law or regulation authorizing it. This statutory change would provide the NDDOT with an additional safety option for managing railroad crossings.

North Dakota has out-of-service highway-rail crossings that are potential hazards because school buses, and trucks carrying hazardous material, must stop (pursuant to NDCC 39-10-43), even if it is not possible for a train to occupy the crossing. In the past, the department has addressed the situation by asking the railroad to remove the crossing or by installing "TRACKS OUT OF SERVICE" signs.

When a railroad uses "TRACKS OUT OF SERVICE" signs, the MUTCD says they must remove all traffic control devices and gate arms, and that signal heads must be removed, hooded, or turned from view. The "TRACKS OUT OF SERVICE" sign implies the tracks no longer will be used. Stating this may be premature if abandonment procedures have not been implemented.

For these reasons, some railroads have been reluctant to install "TRACKS OUT OF SERVICE" signs until the rail abandonment process is completed. Until "TRACKS OUT OF SERVICE" signs are in place school buses and trucks carrying hazardous material are in potential danger of being rear-ended when they obey the law and stop at a crossing known to be unused.

SB 2301 would authorize the department to place an "EXEMPT" sign at unused rail-highway grade crossings where the railroad's abandonment process has not been implemented or completed. The sign would indicate that drivers of school buses and hazardous materials trucks identified in NDCC 39-10-43 are not required to stop.

We believe the railroads and trucking industry are receptive to use of the "EXEMPT" sign. In addition when the "EXEMPT" sign is used, traffic control devices do not have to be removed, hooded, or turned from view.

If SB 2301 is passed, the department will state in it's internal policy that before "EXEMPT" signs are used, the operating railroad must certify in writing that measures have been undertaken to insure that no train, locomotive, or other railroad equipment can occupy the crossing.

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

Dear Mr. Chairman:

Because of an NDMCA Budget Committee and Board of Directors meeting I am unable to attend your committee hearings on Thursday, February 27th.

Please be advised that on behalf of the NDMCA, I wish to advise your committee of our members support of SB2301.

As you may recall, several years ago the ND Legislature authorized the state to adopt the Federal Motor Carriers Safety Regulations. These regulations cover most all the safety standards by which the trucking industry is to operate under on the intra and inter state levels.

Section 392.10 of the regulations deals with railroad grade crossings and vehicle stopping requirements. Sub-sections four and five of that section deal with abandoned crossings and the marking of those crossings with a sign reading "Exempt".

Passage of SB2301 would confirm with signing regulations the trucking industry's drivers identify with when approaching grade crossings that have been abandoned.

Mr. Chairman and members of the House Transportation Committee, we request your recommendation of a do pass for SB2301.
