
# NORTH DAKOTA SCHOOLS THAT SERVE AMERICAN INDIAN STUDENTS

Unlike other states, American Indian children in North Dakota are dispersed in school districts throughout the state. Of the school <u>districts</u> in the state, American Indian children are present in all but one (1) district. Of the 433 school plants, American Indian children are present in 336 schools or 78% of school buildings.

#### LEGEND:

Education of American Indian children in the North Dakota System of schools is complex both in governance and financing.

- Cooperative School Districts (Labeled for the purposes of this report only CSPD) Schools which are governed by public school district boards and jointly financed under Public Law 100-297- Bureau of Indian Education, formerly BIA- OIEP and state foundation aid.
- Non-Public Schools: privately financed schools or schools operated by religious groups.
- Public School Districts on Reservations
- Tribal Schools: funded under Public Law 100-297.

#### AMERICAN INDIANS IN NORTH DAKOTA

American Indian peoples in North Dakota today are the Mandan, Hidatsa, Arikara, the Yanktonai, Sisseton, Wahpeton, Hunkpapa and other Dakotah/Lakota (commonly known as the Sioux) tribes, along with the Pembina Chippewa, Cree and Métis.

### NORTH DAKOTA TRIBAL NATIONS

Five tribes operate within North Dakota. Each tribal government elects its own chairperson and council members. Each tribal government along with each tribal headquarters are as follows:


Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation, New Town, North Dakota Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa, Belcourt, North Dakota Spirit Lake Nation, Fort Totten, North Dakota Standing Rock Sioux Tribe, Fort Yates, North Dakota. Sisseton-Wahpeton Oyaté, Agency Village, South Dakota.

#### AMERICAN INDIANS IN NORTH DAKOTA EDUCATIONAL SYSTEMS

In the 2006-2007 school year, 10, 251 American Indian students were enrolled in schools in North Dakota and comprise 9.88 % of the enrolled student population of the state. By type of school, enrollments range as follows:

Public\Cooperative School Districts – 8,214 or 8.59%.

BIA/Tribal schools – 1,497 or 99.60% Non-public schools – 507 or 7.79% State Institutions – 33 or 35.48% All schools 10,251 or 9.88%



#### COMMITMENT TO EDUCATION

The North Dakota Department of Public Instruction administratively supported an Office of Indian Education from 1984 to 1991. In 1991, funding was sought to support FTE's for an Office of Indian Education, and a Native American Curriculum. The State Legislature appropriated funding of an American Indian Curriculum. From 1991 through 2001 the curriculum was developed, published and made available to the schools of North Dakota. That program is currently administered out of the North Dakota Indian Affairs Commission.

The 60<sup>th</sup> North Dakota State Legislative Assembly authorized a new staff position in the North Dakota Indian Affairs Commission to serve as an American Indian Education Specialist. The intent of this position will be to work with school systems to address the low achievement scores of American Indian students.

The Commission, statutorily authorized in 1949, and throughout its 58 year history has been committed to advancing state and tribal relations. Under this new initiative the Commission will work toward establishing partnerships with the North Dakota education community to better address the educational outcomes for American Indian students in North Dakota.

- 105,381 all students

- 7,756 American Indians enrolled in Public Schools.
- 428 American Indians enrolled in Non-Public parochial or other schools.
- 1,540 American Indian students enrolled in Bureau of Indian Affairs or Tribal Grant Schools.
- 9.9% of North Dakota's k-12 school population is American Indian
- 71% (seventy-one percent) or 7,307 of North Dakota's American Indian students are enrolled in schools located on or near Indian reservations;
- 24% or 2,427 are enrolled in "urban" or rural North Dakota schools; and
- 5% are enrolled in non-public and or parochial schools.

## Glossary of Terms

<u>Native American Language:</u> Means the historical, traditional languages spoken by Native Americans. (Section 103 of the Native American Languages Act of 1990).

<u>Native Language</u>: The term 'native language', when used in reference to an individual of limited-English proficiency, means the language normally used by such individual, or in the case of a child or youth, the language normally used by the parents of the child or youth.

Public School: The North Dakota Constitution provides, in part:

A high degree of intelligence, patriotism, integrity and morality on the part of every voter in a government by the people being necessary in order to insure the continuance of that government and the prosperity and happiness of the people, the legislative assembly shall provide for a uniform system of free public schools throughout the state, beginning with the primary and extending through all grades up to and including schools of higher education, except that the legislative assembly may authorize tuition, fees and service charges to assist in the financing of public schools of higher education. Article VIII Constitution of North Dakota, October 1, 1889.

Non-public School: 'Nonpublic school' means an educational institution which students attend in lieu of public school attendance wherein a resident of North Dakota may legally fulfill the compulsory instruction requirements of section 15-34.1-01. ND CC 15-34.1-00.1.

<u>Postsecondary School</u>: Any public or private education institution of higher education beyond the secondary level, including two-and four-year colleges, technical schools, and universities.

Indian Reservation: A reservation is an area of land "reserved" for an Indian band, village, or tribe (tribes) to live on and use. Title to the Indian-owned reservation land is held in trust by the United States for the benefit of said Indians. (Bureau of Indian Affairs 1968; Cohen, 1982). The term "reservation" is taken from the early practice whereby Indian tribes were enticed, coerced, or otherwise persuaded to relinquish, or "cede" the majority of their homelands by treaty to the federal government, while holding back or "reserving" a portion of their aboriginal lands for their own use. Practice goes back to at least 1640, when the Mohican Chief, Uncas, ceded a large part of the colony of Connecticut and retained a reservation for his tribe (Cohen 1947), in Utter 1993). The term applies to Indian reservations, public domain Indian allotments, former Indian reservations in Oklahoma, and land held by incorporated Native groups, regional corporations, and village corporations under the provisions of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act [43 USCS, subsections 1601 et seq.].

<u>School</u>: Means a publicly supported institution, in whole or in part, by state funds wherein a resident of North Dakota may legally fulfill the compulsory instruction requirements of section 15-34.101.

#### **State Education Agency (SEA):**

An agency that oversees all public education within a state or territory, usually called a state department of education.

<u>Tribally Controlled School</u>: The term 'tribally controlled school' means a school, operated by a tribe or a tribal organization, enrolling students in kindergarten through grade 12, including preschools, which is not a local educational agency and which is not directly administered by the Bureau of Indian Affairs. (PL. 100-297- April 28, 1988, 102 STAT.395).

<u>Tribe</u>: The term 'tribe' means any Indian tribe, band, nation, or other organized group or community, including any Alaska Native village or regional or village corporation as defined in or established pursuant to the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (43 U.S.C. 1801 et seq.) which is recognized as eligible for the special programs and services provided by the United States to Indians because of their status as Indians. (Public Law 103-382, 1994, 108 STAT.4017).
