
(Meter 4097) Senator O'Connell, District 6: Introduced the bill that he sponsored, Handed out some written testimony Exhibit 1. The bill will transfer up to two hundred thousand dollars. This legislation was done in 1997 for funding studies and evaluations regarding the registration processes for minor crop pesticides in '99. (Meter 4237) Senator Krauter, co-sponor on the bill: The committees reference on this bill, if you go back to SB 2026 it will provide you with some financial analysis of the minor use fund that was presented to us in this committee. It will show you the beginning balance of this fund on June 30, 2001, was one hundred and eighty thousand. Of that current biennium fifty five hundred thousand was transferred from the herb fund into the minor use pesticide fund giving us a total of six hundred and eighty thousand. Through the biennium three hundred and forty thousand was used for projects that left a balance of three hundred and forty thousand. Now going into this next biennium, the three hundred and forty

thousand in the governor's budget there is a two hundred and fifty thousand expenditure to use at the NDSU research center on some pesticide plats/plots. Which brings that count down to ninety thousand. This is a piece of legislation that we see every legislative session, and it needs to be transferred up to two hundred thousand into that fund to build the balance back up in there so it can be used for those minor crops such as canola, sunflowers. (Meter 4470) Jack Dalrymple, Lt. Governor: I agree with the bills sponsor that we are short a couple of hundred grand for the minor use fund in '03-'05. The question becomes how you want to address that - this bill would be one way but what I need to emphasis is that the whole question of the minor use fund balance and appropriations and the herb fund balance in appropriations and another bill in the senate that has to do with the registration fee that would supply new income in herb fund are all interrelated. They need to be address together and the appropriate place to do that is this committee on the Ag commissioner's budget. There are a couple of options, which I considered was the fact that the crop harmonization board itself, of which I am the chairman, will have in this biennium, spending authority that exceeds their needs by about two hundred thousand dollars. I think technically according to the law, the crop harmonization board would have the legal authority to transfer those funds right now to the minor use fund and to continue to oversee their use. But I decided that is something that should be looked at by the legislature, I know how I felt when I was in appropriation and money got hazed in a different way than what people had remember. That was not that was presented at the last session, you do need to approve that if you want to go in that direction. In any case, you wind up in the same place which is that the herb fund will then be short two hundred thousand and you are going to have to figure out where that money is going to have to come from, that registration fee reinstatement or will it come from savings in herb or

(Meter 4900) Chairman Holmberg announced that this bill will go into a subcommittee that is working on the Ag department's budget. Consisting of Senator Bowman, Thane and Krauter. This will be in their portfolio. SB 2398 - minor use pesticide fund

The bill provides for a transfer of up to \$200,000 from the environment and rangeland protection fund to the minor use fund.

- 1. The minor use fund was created by the Legislature in 1997 for funding studies and evaluations regarding the registration process for minor crop pesticides. In 1999 minor use pesticides for major crops was added.
- 2. When current obligations are met (a little over \$130,000) and if the transfer out of the fund to the NDSU budget (proposed in the Governor's budget) there will only be \$90,000 left in the fund.
- 3. \$90,000 will not adequately fund the demand for minor use pesticide projects in the coming biennium.
- 4. The fund has worked well 28 minor pesticides approved, 7 crop protection products made available to North Dakota farmers.
- 5. Sunflower, canola, pea and lentil producers as well as other minor and major crop producers have benefited greatly from the projects funded by the minor use pesticide fund.
- 6. Another bill in this session, SB 2319, would lift the sunset on pesticide registration fees and would generate as much as \$450,000 of revenue for the environment and rangeland fund and allow funding for this bill as well.

Testimony of Jeff Olson, Program Manager Plant Industries North Dakota Department of Agriculture SB 2398 February 4, 2003 9:30 a.m. Senate Appropriations Harvest Room

Chairperson Holmberg and members of the committee, my name is Jeff Olson. I am a Program Manager at the Department of Agriculture, and I administer the Minor Use Fund for the Crop Protection Product Harmonization and Registration Board through a contract between the board and the Department of Agriculture. I am here to testify for Commissioner Johnson in support of SB 2398.

The Minor Use Fund was developed by the 1997 Legislature for the purpose of conducting or commissioning studies, investigations, and evaluations regarding the registration process for crop protection products for minor crops. The Minor Use Fund was initially funded by a \$350,000 transfer from the Environmental and Rangeland Protection (EARP) Fund. Grant expenditures from the Minor Use Fund during the 1997-1999 biennium amounted to \$34,775. The 1999 Legislature authorized a carry-over of \$314,724 into the 1999-2001 biennium and transferred \$285,000 from the EARP Fund creating a balance of \$599,724. During that session, legislation

to change the definition of the Minor Use Fund to include studies for major crops and minor uses was also approved. At the end of the 1999-2001 biennium, there was a carry-over of \$180,289.

During the 2001 Legislature, \$500,000 was transferred from the EARP Fund to the Minor Use Fund for continued research, and the oversight of the Minor Use Fund was 'noved from the Pesticide Control Board to the Crop Protection Product Harmonization and Registration Board. To date during the current biennium, \$133,275 has been obligated from this fund and another \$250,000 was transferred from the Minor Use Fund to the NDSU budget in the Governor's budget and SB 1021 to defray expenses of minor use pesticide research. With these obligations and transfers, there is a current balance of \$90,289 in the Minor Use Fund for the remainder of the present biennium. This amount is not adequate for funding the projects that we expect during the coming biennium.

