Chairman Delzer opened the hearing on House Bill 1002. Roll call was taken at an earlier hearing today.

Secretary of State, Al Jaeger, presented the committee with his biennial report and his written testimony.

Chairman Delzer: I had a discussion with Karen Mund this morning; she said that you were responsible for collecting the number of new legislators who want the hardcopy of the Code. How many have requested it out of the new legislators?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: I do not. What we do by law, A few sessions ago, Rep.

Carlisle had the law amended. The law at one time mandated that every legislator received a hardbound copy of the Century Code. Now it is an option thing. Each year we send out a letter

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to all of the new legislators to see if they want a hard copy or a CD copy of the code. We have had legislators that requested the hard copy and later returned them to our office still shrink wrapped.

Chairman Delzer: I would still like a copy of this list.

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: Ok.

Chairman Delzer: I would think that is getting to be less and less every time.

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: Yes it is. With your computers and search ability you can do much better with that. The thing that you need to keep in mind in this appropriation for this public printing though is the reason you guys get the cd is because it is included in this contract price with the publisher. I don't get the cd. The only thing we can give agencies is the hardbound copy. If I want a cd I have to go to this company here and buy it. In a sense what is happening is because we have the legislative council the way it is arranged, you are in a sense getting the cd free.

Mr. Jaeger continued his testimony with the major accomplishments of the Office.

Chairman Delzer: So the contract for license fee for the new database system is the \$780,000 for the next biennium?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: Yes. It will be for the next two bienniums and then it will drop down.

Chairman Delzer: What will it drop down to?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: I will have to get you that figure.

Chairman Delzer: You have already made the contact with them?

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Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: The contract is written in such a manner that if you don't give us the money, the project will stop. Essentially, the gains that we will have in productivity, the things that we will be able to offer the public in terms of online filing and on off chute of that that we are investigating is that we think that at some point we will be able to use the system to allow all of you to file your campaign contribution reports online. There are a number of features to it. That is just to kind of bring you quickly up to date on that project.

Chairman Delzer: What was the original cost of the one you scrapped and how does that differ from the cost of the new one?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: I am sorry. I do not remember that off the top of my head.

Chairman Delzer: If you would get that for us.

Representative Kaldor: Did the vendor that you were using do a preliminary analysis?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: We had a partnership with the state of North Carolina. We were going to use the system that they had created. We had come in a partnership with them. They were using their resources and we were using ours and it was going to be kind of a win/win situation. We made a couple of trips to North Carolina and what in hindsight happened is that the review of the architecture internally at ITD, something just didn't mesh right. As we got into the fall of the year things started cropping up but we were not quite being made aware of them. Mike Ressler is the first to say that. What happened then is that people internally, the problems that they were seeing were not being pushed up to the top. It was not until all of a sudden I am hearing that my staff is running into problems because they would say well this isn't quite what we wanted and they were getting well this is the way that it has to be. All of a sudden we get to December and something is not right and finally it all kind of comes out that the architecture is not good. It doesn't matter how much more money we toss at it. I think we did the right thing but the need is still there.

going to have a very marketable product.

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Representative Kaldor: The issue come to be is how do we try to avoid this in the future?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: I think ITD has made internal changes also. On this particular project, everything is in green. We have monthly meetings. Staff is meeting all of the time. This particular vendor that we have has actually given us a price break on this particular project.

Mr. Jaeger continued his testimony with the Election Management System and the Future Critical Issues.

Chairman Delzer: How much did you request from the Emergency Commission for the General Services Fund?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: It was an increase of \$165,520.

Mr. Jaeger continued with his testimony regarding Election Reform (Page 7 of testimony).

Chairman Delzer: Has this bill been introduced?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: No, we were hoping it would be rolled into our budget.

Representative Kempenich: Is it my understanding that you would like \$25000 in a line that you could cap but you think that you are only going to use about \$15,000?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: No we need the \$25,000.

Chairman Delzer: I understand the language but why was this not included in the Governor's Budget?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: At the time of the budget we didn't not have the figures yet.

Representative Kempenich: INAUDIBLE

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Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: It is right around there.

Representative Kempenich: Have you started any of the calculations?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: The law currently does not allow them to do that.

Chairman Delzer: What is the Federal Share of this then?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: None because the federal interest has been earned on the federal money and it is rolled into the account.

Chairman Delzer: If you have the authority why do you not have the authority to roll over the General Fund?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: I do not know.

Chairman Delzer: Is that fund growing more than you are using it and at what level do you tell the feds that you don't need anymore?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: First of all you have an interesting question because the feds have not come through and given us all of the money that is authorized in the bill.

Chairman Delzer: My question is do we really need to spend it all in North Dakota? Are you getting everything done without spending the total amount?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: I am hoping to use this as an endowment.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: So how much money has not been sent from the Feds?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: About \$3million.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: This was authorized how long ago?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: 1990.

Mr. Jaeger referred to a packet of spreadsheets that he had distributed.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: You developed these sheets yourself?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: Yes.

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Chairman Delzer: Do you use PeopleSoft?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: I was told there might be a way but I have not had a chance to look.

Chairman Delzer: Tammy, PeopleSoft has to be filled out. Is it filled out by each agency?

Tammy Dolan, OMB: Yes the agency staff is entering the information to PeopleSoft.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: Is this something you made or is it extracted from PeopleSoft?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: I made it.

Chairman Delzer: Are the revenues set by statute?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: I believe they are set by law. It is interesting that you brought that up because we have increased our revenue and the fees that we have charged in our office have remained unchanged since 1993 or 1995. The increased revenue is the result of having 45-50,000 new filings of new business registrations.

Chairman Delzer: In essence they are a tax on everybody doing business or however you want to say it. What is our reasoning for wanting the revenues to be so much higher?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: Don't miss understand the fees have remained the same.

Chairman Delzer: I understand that. Why if we can reduce the fees and make it even easier for people to start a new business, have we looked at that?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: Right now an annual report costs \$25.00 and that is probably pretty close to what it costs us to process it so. The revenues are more because more companies have registered with us so those fees come in. At some point you still make a profit but to cut back on the fees that have been in effect for so long, right now yes we are a profit center for the state of North Dakota and we return quite a bit more to the General Fund than what my appropriation is. It is not based on us being greedy or anything like that. It is based on the number of businesses in the system.

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Chairman Delzer: I understand that and I am not arguing that. It is in essence a tax on people doing business in North Dakota.

Representative Glassheim: So you have increased filings have you had increased FTEs over the last decade? And you have had increased costs of IT which is helping you to process the filings.

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: Our productivity is up and we have reached a point where I have kept our operations pretty much in line despite that increase.

Representative Glassheim: So the total increase in fees, is that to cover the cost of the increased IT to process these fees?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: Right and we are not asking for any fee changes. There is on thing I might just mention very quickly because I think it is kind of important. If you go to page eight of my hand out I have the optional requests listed there. I just wanted to bring on thing to your attention and maybe ask you to consider one thing. The North Dakota Business Development Engine, we put in there \$3,400,000. This was project number six on the SITAC list. It is a project that got started three or four years ago and what it would do is, the Secretary of State's office has been kind of picked as the focus point of this project. This is a project that would benefit about fifteen to seventeen agencies. Everybody has been involved in this. What it does is that it offers their customer a single portal to come in and to do business with a number of different agencies and really enhance services for the public and at the same time help cross communication with agencies. The Governor did not put it in. Last biennium the project was authorized if we had revenue that would be generated from the publicly traded corporation bill. At this point we don't have any but we certainly know that it wont take too long and we will have some of those. Last time what was in my appropriation bill was the authority to borrow from the Bank of North Dakota if I could show a future revenue stream to offset the

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cost of that particular project. At this point to say would you please give me \$3.4million or us agencies that amount of money, I don't know if that is feasible for you to consider. This project is too important to let it die. I would like you to consider something similar to what was done in the last biennium which would authorize us to then move ahead with the project. The project is basically approved if I have the money for it. We have all of the plans set that I think some of you have seen the different things. Representative Skarphol who is on the interim IT committee is very much aware of the project and knows it in quite detail.

Representative Berg: Just to follow up to that. What are the benefits to the business?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: First of all, the main thing would be is that a business could go to a single portal and not have to go to a bunch of different websites to do a lot of your

business because this would allow you to do business with a number of different places.

Representative Berg: We are not changing business we are just changing the portal. What I would like to see is us change we do business and get the Tax Department, Job Service, and Workers Comp working with a business to report in one place. Is there a way whether this or another way to pull those together so people have one check they write, one point of contact?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: I think that this is probably toward that end. What I can do is there is a very detailed information on it and I will make sure you get it.

Chairman Delzer: Just furnish that when we go into more detail. Also let us know why you had \$2.9million in this biennium and now you are asking for \$3.4million for the next one.

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: The higher figure is a figure that ITD has given us as revised from a couple of years ago.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: Let's move to 1002. I have some information here that was just handed out. You should have each received some information dated February 2, a memo with a bunch of detailed information from the Secretary of State. There is an additional FTE in there—an accountant position. OMB has suggested that they have the FTE.

Tammy Dolan, OMB: Yes, you are correct.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: This would put him in the same system as some of the other agencies are doing to input their fiscal data into PeopleSoft so it is more easily accessible. The memo that you see has quite a lot of different things. It talks about the business development engine which is another project which the Secretary has been working on the operating platform. You can see there are amendments listed on the first page. We have also the issue with the issue of the _____ election fund. Apparently those funds are deposited in to one account and the Secretary is concerned that when the feds audit us that there may be an issue about the interest on our portion not being there. Does anyone remember—it was like around \$30.0

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Representative Kempenich: I think it is \$25,000. Truthfully, the whole thing with this is the increase is one FTE, after that it is federal funds. I don't know about that \$780.0. I don't know where a person wants to go with that.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: If you have any ideas just put them together. The FTE is the one question I have and I think that it has been demonstrated pretty fairly that this is something that the Secretary should be having in his department. The final word has not come down yet on where we are with additional people and what is going to happen. So let's think about that. If you have any ideas throw them out now or we will come back and revisit it after the weekend.

Representative Dosch: Just to comment on the \$780.0—that is for the system they are putting in and that is basically committed to. There is going to be three additional payments so there really isn't anything we can do about that.

Representative Kempenich: That is what they have already spent. They system is more than that.

Representative Dosch: There is another \$1.3 million to finish that project. It is something they have to do.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: I believe so. Moving forward is something we are going to have to do to complete the project.

Representative Kempenich: We might as well put in an amendment removing that FTE.

Representative Glassheim: The business program of \$3.0 million is not in the budget and we are not interested in putting it in.

Representative Kempenich: There was money in to start it last biennium. They spent \$780.0 and things didn't work. They pulled the plug on the project for right now. They gained some knowledge of where they want to go with it but that was basically they pulled the plug

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instead of keeping going forward. The project manager decided this wasn't working so they are regrouping right now and seeing what they can salvage out of what they did get accomplished and then are starting over again.

Representative Glassheim: So the 780,000 is to pay for the cost of developing the business development engine that didn't work out. There is no money in the budget for continuing that.

Representative Kempenich: There was some money appropriated last session and the \$780.0 is what they spent. I think the appropriation was about \$3 million.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: I think it was a loan authorization. We may be talking about two different things. If you look at the memo and bullet point number 3. The discussion is to either fund it or allow borrowing authority. I don't know if that is something we want to do—it's an additional \$3.4 million.

Chairman Delzer returned to the meeting.

Representative Kaldor: This is one of many of these. I would be very interested if LC could develop some kind of list of the many contracts or loans that we have entered into that are going to be paid out over the period of the next two biennia. It seems like we have a lot of these—contracts that are to be paid off in 3 or 4 installments. It's hard to get a handle on this and if it will be an ongoing operating expense.

Chairman Delzer: For all the bills in Government Operations?

Representative Kaldor: For all the state agencies. I would be happy if it were just for us and our agencies.

Chairman Delzer: So that we can prioritize within ourselves too. Also ones we will be seeing in the second half. If that's not too hard to do.

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Representative Kempenich: This idea of giving someone borrowing authority for the future.

I know it's like bonding but it doesn't seem to be described the same way. We are committing the money and we are calling one-time money. We should probably pay for it up front. Most of it is technology projects.

Representative Kaldor: It might be the right thing to do because they are work in progress types of agreements. You don't want to put money into a box waiting to spend it in two years and four years. We just need to get a handle on this and an understanding. It seems like more and more agencies are coming in with that. I am assuming it is technology things that drive this.

Chairman Delzer: If we do them and accept them, we should certainly have language in the bill that we expect it to be part of the budget next time and not listed as an OAR. It should be part of the base budget. They should have planned it for that. It certainly shouldn't be anything we have to find money for next time if there is shortage in the ending fund balance.

Representative Dosch: I would like an amendment to take \$20,000 out of the travel expense. They have a 54% increase over previous years.

Chairman Delzer: Did we have a discussion with them on the computers? Is that part of your \$20.0 also?

Vice Chairman Thoreson: I don't remember having a discussion about the computers.

Chairman Delzer: The election reform, is that all federal dollars?

Representative Dosch: Are you looking at number five.

Chairman Delzer: I imagine it fits under that category but on the bill it is 5.4

Representative Dosch: That 2.8 is the difference between the \$4.5 million and the other \$1.6 they are backing out of the original software

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Chairman Delzer: But it is all federal funding?

Representative Dosch: Yes it is. My comments on the Election Reform line say that it is all federal dollars.

Chairman Delzer: This has GF for a new computer program. Correct. Has he had an RFP for that?

Representative Dosch: It is already in progress. That's the first installment on that. To finish paying off the system it would another \$1.350 million. So that is why we had the discussion on whether there are other obligations are out there beyond this next biennium. That is the work in progress on the current system they are migrating to now. So, they really can't change that at this point.

Chairman Delzer: Again, if people want to come up with amendments later on, let's not be afraid to discuss them.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: Secretary of State is House Bill 1002. I believe we discussed having amendments drafted to remove the FTE accountant position and also reduce the operating expenses by \$20,000. For purposes of discussion I would move those amendments.

Chairman Delzer: You have heard the motion is there a second?

Representative Kempenich: Second.

Chairman Delzer: The motion was made and seconded, any discussion? Representative Thoreson did you have anything further to add?

Vice Chairman Thoreson: I think we have talked about this. I think at this time it is just best if we remove that.

Representative Glassheim: Could you refresh me, what was the purpose of this position?

Vice Chairman Thoreson: This position I believe was put in as a suggestion of OMB to work in an accountant role. The Secretary's office has been maintaining things on a separate system such as an Excel spreadsheets and that sort of thing. While the position may be useful I believe that perhaps we can find other ways of bringing the office into using the system that is in place perhaps through training or finding somebody within the Secretary's office to handle this. I would hope that would be the case.

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Chairman Delzer: If I remember right I don't believe the Secretary had ever asked for this. I think it is something OMB suggested.

Representative Berg: I guess my question is, you've got \$780,000 for this platform migration and then \$4.5million for the equipment to implement the electronic poll books, and this position relates to I am not sure. I see it referenced a couple of different places. One is kind of an accountant and I think it is also referenced as a data base. I don't have a problem with the motion but I am just.

Chairman Delzer: It seems to me that with the \$780,000, it seemed to me that was a case where they had been funded for doing the IT program and they stopped it. This \$780,000 was supposed to replace that one. The \$4.5million is all HAVA money, which I don't know how solid that is but on the green sheet it is all equipment for counties to help with the Help Americans Vote Act. Counties will have five years to repay the money to the election fund. I guess I do not know, can anybody tell me what the election fund is used for?

Representative Kempenich: It is to educate the county and the voters. It is all pass through to the counties. I do have a question, the Secretary brought up \$25,000 to balance his books where did that go?

Vice Chairman Thoreson: That is correct. The Secretary does have an issue with if there is a federal audit of the HAVA funds, there was the issue of interest gathered on just the state's match and I don't know that we want to put an amendment on with the specific dollar amount however we may need to add something in language wise allowing that to occur. That did not come up in our discussion.

Chairman Delzer: It is a case on the interest on the HAVA money is going into the state General Fund instead of staying in the HAVA account? Vice Chairman Thoreson: That is correct. For us to receive the federal dollars, it was a 95/5 split. The state had to provide a 5% match to the 95% from the feds. When that money was housed in the bank, apparently the interest on the state's 5% portion should have been separated and was not so there is some concern that a federal audit would show that the federal dollars are paying the interest on the state portion.

Chairman Delzer: This is something that the Secretary brought forward now. There is nothing in the budget about it. Did the Secretary bring that forward Tammy?

Tammy Dolan, OMB: That was an issue that we had discussed. Right now there is not language that directs that the interest earned on that money stays in the fund. So without that language all of the interest goes to the General Fund. We had talked about that along with the adding for the back interest that would have accrued to that account plus we did not have an amount that we could work with at that time so we did not add that into the budget.

Chairman Delzer: What about the language? Did you consider adding the language? Did you on purpose not add it?

Tammy Dolan, OMB: We talked about it but we thought that the issue should be dealt with together because right now it is not allowable that the interest even accrues to that fund so we did not put it in the bill. We thought that it could be dealt with together when we would be adding back the interest if you so chose to go that way.

Chairman Delzer: The Governor's office take on that was that that was something that you would worry about after the federal audit if they complained about it?

Tammy Dolan, OMB: That would not be our position. It is just that right now in the Treasurer's Office only allocates interest to those funds that are established that way that directs that the interest goes to them other than that for the most part it stays in the General Fund.

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Chairman Delzer: It is a question whether or not somebody wants to propose that amendment.

Representative Kempenich: We might as well get it out. I propose that the interest money...

Chairman Delzer: I think we have a motion on the table. Let's go ahead and deal with this motion and then we will take another one.

Representative Kaldor: I do have a question before we move on relating to the account specialist three. I am just looking at the narrative in the OMB website. I am a little bit concerned about this one because I think and maybe Tammy can correct me if I am wrong but it looks like the reason that they are asking for this is because of business demands which is a good thing because it indicates that our economy is driving more business requests of the agency. We certainly would not want to obstruct the growth of business or delay the ability of businesses to get their recordings and all of their filings done properly and timely. I don't know if there is more to it than that, I would be open to that but I wonder if maybe Tammy could elaborate on why the OMB did not recommend this.

Chairman Delzer: This is one that the Secretary of State did not ask for correct?

Representative Kaldor: That is why I want to know why OMB said you ought to do this.

Roxanne Woeste, Legislative Council: It was included in the optional requests.

Chairman Delzer: It was an optional request of theirs?

Roxanne Woeste, Legislative Council: Yes.

Chairman Delzer: Of the Secretary of State or was it one that you guys added?

Tammy Dolan, OMB: No. Roxanne is correct. The Secretary of State did include an optional request for the position. We have to work very closely with the Secretary of State throughout the year. They do not have an accounting specialist on staff that handles a lot of the accounting issues. They do the daily processing of the business and that person is very busy.

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on his other duties.

The Secretary himself does all of the financial reporting and if this position were in place he could actually not do that because he has plenty of other duties that he also has to work on.

This past biennium the reason that we worked with the Secretary of State and actually, I believe he is convinced now that he needs this position because there were some federal reporting issues that we found over the biennium that we worked with him to clear up that were fairly complex. Their budget is becoming more complex with the federal dollars, general dollars and all of their business activity. Between those issues that we found and just the amount of activity they have, this position would help them in the future do all of their federal reporting. For example the interest issue that was identified. We believe that had they had a position looking at these things over the years they might have seen this earlier. They have not had a federal finding yet but they think that there may be issues when they are audited. That is why we requested it. It was mainly the complexity of the office and to allow the secretary to focus

Chairman Delzer: If we allow this is it going to change the way things are done and is it going to free up any of the Secretary of the State's time?

Tammy Dolan, OMB: That is an issue that we talked about with him before he submitted the request. I believe if they get a person in that position that has the expertise and can do the things that the Secretary wants done yes, it would free up more of his time.

Chairman Delzer: Is there anything that is going to be done that is not currently being done?

Tammy Dolan, OMB: I think if a person was using the system and the reports that come off of the system the way that they could. I think there is some duplication to put it bluntly. I think there is some duplication of effort there that yes would free up time because of all of the transferring from one area to the other.

