Minutes: CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG opened the joint session hearing to SB 2423. A bill relating to provide legislative intent regarding state employee reductions; to provide for a report to the budget section; to provide for state employee compensation increases; and to provide an effective date.

REPRESENTATIVE RICK BERG explained the changes to this bill that the Governor vetoed. This bill was introduced because of the workforce adjustment, basically the changes are on the second page of the bill. This concept was to have a reduction in our state workforce and savings from permanent reduction for salary increases. On page 2, the dates were changed on the OMB bill on lines 9 to January 1, 2004, and line 18 was January 1, 2005. The reductions would be achieved and then the savings would be used for the salary increases. The other change on line 6, the original language stated the dollars would come from permanent reductions through retirements or through vacant positions. Line 6 was added savings were provided primarily from permanent savings resulting from reduction of full time equivalent positions. Line 10, language

was added, the dollar supplemented as necessary to accumulate savings as part of a full time position. Those are the languages from the original bill.

(Meter 321) REPRESENTATIVE DELZER asked REPRESENTATIVE BERG to describe what he feels is the definition of the word "primarily" as used in the bill.

(Meter 345) **REPRESENTATIVE BERG** stated a high number such as 90%.

(Meter 365) REPRESENTATIVE DELZER asked why not put in the number 90% instead of the word primarily? REPRESENTATIVE BERG stated that it is something the committee needs to discuss. He stated this is the language that is before them and his concern is with in the past there have been salary increases that require agencies to find the money within and his perception of those salary increases are to determine what equipment or other expenses appropriated that end up being tossed in the next biennium. The intent here is a permanent savings to those dollars.

(Meter 457) REPRESENTATIVE SKARPHOL asked in the original version there was a triggered number of reductions that had to take place. Is that still in place?

(Meter 465) REPRESENTATIVE BERG stated that is another significant difference here. In the original language said there were two things that had to happen. That number was 84 positions eliminated and the salary increases would be up to a one or a two. This bill still has those targeted reductions but if that number is not achieved, the dollars that would be saved could be used for salary increases. The part of the discussion that evolved around that was that maybe positions that may be in upper management that could be consolidated or eliminated or merged and there would be a substantial savings there that wouldn't reflected in the numbers.

(Meter 544) REPRESENTATIVE SKARPHOL asked if what he is saying is if there is an employee reduction of one, whatever salary that individual had would be split up? If there is no employee reduction there will be no salary raise? **REPRESENTATIVE BERG** answered yes to both questions.

(Meter 567) REPRESENTATIVE DELZER asked about the second page, in effect are we allowing any rollup to be used for the payment of the one and two percent, whereas before, we passed this, we were not.

(Meter 587) REPRESENTATIVE BERG stated that it gets back to the word "primarily" and gets back to the word "supplemented". He thinks it is agreed that if additional money is to be used, it defines it more clearly.

(Meter 615) **SENATOR ANDRIST** stated he is not agreeable with the word "primarily". He stated it seems to him that it makes it flat out a one or two percent raise. He would prefer that the word "primarily" removed and stick to the original concept.

(Meter 651) REPRESENTATIVE GLASSHEIM asked how does this work? Whatever you save the month before, then is divided by 4,000? REPRESENTATIVE BERG stated there are targeted dates in here and we would know what the salary was appropriated so those dollars can be easily identified. Targeted dates of July 1, 2003 and January 1, 2004.

(Meter 735) REPRESENTATIVE GULLESON stated the different language here, but the bottom line here is still facing employee compensation increases on finding a reduction in the staff. REPRESENTATIVE BERG answered that is one way to look at it. Whatever a \$12,000 a year employee salary increase would increase the health insurance \$400 or \$500 a month. An

really long term is if we control the road of state government, the number one cost is state employees and if that can be controlled to some degree, there will be a chance of salary increases. (Meter 837) REPRESENTATIVE SVEDJAN stated prior coming into this meeting, they were in conversation with the Governor's office on a number of things related to this bill. Not the lest, of which was the changes of dates. The dates that are shown on page 2, when the bill was originally passed, those dates coincide with the dates on the front of the bill. As dollars are rolled up from savings as generated from retirements, vacancies, or employee turnovers. The one percent or two percent would be paid out on the dates that coincide with the dates on the front of the bill. The intent of passing it out it was the House and the Senate did in regular session, was there needed to be dollars rolled up from these sources of savings before salary increase could be granted. In the discussions today earlier was how could we authorize salary increases without any time for these roll ups to occur. So in discussing these, it was his understanding that the Governor's office would be amenable to putting the dates back to the original date in the original bill.