Since the inception of the Fund, there have been 28 minor use projects approved, of which seven crop protection products have been made available for use by ND farmers. Table 1 shows the breakdown of the projects and their progress toward EPA registration. Participants in the program include NDSU, National Sunflower Association, Northern Canola Growers, ND Dry Pea and Lentil Association, U.S. Durum Growers, USDA Wildlife Services, and Dakota Pasta Growers. The program has created enormous interest and response during the previous biennia. Because of this interest and the success of this program, this bill was drafted to request \$200,000 be transferred from the EARP Fund to the Minor Use Fund for research purposes.

Mr. Chairman, another bill that will likely cross your committee is SB 2319 which deals with removing the sunset of the pesticide registration fees and allowing for an allocation of \$250,000 for the noxious Weeds line to be used for saltcedar control. This bill is being heard in the Senate Agriculture Committee on Thursday, February 6. Removing the sunset from the pesticide registration fees would generate approximately \$450,000 of revenue to the EARP Fund and would allow for these two bill to be funded.



Chairperson Svedjan and members of the committee, my name is Jeff Olson. I am a Program Manager at the Department of Agriculture, and I administer the Minor Use Fund for the Crop Protection Product Harmonization and Registration Board through a contract between the board and the Agriculture Department. I am here to testify for Commissioner Johnson in support of SB 2398.

The Minor Use Fund was developed by the 1997 Legislature for the purpose of conducting or commissioning studies, investigations, and evaluations regarding the registration process for crop protection products for minor crops. The Minor Use Fund was initially funded by a \$350,000 transfer from the Environmental and Rangeland Protection (EARP) Fund. Grant expenditures from the Minor Use Fund during the 1997-1999 biennium amounted to \$34,775. The 1999 Legislature authorized a carry-over of \$314,724 into the 1999-2001 biennium and transferred \$285,000 from the EARP Fund creating a balance of \$599,724. During that session, legislation to change the definition of the Minor Use Fund to include studies for major crops and minor uses

was also approved. At the end of the 1999-2001 biennium, there was a carry-over of \$180,289 of which the majority of these funds had been allocated to research projects.

During the 2001 Legislature, \$500,000 was transferred from the EARP Fund to the Minor Use Fund for continued research, and the oversight of the Minor Use Fund was moved from the Pesticide Control Board to the Crop Protection Product Harmonization and Registration Board. To date during the current biennium, \$133,275 has been obligated from this fund and another \$250,000 was transferred from the Minor Use Fund to the NDSU budget in the Governor's proposed budget in SB 1021 to defray expenses of minor use pesticide research. With these obligations and transfers, there is a current balance of \$90,289 in the Minor Use Fund for the remainder of the present biennium. This amount is not adequate for funding the projects that we expect during the coming biennium.

Since the inception of the Fund, there have been 28 minor use projects approved, of which seven crop protection products have been made available for use by ND farmers. Table 1 shows the breakdown of the projects and their progress toward EPA registration. Participants in the program include NDSU, National Sunflower Association, Northern Canola Growers, ND Dry Pea and Lentil Association, U.S. Durum Growers, USDA Wildlife Services, and Dakota Pasta Growers. The program has created enormous interest and response during the previous biennia. Because of this interest and the success of this program, this bill was drafted to request \$200,000 be transferred from the EARP Fund to the Minor Use Fund for research purposes.

Mr. Chairman, another bill that will likely cross your committee is SB 2319 which deals with removing the sunset of the pesticide registration fees and allowing for an allocation of \$250,000 for the Noxious Weeds line to be used for Saltcedar control. This bill is being heard in the House Agriculture Committee on Thursday, March 13. Amending the sunset for the pesticide registration fees would generate approximately \$450,000 of revenue to the EARP Fund and would allow for these two bill to be funded.

The Minor Use Fund was established in 1997 by the 55th legislative assembly to conduct studies, investigations, and evaluations regarding the registration process for crop protection products for minor crops and minor uses. The Minor Use Fund was initially funded by a \$350,000 transfer from the Environment and Rangeland Protection (EARP) Fund.

During the 2001 Legislature, \$500,000 was transferred from the EARP Fund to the Minor Use Fund for continued research. After transfers to NDSU in the proposed executive budget and SB 1021 to defray expenses of minor use pesticide research at NDSU the balance in the fund will drop to about \$90,000. Anticipated costs for projects in the next biennium will exceed the remaining balance of the fund, meaning that some of those projects will have to be abandonded.

Sunflower; canola; durum; pea and lentil commodity groups as well as NDSU and federal agencies have utilized funding from the minor pesticide use fund. Seven crop protection products have been made available for use by ND farmers since the inception of the fund.

Because of the interest in and utility of the program we felt it was important to ensure that adequate resources are available. SB 2398 transfers \$200,000 from the EARP (environment and rangeland protection) Fund to the Minor Use Fund for research purposes.

[SB 2319 removes the sunset on the pesticide registration fees. That bill is being heard in the House Agriculture Committee on Thursday, March 13. Removing the sunset from the pesticide registration fees would generate approximately \$450,000 of revenue to the EARP Fund and would allow for both SB 2398 and SB 2319 to be funded.]