Chairman Delzer: I don't argue that at all, the question is whether or not this position is going to free that up and what is going to happen if it does? What is going to be the improvements to the citizens of North Dakota by freeing that time up? Now because who are you freeing the time up for?

Tammy Dolan, OMB: For the Secretary of State. They would probably have more frequent financial reporting.

Chairman Delzer: They are currently already doing all of the BARS and everything but they are also doing this other.

Tammy Dolan, OMB: For their daily operations, yes, they have to use PeopleSoft. They do use PeopleSoft for all of their information is there. It is mainly how the information is utilized on the administration side afterwards that would change.

Representative Meyer: Aren't we talking about how we want him to quit putting all of his reports on Excel spreadsheets? I mean it is just a redundancy.

Chairman Delzer: Yes and no. It is his prerogative of how he does that. The question is whether or not he is going to change even if we give him another staff person.

Representative Kempenich: What would this position be classified as?

Tammy Dolan, OMB: Accounting Specialist III.

Representative Kempenich: Would it just be accounting or a CPA or what?

Tammy Dolan, OMB: It could be a CPA yes.

Representative Kempenich: We have four different budgets now that are asking for accountants. I don't think he has got enough money in here for one thing if he is going to ask for what he is looking for. I think we should leave this out for right now and see how passionate they are about it. I know that there are four different budgets right now that are looking for accountants and a lot of them are higher than a three.

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Chairman Delzer: Further comments by the committee?

A motion was made by Vice Chairman Thoreson, seconded by Representative Kempenich to remove the funding for the Account Budget Specialist FTE position and

remove \$20,000 from operating. Amendment was adopted by voice vote.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: Representative Kempenich pointed out that in the testimony which

the Secretary of State distributed during his hearing; he did propose language to deal with this

interest earnings. What it does is it amends section 16.1-01-15 of the Century Code. That is

the part that sets up the election fund that the Secretary maintains. The way it reads out says

the monies in the election fund must be used for the exclusive purpose of carrying out activities

for the Help America Vote Act 2002 and are subject to Chapter 54-16. His proposed language

after the words election fund, he wants the following language, and any interest earnings on

the election fund. So I guess if we were to amend this we would need to put in a section

adding that language to 16.1-01-15.

Representative Kempenich: If you go down to section two he has the dollar amount that he

would like to have in there too, \$24,332.54. I have another question too. It goes down the

amount appropriated here represents the imputed interest earnings allocated to the amount

of? Is that an underline under the amount of?

Vice Chairman Thoreson: No I think that is a copy line.

Representative Meyer: Is that the exact amount that has been identified as past due.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: that is the estimate but then he also has the language here or so

much of the sum as may be necessary. I think that was just a best guess estimate.

Chairman Delzer: Is it a requirement of that number by Century Code?

Roxanne Woeste, Legislative Council: This is an area I am not very familiar with. I can check with the Director and perhaps he can give you more information.

Representative Berg: I guess that is what I would ask. Just check with Jim and I guess I would be open to even removing that hard number and just leaving them a little flexibility.

Representative Dosch: It is my understanding that it is in code that we may be provided with this. Anyone who requests will be provided. A vast majority are getting theirs on disk now but because it is in code that upon request the legislator would be provided with this. I think it would be a code issue that we would have to change if we want to sunset that.

Chairman Delzer: Your understanding is not that the code sets 700 but anyone provided.

Representative Dosch: It is any one requested and that is why at the start of each session, new legislators get a deal saying do you want a full set or do you just want the disk.

Chairman Delzer: Did you ask of those 700 that they are getting how many of them they are using?

Representative Berg: I think Roxanne should just talk to Jim. It says 700 and we have 141 legislators so it is way more than just legislators. I think we maybe need some hard copies but at the same time. I think we are spending \$163,000 for those 700 and then another \$330,000 for the update with Lexus.

Chairman Delzer: I think our issue is, I don't know, I think the Secretary could adjust that on his own if he wanted to.

Representative Berg: I think it is probably required on who gets them in the Century Code.





V. Chair Grindberg opened the hearing on HB 1002, the Secretary of State and public printing appropriation.

Alvin A. Jaeger, Secretary of State testified in favor of HB 1002 and provided written testimony # 1 entitled the FIFTY-SEVENTH BIENNIAL REPORT JULY 1, 2005 – JUNE 30, 2007. He also provided written testimony # 2. (06.38)

Senator Warner said he is new to the appropriations committee and asked if Al Jaeger has some background information for request #6 on page 9.

Al Jaeger said yes, he will have it sent to the committee. Regarding request 1 on page 9, he said OMB has already determined the positions are critical and it was at their urging that he included the accounting FTE.

Senator Krauter asked if there are any vacancies in the 27 FTEs.

Al Jaeger said they have two vacant positions. He explained his staff's longevity, his staff equity request and the difficulty in hiring new employees while being unable to give raises to current employees. He also left with the committee a list of his staff's years of service (#3) (26.00)

Senator Robinson clarified that when he talks about people at the top taking less, he is talking about percentage.

Al Jaeger said that is correct. He has two carrots; one is someone with many years of experience that is fed up with the work environment in the private sector. The other is fully funded health insurance.

Senator Robinson said on the Senate side in SB 2003, they have a \$100 minimum. With the equity and FTEs, what additional bumps can you give your staff at the bottom pay levels?

Al Jaeger said with the grade 5 person, it was about \$180/month. He does have some people he will have to give the \$100 bump. They are at the very bottom.

Senator Krauter said he is trying to understand the history of the vacant FTE's. How long have they been vacant? What is the history of applicants?

Al Jaeger said they had two grade 5 FTEs vacant and hired two people about 9 months ago. They hire with a six month probation period. One employee made it and one didn't, he gave notice in December to one. That position has been vacant since December. They ended up with 60 or 70 applications. He had to put that on hold because all the managers are so involved with the tech project, there is no one to train a new employee. At the moment he has a temp in the office. He is not happy about it and is the victim of circumstance. It is his intent is to fill that position within a few months. The other position is in a technical support area, grade 8 or 10; she took a job with another agency with a considerable increase in salary. Again, they are a victim of timing. The project they are doing is very intense. The senior managers are too busy now to hire and train. Normally, the only vacancies he has are in grade 5 positions.

Senator Krauter asked about the time frame in filling the second position. When was it vacated?

Al Jaeger said it has been vacant since last fall. With the project and the elections, they ran out of time to hire. It is a position they want to fill because the duties tie into their new project.

He continued describing his written testimony (35.26) He does the budgeting work himself because there is no one on his staff with the education to do it. OMB has recommended he put an accountant on staff.

Senator Christmann asked if the data base and processing migration project and the business development project can be done at same time.

Al Jaeger said the migration project should be done by end of the year. The business development engine can't really start until after that. OMB has recommended the Secretary of State's office be the lead agency on the project. It goes across many agencies and the funding is divided between all the involved agencies.

Senator Christmann said he is trying to follow the migration project. There was about \$600,000 for the initial part. He asked about the funds that were leftover when the plug was pulled. The \$780,000, is that the high licensing cost he has been referring to? Al Jaeger explained his expenditures and the general service operating fund. He requested the excess over \$75,000 in the general services account not be turned back to the general fund as it always has been and used instead for the project, which is his request number 5 on page 9. He explained the \$20,000 reduction in his budget by the House is substantial. Senator Robinson clarified the migration project would be done by the end of the calendar year, not fiscal year.

His grade 5 people are doing grade 6 work. They need the type of person that has some intuitive reasoning. It may ultimately result in a decrease in the number of employees but for the next biennium, it won't.

Senator Warner asked if the documents age out of the system.

Al Jaeger said he doesn't know. Clara Jenkins, who is in charge of the project and has been with the office for 36 years, knows the details. There are files over at archives for corporations that have been in existence for over 100 years. They have a very good record retention system.

Chairman Holmberg opened discussion on HB 1002 and stated there are two different amendments.

Senator Warner said that he asked Senator Wardner to accompany him to the Secretary of State's office for the discussions and wanted two sets of eyes. He presented two amendments .0302 and .0303. Both amendments restore the governor's budget recommendations for this budget. It restores a cut of \$20,000 in the secretary of state's operating line; restores an FTE which is a financial analyst and budget specialist which was approved by the governor but deleted by the House. The Secretary of State's office has never had a financial officer. As larger and larger amounts of money are flowing through the office, they want to be sure and maintain the integrity of federal funds. The Secretary of State was overwhelmed by the amount of effort it was taking and he requested a financial officer, and we agreed. The distinction between the two amendments – the Sec. of State advocated being the lead agency for 15 different agencies in government to coordinate their efforts in developing new businesses in the state. They would be able to reach each other's data bases within certain limits. This upgrade of technology would be an expansion beyond the governor's budget. The technology upgrade would be funded in the .0302 and it is not funded in the .0303

amendment but it continues some loan authorization money which was actually in the

commerce budget bill last session. That authorizes the Secretary of State to borrow the money if he can prove that he has a revenue stream which would finance it through the budget section. The revenue stream which we'd be anticipating would be the change in corporate governance structure that we adopted last session which would make ND a haven for shareholder friendly corporations.

Discussion continued on the HAVA funds (Help America Vote Act) and using ITD versus private vendors for providing this program to the state.

V. Chair Grindberg felt that an RFP should be set up and the process bid.

Senator Wardner said ITD would be watching and making sure the project is run right.

Senator Robinson was wondering if ITD would be excluded if private vendors were cheaper.

Minutes:

Vice Chairman Thoreson opened the conference committee on House Bill 1002. All conferees were present.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: I guess this morning we are going to have a little discussion about the changes made on the Senate side of House Bill 1002. I know there are still some issues that are yet to be resolved I think in regards with equity and other things so we probably won't come to any major decisions this morning but I guess for our purpose get some information on the changes which you made after the budget came over to your side.

Senator Krebsbach: I am sure we are waiting for some kind of response for what we did and why.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: Yes.

Senator Krebsbach: I will go into what we did and I welcome my two colleagues to jump in at any time because they are probably more aquatinted with this than I am. I didn't work on the subcommittee of this one but at the same time it is one that I am very interested in. We did restore the 2% reduction in salary that you folks made. It was requested by the agency that this be done and we have been doing this on all of our budgets. Also we restored the equity

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dollars and there was a request for a full time equivalent accounting budget specialist which really has been recommended that they have. What we are dealing with here folks is an agency with a budget of \$18,511,000. They need this specialist in their agency. We did restore that. Also we restored the \$20,000 l believe it was reduction in your operating expenses. We felt they showed good justification for the need for that. Also there was the amendment put in to allow them to carry over their unexpended funds. Then we included the language of authorization for their budget section approval for the development engine project that they are involved in. That pretty much covers what we did restore and I would welcome any comments from my colleagues on that.

Senator Kilzer: On the item of \$20,000 that the House had taken out for operating expenses, the testimony showed that about 75% is technology and the remaining \$5000 is for miscellaneous things but necessary like postage and things like that.

Senator Warner: If I could point out that this is a very well established agency with employees that have an extraordinary long tenure. There will be an unusually large number of people who are approaching retirement. Traditionally and if fact by law I guess these employees are entitled to compensation for a certain amount of sick leave and vacation time and severance packages of sorts. There will be will be an unusually amount of these people retiring in the coming years and traditionally that is the money that has come from roll up from unfilled positions that is usually being needed to fill that need. That was the justification we had for restoring all of their anticipated dollars from FTEs that were unfilled.

Representative Meyer: Would someone refresh my memory on the \$3.4million for the implementing of the business development engine computer project? Did we have that presented to us or did it just happen when it got to the Senate? I can't remember.

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Vice Chairman Thoreson: We did have that discussion in the first half on the business development engine project.

Representative Meyer: And we removed that?

Representative Dosch: I think this is just to allow for the carry over right?

Senator Warner: The business development engine has been going for a few bienniums in developmental and conceptual conversations among all of the different state agencies which would have to do with the emerging business systems in this state. It was presented but not funded in the Governor's budget. Although we had language in the Commerce Department last session I believe it was that allowed for them to continue the discussions and for them to go forward with the money should come in from a corporate governance structure that we were adopting in North Dakota. If the revenues proved to be sufficient to justify it or have a loan that we would allow it to go forward without further authorization. We continued that language. The Senate did test the issue in the committee of allowing full funding of the business development engine. We presented it as an amendment to the committee and it was declined. It was a decision that we were interested in the concept we were interested in it going forward and the discussions going forward but we though it should be paid for out of corporate governance fees so we allowed the conversations to continue but did not fund it. We have retained the language which was existing from the Commerce budget last session.

Senator Krebsbach: I would like to call your attention to this document right here which is the North Dakota Business Development Engine and if you do not have that I am sure the Secretary would be happy to provide you with that.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: Was that something that was provided to the House prior do you recall? We have our information here and I think we could find it.

Senator Krebsbach: I think it pretty well explains the entire program there. I do believe we did leave in the authorization for them to borrow for this program to get it implemented and then have it paid such as Senator Warner said with fees and so on.

Representative Dosch: I guess one of the issues is they are currently going through a computer upgrade now to get the rest of their computers on the UCC filings and all of that and get them off of the mainframe. As we look at this, is it really practical in the next two years that they would be able to take on yet another project such and this. The fact that it was not included in the Governor's budget I guess some of the reasons that I recall why we decided to go forgo that.

Senator Krebsbach: I would prefer that we have the Secretary address that question because I think he is the most qualified to do so.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: If the Secretary wants to go ahead and just for clarification present that again. I will caution that this is not another hearing on this but we will certainly take information which might pertain to this.

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: There is no expenditure of money. I just want to clarify that. There is no money being added. OMB and the Governor have always been supportive of it the Governor just didn't put in the funding for the \$3.4million and we did present it to you and I had requested at that time the same language that the Senate put in which is the duplicate of the language that was put in to the Department of Commerce budget last session. It is the authorization to keep the project alive. If the funds come forth we can do it. Our migration is going to be completed by the end of the year so we wouldn't tackle anything but if funding was available at that time we certainly would not want to wait until next biennium so it is the authorization to keep the project alive but there is no money other than the authority to borrow.

Representative Dosch: So that would be reflected under special funds?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: Yes.

Senator Warner: One of the changes that we made last session, an important change in the corporate governance law, created a governance structure which was probably the most share holder friendly in the United States. It is most responsive to share holder concerns. This is opposed to the Delaware model which is very management friendly. I think right now we are in a period of recession within this country but I think that all of us have good hopes that we will be coming out of this recession within a year so and if we will see a new birth in businesses and restructuring of businesses and I hope that we have learned some lessons from not retiring too heavily on management and the way that we are going to draw out investors back into the stock market and such is that we are going to create business structures which are more responsive to share holder concerns rather than management concerns. I think North Dakota is uniquely poised because of this change in governance structure that we have adopted a safe port for those corporations. As we hope that they do, incorporate in North Dakota bring significant fees, something in the nature of \$40,000 per corporation per year I think it is and registration fees and that would certainly be enough of an economic source of steam to drive this development engine. We would like to leave the language in place it only allows it to go forward if the money is there and it still has to go to Budget Section and I think Emergency Commission before it can proceed.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: I too was in strong support of that change we made last session. I think it was a very good thing we did here in North Dakota giving companies an opportunity to look at our state as a place to incorporate and do business and I guess going forward we need to look at the tools that would be best to bring those people here. This was something which from the changes we made we did not include that. We can certainly discuss those issues here and perhaps come to some position as to whether or not that is necessary. I do appreciate

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your information on that. Are there any other questions at this time? I guess I do have one before we go forward. In visiting with the Secretary yesterday there was some language or money I believe that dealt with the HAVA funding. If you would like to address that just for the record so we all are aware of that.

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: One of the amendments that we have that we did not bring up at the time that we were before the House. Congress passed an omnibus bill that included money for HAVA. North Dakota is eligible to receive \$500,000 but we need a 5% match. That just happened like a day before we were actually on the Senate side. They have added \$30,000 to go towards the 5% match. Our intent would be to work it so that we can get the match in as quickly after July 1st as possible so that it gets into the election fund because as soon as it is in the election fund it starts earning interest. That is pretty important.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: So the \$30,000 is to get the \$500,000 in federal dollars.

Representative Dosch: One other question, what is the purpose of that money? What would you do with the money?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: Actually the state has and I know it is in my testimony, a couple more million dollars that is still due to North Dakota but it does go to support our election endeavors in the state of North Dakota, support the systems things that we do with the counties and what have you. My goal at the moment is that we create some sort of endowment so that we can use the interest as long as possible. It is off the top of my head but I believe and again this is sense we met with you but I think that since we received HAVA money we have earned something like \$1.2million in interest so that interest can support stuff so getting that \$500,000 in is helpful because it just supports our ongoing support of the election process. We have it coming and it should have all been here already but it comes in bits and pieces.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: They authorize but don't always appropriate.

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Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: It is a little different than you guys.

Senator Krebsbach: A lot of this money that we have been getting also goes to the counties in the state for their ongoing training. There is a constant turnover in poll workers, election volunteers and so on and I think this is a great assistance to the counties in the state for that process.

Vice Chairman Thoreson: Thank you Senator. Committee I guess, I am just looking for any other issues that the House side may wish to ask of the Senate at this time? Again we will most likely meeting again in the future. We need to take this information back and discuss with our respective caucuses and within our body as I am sure that you need to do with yours. Also the issue of the equity funding is something which is throughout most of the budgets and until there is probably some agreement as to what will happen with that I don't know that we will be making any final decisions on this but I do appreciate the information you have shared with us this morning and we will go ahead and look forward to meeting once again.

Vice Chairman Thoreson called the conference committee on House Bill 1002 to order. All conferees were present.

Representative Thoreson: Ok committee what we are going to do is just go through the points here on the statement of purpose of your amendments. You should have those in your folder. It is my intention that if we can we get this one taken care of this afternoon. If not we will schedule again for Monday. Item number one, that is the FTE, we will get back to that. Items two and three I think those are pretty well taken care of so we can put a mark next to them.

Those are going to be handled in 1015 or some of it will be.

Representative Dosch: Perhaps we can get Legislative Council to comment on that because I believe that was one of the other provisions or amendments on the bill too that did not go through, as far as item number two.

Roxanne Woeste, Legislative Council: This is the adjustment that the House did to all agency budgets the first half of the session relating to anticipated salary savings from vacant positions. This is the same adjustment that they do to budgets the second half so we have

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been keeping the funding that the Senate restored typically in conference committees we are restoring that funding.

Representative Thoreson: So our actions in the second half did not do this to budgets which we received the Senate version of, correct?

Roxanne Woeste, Legislative Council: Correct.

Representative Thoreson: So by the Senate putting this back in we are kind at a level place.

Roxanne Woeste, Legislative Council: Correct I believe the House had agreed to putting back the funding and this issue.

Senator Warner: So the money for this is in OMB?

Roxanne Woeste, Legislative Council: The OMB bill includes the equity pool. This is money that is just going back in the budget.

Representative Thoreson: It is back in now because the Senate put it back in.

Roxanne Woeste, Legislative Council: Correct.

Representative Thoreson: So are we all comfortable on that? We can agree that it is going to stay at that level because the Senate has restored the changes made in the first half by the House. Item number three, the equity that is going to be taken care of in 1015. Item four, the \$20,000 in operating expenses, the notes that I have says that it was about 75% technology and then postage and other expenses were about 25% of that. I think that is what came up in our original discussion. I guess for my part I don't know if that one is a deal breaker or not. I think we are ok with that. We are only talking about \$20,000. Let's go ahead and check that one off of the list. Item number five was the match for the federal funds. Mr. Secretary, this is something that occurred after the House had seen this bill, correct?

At Jaeger, Secretary of State: If you recall in the House side you added the money I needed to cover the interest on the HAVA so that was on the House side. The Senate maintained that.

This is the match I need for the HAVA money which

This is the match I need for the HAVA money which was approved by Congress just a couple days before my Senate hearing. That is the 5% match to get the \$500,000.

Representative Thoreson: Do you know, we talked in the first half, how much HAVA money has been allocated and how much has actually been appropriated? What are we still waiting for?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: It is over \$1million and close to \$2million that Congress still has not appropriated.

