Rep. Maragos-District 3-for-I would ask this committee if we could fly the coat of arms of the State of North Dakota along with the American Flag and the State Flag.

Rep. Klemin: Is this limited to flags or could I put the coat of arms on my car.

Rep. Maragos: You do put the coat of arms on your car, if you want to park in the parking lot.

Rep. Klemin: Could I put a huge one on the side of my door, for example.

**Rep. Maragos:** I suppose, like anything, someone could probably take it to the nth degree, you better be a legislator if you do it.

**Rep. Klemin:** The point is that it is not limited to flags.

Rep. Grande: The coat of arms of this state may be used in a manner consistent with the respect and dignity do a state coat of arms and its symbolic value. The Governor, the National Guard, Departments and Agencies with the State of North Dakota, North Dakota Veterans

Organizations, Educational Institutions, recognized Patriotic Organizations, etc.

Chairman Haas: It is quite specific, beyond that there is additional language that specifies exactly what it looks like and what colors you have to use, the colors are designated by Quarter Master General of the United States Army, so it gets restrictive.

Rep. Conrad: You are including former members of the legislature and this doesn't include former Governors.

**Rep. Maragos:** My understanding is that there might be an amendment to remove the word former.

Rep. Conrad: OK.

Rep. Maragos: Which I have no problem with.

Rep. Meier: Campaign advertising, would we be able to use it for campaign advertising?

Chairman Haas: I believe that it would detract from the dignity of the coat of arms.

Rep. Maragos: Just with the respect of the change I am asking for, would it be OK for us to use the coat of arms on a letter head.

**Rep. Klemin:** The coat of arms is not the same as the great seal.

**Rep. Maragos:** I don't believe it is. The great seal is round and the coat of arms is quite different.

Chairman Haas: Luke just gave us another section of the century code that says, unauthorized use: a person may not place or caused to be placed upon the coat of arms of this state, any advertisement of any nature or exposed coat of arms to public view when any advertisement has been attached there to. That would preclude the use of the coat of arms during campaigning. It goes on with additional restrictions.

Rep. Maragos: I certainly don't want to change any of that, all I am interested in doing is adding the idea that a legislature, if he so chooses could indicate by flying the flag that he is a duly elected member of the legislature.

**Rep. Sitte:** Historically do you know the difference between the great seal and the coat of arms and what each represents?

**Rep. Maragos:** I think they are both symbols of the state, the coat of arms, we use it to identify ourselves as members of the legislative assembly, the Governor, the National Guard. I really can't tell you what the distinction is. We have it on our stationary.

Chairman Haas: Luke just gave us another section of the century code 54-02-01, which governs the great seal, permitted uses, etc. We can have copies of this made and distributed to the committee.

**Rep. Maragos:** It seems to me that the great seal is used on communications then anything else.

The coat of arms is basically a symbol to signify an association.

Rep. Galvin: Is there not another law that governs the great seal.

**Rep. Maragos:** I think that is just what your intern produced for you and it will be passed out to you.

Al Jaeger-Secretary of State-Neutral-The coat of arms is green. The great seal is my area of responsibility.

Chairman Haas: Thank you very much. Any more questions?

Chairman Grande: Calling the Conference Committee on HB 1453 to order and ask the clerk to take the roll. Rep. Grande, Rep. Galvin, Rep. Potter--Sen. Syverson, Sen. Kreabsbach. Sen. Nelson-Sick

At this time would the Senate like to explain there amendment.

Sen. Syverson: You are familiar with the history of the bill when it was first filed with addressing a member or former member of the legislature being allowed to use the coat of arms. You folks amended it to read a serving member, we after some discussion and testimony by the Secretary of State decided the initial form of the bill with the member, first iteration former member would be appropriate and we also decided we had left out two significant elected officials, that being the former governor of North Dakota and the former Lieutenant Governor. I think in the committee we had some discussion on whether the term governor could be

extrapolated to mean the former governor, but it might be appropriate to insert that line in the bill. The former governor or the former lieutenant governor of the State of North Dakota in the bill. Let me address the issue of the coat of arms as it compares to the seal. There is indeed protection and direction in code to protect the coat of arms, as to its usage and it would be incumbent on everyone that worked be drafted this opportunity to comply those statutes, for that reason we thought we would like address the issue with you folks, the people that I have talked to they have no reservations about it, they feel it is a good idea if you want to have a flag in front of your house, with the United States flag flying, one could do that. We can't obviously use the seal in a lot of respects, but the coat of arms we could. If we can include veterans and patriotic organizations it seemed to us that it would be appropriate to allow someone who is as patriotic to the state as a serving legislature, former legislature, former governor, or a former lieutenant governor. For that reason we proposed to have a conference to report on.

