The state of Nebraska closed the Nebraska School for the Deaf in 1998. At that time, the Nebraska Department of Education entered a contract with the Iowa School for the Deaf for students who are deaf or hearing-impaired and require a residential component. The majority of the state's students who are deaf or hearing-impaired are educated in local school districts.

²The state of Nevada provides services to most students who are deaf or hearing-impaired in local school districts and special day programs. Students with significant needs may be placed in an educational facility out of state.

³The state of New Hampshire provides services to students who are deaf or hearing-impaired in local school districts. Some school districts send students to out-of-district programs, which can also be out of state.