Representative Thoreson: Any word on when that is coming?

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: No. What happened the last time, when we did get some money, I actually went to the Emergency Commission and they gave me out of the state contingency fund 5%, so that we could get the money into the piggy bank as quickly as possible because it starts earning interest.

Representative Thoreson: That was going to be my follow up because if this happens while we are not here, you still have to have the money to get that.

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: They have because the case being made is that if I had to wait we have had it already for several months and it is earning interest and we had waited until the session we would have lost that interest.

Senator Krebsbach: In response to your question according to the testimony from the Secretary of State on February 25 the balance still due to North Dakota is \$4,428,197.

Representative Thoreson: That is what I recalled when we had spoken is that it was about four million dollars but I didn't know if we were getting a big chunk to cover that or not. If I remember it was like \$9million total and only \$5million had been sent to us. So we are still short a few bucks. Item five I think we can click off of the list if the committee members agree.

Item number six this is for the business development engine dealing with the corporate development.

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: This is just the authorization and by the way since I was in front of this conference committee on Thursday, I received notification that I think we will have our first publicly traded company in the middle of June. If we get a few more of those I will be able to proceed with this.

Representative Thoreson: That is good news as someone who strongly supported that change in legislation last session, I am happy to see it is paying off. I did notice that we have a company according to the Bismarck Tribune which has offices here that is Fortune 500 but I believe they are not incorporated in North Dakota. They are a Delaware corporation. I talked to their government affairs person and said it sure would be nice to have a North Dakota Fortune 500 company.

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: If we get a few of these the franchise fee is about \$40,000 a year.

Representative Thoreson: So I think just because we are being so very agreeable here I have no problem with item six. I think we can go ahead and agree to that. That takes us back to item number one, the FTE. I was provided a handout a few moments ago showing where we are with fiscal staff in the agencies. Let's go ahead and discuss this a little bit. I will open it up to either side for comments and hopefully we can maybe come to some resolution on this.

Representative Dosch: Based on that sheet here, he obviously has way too high a budget in relation to the number of employees so we would probably want to take a look at that. That is what you meant by that.

Representative Thoreson: Let the record show that there was a smile on the faces of the committee as that comment was made. Back to more serious discussion, I guess while I am

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also not one who necessarily likes adding persons, the case most likely has been made that this is something that is going to be needed. I know that you have certainly put a lot of work into doing this yourself and others and your staff. We have added one for the commission for council for indigents. Just my personnel opinion that I think it would be ok to move forward and put this position there.

Senator Warner: I applaud the wisdom of your decision. We had some discussions earlier about the futility of trying to teach eagles how to swim. In other words of using highly paid and highly qualified employees to do mid-level tasks. If that was your argument that you made in Indigent Defense, why should we be paying \$130/hour lawyer to do bookkeeping work. I think the same could be said about the skills possessed by the Secretary of State.

Representative Thoreson: I agree. If others are comfortable with that it looks like, if we are doing it the way we are doing it in some others, we see a lot of H's along this one here today maybe we will hopefully move forward with it.

Representative Dosch: As you know I am pretty stingy with giving out employees, as Senator Krebsbach can attest to. But I also have to agree with adding this. I think it is needed and I think the Secretary's abilities can be directed better places than doing a lot of this accounting work. However, only one caveat that I am supposed to relay and that is that this position is put in that he does in fact be given this work to do and that our Secretary doesn't continue on to hold on to some of this but that you certainly utilize this individual which I am certain you will.

Representative Thoreson: He is going to be so busy signing up companies coming to the state that he won't have time to do it. I guess I would entertain a motion if we agree.

Roxanne Woeste, Legislative Council: There is just one other thing I would like to note. The Senate had one additional change that has not been discussed. It is section five on the first page of the Senate amendments version 0303. It is a section that was added that allows them

to carry over any money in the general services operating fund into this next biennium to use for one of the IT projects. I just wanted to note that.

Senator Warner: This is an IT project which will span over the biennial break but will probably be concluded not too far into the year. There is a limiter on it that allows this carry over to be for only for that project. This is sort of sweeping up the dust and putting the debris away. I am getting a little carried away with my metaphors here.

Representative Thoreson: I will use another one. I just told Representative Dosch that since we are folding like cheap suits on this one I suppose what is one more. That is just my opinion.

Senator Warner: If it is the proper motion I would move that the House to the Senate Amendments. Is that correct?

Senator Krebsbach: And further amend.

Representative Thoreson: I believe we need to take equity out. Does the Senate not have to accede from their amendments and further amend?

Roxanne Woeste, Legislative Council: The proper motion that will be needed is that the Senate will have to recede from their amendments and we will do everything that the Senate amendments do except for the removal of the equity.

Senator Warner: So the proper motion is that the Senate recedes.

Representative Thoreson: As long as everyone is clear with that we are going to go ahead with that.

A motion was made by Senator Warner, seconded by Senator Krebsbach for the SENATE RECEDES FROM THE SENATE AMENDMENTS AND AMENDS. The vote was 6-0-0.



Any unexpended and unobligated balance remaining in the secretary of state's general services operating fund on June 30, 2009, is not subject to the provisions of section 54-09-08, and any unexpended funds are available and may be expended by the secretary of state, during the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, and ending June 30, 2011, for the database and processing platform migration project."







Dear Mr. Jaeger:

As you know, the Legislative Council is responsible for preparing the material for and supervising the publication of the North Dakota Century Code, the North Dakota Administrative Code, and the North Dakota Session Laws. The purpose of this letter is to notify you of the estimated costs for the 2009-11 biennium so you can include a sufficient amount in your budget request for these purposes.

During the 2007-09 biennium, cost estimates for the North Dakota Century Code purchases in your budget were based on the state maintaining 700 sets of the code. As we are not aware of any reason to change the number of sets needed, we are continuing to base our estimates on maintaining 700 code sets for the 2009-11 biennium.

During the 2009-11 biennium, we have tentatively identified Volumes 2B, 3A, 4C, 8B, and 12 of the North Dakota Century Code for replacement. We anticipate splitting the contents of Volume 3A into Volumes 3A and 3C, which means each set of the code will require six replacement volumes. These replacement volumes must be published to avoid increased costs for supplements and the eventual need to replace the entire Century Code. Replacement of volumes also makes the Century Code more easily usable for the public. The Court Rules Annotated volume is published in a softbound volume that must be replaced each biennium. Based on cost estimates furnished by LexisNexis, \$163,800 will be needed to purchase 700 sets of replacement Volumes 2B, 3A, 3C, 4C, 8B, and 12 and \$29,400 will be needed to purchase 700 sets of the Court Rules Annotated volume.

Based on LexisNexis estimates, \$88,200 will be needed to purchase 700 sets of the 2009 pocket supplements, \$35,700 will be needed to purchase 700 sets of the 2009 general index, and \$14,350 will be needed to purchase 700 sets of the Court Rules supplements. We are recommending that the state not purchase 700 sets of the Advance Code Service, which will result in a savings of \$58,800.

The estimated costs for North Dakota Century Code updates for the 2009-11 biennium total \$331,450. In the letter of estimated costs from Mr. Brian Kennedy, Associate Director, Government Relations and Contracts, LexisNexis (copy enclosed), it is stated that LexisNexis offers state government subscribers a 25 percent discount. Application of this discount will reduce estimated expenditures for 2009-11 North Dakota Century Code updates to \$248,587.50.

Based on the expenditures for the last two bienniums, North Dakota Administrative Code printing and mailing costs have been variable so estimating these costs is rather difficult. As you know, these costs depend on the volume of rules adopted by agencies, and there is no way to reliably predict what that will be. For the 2005-07 biennium, Administrative Code monthly average costs were \$2,183 for printing and \$195 for mailing and miscellaneous expenses. It appears costs for this biennium are somewhat reduced and we now do quarterly publication and mailing, rather than monthly. We believe it would be appropriate to reduce average cost estimates for the 2009-11 biennium by a net reduction of 20 percent in printing and mailing costs. This would mean average monthly costs would be anticipated to be \$1,746.40 for printing and \$156 for mailing. Based on these estimates, your budget will require Administrative Code printing costs of \$41,913.60 and mailing costs of \$3,744. You may want to consider whether you are comfortable with the estimated costs and adjust these amounts accordingly. We have not factored into these calculations any estimate for increased printing or postage costs.

We estimate that \$32,744 will be required to cover printing, binding, and mailing costs for the 2009 North Dakota Session Laws. This amount is based on the 2007 expenditure plus an increase of 5 percent and should include having Session Laws volumes mailed to purchasers by the printer to avoid the burden on your office of doing these mailings.

We respectfully request that you include \$326,989.10 in your budget request for the 2009-11 biennium for publication and printing costs for the North Dakota Century Code, North Dakota Administrative Code, and North Dakota Session Laws and postage and mailing costs for the North Dakota Administrative Code and North Dakota Session Laws. This is an increase from the comparable amount we recommended for these expenses for the 2007-09 biennium.

We are not in a position to make any suggestions regarding the other costs that must be included in the public printing line item of your budget, including the costs of individual volumes to update old sets of the Century Code, the new sets of the Century Code required for new members of the Legislative Assembly, and postage and mailing costs for the Century Code. Therefore, those costs are not included in our estimates.

AGENCY STATUTORY AUTHORITY

North Dakota Constitution, Article V, Section 12; North Dakota Century Code Title 10 and Title 16.1; North Dakota Century Code Chapters 15.02, 54-09, 35-01, 35-17, 35-21, 35-29, 35-30, 35-31, 35-05,41-09,43-07, 44-06, 45-10, 45-10.1, 45-11, 45.22, 45-23, 47.22, 47-25, 50-22, 53-01, 54-05.1, 54-16, and 55-01.

AGENCY DESCRIPTION

The agency is the office of record for certain legal documents generated by the executive and legislative branches of state government; the office of record for public records and notices including various business entities; and it performs a wide range of licensing, regulatory, registration, and administrative functions within four operating units. The agency performs these functions in accordance with the requirements of the state's constitution and laws.

AGENCY MISSION STATEMENT

To serve the people of the State of North Dakota and its guests; execute with integrity the duties required by the North Dakota Constitution and the North Dakota Century Code; collect and preserve the records of the State as defined by the law; act as an ambassador for the State of North Dakota, its people, and its way of life. This mission will be dispatched effectively, efficiently, expeditiously, courteously, and with financial responsibility.

AGENCY PERFORMANCE MEASURES

Although it does not have a formal written program, the agency's management team and unit leads have access to various processes for tracking productivity, effectiveness, efficiency, quality of customer service, and compliance with laws. It is anticipated the statistical tracking of information will be improved with the agency's migration to a new database and document processing platform, for which funding was approved in the 2007/2009 biennium and for which continued funding is being requested in the agency's 2009/2011 budget request.

AGENCY MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Enhanced agency website, which received approximately 3,845,000 hits over a 12 month period ending September 2008 on its various pages and sections. See appendix A for activity in the month of November 2008.

Enhanced 24/7 live business records search on agency website which displays data about business entities filed with the agency.

Enhanced website for access to annual reports filed by businesses allowing them to complete them online, print them, sign them, and mail them to the agency.

Continued the migration of the agency's database from AS/400 platform created in 1988/1992 to a new operating platform. Unfortunately, the first effort had to be stopped because the underlying architecture of the intended platform was dysfunctional. The second effort resulted in a prolonged RFP process. An agreement with a vendor was finally executed in August 2008, with a projected completion date of approximately 12 to 16 months. The good news, which is very exciting, is the new platform will have features beyond whatever the agency dreamed possible at the beginning of the 2007/2009 biennium.

See appendix B for background history.

It will far exceed the enhancement of services for customers and productivity gains originally anticipated. For example, it will allow for the on-line filing of many documents, reports, etc. In this particular case, the delay that was experienced has and will be proven to be very beneficial for the future.

As with the above migration, the mandated migration of the Central Indexing System (CIS) from the state's mainframe was also continued. It had the same history as described above and now will become a part of the same platform with the same exciting benefits and features. This will greatly enhance the agency's CIS, which is connected to the state's 53 counties and provides a centralized depository for various lien documents.

Continued to enhance the agency's Election Management System (EMS) and Election Administration System (EAS). It provides new and expanded election information on the agency's website about elections, candidates, campaign contributions, voter precinct finder, polling location details and the reporting of election night returns. In addition, it assists in the administration of petition review, poll worker tracking, voting statistics reporting, and early and absentee voting.

A specific feature already mentioned was launched in October 2008 that allows the voter to find his or her voting precinct through the use of a house number and zip code. The Central Voter File, which is a part of the EAS, was successfully launched and is used by the counties to track absentee ballots, allow for the efficient management of early voting precincts, and to expedite the voting process on election day.

AGENCY FUTURE CRITICAL ISSUES

In the statistical data section of the program narrative, the data reveals that since 1991/1992 and through the 2005/2007 biennium, the agency's revenue increased by 103%. On the other hand, since the base 1991/1993 biennium, the agency's expenditures only increased by 25.2%. This comparison is significant since the individual fees collected by the agency for its services have remained relatively unchanged during the past 14 years. Therefore, the increased revenue is directly related to the increase in the number of registrations, fillings, and increased demand for the services provided by the agency. In order to respond to this increased demand, the agency is substantially dependent on the use of information technology (e.g. software, hardware, Internet, etc.), which it uses to provide the timely, accurate, and efficient services expected by the public, businesses, and customers of the agency.

As was also documented in the statistical data section, the agency is processing 44,871 more documents per year then it did in 1995. That is an increase of 106%. Therefore, to provide services in a cost effective and efficient manner for the public, it is vitally important that the agency receive support for technology initiatives. As stated in the first paragraph, the agency has provided a significant increase in revenue for the state while at the same time having comparatively modest growth in expenditures.

The agency is the first place stop and prime filer of a variety of business related information. In other words, business in North Dakota begins with the Secretary of State's office. Therefore, the agency has a key role in the state's e-government initiatives making it imperative the agency has adequate funding and support in order to implement the appropriate technology to meet these goals and provide services the public is requesting. It is critical to continue the migration of the two databases from their current environment to the new platform contracted for in August 2008. The increase in services and productivity will be significant. The funding required for continuing the migration is included as an Optional Request in this budget

It is also imperative state agencies join together to provide a common portal for customers to enter. Therefore, the agency has been identified as the one to manage the development of the Business Development Engine, which was ranked as the # 6 project by the State Information Technology Advisory Committee (SITAC) and is included as an Optional Request in this budget. This was not included in the Governor's budget recommendation.

Having the ability to offer competitive salaries is a huge challenge. For example, to hire the last two persons for entry level positions (grade 5), we had to offer salaries that were within a few hundred dollars of the salaries currently being received by agency staff (also grade 5) that has been employed for several years. The agency needs to have competitive grades in its employment structure to be competitive and to pay salaries appropriate for new duties that will result with the new platform and opportunities for cross-training. The entire requested amount was not included in the Governor's budget recommendation.

COSTS TO CONTINUE

The higher level of licensing fees for the agency's new platform will continue through 2013.

Note # 1 – Because of a system wide reallocation by ITD of the costs related to the statewide area network connecting the agency and the state's fifty-three counties for the operation of the central indexing system, the budget was increased by \$300,000 from \$75,000 to \$375,000, accounting for 39% of the increase. Another \$197,000, or 26% of the increase, was for salaries as approved by the legislature, emergency commission, and the budget section. Most of the remaining \$264,000, or 35% of the increase was for increased expenses related to services provided by ITD and other technology related expense as approved by the tegislature, emergency commission, and the budget section. Almost half of that amount was directly related to the cost of providing the increased demand for agency information as authorized through the agency's general services operating fund, with those expenses being covered by the revenue generated to that account.

Note # 2 – ITD again reallocated costs related to the statewide area network resulting in another \$175,000 increase added to the agency's budget.

Note #3 - The expenditures included a one-time amount of \$125,000 for migration of database

Summary: Using 1991/1993 biennium as the base year inherited by the present agency administration and through the 2005/2007 biennium, the agency's revenue increased by 103.0%. During the same period, the agency's expenditures increased by only 25.2%.

^{*} The 1999 Legislative Assembly authorized a General Services Operating Fund for the agency's "retail" trade. At the end of the 2005/2007 biennium, the agency transferred \$25,137 to the state's general fund, which was the uncommitted amount over \$75,000.

Demand for Services

The demand for the agency's services has grown steadily during the period beginning June 30, 1995, and ending June 30, 2008. This is in direct relationship to the net increase in filings and registrations as listed below.

^{*}Prior to 1997, non-profit corporations were not required to file an annual corporate report. Therefore, the agency is processing an additional 9,103 filings that it did not process twelve years ago.

Even though the agency is processing an additional 53,517 documents a year since the 1995 benchmark, its FTE authorization has only increased 2.0 FTE from 24 FTE on June 30, 1995, to its present authorized FTE of 26.0 in effect since July 1, 2001.

EXPLANATION OF PROGRAM COSTS

For the 2007-2009 biennium, the appropriated salary line represented approximately 51% of the agency's total general fund spending authority.

The appropriated operating line for 2007-2009 represented approximately 48% of the agency's total general fund spending authority. Of that amount, approximately 76% of the operating line was budgeted for payments to the state's Information Technology Division (ITD). Another 5% of the operating line was used for expenses related to information technology, e.g., programming, software, and hardware. The remaining 19% is spread among other object code categories and supports the general operations of the agency. Those budget object codes include telecommunications, travel, mailing services, professional development, fees and services, repairs and maintenance of equipment, insurance, office supplies, printing, professional supplies and materials, and miscellaneous expenses.

The agency also has a general service fund, which is the retail account for information sold by the agency. Approximately 91% of that budget is to cover expenses related to the technology for providing the requested information.

Extensive technology is used by the agency to increase productivity, provide better and faster services for the public, and to maintain many thousands of records associated with approximately 100 diverse and varied categories that relate to the duties of the agency. For example:

- 1. The agency's budget supports the statewide Central Indexing System (CIS) area network connecting the agency and the state's fifty-three county Recorder offices. The budget supports the maintenance of the database housed on the state's mainframe computer, which database is currently being migrated to a new database. The CIS contains approximately 288,000 active files related to various personal property liens throughout the state.
- 2. The agency's budget supports a database of approximately 160,000 names for approximately 100 diverse and varied categories related to the duties of the agency and for associated expenses such as programming, which is only available from a private vendor. For 2009-2011, the agency is submitting an optional request to allow the continued of migrating the agency's databases to a new operating platform.
- 3. The agency's budget supports an Internet web site and covers associated expenses.

ELECTION REFORM

Since the adoption of HAVA, the state has received the following amounts of funding.

In 2003, it received \$5,000,000, which did not require a state match.

In 2004, it received \$4,150,000, which required a 5% state match. According to the State Plan, 1/2 share of the 5% was provided by the state and the other half share was provided by each one of the state's 53 counties in proportion to the voting equipment supplied to them. The state's share was appropriated in Section 2 of Senate Bill 2002 as adopted by the 2003 Legislative Assembly and signed by the Governor. Each of the counties receiving voting equipment paid their one/half share as committed allocated in their respective budgets. The state's share of \$105,000 was provided from the projected agency's turn back to the general fund at the end of the 2001/2003 biennium.

For the fiscal year 2004, Congress appropriated an additional \$7,446,803, which required a 5% state match of \$391,937. As part of the match, the federal Election Assistance Commission recognized the agency's investment in its Election Management System as an in-kind contribution in the amount of \$257,970. The balance for the match was contributed by the Counties in the amount of \$57,867 and the legislature appropriated \$76,100.

In 2008, Congress appropriated an additional amount in the Omnibus Appropriations Act for Fiscal Year 2008, which resulted in North Dakota becoming eligible for an additional \$575,000 for the HAVA election fund. In order to secure it, the state was required to provide a 5% match. This was achieved when the Emergency Commission on March 14, 2008 authorized the amount of \$30,263 from state's contingency fund to be used for this purpose.