(Meter 1000) The second discussion had to do with the word "primarily" and whether or not there should be some percentage put in there. Reason being this bill could be read a number of ways. On the one hand, you could read it there would be no attempt dirviring savings from vacancies result from retirements or termination or otherwise. And all the dollars would simply be rolled up from vacant positions. On the other hand, the word "primarily" suggests that most

of the money that is authorized for paying salary increases should come from permanent savings resulting from reductions from the full time equivalent positions. So it was suggested at the earlier meetings, the inquirer about this, OMB, he wants to find out their feelings about whether or not a percentage should be put in there in place of the word "primarily".

(Meter 1123) **SENATOR MATHERN** asked how are we protecting the services to the public? If an agency decides to have a vacancy to provide salary increases, that translates into less services because that work that was no longer done. How is the public protected? What is the rational of this method?

(Meter 1179) REPRESENTATIVE SVEDJAN responded the intent of this was not to lessen the amount of service of the employees offer to the tax paying public. The second year is rather and where possible, positions can be merged or the work load can be spread amongst them and therefore positions could be eliminated. That decision would fall within the agency. There is no requirement here, that just because a position is vacant, it is going to be terminated. It needs to be based on the needs of the agency. There is no intention here to reduce the position. (Meter 1300) SHEILA PETERSON, OMB, testified that she could answer some of the questions. The OMB supports the concept of reducing full time FTE in order to provide a mechanism for salary increases for state employees. The second question of the word "primarily" verus percentage, to the extent of allowing some flexibility in accomplishing this, would be very comfortable with this.

(Meter 1403) REPRESENTATIVE SKARPHOL referred to the bill of lines 10-15-19 & 24, on page 2, it says supplemented if necessary from accumulated savings from other vacant positions. That to him, implies that they do not need to get rid of the vacant positions, they can merely use

the dollars to supplement the pay increase. Is that correct? Take line 10 for example, he reads that to say that you don't have to eliminate the position, but you can merely use the money to pay increases. He believes that defeats the whole purpose of the bill.

(Meter 1466) SHEILA PETERSON looking at line 9, it states primarily.

REPRESENTATIVE SKARPHOL stated that "primarily" to him and "primarily" to her may mean two different things. What assurance does he have that we are going to see these vacant positions eliminated? (Meter 1513) SHEILA PETERSON stated that OMB would work individually with each agency and help to determine what positions are vacant or are being vacated and whether or not they can be permanently vacated and those dollars would be moved into a pool as set up in Section 2. Once the money is in the pool, the agencies do not have that money any longer. A permanent savings is a permanent savings, not only a dollar set aside in the pool, but also the FTE. There isn't an opportunity for the agency to retain that FTE then. Otherwise it doesn't become a permanent savings.

(Meter 1625) **SENATOR ANDRIST** asked if the "primarily" is more that ½, where is the other rollup savings?

(Meter 1740) SHEILA PETERSON answered it would come from positions that are held over for less than a year, or if there are dollars left over from an overtime project, or temporary positions.

(Meter 1779) **SENATOR ANDRIST** asked where in the bill would he find those examples? The language states the money comes from the pooled salary savings?

(Meter 1799) SHEILA PETERSON answered on page 2, line 6 & 7, it states "primarily" from permanent savings resulting from reductions in full-time equivalent positions. In addition to the

(Meter 1889) **REPRESENTATIVE KOPPELMANN** asked the point have been drawn of the word "primarily" troubles him as well. If you are talking about 51% of the dollars of the reduction of force to fund the primary portion of salary increase while the other dollars come from the sources that you are talking about.

