Minutes: Chairman Mutch opened the hearing on SB 2230. All Senators were present.

SB 2230 relates to appointment of legislative assembly members on the workforce safety and insurance board of directors.

Senator Tim Mathern, District 11, introduced the bill. See attached testimony.

Senator Klein: Did you have a lot of knowledge back when the director was appointed by the Governor?

Senator Mathern: We had discussions about the appointment of the director and there was debate between the parties about who that director should be and the qualifications. And in that process, we got more information about how the agency was run by that director.

Senator Klein: Wasn't that discussion primarily because it became a political issue and that is why we tried to snatch that away to avoid having that political aura around it. So the director would then represent the agency, rather than a party.

Senator Mathern: This bill suggests that there is middle ground that we ought to be working.

Senator Heitkamp: With only three legislators going on this, do you think that board will end up being political with all of the other make-up of the board?

Senator Mathern: I think the essential operation of the agency would not change with this. This isn't enough to change the balance in power of the board.

Senator Christman, District 33, spoke to support the bill. Last fall when the audit came out, I felt this was a concern. I thought that having legislative insight on that board would be the way to go. A lot of the rational for that is the political oversight with the audit that brought this to light. Since then, I've met with the new staff and I think they have made tremendous progress.

Senator Klein: Did you ever feel that WSI denied you access to any questions or answers that you were looking for?

Senator Christman: No. I didn't really know anyone there.

Senator Heitkamp: At what point did you make the determination that some things needed to get fixed? This committee, for the last couple of sessions, has heard testimony on what many of us felt were abused and nonpayment of injured workers.

Senator Christman: The anecdotal evidence, but the audit mainly.

Senator Nething: This is unusual to have legislators appointed to an executive board?

What would you use as a dividing line so other legislators didn't say that they wanted to be on all kinds of boards?

Senator Christman: I don't have one in mind. I think the decision making ability of the legislators will decide that.

Senator Nething: What makes this totally different than any other board?



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Senator Christman: I can't think of an example that is anything similar to this. It is unique in that it is not an agency where the head is not an elected party.

David Kemnitz, AFL-CIO, stated their support for the bill.

Sebald Vetter, President of C.A.R.E, (didn't state what it stood for), stated his organization's support for the bill.

Chairman Mutch allowed opposition at this time.

Bob Indvik, Board Chair of Workforce Safety and Insurance, spoke in opposition. See attached.

There were no questions from the committee.

Dave MacIver, President of the Greater North Dakota Chamber of Commerce, spoke in opposition. See attached.

Senator Heitkamp: Are you saying that the members of this board have no allegiance or any activity in either political party in the state?

Dave: No, I'm not saying that. There will always be an influence. By putting legislators on there would create more of an influence.

Senator Heitkamp: When I talk to employers, one of the problems we struggle with in North Dakota, is to assure these businesses that we have enough workers to come in and make that happen. As WSI swings the pendulum so far toward the employer, instead of the worker, aren't you afraid that the workers that you need to achieve your goal, are going to say it's an unfriendly state for workers that we aren't going to be there?



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Dave: No, as a matter of fact I'm not. The amount of workers who believe that they are being treated well has gone up since 1995.

The hearing was closed. No action was taken.

BILL DESCRIPTION: Appointment of legislators to WSI Board

BILL NO: SB 2230

SUMMARY OF ACTUARIAL INFORMATION: Workforce Safety & Insurance, together with its actuary, Glenn Evans of Pacific Actuarial Consultants, has reviewed the legislation proposed in this bill in conformance with Section 54-03-25 of the North Dakota Century Code.

The proposed legislation would increase WSI's Board of Directors from 11 to 14 members by adding three legislators to the Board.

FISCAL IMPACT: The estimated costs for adding 3 additional Board members to cover payroll, travel and other related expenses would be approximately \$8,850 per year or \$17,700 for the biennium.