I request your consideration to include and amendment to the agency's appropriation bill to cover interest costs on state match in election fund to the end of the biennium. HAVA required the state to establish a specifically identified election fund, which was to include the funds received from the federal government and the state match. Although HAVA was very specific in stating the interest earned on that fund had to be rolled back into the fund, interest was never calculated on the state's share in the election fund. We have been assured that is something Federal auditors will be checking.



Migration of Operational System – Optional Request

The Secretary of State's operational database is housed on an AS/400 operating system. Created 17 years ago, the system has an underlying operating platform (or chassis) that is no longer efficient or adaptable to today's technology.

In addition, there are only a few qualified system programmers available within the community. Therefore, the agency's present AS/400 platform is expensive to maintain and always a challenge to change when required by legislative action.

The system is not cost-effective for expanding and enhancing the services offered to the public and other state agencies. The current base platform does not have the capability of easily utilizing the latest in technology. For example, to offer Automatic Clearing House (ACH) services on the AS/400 is prohibitive.

For several legislative sessions, ITD has recommended the agency make a change in its operational platform. The cost, however, to make the switch has been prohibitive and estimated as high as several million dollars. Fortunately, that has changed. Cost has been reduced and technological options have greatly increased.

The need to migrate to a different platform is imperative if the agency is to process the increased number of filings, maintain productivity and provide its customers with the electronic services they desire. The State Information Technology Advisory Committee (SITAC) gave the project a high ranking. The project will also benefit many other state agencies and allow for innovative sharing of resources that will have economic development benefits to the state and its citizens.

The proposed replacement system is Secretary of State Knowledge Base (SOSKB). It was created by the North Carolina Secretary of State's office, which has made the source code available to North Dakota at no cost. In return, we have a joint development agreement whereby the two respective states share in all enhancements to the system. This is already being done with the transfer of the agency's Central Indexing System from ITD's mainframe computer (a mandated move) to SOSKB. The funding for the transfer was provided in the agency's current budget.

The optional request in the Governor's recommended budget will allow the agency to move the balance of its operations from the AS/400 to SOSKB. The move will allow the agency to increase productivity and provide enhanced customer services, which can be quantified.

As stated earlier, the migration would have benefit for the numerous other state agencies that regularly access and rely on the agency's database. As required by state law, all businesses have an initial filing requirement with the Secretary of State's office before they can obtain permits, licenses, etc. from other state agencies. Therefore, the new system would provide a technology base that would better allow the sharing of information with other agencies and could present a one-stop entry for citizens interacting with state agencies. Currently, several agencies are funding a feasibility study, which is scheduled for completion before adjournment, for a project titled the North Dakota Business Development Engine.

Secretary of State Optional Request Page 2

As to the agency's internal operations, it is conservatively estimated by ITD * that the agency could process an business entity annual report 25 times faster by reducing the number of times the document is physically handled in processing and filing. (* This is a conservative estimate based on ITD's experience with DOT and Tax Department processing systems.)

For example, a single annual report is now physically handled a minimum of eight times and depending on distribution of workload, it can be handled two to four additional times. A document could easily be hand-carried between 500 and 1,000 feet before required tasks necessary for the filing the documents are completed.

With the new system, the document would be scanned immediately upon receipt and processed electronically from any workstation located within the office. If the increased processing efficiency is multiplied by the nearly 500,000 documents that the agency processes during the biennium, the savings in time and resources become significant.

A new platform would also give customers the option of filing documents electronically and paying the applicable filling fees in a paperless manner, which also eliminates the need for any physical handling of the payment or the hard copy of a report.

The project is important for the following reasons.

- Regardless of the system, funds will be expended. The choice is whether to maintain or upgrade
 the present antiquated system as best we can or invest those same funds on a new system that
 is faster and more adaptable.
- 2. Although the present system can be upgraded, its operating platform can never reach the level of efficiency, as a new platform would allow.
- 3. The opportunity is available now to leverage funds at a fraction of previous cost estimates in order to accomplish the migration. With the processing time being reduced with the new system, it will be possible to decrease overtime costs, which are now needed in order to meet statutory deadlines.
- 4. With the increased workload of 106% since the 1995 base year used in the budget request, it is becoming more difficult to process reports in a timely manner and increasing the number of FTE's is not an option because, even if it were approved, the agency would not have the space to house them.
- 5. A transition will take time. However, the agency has several staff members nearing retirement age and with increasing processing efficiencies, restructuring becomes a viable option.
- In a technology audit, dated July 25, 2003, the State Auditor recommended several changes to the agency's processing procedures and database. The agency has not yet implemented many of those recommendations because the funds would be expended on an obsolete system, which are already available in SOSKB.
- 7. Software manufacturers recognize the importance of tracking performance. Although the present system can be used for tracking, the process is complex and convoluted. In SOSKB, the tracking is already programmed into the system.
- 8. It is difficult to justify spending funds on a system that is being recommended for replacement.

Summary of Features for new Secretary of State Operating Platform

- Replaces and then consolidates all of the software used for the operations of the Secretary of State's
 office (except for elections). Currently, the Secretary of State's operations are housed on an AS/400
 and the state's mainframe. The result will create added efficiency to the agency's processes,
 increase productivity by permitting staff to be cross-trained to perform a wider range of office duties,
 and reduce the cost of hosting and maintaining the software.
- The software removes the Secretary of State's operations housed on the AS/400, which was written
 in RPG program language prior to 1992 and for which very few developers now exist with the
 necessary programming skills related to this particular language. Therefore, the current software is at
 high risk for failure and is fast approaching obsolescence.
- The software will contain all of the security standards and recommendations of the technological audit conducted by the State Auditor's office and its contracted security advisor.
- The software will allow a customer (filer) online access to complete and submit documents, along with payment, directly from a computer. Currently, this agency has a limited number of filings that can be completed and paid for online. It is anticipated a majority of customers will ultimately choose to file online, along with the payment, compared to submitting documents in a paper format, along with either a check or credit card authorization, through the mail or other delivery service.
- For most agency applications, the software will "check" the document being submitted online and compare it for accuracy with the Secretary of State's record and if correct, allow it to be submitted without agency intervention. This service will be available to the customer 24/7 and provide the customer with instant response and guidance to complete the document correctly. The result will reduce (not eliminate) the agency's current workload in processing paper documents, minimize the customer error factors in their preparing and submitting documents, allow more time for agency staff related to filing deadlines.
- The software will collect the filing fees for the online applications and automatically "feed" them
 through the system directly to the Bank of North Dakota. This will eliminate the processing of tens of
 thousands of checks/credit card transactions between the Secretary of State and Treasurer's Office.
- The software will allow for the acceptance from customers of Automatic Clearing House (ACH)
 payments. It is anticipated this feature will decrease the cost of credit card transaction fees paid by
 the agency because ACH payments do not have transaction fees.
- The software will allow for the electronic transmission of documents between the Secretary of State's
 office and customers in a secured utility protecting confidential information. This will allow the agency
 to provide customers with a faster service related to document filing and significantly reduce mailing
 costs.
- The software will enable customers to go online to obtain public reports (by paying the applicable fee, as is currently set in law) in multiple formats to import into their respective systems. The reporting device will contain a GIS component to allow the display of data on a map, e.g., the location of any business registered with or licensed by the Secretary of State.

remaining from the \$10,000,000 allocation is available for budget section approval at its first meeting after September 1, 2008.

SECTION 15. CENTERS OF EXCELLENCE - OFFICE OF MANAGEMENT AND BUDGET - CONTINGENT BORROWING AUTHORITY - APPROPRIATION. As requested by the centers of excellence commission and subject to emergency commission and budget section approval, the office of management and budget shall borrow the sum of \$5,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the Bank of North Dakota, which is appropriated for the purpose of providing funding to centers of excellence as directed by the centers of excellence commission, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009. The office of management and budget shall request funding from the sixty-first legislative assembly to repay any loan obtained pursuant to provisions of this section, including accrued interest. The borrowing authority and appropriation provided for in this section are available only if all other funding provided by the sixtieth legislative assembly for centers of excellence has been obligated.

SECTION 16. APPROPRIATION - OFFICE OF MANAGEMENT AND BUDGET - PRAIRIE PUBLIC BROADCASTING. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$2,023,138, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the office of management and budget for the purpose of providing funding to prairie public broadcasting, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009.

SECTION 17. ONE-TIME FUNDING - EFFECT ON BASE BUDGET - REPORT TO SIXTY-FIRST LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY. The general fund appropriation in section 16 of this Act includes \$686,000 for an analog to digital conversion project which is a one-time funding item. These amounts are not a part of the office of management and budget's base budget to be used in preparing the 2009-11 executive budget. The office of management and budget shall report to the appropriations committees of the sixty-first legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009.

SECTION 18. SECRETARY OF STATE LOAN AUTHORIZATION - CONTINGENT APPROPRIATION - BUDGET SECTION APPROVAL. Subject to budget section approval, the ecretary of state may borrow up to \$2,920,000 from the Bank of North Dakota which is appropriated to the secretary of state for the purpose of implementing the North Dakota business development engine information technology project during the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009. The secretary of state may request budget section approval only if the revenues projected by the secretary of state and the office of management and budget to be generated as a result of provisions of House Bill No. 1340 over the term of the proposed loan based on the trend of actual corporate charters granted are anticipated to exceed the revenues projected by the sixtieth legislative assembly relating to this bill by an amount sufficient to repay the proposed loan, including interest over the term of the loan.

SECTION 19. RENAISSANCE ZONE CONFERENCE - LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL PARTICIPATION - REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL. The department of commerce, during the 2007-08 interim, shall organize, host, and facilitate a renaissance zone conference. The department shall extend invitations to participate in the conference to representatives of each of the state's renaissance zone communities, other community representatives interested in this concept, and to legislators who are members of the legislative council interim committee studying economic development-related issues. Legislators who are members of the interim committee studying economic development-related issues shall attend the conference as part of their interim committee The purpose of the conference is to provide a forum at which the department, legislators, and renaissance zone and other community members may review the list of projects in the state which have been undertaken under the renaissance zone program, evaluate whether the projects have positively impacted the renaissance zone communities, consider options for smaller communities to become involved in the renaissance zone program or a similar program, and make recommendations regarding how the program could be improved to further meet the needs of the state and local communities. Before July 1, 2008, the department of commerce shall report to the legislative council on the conference activities and the department's legislative and administrative recommendations resulting from the conference.

The attached is a worksheet I submitted to OMB for the requested salary equity package. The request was for an equity package of \$116,254. The Governor recommended \$80,040.


If at all possible, for the following reasons, the Secretary of State requests the committee's consideration in restoring the request to \$116,254.

All of the present grade 7 positions should be reclassified to grade 8 to more accurately reflect the nature of their duties. They provide assistance comparable to a legal assistant in a law firm.

In addition, the intent of the agency is to reclassify the grade 5 positions to grade 6 to more accurately reflect the new duties they will have with the agency's new software data system, which will allow for cross-training of office processing duties.

The largest equity increases were given to the current grade 5 positions to ensure all of them would receive a salary of at least \$2,000 per month. This is needed to compete with the private sector with new hires. Of course, with this type of increase, it compresses the distance between the salary paid to the upper grade levels and with persons who have been with the agency for many years. Therefore, the equity salary optional request included increases for the upper grades but not to the level of the increase as was requested for the grade 5 positions. Please note the column listing the years of service for the various positions.

FOOTNOTE: I redacted the names because the actual increase most likely will be adjusted a little within the equity package. The increases were mostly for the grade position and not necessarily for an individual FTE. Therefore, small modifications might need to be made.

AGENCY OVERVIEW

AGENCY STATUTORY AUTHORITY

North Dakota Constitution, Article V, Section 12; North Dakota Century Code Title 10 and Title 16.1; North Dakota Century Code Chapters 15.02, 54-09, 35-01, 35-17, 35-21, 35-29, 35-30, 35-31, 35-05,41-09,43-07, 44-06, 45-10, 45-10.1, 45-11, 45.22, 45-23, 47.22, 47-25, 50-22, 53-01, 54-05.1, 54-16, and 55-01.

AGENCY DESCRIPTION

The agency is the office of record for certain legal documents generated by the executive and legislative branches of state government; the office of record for public records and notices including various business entities; and it performs a wide range of licensing, regulatory, registration, and administrative functions within four operating units. The agency performs these functions in accordance with the requirements of the state's constitution and laws.

AGENCY MISSION STATEMENT

To serve the people of the State of North Dakota and its guests; execute with integrity the duties required by the North Dakota Constitution and the North Dakota Century Code; collect and preserve the records of the State as defined by the law; act as an ambassador for the State of North Dakota, its people, and its way of life. This mission will be dispatched effectively, efficiently, expeditiously, courteously, and with financial responsibility.

AGENCY PERFORMANCE MEASURES

Although it does not have a formal written program, the agency's management team and unit leads have access to various processes for tracking productivity, effectiveness, efficiency, quality of customer service, and compliance with laws. It is anticipated the statistical tracking of information will be improved with the agency's migration to a new database and document processing platform, for which funding was approved in the 2007/2009 biennium and for which continued funding is being requested in the agency's 2009/2011 budget request.

AGENCY MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Enhanced agency website, which received approximately 3,845,000 hits over a 12 month period ending September 2008 on its various pages and sections. See appendix C for activity in the month of November 2008.

Enhanced 24/7 live business records search on agency website which displays data about business entities filed with the agency.

Enhanced website for access to annual reports filed by businesses allowing a business entity to complete them on-line, print them, sign them, and mail it to the agency.

Continued the migration of the agency's database from AS/400 platform created in 1988/1992 to a new operating platform. Unfortunately, the first effort had to be stopped because the underlying architecture of the intended platform was dysfunctional. The second effort resulted in a prolonged RFP process. An agreement with a vendor was finally executed in August 2008, with a projected completion date of approximately 12 to 16 months. The good news, which is very exciting, is the new platform will have features beyond whatever the agency dreamed possible at the beginning of the 2007/2009 biennium.

See appendix D for background history on migration project.

It will far exceed the enhancement of services for customers and productivity gains originally anticipated. For example, it will allow for the on-line filing of many documents, reports, etc. In this particular case, the delay that was experienced has and will be proven to be very beneficial for the future.

As with the above migration, the mandated migration of the Central Indexing System (CIS) from the state's mainframe was also continued. It had the same history as described above and now will become a part of the same platform with the same exciting benefits and features. This will greatly enhance the agency's CIS, which is connected to the state's 53 counties and provides a centralized depository for various lien documents.

Continued to enhance the agency's Election Management System (EMS) and Election Administration System (EAS). It provides new and expanded election information on the agency's website about elections, candidates, campaign contributions, voter precinct finder, polling location details and the reporting of election night returns. In addition, it assists in the administration of petition review, poll worker tracking, voting statistics reporting, and early and absentee voting.

A specific feature already mentioned was launched in October 2008 that allows the voter to find his or her voting precinct through the use of a house number and zip code. The Central Voter File, which is a part of the EAS, was successfully launched and is used by the counties to track absentee ballots, allow for the efficient management of early voting precincts, and to expedite the voting process on election day.

AGENCY FUTURE CRITICAL ISSUES

In the statistical data section of the program narrative, the data reveals that since 1991/1992 and through the 2005/2007 biennium, the agency's revenue increased by 103%. On the other hand, since the base 1991/1993 biennium, the agency's expenditures only increased by 25.2%. This comparison is significant since the individual fees collected by the agency for its services have remained relatively unchanged during the past 14 years. Therefore, the increased revenue is directly related to the increase in the number of registrations, filings, and increased demand for the services provided by the agency. In order to respond to this increased demand, the agency is substantially dependent on the use of information technology (e.g. software, hardware, Internet, etc.), which it uses to provide the timely, accurate, and efficient services expected by the public, businesses, and customers of the agency.

As was also documented in the statistical data section (page 4), the agency is processing 44,871 more documents per year then it did in 1995. That is an increase of 106%. Therefore, to provide services in a cost effective and efficient manner for the public, it is vitally important that the agency receive support for technology initiatives. As stated in the first paragraph, the agency has provided a significant increase in revenue for the state while at the same time having comparatively modest growth in expenditures.

The agency is the first place stop and prime filer of a variety of business related information. In other words, business in North Dakota begins with the Secretary of State's office. Therefore, the agency has a key role in the state's e-government initiatives making it imperative the agency has adequate funding and support in order to implement the appropriate technology to meet these goals and provide services the public is requesting. It is critical to continue the migration of the two databases from their current environment to the new platform contracted for in August 2008. The increase in services and productivity will be significant. The funding required for continuing the migration was included as an Optional Request in the budget submitted to OMB and was included in the Governor's budget recommendation.

It is also imperative state agencies join together to provide a common portal for customers to enter. Therefore, the agency has been identified as the one to manage the development of the Business Development Engine, which was ranked as the # 6 project by the State Information Technology Advisory Committee (SITAC) and is included as an Optional Request in this budget. This was not included in the Governor's budget recommendation.

Having the ability to offer competitive salaries is a huge challenge. For example, to hire the last two persons for entry level positions (grade 5), we had to offer salaries that were within a few hundred dollars of the salaries currently being received by agency staff (also grade 5) that has been employed for several years. The agency needs to have competitive grades in its employment structure to be competitive and to pay salaries appropriate for new duties that will result with the new platform and opportunities for cross-training. The entire requested amount was not included in the Governor's budget recommendation.

COSTS TO CONTINUE

The higher level of licensing fees for the agency's new platform will continue through 2013.

EXPLANATION OF PROGRAM COSTS

For the 2007-2009 biennium, the appropriated salary line represented approximately 51% of the agency's total general fund spending authority.

The appropriated operating line for 2007-2009 represented approximately 48% of the agency's total general fund spending authority. Of that amount, approximately 76% of the operating line was budgeted for payments to the state's Information Technology Division (ITD). Another 5% of the operating line was used for expenses related to information technology, e.g., programming, software, and hardware. The remaining 19% is spread among other object code categories and supports the general operations of the agency. Those budget object codes include telecommunications, travel, mailing services, professional development, fees and services, repairs and maintenance of equipment, insurance, office supplies, printing, professional supplies and materials, and miscellaneous expenses.

The agency also has a general service fund, which is the retail account for information sold by the agency. Approximately 91% of that budget is to cover expenses related to the technology for providing the requested information.

Extensive technology is used by the agency to increase productivity, provide better and faster services for the public, and to maintain many thousands of records associated with approximately 100 diverse and varied categories that relate to the duties of the agency. For example:

- The agency's budget supports the statewide Central Indexing System (CIS) area network connecting the agency and the state's fifty-three county Recorder offices. The budget supports the maintenance of the database housed on the state's mainframe computer, which database is currently being migrated to a new database. The CIS contains approximately 288,000 active files related to various personal property liens throughout the state.
- 2. The agency's budget supports a database of approximately 160,000 names for approximately 100 diverse and varied categories related to the duties of the agency and for associated expenses such as programming, which is only available from a private vendor. For 2009-2011, the agency is submitting an optional request to allow the continued of migrating the agency's databases to a new operating platform.
- The agency's budget supports an Internet web site and covers associated expenses.

ELECTION REFORM

Since the adoption of HAVA, the state has received the following amounts of funding.

In 2003, it received \$5,000,000, which did not require a state match.

In 2004, it received \$4,150,000, which required a 5% state match. According to the State Plan, 1/2 share of the 5% was provided by the state and the other half share was provided by each one of the state's 53 counties in proportion to the voting equipment supplied to them. The state's share was appropriated in Section 2 of Senate Bill 2002 as adopted by the 2003 Legislative Assembly and signed by the Governor. Each of the counties receiving voting equipment paid their one/half share as committed allocated in their respective budgets. The state's share of \$105,000 was provided from the projected agency's turn back to the general fund at the end of the 2001/2003 biennium.

For the fiscal year 2004, Congress appropriated an additional \$7,446,803, which required a 5% state match of \$391,937. As part of the match, the federal Election Assistance Commission recognized the agency's investment in its Election Management System as an in-kind contribution in the amount of \$257,970. The balance for the match was contributed by the Counties in the amount of \$57,867 and the legislature appropriated \$76,100.