Chairman Grande: Our committee had done some research, also. The piece that you are looking at is the original resolution from 1955. The development of the coat of arms for the State of North Dakota. The other thing is a copy of the current statute. One of things that was interesting that had stayed in place the whole time was the second whereas, where such a distinctive emblem is proper and necessary for use by the North Dakota National Guard and Veterans Organizations during ceremonies or for official functions, this is pretty much a significant piece is used and developed for the National Guard or the military for our state. In the resolution, in the minutes for when this resolution was heard in 1955, that is where they included the patriotic organization. They put it into the law then in 1957 and wrote it in, that is what you really see today, with little or no change has taken place. The coat of arms was used by the governor, who is the overseer of

the National Guard. Department agencies of the state of North Dakota, North Dakota Veterans organization, officially recognized North Dakota Educational Institutions Systems or divisions thereof and patriotic organizations. Legislators kind of got left out and the necessity of putting that into just because of the current usuage of that is pretty important. I talked to the historical society and meeting with the Secretary of State on this, the only time an individual is allowed to utilize this symbol, that it is flown at the governors residence and it is a separate flag altogether. He is the only one that can use the four star and it is when he is in control of the National Guard that he is allowed to use this specific symbol. Each individual cannot and take it and use it as an individual. It was meant as an organizational symbol. My concern came up when we talk about, one, the former member portion, should we as former legislators have to remove the sticker off of our cars. I want to address the legislative assembly is using it as note to who the body is by using as stickers.

**Sen. Krebsbach:** There is another chapter and this was just given to me by the Secretary of the State and 54-41-05, unauthorized use and penalty and a person may not place or caused to be placed upon the coat of arms of this state any advertisement of any nature.

Sen. Syverson: Would there be any history as discovered as to when the North Dakota Educational Institutional Systems Division were included in the usage of this, because the original current resolution does not include them, nor does it include patriotic organizations or does it include departments or agencies in the State of North Dakota, obviously it seems fit in the past to address the usage in a broader scale then what was originally addressed in the original resolution.

Chairman Grande: In the 57 legislative assembly laws they do go to that extent, somebody made the decisions that those University systems should be included there. Since that time it hasn't been. In that unauthorized use, right away they said no person shall place or cause the coat of arms in advertisement. My concern is when they said no person.

Sen. Krebsbach: I think when they say no person, as the entity, that they may not use it in an advertising form.

Sen. Syverson: The way we have been using it apply to an organization or an individual.

**Rep. Potter:** A person and individual are different in law. A person and individual, when it says a person in law or an individual in law are two different entities.

Rep. Galvin: Reason would tell you, even the governor can't use it, only under some circumstances and individual could not use it at all. I don't see how an individual can use this at anytime.

Chairman Grande: It says that no person shall place or cause, whether we call that a group or a person and the final statement, any person violating the provisions of this section shall, you could interpret it either way as individual or a group.

Sen. Krebsbach: Not for commercial purposes or for advertising. I wonder if it would be proper for us to have a little research done by our Attorney General office and give us some guidance and direction in utilization of this and to what extent we have to go, if any to use this on our vehicles. We could get some idea, why it was so limited in scope.

Chairman Grande: That sounds like a good idea and I will reschedule the committee.

**Sen. Syverson**: What was the thought process by expanding it to Departments and Agencies and Educational Institutions.

**Sen. Krebsbach:** In point number three it is department and agencies of the state of North Dakota has authorization. We might as include the former legislators and the former governors and former lieutenant governors.

Minutes: HB 1453 Relating to authorized use of the coat of arms of the state.