(Meter 2053) LT. GOVERNOR JACK DALRYMPLE helped SHEILA answer some concerns of the committee members. He stated the way that the administration views this situation is important to how it functions. How the administration would carry this out is important. The problem with the bill as it was introduced was the result was going to be very difficult to achieve without some management flexibility. The permanent savings that could be rolled up do not occur informally in all agencies. In many cases, they are concentrated very heavily in individual agencies. So if you do not have an incentive, or you can't create an incentive for that agency to want to convert those positions, you have a real problem, in terms of execution. All the agencies will tell you everyday, they need absolutely every position they have. The only way to ever have any success of this type of thing, is when we create a financial incentive for them to convert these positions. So we need to be able to handle an interagency pool, so to speak, also a cross agency. They would like the flexibility after they have demanded that they do everything that they can to look at temporary based agencies. The legislature would also like to see these raises to occur. He thinks rolling up FTE positions on a permanent basis is a good idea. But there is a need of some flexibility to manage it as best as it can. The problem with percentage, the percentage number is really unknown of what is needed today.

(Meter 2298) **SENATOR KRAUTER** asked about the effective dates of July 1, 2003 and July 1, 2004? With the reduction of full-time equivalent positions happening prior to July 1st, they would have to be prior to that in order for an effective date to give any type of an increase. Do you have a problem with those effective dates? Up to 1% on July 1, 2003 and up to 2% on July 1, 2004?

(Meter 2354) LT GOVERNOR JACK DALRYMPLE stated that some good logic in delaying the beginning of a pay increase, to give you an opportunity to see what kind of voluntary conversion of positions can get going. Keep in mind until that pay increase becomes available, you will have to have some real incentive to have some people to agree to those conversions. The answer to the effective dates is what is preferable, do you want 10 months to go with no increase or do you want to gradually ease into it.

(Meter 2474) CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG stated the way he reads into it, is July 1st of this year, and the Governor's original proposal was January 2004.

(Meter 2525) There was no opposition testimony.

Minutes: CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG opened the hearing to SB 2423. A bill relating to provide legislative intent regarding state employee reductions; to provide for a report to the budget section; to provide for state employee compensation increases; and to provide an effective date.

CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG stated there are really some issues that may not be the right thing to do but end up doing. He stated it is not a perfect bill, there was some real concern that was expressed regarding the dates when the executive branch offices (on page 2), may provide state employee increases effective July 1, 2003, to be paid in August and if you are looking at those permanent rollups, the biennium did not start until July 1st. He was struggling trying to see how that would work. (Meter #213) CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG asked the Legislative Council, A. Knudson to prepare an amendment to change those dates back to the December 31 to January 1st in the appropriate places and to remove on page 2, the lines were "primarily" are written.

No vote was made.

(Meter 330) SENATOR KRAUTER asked with the proposed amendments that are to be presented, starting on July 1 to December 31, if there is a proved savings, those would be the pooled dollars up to a 1% increase basically the next 12 months.

CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG stated that would be correct.

(Meter 377) SENATOR MATHERN asked if it is his understanding that this pool savings could be accumulated across the executive branch and distributed across the executive branch or would it be agency by agency? CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG stated it is his understanding it would be across the executive branch because OMB can prepare or set up this pool. They are not required to do so but they can set up this pool. SENATOR MATHERN stated that one agency could receive increases even though they had no decreases in staff because another agency had decreases in staff. CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG agreed that was his understanding and some agencies are so small, there is no way that they could continue their functions with that type of rollup.

(Meter 474) ALLEN KNUDSON, Legislative Council stated in Section 2 explained that is what it says.

Minutes: CHAIRMAN HOLM BERG opened the hearing to SB 2423 for the special session.

Attendance was taken, a quorum was established.

(Meter 54) **CHAIRMAN HOLM BERG** handed out a proposed amendment 30805,0307 and explained the changes. The first change on page 1 of the bill, would change the OMB "may" to "shall", the other two changes are as follows: on the back side of the bill, all of those dates are changed. The bill originally came in with a date of July 1, 2003, they were all changed to January 1, 2004 and 2205 when they come into effect. The other change which was talked about, reminding the committee about the concern of the word "primarily". The amendment would say at least 70% of the funding for the increases must be from pooled savings and the rest could come from accumulated savings and other full-time equivalent positions of the agencies. It gets them a little flexibility perhaps not as much as they would like, but it would give them a bit more flexibility rather than saying provided completely or using the word "primarily" which is an

nebulous term. He asked for a motion for adopting the amendment. SENATOR GRINDBERG made a motion to DO PASS of the amendment with SENATOR THANE seconded.