Testimony of Dave MacIver President, Greater North Dakota Chamber of Commerce Presented to the Senate Industry, Business and Labor Committee January 25, 2005

SB 2230

Mr. Chairman and members of the Senate Industry, Business and Labor Committee, my name is Dave MacIver and I am the President of the Greater North Dakota Chamber of Commerce. I am here today representing a coalition which includes area chambers of commerce in North Dakota with over 7,400 member businesses and other associations to urge you to oppose Senate Bill 2230.

The business community would like to express its opposition to this bill. We believe the Workforce Safety & Insurance board of directors should not be influenced by politics. By placing members of the legislative assembly on the board, there is danger of tainting the neutrality of the decisions. Having politics involved with decisions of a board of directors can lead to potential conflicts of interest and abuse. The Legislative Assembly already has input into the WSI system, as it is the Legislative Assembly that has the ultimate control over the monopolistic insurance program.

The business community believes that the board of directors should be made up of those individuals that are involved directly with WSI: the business community, the medical community, and the employees. There is also one member placed on the board by the governor,

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

Good morning, my name is Bob Indvik. I am the Chair of the Workforce Safety & Insurance (WSI) Board of Directors. I am here to testify in opposition to Senate Bill 2230. The WSI Board of Directors unanimously voted to oppose this bill. I will briefly address the Board's concerns.

Under the current eleven-member structure, the Board represents employers, workers and the medical community. We operate as a business focusing on the delivery of superior workers' compensation products and services to injured workers and employers free from unnecessary political influence.

The addition of legislators to the Board of Directors would infuse politics into our Board's governance.

Under the "Carver Model" of Board governance, the Board speaks with one voice in order to ensure the integrity of the Board's position on an issue. Because, by design, a legislator represents all constituencies simultaneously (employers, workers, and providers), what happens when they encounter an issue of having to advocate an approved Board position that would be in direct conflict with one of these constituent's position? Which constituency would be the primary focus?

The Board believes the interests of injured workers and employers are best served by a Board composed of gubernatorial appointees with expertise and experience in a variety of areas without the interjection of politics into the process.

Thank you Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee for your time. I will be glad to answer any questions.

Senate Bill 2230 Industry Business and Labor Committee January 25, 2005

Chairman Mutch and Members of the Senate IBL Committee,

My name is Tim Mathern, Senator from District 11 in Fargo. I speak in support of SB 2230 relating to board membership on the Workforce Safety and Insurance Board.

The essential element of the bill, adding legislators, is in lines 23 and 24 of page 1 and lines 1 through 5 of page two. "Three members are members of the legislative assembly, two of whom must be selected by the members of the legislative council representing the majority faction and one of whom must be selected by the members of the legislative council representing the minority faction. The legislative assembly members serve at the pleasure of the appointing faction of the legislative council. The appropriate faction of the legislative council shall appoint a replacement member for a departing legislative assembly member."

No present members of the Board are changed or displaced with this bill. Three members are added, two from the majority and one from the minority. It goes from 11 to 14 members.

Mr. Chairman I deal with the WSI budget in appropriations committee. WSI is a large agency. We do not have the time to get into the details of the agency operations. We deal with policy questions on the floor after your committee has taken hours of testimony which I and other legislators do not hear.

I think we need legislators with more in-depth knowledge of this agency which impacts every employer and employee in the state. Adding three people to the Board adds a knowledge base to the legislature itself to enhance what we know as appropriation or industry business and labor committee members.

Last summer when reports were in the paper about the operation of WSI, I recognized a lack of knowledge on my part and that of other legislators about the workings of WSI. I am uncomfortable about this. I noted too that there were things going on that were not general knowledge of the legislators or public. The media made us aware of some of these operational practices. I think having a few legislators on the Board would not only bring legislators up to speed on what is going on, but would also bring more openness to Board operations. The light of day is helpful to us all.

I voted to take the director appointment away from the Governor. It might have made sense then, but I think now it leaves us in the dark. While the governor, he has not introduced a bill to regain director appointment control, his decision does not absolve us as legislative branch from knowing more about this important agency.

Chairman Mutch and committee members, lets get more involved in WSI. More information and more openness will be good for our state. I urge a do pass recommendation for SB 2230. Thank you.
