SURVEY OF AGENCY ALCOHOL, DRUG, TOBACCO, AND RISK-ASSOCIATED BEHAVIOR PROGRAMS

During the 2001-02 interim, the Budget Committee on Government Services studied programs dealing with prevention and treatment of alcohol, tobacco, and drug abuse and other kinds of risk-associated behavior which are operated by various state agencies. The committee studied whether better coordination among the programs within those agencies may lead to more effective and cost-efficient ways of operating the programs and providing services. At that time, a survey of agency alcohol, drug, tobacco, and risk-associated behavior programs was conducted and the results were placed in a table. That information was updated during the 2003-05 biennium by the Budget Committee on Government Services as part of that committee's study of the state's

long-term prison needs and the needs of individuals with mental illness, drug and alcohol addictions, and physical or developmental disabilities.

On November 14, 2005, a letter was sent to the relevant agencies requesting an update of the table for the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations. In particular, the letter requested that the information be updated and narrowed to address programs that discourage destructive decisions. Discouraging destructive decisions includes prevention, education, awareness, and early intervention. The following is each agency's response, including the sources of funding, restrictions on use of funds, and the anticipated uses of the funds for the 2005-07 biennium. In addition, the amount and funding source for each program for the 2003-05 biennium have been included in the table.