(Meter 210) Discussion to follow

(Meter 213) **SENATOR MATHERN** stated he felt there is a problem with these amendments. Agencies are under funded at the point and so the reality of an increase is not there. They really don't have the money to fund these salary increases, promoting this bill with this concept which essentially means you don't get a raise unless your colleague dies or gets sick and doesn't come back and you do more work. If that happens that you colleague is gone, you do more work. It 'isn't a workable bill.

(Meter 297) CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG stated this gives that agency absolute control whether to keep or eliminate vacancy or that particular position. He gave examples of how higher education gives salary increase - increasing tuition or through efficiencies of joining of positions. (Meter 414) SENATOR KRAUTER stated he has similar concerns and looking at the budget of the Human Services Department, they have eliminated over 200 positions, in the budget and now we are expecting them to find other positions to eliminate which has major unfunding already in it. What do you do in a special funded agency? How are they going to be administered in something like this? Where by, a pool is generated from general fund dollars and is going to be commingled into a special fund agency. How does that work?

(Meter 477) ALLEN KNUDSON explained that OMB would be responsible for establishing the pool and it would need to set up the guidelines with how those various funding sources would be allocated back out. It would be basically up to the OMB to comprise any federal requirements that would associated with those funds.

(Meter 513) SENATOR KRAUTER stated then we would commingle all general fund money into a 100% special fund agency then? How is the money going to get there? Where is it going to come from?

(Meter 529) CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG added it is up to OMB to allocate the money back out. (Meter 538) ALLEN KNUDSON repeated his answer that OMB would set up the guidelines to how those funds would be designated once they were included in the pool and allocated back out. (Meter 553) SENATOR KRAUTER stated the pool is 100% general funds, correct? ALLAN KNUDSON stated they could be special funds as well. CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG added they would have to comply with all federal laws and regulations.

(Meter 582) SENATOR MATHERN wanted to make a motion to move to substitute the amendment and CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG clarified there needs to be a vote on the proposed amendment (30805.0307).

(Meter 599) Roll call on the amendment (30805.0307) PASSED with 9 yeas, 3 nays and 2 absent and not voting.

(Meter 656) SENATOR MATHERN proposed an amendment (30805.0306) made a motion to adopt with a second from SENATOR KRAUTER. He explained what this amendment does. It takes out the specific listing of employees between lines 10 through 14 and establishes the procedure where \$2.6 million of general funds is put in to salary increases to all state agencies which translates into a salary increase beginning January 1, 2004 of \$28 per month for each state employee. The amount of \$28 was noted in Section 3 on page 2. He quoted that page. It is not for employees who performance levels do not meet the standards, it is not for probationary employees and the wording is retained in the bill and it suggests it is important that the legislative

intent be followed. That the number of state employees be reduced where there are employee retirements and there is employee turnover, however, there is no requirement of so many of those positions being eliminated. The amount \$28 was essentially comes from looking at what would a 1% increase be across for all state employees, instead of providing a 1% increase which would give a higher salary increase to a hundred thousand person compared to a twenty thousand person. Translating that same amount of money, \$2.6 million, into a flat increase for every state employee per month at \$28 is how that amount was raised. He feels this is an actuate way for employees to be aware of salary increases, it reflects the concern of the reduction of employees, it also suggests that we don't do this until January 1, 2004, and the funding would include not just general funds but special funds which would bring it to \$5 million.

(Meter 931) **CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG** stated to the committees new members, it has happened on occasion that a flat per month rate be given XX number of dollars for salary raises. He also asked **ALLEN** what changes the House Appropriations made to the Corrections bill, taking a million dollars out of the general fund balance. If we were to pass this, what would be the ending fund balance? **ALLEN KNUDSON**, **LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL**, answered as the legislature left, the balance was \$11.2 million and if you reduce that with the Corrections, it would be \$10.2 million. This would reduce it by an additional \$2.6, the ending would be \$7.6 million.

(Meter 1035) **SENATOR O'CONNELL** asked if there was a million dollars savings from yesterday from IT? Has that been reflected into the budget?