In 2008, Congress appropriated an additional amount in the Omnibus Appropriations Act for Fiscal Year 2008, which resulted in North Dakota becoming eligible for an additional \$575,000 for the HAVA election fund. In order to secure it, the state was required to provide a 5% match. This was achieved when the Emergency Commission on March 14, 2008 authorized the amount of \$30,263 from state's contingency fund to be used for this purpose.

The House did approve an amendment (page 2, lines 14 thru 19) to the agency's appropriation bill to cover interest costs on state match in election fund to the end of the biennium. HAVA required the state to establish a specifically identified election fund, which was to include the funds received from the federal government and the state match. Although HAVA was very specific in stating the interest earned on that fund had to be rolled back into the fund, interest was never calculated on the state's share in the election fund. We have been assured that is something Federal auditors will be checking.



Request # 1

Restore the 2% reduction in salary line made by the House in the engrossed bill

Request # 2

Restore the equity dollars removed by the House in the engrossed bill and consider the agency's original request for staff equity dollars as requested in Number 2 on page 8.

Request # 3

Restore the FTE Accounting/Budget Specialist position recommended in Governor's budget in number 5 on page 8 and removed by the House in the engrossed bill

Request # 4

Restore the \$20,000 reduction in operating expenses removed by the House in the engrossed bill

Request # 5

Include an amendment similar to the following to allow the agency to carry forward unexpended funds in its general service operating fund.

SECTION __. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - GENERAL SERVICES OPERATING FUND. Any unexpended and unobligated balance remaining in the secretary of state's general service operating fund on June 30, 2009, is not subject to the provisions of section 54-09-08, and any unexpended funds are available and may be expended by the secretary of state, during the biennium beginning July 1, 2009, and ending June 30, 2011, for the database and processing platform migration project.

Request # 6

Include an amendment similar to the following from 2007, which was included in Section 18 of HB 1018, the Department of Commerce Appropriation bill.

SECTION 18. SECRETARY OF STATE LOAN AUTHORIZATION - CONTINGENT APPROPRIATION - BUDGET SECTION APPROVAL.

Subject to budget section approval, the secretary of state may borrow up to \$2,920,000 from Bank of North Dakota which is appropriated to the secretary of state for the purpose of implementing the North Dakota business development engine information technology project during the biennium beginning July 1, 2007, and ending June 30, 2009. The secretary of state may request budget section approval only if the revenues projected by the secretary of state and the office of management and budget to be generated as a result of provisions of House Bill No. 1340 over the term of the proposed loan based on the trend of actual corporate charters granted are anticipated to exceed the revenues projected by the sixtieth legislative assembly relating to this bill by an amount sufficient to repay the proposed loan, including interest over the term of the loan.

In addition, to include language to a single entry portal system to obtain various government services, information, and transaction processing and to allow the charging of a convenience fee to apply only to electronic/on-line transactions and not for accessing information provided through state government websites.

The 2007/2009 agency appropriation included an amount of \$824,153 to migrate the agency's database from the state's mainframe and the agency's AS/400 to a new platform. The new platform was called Secretary of State Knowledge Base (SOSKB) and it was a joint project with the North Carolina's Secretary of State's office.

The project started in the last quarter of the 2005/2007 biennium. In January 2008, after \$770,105.30 had been expended, which included funds from both the 2005/2007 and 2007/2009 bienniums, it became evident that the base architecture was flawed and it could not be fixed regardless of the amount of funds expended to correct the problem. Therefore, the Secretary of State stopped the project.

When doing so, the Secretary of State immediately informed the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) and the Interim Legislative Information Technology Committee.

Although the project was stopped, the need to migrate the agency's database was critical. At first, it was thought there was only one product available through one vendor that would be applicable to Secretary of State operations. Therefore, an attempt was made to enter into a sole source contract with that vendor.


However, because four other vendors raised objections and said they could provide similar software, a limited RFP process was initiated with four vendors. It was clearly stated in the RFP that the Secretary of State had only \$600,000 in funding available for the project during the 2007/2009 biennium. The results were as follows"

After all of the bumps in the road, the Secretary of State is obtaining a new platform that far exceeds anything anticipated in the North Carolina partnership or with the sole source vendor, i.e., FileONE.

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North Dakota Business Development Engine **Executive Summary**

The Business Development Engine is an automated online system that provides a streamlined environment enabling new and existing businesses easier interaction with North Dakota State Agencies. In so doing, new businesses can become operational much quicker and existing businesses can do their reporting of information much more efficiently. The engine also provides prospective businesses with greater researching functionality resulting in additional opportunities for growth and expansion while moving North Dakota to an ever-stronger economy.

The Business Development Engine is the next evolutionary step for businesses to interact with government. This is a natural progression from businesses interacting with government using paper or agency specific online forms to an online "One-Stop Streamlined Environment", allowing businesses to electronically interact with over 15 agencies 24 hours a day every day through a single common interface.

Business Development Engine Components


- New Business Registration
- Existing Business Maintenance and Reporting
- Public Inquiry
- Government to Government Interfaces

Primary Benefits to Business Development

- Single point of contact with State Government will reduce agency interfaces from over 15 agencies to 1 resulting in significant time savings for the business
- Expedites creation of new business resulting in faster achievement of earned income for the business
- Improve business compliancy which minimizes penalties incurred by businesses and confirms that all requirements have been satisfied and fulfilled
- Promotes a good working relationship between business and state government.
- Access to information of services and products available in North Dakota
- Allows an entrepreneur to confidentially research potential markets and determine feasibility of new business
- Provides customer assurance that all businesses are being held to the same standards

Cost and Time Estimate

- One-Time Cost: \$3,400,698 over 22 months. This includes the analysis of business and agency requirements, system design and development, implementation of hardware and software, project management, and agency business application integrations.
- The one-time cost to implement the engine provides years of savings to business and agencies at minimal annual maintenance costs. On-going annual maintenance is estimated to be \$108,756 per year, covering hardware and software maintenance.



Governance

A governance structure would be established similar to Criminal Justice Information Sharing (CJIS) or Geographic Information Systems (GIS) to set policy, strategic direction, and ensure the engine meets the needs of business and government agencies.

Office of the Attorney General Secretary of State Tax Department Workforce Safety and Insurance This document contains a list of automated services that will provide a streamlined relational environment between new and existing North Dakota businesses and state government through which businesses are provided faster reporting tools and greater researching functions resulting in additional opportunities for growth and expansion while moving North Dakota to an everstronger economy. The intent of this project is to enhance the connectivity between state agencies in regard to North Dakota business data using Service Oriented Architecture (SOA) technologies. SOA technology allows agency applications to be integrated without replacing any agency systems.

Through this system, business owners will be granted the opportunity to relate to state government in the manner in which they are most comfortable. Whether their interaction of choice is paper or electronic filings directly with each agency or through a common connection that disperses the correct information to each agency, the business owner will be in control. However, by creating this system of interagency connectivity, every business owner will be assured that all required relationships with state government are in place. Additionally every state agency working with businesses in North Dakota will be able to stay as current as possible on each business regardless of how the business owner interfaces with state government. This is a win-win for business and state governmental operations.

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Business to Government Interface

New Business Creation

Allow a new business to register with the State of ND via an interactive web site. This web site would assist the new business owner when registering by only requiring the information necessary for that particular business based on well defined business rules. It would also automatically submit the appropriate information electronically to each agency as necessary.

Business Benefits:

- 1. Customer enters information only once which ensures consistency, requires less effort, and saves time.
- 2. Eliminates confusion as the system identifies all requirements for the specific business situation.
- 3. Expedite the interface between the new business and state government agencies.
- 4. Businesses could use the process during their feasibility study to determine potential costs, requirements, and opportunities.
- 5. Allow the business to submit one payment that will be disbursed by the system to agencies according to fee requirements.
- 6. Businesses only need to retain one unique identifier which would allow them to interact with all agencies.

Agency Benefits:

- 1. Consistency of data across all agencies.
- 2. Businesses are identified by a unique identifier which would eliminate confusion between agency records.
- 3. Information is dispersed to agencies according to the established interagency business rules.
- 4. Eliminate duplication efforts and costs between state agencies since information is entered only once by the business.
- 5. Expedite the interface between the new business and state government agencies.

Existing Business Maintenance

Business Profile Maintenance and Query

Allow an agency to electronically access and maintain the information for a specific business. Agencies will remain in control of the data within their systems. The system would build the business profile by retrieving all the business information from each participating agency at the time the business profile is requested. The information returned would contain only shareable information such as: Registration information, current license information, the current status of the business and its state accounts such as Tax, WSI, or JSND.

Business Benefits:

- 1. Information is consistent for all agencies.
- 2. Allows businesses the capability of easily modifying their information through the common state government interface. For example, an address

- change is done by one agency and all agencies will receive the corrected information.
- 3. Significantly reduces the margin of error for the business to inadvertently provide incorrect information to state government.

Agency Benefits:

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- 1. Information is consistent for all agencies.
- 2. Provides an agency with one stop to obtain all business information and documents.
- 3. Expedite investigation for Law Enforcement and other regulatory, licensing, and granting agencies.
- 4. Expedite the collection of past due ND state government obligations from businesses.

Periodic Business Reporting

Allow a registered business to submit their statutorily required business information in a consolidated manner to state agencies via an interactive website. For example, a corporation could file its corporate tax return, Work Force Safety payroll report, Job Service employer's contribution and wage report, license renewals, Secretary of State annual report, and any other government agency reports in a single effort. The system will only require the user to enter the information that is necessary for their particular type of business. The system would automatically submit the appropriate information electronically to each agency's existing data system as necessary. Each agency would only be provided the information that the law allows them to receive.

Business Benefits:

- 1. Customer enters information only once which ensures consistency, requires less effort, and saves time.
- 2. Eliminates confusion as the system identifies all requirements for the specific business situation.
- 3. Expedite the interface between the business and state government agencies.
- 4. Allow the business to submit one payment that will be disbursed by the system to agencies according to fee requirements.
- 5. Upon submittal, the system would immediately provide confirmation to the business that all requirements have been satisfied or identify any requirements left to fulfill,

Agency Benefits:

- 1. Time savings for agencies by virtue of electronic filing.
- 2. Consistency of data across all agencies.
- 3. Information is dispersed to agencies according to the established interagency business rules.
- 4. Eliminate duplication efforts and costs between state agencies since information is entered only once by the business.
- 5. Expedite the interface between the business and state government agencies.
- 6. Encourages businesses to use online system vs. paper forms.

Business Reminders

Electronic reminders will automatically be sent to a business by the system. The reminders will be generated based upon predetermined events according to business needs. For example, a filing event such as an approaching renewal deadline or the filing of a merger which affects all licenses held by the non-surviving entity would cause a reminder to be sent. Reminders could be sent in the form of emails, recorded messages, etc.

Business Benefits:

- 1. Business is more likely to avoid late filing penalties.
- 2. System will help businesses remain compliant with every participating state agency.
- 3. Promotes a good working relationship between business and state government.

Agency Benefits:

1. Agency will save cost of notifying late filers and painstaking collection of penalties.

Public Inquiry

Public Query of Business Information

Allow a public user to electronically access the open records information of a business for research purposes. The system would allow a user to search for businesses using criteria such as: business name, business id number, and/or nature of business activities. The business information will be retrieved from each participating agency at the time the search is performed.

Business Benefits:

- 1. Information provided is the most current available.
- 2. Easily provide statistical information to businesses such as total number of businesses engaged in a similar enterprise.
- 3. Possibly identify an industry group for eligibility of grants.
- Identify industry groups for business purpose within a trade area. For example, a business can locate a provider in close proximity, which potentially enhances opportunities for ND businesses.
- 5. An expanded list of nature of business activities would allow for a more comprehensive search result.
- 6. Allows an entrepreneur to confidentially research potential markets.

Agency Benefits:

- 1. An expanded list of nature of business activities would allow for a more comprehensive search result for such tasks as legislative fiscal forecasting.
- 2. Granting agencies can identify the eligible businesses.
- 3. Allow an agency to research market gaps for future business development.
- 4. Agency receives fewer calls for market information because the business can do their own research.

Government to Government Interface

Agency Notification

An electronic notification will be sent automatically to each participating agency when something occurs that could affect the business' standing in ND. The events that would trigger a notification to be sent would be determined by participating agencies based on established business rules and laws. For example, merger, conversion, business name change, dissolution, consolidation, change of a business status, delinquent taxes or other accounts, etc.

Business Benefits:

- 1. When a critical business event occurs, all participating agencies will be informed.
- 2. This affords the business owner a strong sense of comfort in knowing that they haven't forgotten a critical piece of the puzzle.
- 3. Provides customer assurance that all businesses are being held to the same standards.

Agency Benefits:

1. Agencies are simultaneously informed of critical business events. For example, licensing agencies would be notified immediately when a corporate charter is revoked.

Agriculture, Department of

- 1. Business Verify By querying the Secretary of States AS400, information such as business owners, officers and business name and address can be obtained. Also, before issuing or reissuing a license, the status of a business is verified to be "In Good Standing".
- 2. Feeding Permit Verify animal feeding operation permit with the Health Department.
- 3. Beginning Farmer Reg. Process financial information to determine if a beginning farmer may qualify for assistance.
- 4. Livestock Dealer License- Process information for livestock dealer's license. Name, address, name of agents and their addresses, bond information, partnership and corporation details are collected. If the business is a corporation, the name and address of the president, secretary, treasure and general manager must be provided.
- 5. Dairy Reg. Process information for dairy business. This information includes name, address and grading.
- 6. Grant App. Process the financial information to determine if a business may qualify for grants administered by the department.
- 7. Auction License Process information for livestock auction market license. Name, address, location, partnership and corporation details are collected. If the business is a corporation, the name and address of the president, secretary, treasurer and general manager must be provided. If the business is a partnership, all partners name and addresses must be provided.
- 8. Food Business License Process the information for animal food business registration. The name, address and name of products must be provided.
- 9. Distributor License Process the information that allows a distributor to do business in North Dakota. The name, address and type of products must be provided.
- Pesticide Reg. Process the information for the registration of pesticides/fertilizers by a business. Name, address, contact person, name of production and registration number must be provided.
- 11. Other License Process the business information for any other available agricultural licenses. Other licenses include milk processors, milk distributors, milk testers, bulk haulers of milk and dairy products in North Dakota, satellite/internet livestock license and wool dealer's license.
- 12. Reporting Most of the licenses require an annual renewal that must be signed.
- 13. Financial Information Financial information about the business, most of which is confidential.
- 14. Meat Market License All Meat Markets with a retail counter must be licensed.

Attorney General (Licensing & Gaming, Lottery and Consumer Protection)

- License App A business will complete the appropriate license application and the
 information will be received by the Office of the Attorney General. Some of the licenses
 regulated here are: Alcohol, Gaming, Tobacco and Transient Merchant. Information
 collected is: Business Name and Location, Contacts, Local Authorization, Board

- 2. Update Business will submit a change form when information changes such as: Doing Business As, Address, Managers, Owners, etc.

- 3. Business Verify By querying the Secretary of States AS400, information such as business owners, officers and business name and address can be obtained. Also, before issuing or reissuing a license, the status of a business is verified to be "In Good Standing".
- 4. Tax Return Charitable gaming businesses submit tax returns reporting income from sales.
- 5. Financial Financial reporting information such as revenue totals is shared.
- 6. Sales Tax Verify Verify that the business has a sales tax permit for certain types of businesses such as a coin operated amusement device.
- 7. Complaint Complaint information will be provided to an agency when requested. Complaint information is also requested from other agencies.
- 8. Sanitation Cert Verify that the business has a sanitation certificate.
- 9. License Verify Information is verified by looking at the Department of Financial Information's website where there are lists of licensed entities.
- 10. Invoice Distributors submit invoice information about gaming equipment sold to businesses.
- 11. Form 990 Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax
- 12. Clearance Verify that the business is not delinquent with its tax return filings.
- 13. License Verify Some licenses such as alcohol and tobacco are verified with the Attorney General's office.
- 14. Form 990 Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax. If possible, would like other agencies to share this information.
- 15. BCI Background Check Bureau of Criminal Investigations performs background checks at an agencies request.

Bank of North Dakota

- 1. Financial Information Financial information about the business, most of which is confidential.

Commerce, Department of

- 1. Business Verify By querying the Secretary of States AS400, information such as business owners, officers and business name and address can be obtained. Also, before issuing or reissuing a license, the status of a business is verified to be "In Good Standing".
- 2. Verify Assistance Verify that a business has qualified for a grant or assistance.
- 3. Tax Accountability Check the accountability of the business.
- 4. Business Hot Line Gather the business information and direct to the appropriate agency.
- 5. Notification request annual reports from the businesses annually.
- 6. Reporting Business submit annual reports (Unemployment information, number of jobs, average hourly wage and average benefits).
- 7. Unemployment information currently the business submits unemployment information. The Department of Commerce would like to verify this information.
- 8. Verify compliance The Securities Commission verifies the business compliance.

- 9. Regional councils 8 regional councils exist in state, they are not a state agency; they are a partner of the Department of Commerce to help administer federal dollars.
- 10. Financial Information Financial information about the business, most of which is confidential.
- 11. Primary Sector Verify JSND will verify that the business is a primary sector before allowing a jobs training contract.

Financial Institutions, Department of

- 1. License App Businesses such as Money Brokers, Payday Lenders, Trust Companies and Financial Institutions submit license information such as Corporate Name, Doing Business As name, owners, financial information, criminal history, contact information and branch information.
- 2. Bond Businesses are required to submit their bond information.
- 3. Consumer Renewal Businesses are required to renew their consumer license information annually.
- 4. Amendment Articles of amendment form is submitted when a business desires to change information such as owner, business name or articles of existence (bank or credit union).
- 5. Renewal Notification When a business desires to change certain information, such as owner information, an amendment can be sent from Secretary of State and an approval process begins.
- 6. Complaint Complaint information will be provided to an agency when requested. Complaint information is also requested from other agencies.
- 7. License Verify License verification is performed routinely for financial entities.
- 8. Business Verify Business profile information contains information such as: Business Name, addresses, contacts, owners, etc. This information can be obtained from the Secretary of State either by direct access to their AS400 system or by using the Business Lookup available on the World Wide Web.
- 9. BCI Background Check Bureau of Criminal Investigations performs background checks at an agencies request.

Health, Department of

- Food & Lodging All Food & Lodging establishments must be licensed, this includes Bed & Breakfasts.
- 2. Mobile Home All Mobile Home Parks & Campgrounds must be licensed.
- 3. Beverage Reg. All Beverage Establishments must be licensed.
- 4. Nursing Homes All nursing homes and care facilities must be licensed.
- 5. Child Care All Child Care facilities must be licensed.
- 6. Schools The health department is responsible for regulating the food services at schools.
- 7. Tattoo All Tattoo/Body Art and Tanning Facilities must be licensed. (this is a bill currently being passed in the legislature)
- 8. Renewals All licenses are renewed on a calendar year basis.
- 9. Inspections Inspections are done periodically on licensed facilities.

- 10. License Verify Various licenses are verified with the Health Department before issuing Sales Tax Permits. Licenses include Bed & Breakfasts, Lodging establishments, Nursing Homes, etc.
- 11. Sanitation Cert Verify that the business has a sanitation certificate; this is a result of the inspection process.
- 12. Feeding permit Verify animal feeding operation permit with the Health Department.
- 13. Business Verify A cross check of information is often done between SOS registration and Health Dept. licensing information.
- 14. Meat Market License All Meat Markets with a retail counter must be licensed.
- 15. Local Licensing There are local health units that handle the licensing requirements throughout the state. Information is only stored locally, and not at that state office.

Human Services, Department of - Child Support

- 1. New Hire Employers are required to submit new employee information within 20 days of employment.
- 2. Termination Employers are required to submit employee terminations.
- 3. Employer Response A form that is sent to employers to gather wage and health insurance information on obligors.
- 4. Request for Information Used to verify an obligors employment.
- 5. Reminders DHS will send businesses reminders and requirement changes.
- 6. Corporate Return Child Support would like to access corporate tax return information. Currently is not legal. This information could be used to determine if a business was still in business or when they quit doing business.
- 7. Bank Account Financial institutions will match on obligors and a levy can be placed on an obligor's account if applicable. The match can be done one of two ways: DHS sends the obligors to Tier Technologies Inc. The financial institution can send their account information to Tier and Tier will perform the match, or Tier will send the obligors to the financial institution and the financial institution will perform the match. Results are sent back to DHS.
- 8. New Hire New hires are shared with other agencies.
- 9. Employer Load Job Service sends their entire employer directory to Child Support once a month and does a full replace in the Child Support system.
- 10. Wages/Payroll Employee payroll information can be obtained from Job Service.
- 11. Business Verify By querying the Secretary of States AS400, information such as business owners, officers and business name and address can be obtained. Also, before issuing or reissuing a license, the status of a business is verified to be "In Good Standing".

