Rep Delmore, Dist. 43, Grand Forks, introduced HB 1228 designed to make life easier for all school districts. It allows for business officers to make payments without each check being signed by the school board president. Quick action on the part of the business officer often results in a discounts on accounts.

Dan Huffman, Fargo School District, appeared in support of the measure. (Testimony attached.)

Rep. Haas: How does this impact your internal audit procedures.

**Huffman:** No impact, all internal controls are in place. All bills and warrants still go to the school board for review.

**Bev. Nielson, ND Association of School Boards,** stated that her association supports HB 1228 as it allows flexibility in the way we do business in 2005.

Bev Nielson appeared on behalf of the North Dakota School Board Association (NDSBA) in favor of the bill. NDSBA passed a similar resolution at their fall conference. Schools should have the option to develop a policy to purchase online.

**Senator Taylor-** Do many schools have policies where the preference is to purchase locally? Is that something your association has discussed?

**Bev-** No, we haven't really discussed it. However, larger schools have had that opportunity to purchase materials online at better savings. Some districts in the state would never be comfortable with that option.

There was no opposition to the bill. Chairman Freborg closed the hearing on HB 1228.

Action taken:

Senator Flakoll moved for a Do Pass recommendation on HB 1228. Seconded by Senator Taylor. The bill passed unanimously, 6-0-0. Senator Flakoll is the carrier of the bill.

The meeting was declared closed by Chairman Freborg.

# 58<sup>th</sup> North Dakota Legislative Assembly House of Representatives House Education Committee HB 1228

Current statutes governing the business practices for school districts have been in place for decades. During this time business practices have changed and our processes need to change to reflect these current practices.

Bond payments, payroll transactions, the federal government and the IRS, to name just a few entities, require the electronic transfer of funds. As school districts we must comply with these requirements.

In addition, many businesses provide discounts for early payment, and reduced pricing for electronic purchases and electronic or credit card payments.

As such, the Fargo School District, and the North Dakota School Study Council, have requested that legislation be drafted and introduced that would allow each school district, subject to school board approval, the ability to develop a process governing the distribution of moneys by the business manager.

That process would include the internal controls necessary to protect the funds of the district. Bills would still be presented to the school board for review, but the review may occur after the funds have been distributed.

The Fargo School Board supports this legislation and a do pass recommendation for the House Education Committee.