Chairman Grande: We will bring the committee to order, for the conference committee, for HB 1453. Lets take roll please: Rep. Grande, Rep. Galvin, Rep. Potter, Sen. Syverson, Sen. Krebsbach, Sen. C. Nelson. We had requested information after our last meeting. The problem is that no minutes and records are kept until 1959 and this was put into place in 1955 and 1957. The only thing that we could dig up is what showed up in the newspapers during this time. My questions is what was the purpose of having a coat of arms? What do surrounding states have as coat of arms and what is there usage? There is only one other state in the Union that has a coat of arms. Why do we? Typically other states will use there flag as the coat of arms, North Dakotas problem is that our flag is similar as the United States coat of arms. If the North Dakota National Guard used that flag whether they were using the North Dakota coat of arms or United States coat of arms, so we had to come up with our own. The study was put together on what our coat of arms should look like. The only thing that I found out, by questioning around, this was meant and

is still used only as the representation of that group, so the National Guard flies the flag, when the National Guard is together. I haven't been able to find a department or agency that utilizes the shield, the crest. The Veterans organization use it to represent there organization. The problem comes up, is the legislature a department or agency of the state of North Dakota, I say no. Information is that we should probably quickly adjust that to be clear. At least have the wording, the following the legislative assembly, to make sure we at least have that and cover ourselves. I would see how far we could take this and I am being a little informal for a conference committee, because I think whether we agree or disagree on a set of amendments, what the proper thing is to do. Our amendments had been to say, a member of the legislative assembly, it is of group that it would be utilized, not as individuals, so I question our amendments. As you guy discussed, this is a great little emblem and so why shouldn't we expand this out, so that is where our debate lies. Sen. Syverson: Having been familiar with one of the organizations that was addressed. I haven't seen the coat of arms flown, the United States flag, under carried by the State flag. I was in an organization in which our emblem was somewhat copied after the coat of arms, so there was a take off in that respect. The possibility of using it as a former or present legislature as a decal on the license plate, to detonate the fact that you have had an association with the legislature or are presently associated with the legislature. That would probably could not be accomplished under the bill that originated in the Senate. There really is no recognition that has been granted to legislatures or former legislatures, as there has been to veterans, who have had a lot of recognition. Maybe there should be some recognition allowed for them in that service that they have provided for the state.

Chairman Grande: The only person who has been given the authority is the governor. The legislative body should back up and design there own coat of arms and then move forward in a proper fashion.

Rep. Galvin: It seems to me when you read the entire law, in order for this to be used by any individual, you would have to go back and change the entire law. There are places through out the law that makes it very clear that an individual can not use the coat of arms under any circumstances.

Chairman Grande: Correct, no individual is suppose to use it under any circumstance. Which lends me to, we are using it as individuals, because we have it on our cars, but we are using it as a body to identify ourselves and our parking and as our things. The National Guardsmen has it on his sleeve, he is not using it individually, he is using it as representation in that group.

**Rep. Galvin:** We have them on cars of people that are not part of the body.

Sen. Krebsbach: Anyone who is employed by the legislature perhaps becomes a member of the body of the legislative assembly during the former period or duration. I recall reading where it was established for the National Guard and recognized patriotic associations. In this particular one, from the Merriam-Webster, is for the National Guard and the Governor. There has been a lot of thoughts and ideas expressed on this whole thing. Maybe we should put it in a study and decide what to do.

Chairman Grande: We need to pass something that says the legislative assembly, to cover ourselves for what we are currently doing, but then amend in that somebody looks through this process and see if we need to establish our own.

Sen. Syverson: The legislative assembly should fit under the umbrella of the state of North Dakota, by establishing a unique and individual coat of arms for the legislative assembly. We are kind of saying, well we are standing off here by ourselves.

Chairman Grande: That could be one take on it, but the Judicial Branch, Governor and the Legislative Branch has their own.

Sen. Nelson: I think it would be interesting concept, the Governor does has his own flag, if there was similar, but different. If there is some way to incorporate what is in the state seal with something, move something around so it is not exactly the same. In this one we have the arrowhead and in this one you have the shield.

Sen. Krebsbach: It has evolved to this. We had to pass legislation, because first of all we were not entitled to use it on our stationary or our calling cards, but we allowed for that.

Chairman Grande: I have always seen the coat of arms with the military, I think we are to the point where we have to include the legislative assembly and issue a study together to finish this off.