Insurance, Department of

- 1. Causality line DOT requests a list of insurance companies that have an authority line of causality.
- Register Resident and non-resident agencies use NIPR (National Insurance Producer Registry) to get a check list and an application (Uniform Application for Business Entity License). Business name, FEIN, National Producer Number, business address, mailing address, owners/partners/officers/directors names and SSN/FEIN is collected. Individual

- agents (producers) don't have to be registered with SOS. Resident and non-resident producers use NIPR to get a check list and an application (Uniform Application for Individual License). SSN, name, business address, mailing address, type of license requested and background information is collected.
- 3. Renewals Nonresident and resident agent continuation fees (continuation education) is required every other year. Appointments (connect agent or agency to underwriter company) get renewed yearly with NAIC. Companies must renew yearly.
- 4. Annual notification request annual reports from agents, agencies and companies.
- 5. Insured Property add or changes or changes of location to insured property (state and political sub divisions) are sent to the State Fire Marshall.
- 6. Business Verify By querying the Secretary of States AS400, information such as business owners, officers and business name and address can be obtained. Also, before issuing or reissuing a license, the status of a business is verified to be "In Good Standing".

Job Service North Dakota

- 1. Determine Liability Employers submit a Report to Determine Liability, contains information such as: Business Name, addresses, contacts, owners, wage totals, employment information, successorship/acquisition information, etc.
- 2. Power of Attorney Employers submit power of attorney information.
- 3. Corp Officer Employers submit a Corporate Officer Exemption to apply for exemption of corporate officers or limited liability company managers from unemployment insurance coverage.
- 4. Const Proj Reg Employers that have large construction projects over 50 million dollars are required to submit Construction Project Registration and Risk Managements forms.
- 5. Recruitment Reg Businesses that are recruiting employees will submit registration information to review resumes and enter job orders in ND Works.
- 6. Provider Reg Businesses are registered to provide services to individuals enrolled in various JSND programs. (Ex: Car Repair, etc.)
- 7. Wage Report Employers are required to submit a Contribution and Wage Report quarterly to JSND. They pay the Unemployment Insurance Tax based on the wages of the employees.

- 2. W9 Businesses submit their W9 information for verification of their business name, address and tax identification number.
- 3. 1099 Businesses submit their 1099 information which is used by the agency to generate the 1099-Misc income form to the business.
- 4. ACH Businesses submit their ACH information to be used for payments to be directly deposited in the businesses bank account.
- 5. License App Process the business information for any other available agricultural licenses. Other licenses include: distributor, food business, auction, livestock dealer, meat market, milk processors, milk distributors, milk testers, bulk haulers of milk and dairy products in North Dakota, satellite/internet livestock license and wool dealer's license.







Chapter One

Constitutional, Statutory, and Legislative Authority

The origins of the Secretary of State's office begins prior to North Dakota's admittance to the union as a state on November 2, 1889. On March 2, 1861, the Congress of the United States adopted The Organic Law, which established the Territory of Dakota. Section three of that law prescribed there would be a secretary of the territory. The term of office was four years, unless sooner removed by the President of the United States. The duties of the secretary were to record and preserve all the laws and proceedings of the legislative assembly, the acts and proceedings of the Governor, and many other duties, which are very similar to those mandated in present day law to the Secretary of State.

The office, as known today, was established in Article V, Section 12, of the Constitution of North Dakota when the state's citizens adopted it on October 1, 1889. Out of a total of 35,548 electors casting their ballot, 27,441 (77%) voters were in favor of adoption and 8,107 (23%) voters were opposed.

Currently, the office of Secretary of State is authorized in Article V, Section 2, of the North Dakota Constitution (as amended by the voters June 11, 1996 and as amended by the voters June 13, 2000). The duties of the Secretary of State are defined in various parts of the state's constitution, in numerous state statutes, and within the agency's administrative rules.

In the state's constitution, the duties of the Secretary of State appear in Article III, related to the initiative and referral powers of the people; Article IV, Section 12, related to choosing a winner by a toss of a coin if two or more legislative candidates have an equal and highest number of votes; Article IV, Section 13, related to the filing of legislative bills; Article V, Section 5, related to term of office; Article V, Section 11, related to succession in the event of a vacancy in the office of Governor and Lieutenant Governor; Article IX, Section 3, related to membership on the Board of University and School Lands; Article X, Section 17, related to the certificates regarding bonds or evidence of indebtedness on the part of the state.

In the Century Code (state law), the general duties of the Secretary of State are established in Chapter 54-09; in Title 10 as they pertain to various business structures, e.g., registered agents, corporate and limited liability company farming, electric cooperative corporations, cooperative associations, business corporations, development corporations, venture capital corporations, community development corporations, professional organizations, limited liability companies, nonprofit corporations, real estate investment trusts, and publicly traded corporations; in Title 16.1 as they relate to elections; in Title 35 as they relate to liens, e.g., agister's, agricultural processor's, and agricultural supplier's; in Title 41 as they relate to the uniform commercial code; in Chapter 43-07 related to contractors; in Chapter 43-54 related to home inspectors; in Chapter 43-55 related to professional employer organizations; in Title 45 as they pertain to general partnerships, limited partnerships, limited liability partnerships, and limited liability limited partnerships; in Chapter 50-22 related to charitable solicitation; in Chapter 53-01 related to boxing and mixed fighting styles; in Chapter 54-02-01 related to the state's Great Seal; in Chapter 54-05.1 related to lobbying; and in other sections related to miscellaneous duties.

Under both the provisions of the Constitution and the North Dakota Century Code, the Secretary of State serves on the following boards, commissions, and advisory capacities.

Board of University and School Lands (North Dakota Constitution, Article IX, Section 3)

Emergency Commission (also serves as secretary of the commission) (N.D.C.C. § 54-16-01)

State Historical Board (N.D.C.C. § 55-01-01)

State Canvassing Board (N.D.C.C. § 16.1-15-33)

Theodore Roosevelt Rough Rider Award (N.D.C.C. § 54-02-07)





Chapter Two

Term of Office and Listing of Secretaries

When the North Dakota Constitution was adopted in 1889, the term of the office for the Secretary of State was two years in length. Beginning in 1965, along with several other constitutional statewide elected officials, the term of office for the Secretary of State was extended to four years. This change occurred when voters approved Measure # 5, which appeared on the ballot in the June 30, 1964, election. In that election, 115,393 electors cast a ballot with 60,099 (52%) voters in favor of the measure and 55,294 (48%) voters opposed.

The next change in the term of office occurred on June 13, 2000, when the voters approved Measure # 2. This measure moved the election of four constitutional offices (Secretary of State, Attorney General, Tax Commissioner, Commissioner of Agriculture) to the non-presidential election year cycle. To establish the new cycle, these four constitutional offices were elected to a term of two years in the 2004 general election. In the 2006 general election, and every four years thereafter, these four positions reverted to a term of four years. The vote for Measure # 2 was 49,391 (62%) voters in favor of the change and 30,431 (38%) voters who opposed the change.

Chapter Three

Duties of Office

The following duties for the Secretary of State are prescribed in Section 54-09 and other sections of the North Dakota Century Code.

- 1. Custodian of Great Seal of North Dakota and other original state documents:
- 2. Attests the signature of the Governor on official acts and maintains a register for them:
- 3. Serves as a member of and secretary to the Emergency Commission; is a member of the Board of University and School Lands; is a member of the State Historical Board; and is a member of and secretary to the State Canvassing Board (elections);
- 4. Concur with Governor's selection for the Theodore Roosevelt Rough Rider Award;
- 5. Serves as the State Athletic Commissioner for boxing and mixed fighting styles;
- 6. Distributes the North Dakota Century Code, the North Dakota Administrative Code and supplements, and the North Dakota Session Laws books;
- 7. Biennially publishes and distributes the North Dakota Blue Book,
- 8. Receives and files original copies of legislative bills and resolutions;
- 9. Distributes copies of legislative resolutions as prescribed by law and directed by the legislature;
- 10. Serves as the state's chief election officer;
- 11. Prescribes the form and content of statewide election ballots;
- 12. Files campaign finance disclosure reports of statewide candidates, political parties, district political parties, political committees, political action committees (PAC), and measure committees:
- 13. Certifies the names of persons elected to each house of the Legislative Assembly:
- 14. Receives and files petitions for initiated, constitutional, and referred measures;
- 15. Files oaths of office for legislative, judicial, and executive officials;
- 16. Issues certificates of registration to lobbyists;
- 17. Licenses contractors, registers charitable organizations and home inspectors;
- 18. Commissions notaries public;
- 19. Completes service of process as required by law;
- Files uniform commercial code (UCC) documents, various agricultural liens, and other miscellaneous liens;
- 21. Maintains the central indexing system and its network link to the state's fifty-three County Recorders (name changed from Register of Deeds, effective August 1, 2001);
- 22. Administers the Registered Agents Act;
- 23. Registers trademarks and trade names, partnership fictitious name certificates, real estate investment trusts, limited partnerships, limited liability limited partnerships, and professional employer organizations;
- 24. Files and records articles of incorporation related to domestic and foreign business corporations, publicly traded corporation, domestic and foreign nonprofit corporations, state banks, credit unions, lodges and fraternal organizations, mutual aid cooperatives, and cooperatives;
- 25. Files and records articles of organization related to domestic and foreign limited liability companies;
- Receives annual reports from various business entities as prescribed by state law;
- 27. Keep records of organized cities as prescribed by law.



Chapter Four

Office of Secretary of State

Mission Statement

This office will:

Serve the people of the State of North Dakota and its guests.

Execute with integrity the duties required by the North Dakota Constitution and the North Dakota Century Code.

Collect and preserve the records of the State as defined by the law.

Act as an ambassador for the State of North Dakota, its people, and its way of life.

This mission will be dispatched effectively, efficiently, expeditiously, courteously, and with financial responsibility.

Chapter Five (A)

Organization of Office

As provided for in the North Dakota Constitution, the Secretary of State has overall responsibility for carrying out the duties and functions of the office. To assist, the Secretary of State may appoint a Deputy (N.D.C.C. § 44-03-01 and N.D.C.C. § 1-01-11). In addition, the Secretary of State is authorized to hire one principal assistant (N.D.C.C § 54-44.3-20(1)). The positions of Deputy and Executive Assistant are non-classified positions and the appointees serve at the will of the Secretary.

The Sécretary appointed I. James (Jim) Silrum, Deputy Secretary of State, effective November 17, 2003.

Appointed August 1, 1995, Kim N. Shaw is the Secretary of State's Executive Assistant.

The organizational structure for the office divides the functional duties of the office into several operating units. During the biennium, the office was authorized twenty-three classified full-time employees and three (including the Secretary of State) non-classified full-time employees. It is also authorized one full-time position, which is federally funded, to assist with the administration of the Help America Vote Act of 2002. The divisions are as follows:

Chapter Six (A)

Appropriations

During the 1991-1993 biennium, the budget for the Secretary of State included appropriations for both General Funds and Special Funds. Although appropriations for a Special Fund are based on projected revenue, the expenditures from the fund cannot exceed the actual amount of revenue received. In 1991-1993, the agency's Special Fund was directly related to the operations of the Central Indexing System (CIS).

The 1993 Legislative Assembly eliminated the CIS Special Fund from the Secretary of State's budget when approving the agency's appropriation for the 1993-1995 biennium. Consequently, the agency was totally funded by General Fund dollars, which method of funding was continued in appropriations approved by the 1995 and 1997 Legislative Assemblies.

Then, the 1999 Legislative Assembly approved the creation of a General Services Operating fund for the agency beginning with the 1999/2001 biennium (1999 Session Laws Chapter 24). The creation of this fund allowed the Secretary of State's office to retain revenue received from the sale of services and products provided by the agency's Central Indexing and Business Registration/Information Divisions N.D.C.C. § 54-09-08). At the end of each biennium, the Secretary of State transfers any un-obligated revenue in excess of \$75,000 from the agency's General Services Operating fund to the state's General Fund.

Legislative Appropriation

The 2005 Legislative Assembly's appropriation for the Secretary of State's office for the 2005/2007 biennium was contained in House Bill 1002, Sections 3 and 5, (2005 Session Laws, Chapter 2), House Bill 1050, Section 3 (2005 Session Laws, Chapter 25), and Senate Bill 2021, Section 4 (2005 Session Laws, Chapter 49). The gross total appropriated line items in effect on July 1, 2005, were as follows:

Funds Returned to State's General Fund

At the end of the biennium, the agency had a remaining gross total of \$83,611 in unexpended general fund appropriated dollars. Of this amount, \$448 related to the agency's general office operations as appropriated in Subdivision 1 and \$83,163 related to public printing as appropriated in subdivision 2.

In addition, as required by the provisions of N.D.C.C. § 54-09-08, the Secretary of State's office transferred \$25,137 from its General Services Operating Fund to the state's General Fund. This amount was the un-obligated balance, which was in excess of \$75,000, remaining at the end of the biennium in the General Services Operating Fund.

The gross total return by the agency to the state's general fund was \$108,748.

Chapter Six (E)

Audit

On August 2, 2007, the Office of the State Auditor transmitted to this office the results of a financial and compliance audit for the two-year period ending June 30, 2006. The State Auditor made the following findings and recommendations (both the questions and the auditor's answers (italicized) are quoted direct from the report):

Responses to Legislative Audit and Fiscal Review Committee (LAFRC) Audit Questions

- What type of opinion was issued on the financial statements? Financial statements were not prepared by the Secretary of State in accordance with generally accepted accounting standards so an opinion is not applicable. The agency's transactions were tested and included in the state's basic financial statements on which an unqualified opinion was issued.
- 2. Was there compliance with statutes, laws, rules, and regulations under which the agency was created and is functioning? Yes
- 3. Was internal control adequate and functioning effectively? Yes
- 4. Were there any indications of lack of efficiency in financial operations and management of the agency? No
- 5. Has action been taken on findings and recommendations included in prior audit reports? The Secretary of State has implemented all recommendations included in the prior audit report.
- 6. Was a management letter issued? If so, provide a summary below, including any recommendations and the management responses. Yes, a management letter was issued and is included on page 18 of this report, along with management's response (agency note the recommendation on page 18 of the audit report was related to a few inadvertent entries in the agencies General Ledger. It was agreed to and corrected).

LAFRC Audit Communications

ConnectND Finance, Human Resource Management System (HRMS), and the AS400 (Secretary of State's accounting system) are high-risk information technology systems critical to the Secretary of State.



Chapter Seven

Administrative/Licensing Division

This division has a multitude of responsibilities and duties. They range from filing documents of the legislature to the licensing and regulation of boxing. The division is also responsible for the accounting functions of the agency. Most of the revenue generated by this division is from the collection of fees related to the issuance of contractor licenses, registration of charitable organization, registration of lobbyists, and the commissioning of notaries. The details of these functions are as follows:

Athletic Commissioner

According to Chapter 53-01 of the North Dakota Century Code, the Secretary of State is the state athletic commissioner and administers matters relating to the regulation of boxing, kickboxing, sparing and, as of July 1, 2005, mixed fighting style competition. The Secretary of State may appoint an athletic advisory boards to assist and advise the athletic commissioner in the performance of the respective duties of the position.

The first state athletic commission was created by the legislature in 1935 with House Bill 213 (1935 Session Laws, Chapter 91). The commission included the Commissioner of Labor and Agriculture, a practicing physician and a practicing attorney appointed by the Governor. Interestingly, the law was specific in stating that not only were the appointees to be citizens of the state, but also of good moral character.

Over the years, the law was changed very little. Then, in 1967, the position of Commissioner of Labor and Agriculture was divided into two separate statewide offices with the Commissioner of Agriculture retaining the duties relating to the athletic commission.

Four years later, in 1971, the Legislative Assembly adopted Senate Bill 2078 and transferred the duties of the athletic commissioner to the Secretary of State and eliminated the three person athletic commission (1971 Session Laws, Chapter 484). However, at the same time, the provisions of the law were such that they did not apply to boxing exhibitions where the net proceeds of the event were devoted to charitable purposes. Consequently, while the law was again modified in 1987 by House Bill 1074 (1987 Session Laws, Chapter 607) and in 1989 by Senate Bill 2184 (1987 Session Laws, Chapter 609), most boxing exhibitions were promoted on behalf of charitable purposes. Therefore, there was no state oversight:

However, that changed in 1991 when major changes were made to the laws governing boxing. In that year, the Fifty-second Legislative Assembly adopted Senate Bill 2411 (1991 Session Laws, Chapter 543), which became effective July 1, 1991. With its passage, the duties of the athletic commissioner became much more defined. The law also allowed for the creation of an athletic advisory board and allowed for a much better response and regulation to the growing boxing activity that was taking place within the state of North Dakota. Since one of the major duties of the athletic commissioner is to ensure the safety of the boxers, the restructured law made those duties easier to administer.

The athletic advisory board has nine members. They are appointed by the Secretary of State and have terms of three years. Each year, three members are newly appointed or re-appointed to the board. This process provides for continuity from year-to-year as the members assist and advise the athletic commissioner.

Revenue from the issuing of licenses is deposited into a special fund as provided for in Section 53-01-09 of the North Dakota Century Code. Licenses are issued to the boxers, referees, judges, corner persons, managers, and promoters. During the 2005-2007 biennium, 174 licenses were issued. The fees collected ranged from \$10 for a boxer to \$100 for a promoter. The revenue received during the biennium was \$7,003.18 and the expenditures were \$6,854.73.

During the 2005 legislative session, Senate Bill 2356 (2005 Session Laws, Chapter 464) was adopted, which resulted in a significant addition to the duties of the State Athletic Commissioner. The legislation authorized "mixed fighting style competition" and as defined in the law "means an advertised or professionally promoted exhibition or contest for which any type of admission fee is charged and in which the participants who inflict or employ kicks, punches, blows, holds, and other techniques to injure, stun, choke, incapacitate, or disable an opponent. The techniques may include a combination of boxing, kickboxing, wrestling, grappling, or other recognized martial arts." Although legally described as mixed fighting style, the common vernacular reference is mixed martial arts.

The legislation authorized an advisory board, similar in structure to the boxing advisory board, to advise the Athletic Commissioner specifically on mixed fighting style competition. As adopted in the legislations, these competitions could only occur upon adoption of administrative rules. In order to make sure the rules were the very best they could be, a working group of individuals knowledgeable in the sport and the Secretary of State's office drafted the rules over a period of several months. The rules, Chapter 72-02.2-02 of the North Dakota Administrative Code, were approved and became effective on October 1, 2006. The first mixed fighting style event was held on October 7, 2006, in the Bismarck Civic Center.

As with boxing, the revenue from the issuing of licenses is deposited into a special fund as provided for in Section 53-01-09 of the North Dakota Century Code. Licenses are issued to the participants, referees, timekeepers, judges, corner persons, managers, and promoters. During the 2005-2007 biennium, 319 licenses were issued. The revenue received during the biennium was \$ 6,255.56 and the expenditures were \$6,235.26.

Contractors

Section 43-07-02 of the North Dakota Century Code requires any person who engages in the business or is acting in the capacity of a contractor within the state to first obtain a license from the Secretary of State. This law applies to any single contract or subcontract where the cost, value, or price exceeds the sum of \$2,000. Failure to first obtain a contractor's license may result in a referral for criminal prosecution to the State's Attorney in the jurisdiction where the violation was committed.

