Testimony on Senate Bill 2387
Regarding equity investment in value added agriculture by the Development Fund Sen. Ryan Taylor, District 7

Good morning, Mr. Chairman and members of the Senate Industry, Business and Labor Committee. My name is Ryan Taylor, senator representing the 7th District. I'm here to discuss Senate Bill 2387, a bill to help grow the value added sector of our state's agricultural economy and put another tool of success in the hands of our beginning farmers and ranchers.

The genesis of SB 2387 was with former Senator Ken Kroeplin, and was proposed to me by Senator Elroy Lindaas. I embraced the bill because of my experiences in production agriculture and the challenges of financing and getting into the value added sector. As communications director and an investor in Northern Plains Premium Beef, I saw ranchers step up with \$10 million in equity commitments only to remain short of the needed equity and deny themselves the opportunities in the consumer market for beef.

The development fund is a necessary tool in "gap financing" for primary sector industry in North Dakota. This bill puts the equity investment responsibilities of the primary sector of value added agriculture under the direction of the value added agriculture promotion and equity board. This think tank of players in the value added ag business was recently appointed by Governor Hoeven to include:

Lt. Gov. Jack Dalrymple, representing the ED&F director
Roger Johnson, ag commissioner
Jerry Doan, state board of agricultural research and education
Duane Hauck, NDSU Extension Service
Eric Hardmeyer, Bank of North Dakota
Mike Warner, Hillsboro farmer
Clayton Fegley, Berthold farmer
Barry Medd, representing the Farm Credit System

The N.D. Development fund is already providing loans and taking equity investments in companies that hold the potential of growing our state's economy, including some in the ag sector. Last year's investments were in 40 businesses with \$7.2 million. But manufacturing silk trees and florals as is done by the successful Botanical Silk Accents company is different from harvesting steers and cutting up choice ribeyes for the backyard barbeque grill. Likewise the investment knowledge for each of those businesses is very different. I think 2387 would be a step in the right direction to have agricultural people passing judgments and providing direction on agricultural projects. Value added ag does more than provide jobs in a single community, it provides demand for raw products statewide, and it can provide increased returns to farmers and ranchers who've invested in their future.

That leads to another important component of the bill on lines 20 to 24 on page 1. The average age of a full time farmer in North Dakota is 55 years old. We know that agriculture is in a tough state of transition. As a 32-year-old rancher, I am definitely in the minority. How can we ease the transition from one generation to the next and make sure that our next generation has the tools they need to be successful? Allowing them to invest in a value-added "winner" at a discounted rate is one tool we can put in their twenty first century toolbox.