**Sen. Krebsbach:** The motion would be the Senate recede from its amendments and House bill be amended.

Chairman Grande: Luke do you have an idea if what kind of amendment we want on the study?

Luke-Intern: LC shall consider studying the possibility of the legislative assembly having its own emblem.

Sen. Kerbsbach: If we want to have something on our license plate.

Chairman Grande: Do you wish to come back and review these, we will recess the hearing on HB 1453 to come back and look at our amendments.

## CHAPTER 54-02 STATE EMBLEMS, SYMBOLS, AND AWARDS

#### 54-02-01. Great seal - Permitted uses - Penalty for commercial use.

1. The great seal of the state is that prescribed in section 2 of article XI of the Constitution of North Dakota. A description in writing of such seal must be deposited and recorded in the office of the secretary of state and must remain a public record. A reproduction of the great seal may be placed on any official form, document, or stationery of any agency, authority, board, body, branch, bureau, commission, committee, council, department, division, industry, institution, or instrumentality of the state or of any elected or appointed official of the state. A reproduction of the great seal may be placed on business calling cards produced for the use of an elected or appointed state official or state employee regardless of whether the cards are purchased by the official or employee or by the state. Any use of the great seal on any other object or thing by any of the foregoing state entities or officials is prohibited unless approved by the secretary of state; provided, however, that the state historical society and the parks and recreation department may, with the concurrence of the secretary of state, reproduce the great seal on any objects they offer for sale as souvenirs.

# 2. It is a class B misdemeanor for any person to:

- a. Place or cause to be placed the great seal, or any reproduction of the great seal, on any political badge, button, insignia, pamphlet, folder, display card, sign, poster, billboard, or on any other public advertisement, or to otherwise use the great seal for any political purpose, as defined in section 16.1-10-02.
- Place or cause to be placed on the great seal, or any reproduction thereof, any advertisement.
- Expose the great seal, or any reproduction thereof, to public view with any advertisement attached thereto.
- d. Utilize the great seal, or a copy or reproduction thereof, for any commercial purpose.

As used in this subsection, "advertisement" means any printed matter, device, picture, or symbol, no matter how presented to the senses, which informs the public that a good or service is available; and "commercial purpose" means with intent to produce a pecuniary gain through sale of a good or service. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the secretary of state may grant a written request by a private vendor to reproduce official state forms and documents, containing a reproduction of the great seal, for resale to persons intending to submit the forms or documents to any state entity in the regular course of business. The secretary of state may also grant a written request by a publisher, educational institution, or author to reproduce the great seal in any research, reference, or educational publication containing a compilation of the great seals of other states.

**54-02-02. State flag.** The flag of North Dakota must consist of a field of blue silk or material which will withstand the elements four feet four inches [132.08 centimeters] on the pike and five feet six inches [167.64 centimeters] on the fly, with a border of knotted yellow fringe two and one-half inches [6.35 centimeters] wide. On each side of said flag in the center thereof, must be embroidered or stamped an eagle with outspread wings and with opened beak. The eagle must be three feet four inches [101.6 centimeters] from tip to tip of wing, and one foot ten inches [55.88 centimeters] from top of head to bottom of olive branch hereinafter described. The left foot of the eagle shall grasp a sheaf of arrows, the right foot shall grasp an olive branch showing three red berries. On the breast of the eagle must be displayed a shield, the lower part

Any person violating the provisions of this section is guilty of an infraction.

These organizations represent approximately 60,000 veterans currently living in North Dakota.



In the late 19th century the Dakota Territorial Guard displayed a blue flag with the coat of arms of the United States in the center. After North Dakota joined the Union in 1889, a similar design was used by the state's National Guard. Colonel John H. Fraine was the battalion commander of the state troops who saw action in the Philippines under the flag in 1898-99. He speameded the

drive to have it recognized as the state flag, which it officially became on March 3, 1911.

The coat of arms on the state flag was easily confused with the U.S. coat of arms, however. In the mid-20th century the North Dakota National Guard created a distinctive new coat of arms, which it proposed as a replacement for the existing design. Its display on a green field was recognized as a flag for government use on March 15, 1957, although it did not replace the 1911 flag. The green flag was basically restricted to the use of the National Guard and of the governor of the state.