By law, a contractor is defined as any person who is engaged in the business of construction, repair, alteration, dismantling, or demolition of bridges, highways, road, streets, buildings, airports, dams, drainage or irrigation ditches, sewers, water or gas mains, water filters, tanks, towers, oil, gas or water pipelines, and every other type of structure, project, development, or improvement coming with the definition of real or personal property, including the construction, alteration, or repair of property to be lid either for sale or rental, and shall include subcontractor, public contractor, and nonresident contractor.




There are four classes of contractor licenses. A holder of a Class A license is not subject to a limitation as to the value of any single contract project. Class B holders cannot have a single contract on a project having a value in excess of \$250,000. For holders of a Class C license, the limit is \$150,000 and Class D license are limited to \$50,000. New license application fees are Class A \$300; Class B \$200; Class C \$150; Class D \$50. There were 7,011 contractor licenses in effect on June 30, 2007.

Contractor licenses must be renewed annually by March 1 of each year. Penalties are assessed if the license is not renewed by the due date. If the license is not renewed within ninety days of the renewal date, a contractor must apply again for a new license. Annual renewal fees are Class A \$60; Class B \$40; Class C \$30; Class D \$10.

Charitable Solicitation

Chapter 50-22 of the North Dakota Century Code governs charitable organization soliciting contributions and professional fundraisers. The 2003 Legislative Assembly adopted SB 2341 (2003 Session Laws, Chapter 419), which became state law on July 1, 2003, the beginning of the biennium. Working in collaboration with the Attorney General's office, the bill represented a major re-write and re-formatting of the state's law related to charitable solicitation. A major processing change was the switch from licensing to the registration of charitable organizations. In addition, the bill gave the Attorney General expanded enforcement tools to pursue violators of the law. Unless a charitable organization or professional fundraiser is first registered with the Secretary of State, they may not solicit contributions from persons in North Dakota by any means.

Among other requirements, there is an organization registration fee of \$25 and a required financial statement. Annually, the organization must file an annual report, along with a \$10 fee, itemizing, among other categories, revenue, management costs, program services, cost of fundraising, names of professional fundraisers, cost of public education, and employee compensation.



Duties of the State

The office of the Secretary of State has the following duties relating to state functions:

- The office records and retains all books, records, deeds, parchments, maps, and papers
 deposited with the Secretary of State as mandated in the law;
- The Secretary of State attests the official signature of the Governor upon all executive orders, appointments, and other public instruments and then affixes the Great Seal of the State of North Dakota;
- The office maintains a registry of the official acts of the Governor including proclamations, appointments, executive orders, extraditions, and writs. During the biennium, there were 436 filings of official acts of the Governor;
- The office maintains a record of all conveyances of property made to the state;
- The office files oaths of office and statements of interest of the appointees of the Governor.

For the 2007 Session, the Secretary of State filed 303 legislative bills, originating in the House of Representatives, along with 44 House Concurrent Resolutions, 1 House Memorial Resolutions and 1 filed with Line Veto. There were 264 bills filed, originating in the Senate, along with 33 Senate Concurrent Resolutions, 1 Senate Memorial Resolution and 1 filed with Line Veto. The session convened January 3, 2007, and adjourned April 25, 2007.

Legislative Duties

The office of the Secretary of State has the following legislative duties:

- Retains two sets of the legislative journals of each house, certifies their receipt, and forwards the additional journals as mandated by legislative rule;
- Receives, records, and stores all books, bills, resolutions, documents, and papers of the legislature as provided for in the law;
- Provides members of the Legislative Assembly with all public documents as provided for in the law including the North Dakota Century Code and its supplements, session laws of the last



legislative session, journals of the last legislative session, the North Dakota Administrative Code and its supplements, and the North Dakota Blue Book when it is published;

- Provides members of the Legislative Assembly and legislative committees with copies of any public documents on file with the Secretary of State;
- Distribute laws, resolutions, or other documents of the Legislative Assembly;
- Retains the acts and resolutions of the Legislative Assembly until such time the law allows, then transfers to the State Historical Society;
- Performs such other duties as may be assigned by the Legislative Assembly.

Lobbyist Registration

According to Section 54-05.1-03 of the North Dakota Century Code, any person who engages in lobbying must first register with the Secretary of State and be given a distinctive lobbyist identification badge. The state's lobbying laws are all inclusive as to who must register as a lobbyist. Any person who, in any manner whatsoever, directly or indirectly, performs any of the following must register as a lobbyist:

- Attempts to secure the passage, amendment, or defeat of any legislation by the Legislative Assembly or the approval or veto of any legislation by the Governor of the state.
- Attempts to influence decisions made by the Legislative Council or by an interim committee of the Legislative Council.

The registration requirement does not apply to the following individuals. All others must register.

- A legislator.
- A private citizen appearing on his or her own behalf.
- An employee, officer, board member, volunteer, or agent of the state or its political subdivisions whether elected or appointed and whether or not compensated, who is acting in that person's official capacity.
- An invited guest of the chairman of the Legislative Council, an interim committee of the Legislative Council, or a standing committee of the Legislative Assembly to appear before the council, interim committee, or standing committee for the purpose of providing information.
- An individual who appears before a legislative committee for the sole purpose of presenting testimony on behalf of a trade or professional organization or a business or industry if the individual is introduced to the committee by the registered lobbyist for the trade or professional organization or the business or industry.

Each individual registered lobbyist must also file a detailed report including a statement as to each expenditure, if any, of sixty dollars or more expended on any single occasion on any individual, including the spouse or other family member of a member of the legislative assembly or the governor, in carrying out the lobbyist's work or include a statement that no reportable expenditures were made during the reporting period. There is no filing fee if the report is filed after July 1 and on or before August 1. After August 1, a \$25 late filing fee is assessed if the report is filed on or before October 1. For reports filed after October 1, the late filing penalty increases to \$50.

When registering as a lobbyist, the registrant must give his or her full name, address, and the name and address of each person or persons, corporations, associations, groups, or organizations on whose behalf they will appear. They must also provide a letter of authorization from those they represent.

There were 166 lobbyists registered for the registration year July 1, 2005, to June 30, 2006. They represented 302 organizations. From July 1, 2006, through June 30, 2007, there were 661 lobbyists registered representing 1,043 organizations. The number of registrants is always higher in the annual registration cycle that includes a legislative session, as was the situation in the 2006/2007 cycle.

<u>Notaries Public</u>

Under N.D.C.C., Chapter 44-06, the Secretary of State commissions notaries public. The term of office for a notary is six years unless sooner revoked by the Secretary of State. Notaries may administer oaths and perform all other duties required by law anywhere within the state. A notary public must have the qualifications of an elector as to age and residence. There were 12,168 notary commissions in effect on June 30, 2007. During the biennium, there were 4,376 new or renewal commissions issued. To educate and maintain contact, Notary Notes newsletter was mailed to the notaries in December 2006.



Miscellaneous Duties

Absent Persons Mineral or Royalty Interests in Land:

The 1969 Legislative Assembly adopted House Bill 404 (1969 Session Laws, Chapter 331) naming the Secretary of State as the registrar of the post office address of each person who owns mineral, leasehold, or royalty interests in land in North Dakota. Then in 2007, the Legislative Assembly adopted House Bill 1048 (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 312), which transferred the duties of filing the notice and becoming the new office of record to the Recorder of each county in which the person claimed to have a mineral, leasehold, or royalty interest in land within that county.

Apostille:

Most often, an Apostille is issued by the Secretary of State to confirm the commission of notaries public. This certificate is attached to documents intended for use in foreign countries. It certifies the authenticity of the signature and the capacity in which the person signing the document has acted. During the biennium, the Secretary of State completed 1,185 Apostille requests.

Chemical Applicator - Appointment of Agent:

N.D.C.C. § 4-35-11 required all nonresident chemical applicators or dealers to designate the Secretary of State as the agent for service of process in the event of a lawsuit against them. During the biennium, 132 such filings were made with the Secretary of State. Beginning with the 2005/2007 biennium, this filing requirement was moved to North Dakota State University Extension Service (SB 2355, 2005 Session Laws, Chapter 72).

Facsimile Signatures:

Each state official is required to file with the office their signature, certified by that officer under oath, for facsimile purposes in official state business.

<u>International Wills:</u> The office registers and preserves international wills of citizens for later execution and disposition according to law.

<u>Public Meetings:</u> As mandated by N.D.C.C. § 44-04-20, the agency maintains a file of the notices for public meetings held by state agencies, boards, and departments.

<u>Service of Process:</u> The agency completes service of process or legal papers when the following business organizations fail to appoint or maintain a registered office or registered agent: domestic and foreign corporations, nonprofit corporations, cooperative associations, limited partnerships, limited liability partnerships, limited liability limited partnerships, and real estate investment trusts.

The Secretary of State also acts as agent for service of process for out-of-state contractors (N.D.C.C. § 43-07-19), amusements (N.D.C.C. § 53-05-04), building and loan associations (N.D.C.C. § 7-07-02), and geophysical exploration companies (N.D.C.C. § 38-08.1-03). The office maintains a record of all processes, demands, or notices.



Chapter Eight

Central Indexing Division

The Central Indexing System (CIS)

The 1989 Legislative Assembly first studied the Central Indexing System (CIS) after it adopted House Concurrent Resolution 3057 (1989 Session Laws, Chapter 840). The resolution directed the Legislative Council to study state laws relating to state and local filings of liens, security documents, financing statements, and continuation statements.

The study included representatives from livestock auction yards, bankers, other lenders, grain dealers, the North Dakota Association of Counties, the state Information Services Division (now known as the Information Technology Division), and the office of the Secretary of State. The study resulted in the adoption of Senate Bill 2024 (1991 Session Laws, Chapter 449) by the 1991 Legislative Assembly.

The new law mandated the Secretary of State to develop and implement a computerized system, which would store data in a central location for the various documents filed with the Secretary of State or in the office of the county recorder (formerly known as register of deeds – change effective August 1, 2001) located in one of the state's fifty-three counties.

The resulting CIS is not a central filing system. Rather, it's a filing system with a centralized computer database, which allows for the filing and the search of records through a central indexing system. It eliminated the need for multiple or duplicate filings having to be made in several counties in order to perfect a lien. The original documents are retained in the office where the filing was made.

In July 1, 1996, state tax liens were also filed in the CIS and are now perfected statewide as well.

The CIS includes six separate databases in which filing information is maintained and searched. They are the Uniform Commercial Code (UCC) Index; the Farm Products Central Notice (CNS) Index; the Federal Lien Index; the Statutory Lien Index; the Statutory Lien Notice Index; and the State Tax Lien Index.

Central Indexing System - Searches

In addition to allowing the filing of various lien documents in any one of the fifty-four filing locations, the CIS is also of benefit to those persons who need to search the database in order to determine if any liens are recorded against a certain individual or business entity. The filing offices, for a fee, provide this service. When the system was first implemented, the requesters of such information had to contact one of the filling offices to request the information they were seeking. Beginning April 1, 1998, a programming change became effective allowing subscribers direct access through the Internet to conduct their own search of the database.

By paying a one-time registration fee, an annual fee, and a fee for each search, the subscriber is allowed access through the Secretary of State's website at www.nd.gov/sos 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The subscriber is able to select which filing location receives credit for the search fee.

Central Indexing System - Direct Access Filing

Beginning in September 2002, another service was added, which allows subscribers the ability to file Uniform Commercial Code (UCC) documents and Central Notice System (CIS) filing directly into the database through the Internet 24 hours a day, seven days a week. As with searches, subscribers pay a one-time registration fee, an annual fee, and filing fee for each filing submitted. They can also select which one of the fifty-four filing locations receives credit for the filing fee

<u>Uniform Commercial Code (UCC)</u>

The agency's Central Indexing System had it beginnings in 1965 with the adoption of the Uniform Commercial Code (UCC) law by the Legislative Assembly. Senate Bill 60 contained 257 pages and, because of it length, it was not published in the 1965 Session Laws book. The law became effective on July 1, 1966.

The adopted law (N.D.C.C., Chapter 41-09) allowed the Secretary of State to review and process UCC filings and related lien documents. These documents are filed to protect the collateral of secured parties.



UCC documents are primarily used to provide proof of collateral on a variety of personal property. The filing is effective for a period of five years and may be continued within six months prior to the expiration date for another five years. A filing can be amended, assigned, or have part of the collateral released by filing an associated filing. Documents terminating the security lien are filed when the debt is paid in full. Federal Tax Liens are also filed as UCC documents.

In 1991, the UCC law was substantially revised and updated by the Legislative Assembly with the adoption of Senate Bill 2100 (1991 Session Laws, Chapter 448). The 2001 Legislative Assembly made another major revision to the state's UCC laws when it adopted House Bill 1105 (2001 Session Laws, Chapter 361). This 97-page bill was introduced at the request of the Commission on Uniform State Laws. Similar legislation was introduced and adopted in all 50 states. The new law changed the requirements for financing statements and the responsibility of filing officers in regard to those documents.

Central Notice System (CNS)

The Central Notice System gives notice of perfected liens filed against the farm products of certain debtors.

In 1985, the United States Congress first debated the provisions of the Food Security Act, which was a part of that year's farm bill. The bill included several provisions and language taken from Article 9 of the UCC law. This was a unique subject for the federal government because it was an area of law considered to be in the realm of state responsibility. The "farm products rule" allowed a creditor, with a security interest in a farmer's crops or livestock, to seek payment from the purchaser of those commodities if the farmer did not pay the creditor. The act approved by Congress allowed states the choice of two options. One option was to create a central filing or notice system. This option, the Central Notice System (CNS) was first discussed by the 1983 Legislature Assembly and ultimately adopted by the 1985 session. On December 16, 1985, the Packers and Stockyards Administration of the United States Department of Agriculture approved the North Dakota CNS as meeting the requirements of the federal law. It is believed that North Dakota may have been as early as the third state in the nation in having its program approved.

Since 1985, the Secretary of State's office has provided subscribers with a Central Notice System Farm Products list, which names the individuals who have given a security interest in a crop or livestock to a lender. To begin with, the list was only made available on a paper printout or microfiche. Then, in July 1998, the information was also made available to customers on a compact disc (CD), which was well received by subscribers. The same information, on July 1, 1999, became available online through the agency's Central Indexing System direct access search option available through the Internet.

Agricultural Statutory Liens

In 1987, the Legislative Assembly authorized the use of an agricultural processor's lien/notice, an agricultural supplier's lien/notice, and agricultural agister's lien/notice. Any person entitled to a lien by statue or otherwise is authorized to file a verified statement with the county recorder (formerly known as register of deeds) or the Secretary of State's office, which together represent the state's 54 filing locations.

Within ninety days, any agricultural processor may file a lien on crops or agricultural products processed by threshing, combining, drying, or harvesting. Agricultural suppliers are allowed to file liens on the crop or product produced with supplied seed, petroleum products, fertilizer, farm chemical, insecticide, feed, hay, pasturage, veterinary services, or in the delivery or applying of such supplies.

Individuals entrusted with the animals by the owner for the purpose of feeding, herding, pasturing, or ranching may file an Agister's Lien upon the animals and are authorized to retain possession of the animals until the amount is paid.

If lien holders intend to impose liability for a lien against a crop or livestock buyer, the lien holder must file a statutory lien notice document in the Central Indexing System. Such liens take precedence over UCC liens (N.D.C.C. § 54-09-10).

As with the CNS, the Secretary of State provides both a microfiche and a compact disc listing of these liens.



Chapter Nine

Business Information/Registration Division

The responsibilities of the Business Division are diversified and involve concentrated workloads at certain periods of the year. Revenue from this division is generated from a variety of fees charged for filings, amendments, reports, lists, and registrations.

Listed below are the forty-four types of entities for which records are filed and maintained by the Business Division. The numbers on file, at the end of the biennium for most of the entities, are listed in the parenthesis following the name of the entity.

The following is a partial listing of some of the entities along with a brief description.

Corporation - Domestic

State law legally recognizes a corporation as an entity having its own rights, privileges, and liabilities that are distinct from the shareholders or members of the corporation. The existence of the corporation begins when articles of incorporation are approved for filing with the office of the Secretary of State or at a later date specified in the articles of incorporation. Corporations are required to file with the Secretary of State an annual report, which is due August 1 of each year.

Corporation - Domestic Publicly Traded

The 60th Legislative Assembly of the State of North Dakota adopted House Bill 1340 (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 102) enabling the North Dakota Publicly Traded Corporations Act, N.D.C.C., Chapter 10-35. This Act only applies to publicly traded corporations created after July 1, 2007, and only if the publicly traded corporation specifically chooses the option. A publicly traded corporation need not incorporate under the provisions of this Act; it may incorporate under, and only be subject to, the provisions of the Business Corporation Act, N.D.C.C. Chapter 10-19.1. In other words, the incorporators have a choice.

Corporation - Foreign

Corporations incorporated in other states or countries are considered foreign corporations. These foreign corporations must first obtain a certificate of authority from the Secretary of State before transacting business in the state of North Dakota, or before obtaining any license or permit prescribed by North Dakota law. To maintain their status, they must file with the Secretary of State an annual report, which is due May 15 of each year.



Limited Liability Company - Domestic and Foreign

Authorized by legislative action in 1993, a limited liability company (LLC) is an entity having its own rights, privileges, and liabilities distinct from the members. Structurally, the limited liability company combines the characteristics of a partnership and a corporation.

The existence of a limited liability company begins when articles of organization have been approved for filing with the Secretary of State or at a later date specified in the articles of organization. As with corporations, limited liability companies must file annual reports with the Secretary of State.

Limited Partnership - Domestic and Foreign

Limited partnerships are created when documents are filed with the Secretary of State. State law legally recognizes a limited partnership as an entity formed by two or more persons having one or more general partners, and one or more limited partners. The general partners have management powers and are responsible for all partnership obligations. Although limited partners may not participate in the day-to-day management operations, they share the liabilities and profits in proportionate share to their contributions.

Limited partnerships may transact any business in North Dakota except banking and insurance. Farming is only allowable if any corporations that may be partners thereof are in compliance with the provisions of North Dakota farming laws. Foreign limited partnerships, which are organized under the laws of other states or countries, must register with the Secretary of State before transacting business in North Dakota.

Both domestic and foreign limited partnerships must file with the Secretary of State an annual report, which is due April 1 of each year.

<u>Limited Liability Limited Partnership - Domestic and Foreign</u>

The Limited Liability Limited Partnership (LLLP) is identical to the traditional limited partnership except that all partners, including the general partner, have limited liability. An LLLP is formed at the time of filing the LLLP registration with the Secretary of State, or at a later date specified in the registration. A LLLP organized under the laws of other states or countries must register with the Secretary of State before transacting business in North Dakota. To maintain their status, they must file with the Secretary of State an annual report, which is due April 1 of each year.

<u>Limited Liability Partnership - Domestic and Foreign</u>

A limited liability partnership (LLP) is an ordinary general partnership acquiring limited liability status upon filing a one-page registration with the Secretary of State. LLP established under another state or country may register with the Secretary of State as foreign limited liability partnerships. Both domestic and foreign LLP must file with the Secretary of State an annual report, which is due April 1 of each year.

Fictitious Partnership Name

A fictitious partnership name is a name used by a partnership that does not include the names of the partners. A partnership identified by a fictitious name must file a fictitious name certificate with the Secretary of State. The certificate must be renewed every five years from the date of the initial filing.

Trademark/Service Mark

A trademark or service mark is a word, symbol, device, or any combination thereof adopted and used by a person or business to distinguish goods or services made or sold from those goods or services made or sold by someone else. The trademark or service mark may be registered with the Secretary of State to establish exclusive right to the mark in North Dakota. The duration of the registration is ten years at which time the registration may be renewed.

Trade Name

According to state law, N.D.C.C. § 47-25-01, a trade name is defined by law to be a name assumed to identify the business or activities of an individual or organization and which does not include in the name the following: (1) the true name of the organization using the name; (2) the first name and surname of each individual using the business name; or (3) the surname of each individual, repeating a surname if more than one owner has the same surname.

Additionally, N.D.C.C. § 47-25-02 states, "A person or organization may not engage in business in this state under a trade name until the trade name is registered with the secretary of state." A trade name registered with the Secretary of State is protected for five years and is renewable. The trade name





registration affords exclusive right to that name so no other business may file or use a name the same as, or deceptively similar. It also creates a public record from which one can identify the principals of a business. The registration fee is \$25.