THE COMMITTEE studied coals

of arms at the Library of Congress and consulted with Arthur Du-Bois, Washington, world authority on heraldic design. It also examined the coats of arms of Meriwether Lewis, of Lewis and Clark fame: and Lord Sellark, founder of the Selkirk Colony, finding t'em rather ornate and complicated.

Webster's Dictionary defines 'heraldry'' as "the art or reence having to do with coats of arms genealogies, etc.'

The rules of heraldry as estab-Hished by practice over the cen-turies dictate that each coar of arms be composed of a crest, a shield and a motto.

What the committee proposes is assimpler design. Its upper portion would include the state's traditional crest of three arrows across a bow (taken from the state scal) underneath which would be a shield containing heraldic symbols, with the motto under the shield.

THE PRESENT feeling of the committee is that the symbols shall include three mullets (stars) taken from the First North Dakota Infantry coat of arms. The three mullets also appear in the coats of arms of Mcriwether Lewis and Lord Selkirk. Each mullet yould also represent the numerical number 13 - three times 13 being 39. The three mullets would be symbolic of North Dakota being the 39th state to be admitted to the union. The arrangement of the mullets on the shield is a matter of personal choice. Tentatively, the committee is considering use of the fleur de lis symbol, honoring Verendrye and other early French ex-plorers, as well as the fact that the greater part of North Dakotal was a part of the Louisiana Pur-

As for sheaves of wheat or biton the committee at present looks on such symbols as too commonplace and general in character. Other states already have adopted these symbols. The committee also feels the motto on the state seal read-ing "Liberty and union now find forever one and inseparable" should not be used for the cont of

arms as it is too long and unwieldly. It is felt that the new motto should be placed at the bottom of the emblem and that it should be significant to North Dakota and of Timeless import. A contraction of the motto could be used. Whether it should be in Latin, French or another language is a que stion still under debate. Examples of some states are: Sic Semper Tyrannis (Thus always to tyrants) for Virginia and Labor Omnia Vingit (La. bor conquers all things) for Okla-

THE COMMITTEE is interested in having citizens make suggestions as to color combinations for the coat of arms as well as the design: It was pointed out that blue cannot be used as a major background color because it is now\_used in several other em-blems. At the present writing, a green and gold combination is fa-

The National Guard members of the committee besides Edwards, are Lt. Col. Donald Fraser of Fargo and Capt. Emerson Murry. judge advocate, of Bismarck, Robert Dahl of Grafton, who is de-partment Americanism chairman, and George Rulon of Fargo, who is department service officer of the Am sican Legion, represent the service men on the committee.

Interested persons may obtain more information by calling on the committee members. They also may be helped by studying coats of arms and heraldry in public libraries.

#### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION "U" (Lindberg and Hegge)

#### STATE COAT OF ARMS

A concurrent resolution authorizing and requesting the governor to appoint a committee to select a suitable emblem to serve as a coat of arms for the state of North Dakota.

WHEREAS, the state of North Dakota does not have an officially recognized coat of arms emblem; and

WHEREAS, such a distinctive emblem is proper and necesorganizations during ceremonies or for official functions; and

WHEREAS, the official coat of arms should conform to the recognized rules of heraldry and depict appropriately significant state history;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved By The House Of Repre-SENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF NORTH DAKOTA, THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN:

That the governor is hereby authorized and requested to appoint a committee consisting of not less than three nor more than five members, who shall be either officers of the national guard or members of a veterans' organization, for the purpose of selecting a suitable emblem depicting appropriately significant state history, to serve as the coat of arms of this state, and to be used and displayed by the North Dakota national guard and veterans' organizations during ceremonies or for official functions.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in making this selection the committee shall consult with the heraldic branch, research and development division of the office of the quartermaster general, United States department of the army, to insure that such emblem shall conform to the recognized rules of heraldry and shall not duplicate the emblems of other states or organizations.

SECTION 2. NORTH DAKOTA LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY EMBLEM –

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL STUDY. During the 2005-06 interim, the legislative council shall consider studying the feasibility and desirability of creating an emblem for the sole use of the North Dakota legislative assembly, members of the legislative assembly, and the legislative council. The legislative council shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixtieth legislative assembly.