Special Registered Agent Record

Corporations, which are created by federal law, are often empowered to operate in every state without filing for authority from a state agency. However, in some cases, federal law requires the corporation to maintain a registered agent in the states in which it operates. A record of such registered agent must be filed with the Secretary of State.

Fiduciary

A bank or trust company organized and doing business under the laws of any state or territory of the United States may be appointed to serve as a trustee in North Dakota. The bank or trust company may be appointed as trustee for a corporate or personal trust, executor, administrator, guardian for a minor or an incompetent person. The appointment may be by will, deed, court order, decree, or otherwise. Before qualifying or serving in North Dakota in a trust or fiduciary capacity, the bank or trust company must file certain documents with the Secretary of State.

Real Estate Investment Trust

Established by legislative action in 1997, a real estate investment trust is an unincorporated entity. This registration is required of real estate investment trusts established in North Dakota and those established in another state and transacting business in North Dakota. A real estate investment trust is a trust or association formed to acquire, hold, manage, administer, control, invest, or dispose property by trustees for the benefit of any person who may become a shareholder. They must renew their registration every five years from the date of the initial filing.

Professional Employer Organization License

Established by legislative action in 2007, a professional employer organization is a person that is a coemployer and is engaged in the business of providing professional employer services. After October 1, 2007, a person may not provide, advertise, or otherwise hold itself out as providing professional employer services unless the person has obtained a Professional Employer Organization License from the Secretary of State.

Registered Agents Act

The 2007 Legislative Assembly adopted the North Dakota Registered Agents Act with the passage of Senate Bill 2153 (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 99), which becomes effective July 1, 2008. Its adoption was promoted nationwide with North Dakota having the distinction of being the first state to adopt it in the United States. The Act authorizes "commercial registered agents" and places the laws related to registered agents for every type of business entity registered in the Secretary of State's office into one chapter of the Century Code (Chapter 10-01.1). As a result and regardless of the type of business entity structure, it provides uniform procedures and a single reference source without having to consult individual business entity chapters for registered agent provisions.

DIVISION ACCOMPLISHMENTS DURING THE BIENNIUM

Enhanced Business-related Information on Secretary of State's Web Site:

The Secretary of State's website includes a section pertinent to business entities and their registration requirements with the Secretary of State. During the biennium, this section was significantly enhanced to provide:

- Information related to publicly traded corporations
- Information and forms related to Professional Employer Organization licensing
- 2007 legislative summaries



Engaged in the Business Hotline Assistance
The Secretary of State partnered with the Department of Commerce to provide knowledge and expertise regarding extensive business-related issues to existing and potential businesses in the State of North Dakota. The issues relate to a variety of key business issues such as starting, expanding, retaining or relocating a business in the State of North Dakota

Chapter Ten

Elections Unit

According to the North Dakota Century Code, Section 16.1-01-01(1), the Secretary of State is mandated to be the supervisor of elections. In carrying out these duties, the Secretary of State may employ additional personnel. Each county in the state is also required to have a county administrator of elections. By state law (N.D.C.C. § 16.1-01-01(4), that individual is the County Auditor. The County Auditor is then responsible to the Secretary of State for the proper administration within his or her county of the state laws, rules and regulations related to election procedures.

The general mandate of election law is to maintain the integrity of the election process and to always protect the rights of the people as provided for in the constitution and laws of the state of North Dakota. The relatively small revenues generated by this division are primarily derived from filing fees assessed for reports, registrations, and for copies of the public records.

As supervisory, the Secretary of State has the power to examine upon his or her request, or the request of any election official, any election ballot or other material, machine, or device used in connection with any election for determining compliance with the law.

The following is a partial list of duties for the Secretary of State administrating election law:

- 1. Develop and implement training programs for all election officials in the state.
- 2. Prepare information for voters on voting procedures.
- 3. Publish and distribute an election calendar, a manual on election procedures, and a map of all legislative districts.
- Convene a state election conference of county auditors at the beginning of each election year and whenever deemed necessary by the Secretary of State to discuss uniform implementations of state election policies.
- 5. Prescribe the form of all ballots and the form and wording of ballots on state referendum questions, issues, and constitutional amendments.
- Investigate or cause to be investigated the nonperformance of duties or violations of election laws by election officers.
- 7. Require such reports from county auditors on election matters as deemed necessary.
- 8. Convene the state canvassing board and certify results of statewide elections.
- Prepare and publish reports whenever deemed necessary on the conduct and costs of voting in the state, including a tabulation of election returns and such other information and statistics as deemed appropriate.
- 10. Establish standards for voting precincts and polling locations, numbering precincts, precinct maps, maintaining and updating poll books, and forms and supplies, including but not limited to, ballots, poll books, and reports.
- 11. Prescribe the order in which each political subdivision will appear on an election ballot.
- 12. Certify to the county auditors the names of state, district, and county officials to be nominated or elected in the primary, general, or special elections.
- Receive and file on behalf of candidates for state and congressional positions their nominating petitions, certificates of nomination or certificates of endorsement.
- 14. Provide certificates of nomination and certificates of election.
- 15. File oaths of office for state, judicial, and legislative office holders.
- 16. Examine and certify for use the voting system or counting machines authorized by law.
- 17. File campaign finance disclosure reports for state, legislative, and district candidates, political action committees, political parties, and measures committees.
- 18. File oaths of office and statements of interest for the appointees of the Governor.
- 19. Provide public access to federal election reports of candidates for President of the United States and for congressional office.
- 20. Create and maintain, in conjunction with the county auditors, North Dakota's Central Voter



Help America Vote Act of 2002 (HAVA)

In October 2002, the President signed the Help America Votes Act of 2002 (HAVA) into law. As a result and in order to reflect the needed changes in North Dakota law, the 2003 Legislative Assembly passed Senate Bill 2409 (2003 Session Laws, Chapter 2409). Updates and changes subsequently were made in various additional bills respectively adopted by the 2005 and 2007 Legislative Assemblies.

The first grant of \$5,000,000 under HAVA was received in April 2003. This was a direct grant to the state without a requirement for a state match. In July 2004, the state received a second grant of \$4,150,000 and in May 2005, the state received a third grant of \$7,446,803. The last two grants required verification of a 5% state match before the federal payments were disbursed.

The match for the second grant was spilt 50/50 between the county and the state. The state's share was appropriated from unspent funds from the Secretary of State's 2001/2003 general fund appropriation. The match for the third grant consisted of a \$257,970 in-kind contribution approved by the Election Assistance Commission for the state's expenditures towards the Secretary of State's Election Management System with the remaining portion paid by the counties.

At the end of the biennium, Congress has not yet appropriated the last grant due to the states according to the HAVA legislation.

During the 2005/2007 biennium, the Secretary of State and a committee comprised of individuals from political subdivisions, advocates from the disabilities communities, political parties, and other interested groups continued to implement the comprehensive state plan required by HAVA for the improvement of elections in the state of North Dakota. The federal funding received was used to finalize the purchase of new voting equipment for every polling location, develop educational materials for voters, election administrators, and poll workers, improve the accessibility of polling locations, and develop common procedures for election administration across the state. Additionally, a portion of the federal funds was used to develop the Central Voter File (N.D.C.C. Chapter 16.1-02), which is a component of the Election Administration System created to standardize election administration across the state. The deposited funds remaining in the federally mandated election fund (HAVA -107th Congress, Public Law 107-252, Section 245(b)) will be used to supplement the cost of elections in future years. Interest generated by the deposited funds is allowed to remain in the election fund for such purposes.

Information about HAVA is available on the Internet at www.nd.gov/hava/.

Initiative and Referendum

Article III, Section 1, of the North Dakota Constitution states the legislative power of this state shall be vested in a legislative assembly consisting of a Senate and a House of Representatives. The people, however, reserve the power to propose and enact laws and constitutional changes/amendments by the initiative, to approve or reject legislative acts, or parts thereof, by the referendum, and to recall certain elected officials. Laws may be enacted to facilitate and safeguard, but not to hamper, restrict, or impair these powers.

Sections 2 through 6 of Article III provide instructions to the Secretary of State regarding the initiative and referendum process. A pamphlet entitled *Initiating or Referring Law in North Dakota* published by the Secretary of State is available upon request.

Since statehood in 1889 and through the 2006 election cycle, North Dakota's voters have voted on 479 measures placed on the ballot for their consideration. These have included constitutional measures placed by legislative action, initiated constitutional measures, initiated statutory measures, and referred measures.



The majority of measures (231) appearing on the ballot since statehood were constitutional amendments placed there by legislative action. Through the date of this report, the voters have been in favor of 132 (57%) of the measures and have disapproved of 99 (43%) of them.

The second highest in number (132) have been initiated statutory measures placed on the ballot through the circulation of petitions by a sponsoring committee. As of November 2006, the voters had approved 55 (42%) of the measures and had rejected 77 (58%) of them.

Sponsoring committees have been successful in placing 43 initiated constitutional measures on the ballot. As of November 2006, the voters had approved 25 (58%) of them and denied 18 (42%) of them.

The actions of the Legislative Assembly have been referred to a vote of the people 74 times. As of November 2006, the voters rejected legislative action 47 (63%) times and upheld legislative decisions 27 (37%) times

As the result of the recommendations of the 1972 Constitutional Convention, a special election was held on April 28, 1972, to consider the adoption of a new state constitution. There was a main "proposition" listed on the ballot to adopt the constitution and four alternative propositions if the proposed constitution was approved. However, it was defeated by a vote of 107,643 (63%) to 64,073 (37%).

The following measures were placed on the ballot by the 2005 legislative assembly and voted on during the 2006 election cycle.

Number of Statewide Elections and Voter Turnout

During the biennium, there were two statewide elections. The first one, often referred to as the primary election, was held on June 13, 2006, with 565 precincts and a voter turnout of 22.47%. The second one was the general election held on November 7, 2006, with 567 precincts and a voter turnout of 44.5%.



The total cost for conducting the two statewide elections in 2006 was approximately \$1,703,316.

Statewide Election (June Primary) - June 13, 2006

Although it is the "final" election for city positions, measures, and often school board positions, the election held in June is commonly known as the Primary election. Appearing on the ballot were a number of offices representing various levels of national, congressional, statewide, district, county, and local government. They were:

They may include but are not limited to Oaths of Office; Statements of Interest; Certificates of Endorsement; Petition/Certificates of Nomination; Affidavits of Candidacy; Certificates of Write-in Candidacy; Political Committee Registrations; Campaign Contribution Statements of Candidate, Political Parties, District Political Committees, Measure Committees; and filings and disclosure reports of federal candidates and various committees including Political Action Committees (PAC).

 House Bill 1241 amended numerous sections of law related to various business entity chapters of the North Dakota Century Code, including the Business Corporation Act in Chapter 10-19.1, the Limited Liability Company Act in Chapter 10-32, the Nonprofit Corporation Act in Chapter 10-33, the North Dakota Uniform Limited Partnership Act in Chapter 45-10.2, Partnerships in General in Chapter 45-13, Limited Liability Partnerships in Chapter 45-22, and Limited Liability Limited Partnerships in Chapter 45-23. While some changes were unique to specific chapters, many of the changes were uniformly adopted in the identified chapters.

The changes to multiple specified chapters include:

- Except for the Nonprofit Corporation Act, definitions were changed or added to include the
 definitions of "acquiring organization", "articles", "class", "constituent organization", "distribution",
 "governing body", "originating records", "owners", "ownership interests", "parent", "related
 organization", "signed", "subsidiary", and "surviving organization"
- A provision was added relating to the reservation of legislative right to amend or repeal provisions
 of the acts and subjecting any entity created or governed by the act
- Removed all provisions in the specified chapters related to article XII of the Constitution of North Dakota since that constitutional article was repealed in the June, 2006 primary election.
- Except for the Nonprofit Corporation Act, enabled mergers, exchanges, and transfers between any organizations

The changes specific to the Business Corporation Act, Chapter 10-19.1, include:

- N.D.C.C. § 10-19.1-00.1, established the official title of the chapter as the "North Dakota Business Corporation Act"
- N.D.C.C., § 10-19.1-10, enabled a committee to create a subcommittee and delegate any or all of
 its authority to the subcommittee; made technical corrections to the content of the articles of
 incorporation; provided that articles of incorporation may be dependent upon facts ascertainable
 outside of the articles incorporated by referenced documents maintained in the corporate office
- N.D.C.C., § 10-19.1-13, created subsection 10 providing that an amendment which only changes the corporation's name need not be submitted to the shareholders for approval
- N.D.C.C., § 10-19.1-41 changed the procedure for the non-judicial removal of directors and
 makes clear that a director may be removed with or without cause by the affirmative vote of the
 majority of the voting power of all shares entitled to vote at an election for directors unless, in the
 case of a corporation with cumulative voting, there are sufficient votes cast against the removal of
 the director as required to have elected the director at an election of the entire board under
 cumulative voting
- A new subsection to N.D.D.C. § 10-19.1-48 enabled a committee to create a subcommittee and delegate any or all of its authority to the subcommittee
- N.D.C.C., § 10-19.1-63, subsection 4 provided that all shares issued are non-assessable unless
 assessable shares are issued with the unanimous consent of all shareholders.
- N.D.C.C:, § 10-19.1-75, subsection 1 enabled a corporation to submit a matter to its shareholders whether or not the board believes the matter to be advisable
- N.D.C.C., § 10-19.1-139.1 provided a new provision for a foreign corporation authorized to transact business within North Dakota to record a conversion transaction with the Secretary of State
- Changes to N.D.C.C., § 10-19.1-146, repealed the financial disclosures on annual reports filed by domestic and foreign corporations
- Changes to N.D.C.C., § 10-19.1-147 standardized the fee to incorporate at \$90; standardized the fee for a foreign corporation certificate of authority at \$135; eliminated the license fees formerly collected from domestic and foreign corporations



The changes specific to the Limited Liability Company Act, Chapter 10-32, include:

- N.D.C.C., § 10-32-07, enabled a committee to create a subcommittee and delegate any or all of
 its authority to the subcommittee; made technical corrections to the content of the articles of
 organization; provided that articles of organization may be dependent upon facts ascertainable
 outside of the articles of organization and incorporated by reference documents maintained in the
 corporate office
- N.D.C.C., § 10-32-10, created subsection 9 providing that an amendment which only changes the limited liability company's name need not be submitted to the members for approval
- Added N.D.C.C., § 10-32-42.1 enabling a limited liability company to submit a matter to its members whether or not the board believes the matter to be advisable
- A new subsection to N.D.D.C. § 10-32-85 enabled a committee to create a subcommittee and delegate any or all of its authority to the subcommittee
- Provided that a disposition of substantially all of the property of a limited liability company is not
 considered to be a merger or defacto merger and that the transferee is not solely liable because it
 is deemed to be a continuation of the transferor

The changes specific to the Nonprofit Corporation Act, Chapter 10-33, include:

- N.D.C.C. § 10-33-01, subsection 35, changed the definition of subsidiary.
- In N.D.C.C. § 10-33-06:
 - Repealed obsolete text in subsection 2 related to cumulative voting.
 - Added text related to creation of committees and subcommittees in subsection 3
 - o In subsection 9, added a new provision allowing the articles of incorporation to be dependent upon facts ascertainable outside of the articles; and to incorporate by reference agreements which copies are maintained in the corporate office.
- In N.D.C.C. § 10-33-10, provided that an amendment to the articles of incorporation, which only
 changes the corporate name, may be authorized by the board of directors without the approval of
 the members.
- In N.D.C.C. § 10-33-44, clarified that written action by the members requires at least a majority vote of the voting power entitled to vote on the matter in question.

The changes specific to the Uniform Limited Partnership Act, Chapter 45-10.2, include:

- N.D.C.C., § 45-10.2-27, subsection 1 exempted the annual report as a document requiring filing acknowledgement by the Secretary of State
- N.D.D.C., § 45-10.2-81, enabled the amendment of a foreign limited partnership certificate of authority with the signature of at least one general partner

The changes specific to Limited Liability Partnerships, Chapter 45-22, include:

 N.D.C.C. § 45-22-22, subsection 2, reduced the fee for a certificate certifying a copy or reciting facts from \$20 to \$15

House Bill 1340 (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 102, effective July 1, 2007)

Established N.D.C.C., chapter 10-35 that affects only publicly traded corporations that choose to be affected

- Exempted existing corporations that publicly-trade their shares and are created under N.D.C.C., chapter 10-10.1
- Provided a new model of corporate governance
- Established terms of directors
- Provided provisions for the election of directors
- Gave qualified shareholders the right to nominate candidates as directors and have the nominations included in the corporation's proxy statement



- Provided reimbursement of expenses to a shareholder for the expenses incurred to conduct a
 proxy contest for the election of directors to the extent the shareholder is successful
- Included provisions related to regular and special meetings of shareholders
- Provided restrictions on poison pills
- Provided anti-takeover provisions
- Established annual reporting requirements and franchise fees

House Bill 1369 (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 81, effective March 23, 2007)

House Bill 1369 enabled a general business entity to use the word "bank" or "trust", or words of
like import, in their business name if the entity acquires written consent from the Department of
Financial Institutions.

House Bill 1452 (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 288, effective August 1, 2007)

- Limited the liability of a charitable organization for money damages for a personal injury or property damage.
- Defined terms related to liability issues.

Senate Bill 2036 (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 384, effective October 1, 2007)

The 60th Legislative Assembly of North Dakota passed legislation that requires professional employer organizations to obtain a license from the Secretary of State. The bill is summarized as follows:

- Provides definitions and general requirements related to professional employer organizations
- Defines the rights, duties and obligations under an employer agreement
- Establishes the licensing requirement
- Provides that a financial statement verified by a certified public accountant be submitted with a license application and be verified no more than 180 days prior to the submission of the application to the Secretary of State
- Requires that the financial statement clearly define the working capital of the professional employer organization.
- Requires submission of a \$100,000 surety bond to the Secretary of State by a professional employer organization seeking a license and that does not have a minimum working capital of \$100,000
- Provides a complaint process, disciplinary actions and penalties

Senate Bill 2153 (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 99, effective July 1, 2008)

- Removed specific registered agent provisions from chapters of the North Dakota Century Code related to entity formation and governance. The related provisions were consolidated into a new chapter, 10-01.1, of the Century Code titled the North Dakota Registered Agents Act.
- Allowed registered agents to represent their clients in the same manner as they do under current law.
- Allowed for the optional registration of a commercial registered agent serving as a registered agent for numerous entities in North Dakota. When doing so, the name and address of the commercial registered agent is consistently on record for all entities represented by them. If the commercial registered agent moves or undergoes a change of name, a single filing of that change will update the registered agent records for all of the clients they represent.
- Established the duties of a registered agent.
- Enabled entities without a registration requirement with the Secretary of State to voluntarily name a registered agent and establish a public record with the Secretary of State. Examples of these entities are trusts or unincorporated nonprofit organizations.
- Eliminated the filing requirement of the consent of registered agent.



Elections Division

House Bill 1374 - Recounts (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 203)

Secretary of State to develop the guidelines for recount procedures and this bill replaced the clerk
of district court with county recorder on the recount board.

House Bill 1375 - Campaign Finance (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 194)

Expanded the "public office" definition to cover all persons elected to office by vote, required a
political party convention revenue and expense statement, and expanded political committee
registration requirements.

 Added websites to the list of mediums barred from use for false information and prohibited gathering initiated measure signatures at a polling site.

House Bill 1377 - Canvassing Elections (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 202)

 Replaced clerk of district court with county recorded as keeper of ballots following election and updated process for submitting certified abstract of votes to the Secretary of State.

House Bill 1378 - Polling Places (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 188)

Authorized counties to use vote centers.

House Bill 1379 - Write-in Votes (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 199)

Replaced clerk of district court with county recorder as keeper of ballots for recounts.

House Bill 1380 - General Procedures for Elections (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 186)

 Increased filing deadlines for special elections, allowed counties to transfer voter records through the central voter file, and provided for a prescribed petition form.

House Bill 1381 - County Offices (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 104)

Set a single date as start of term of office.

House Bill 1382 - County Filing Date (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 56)

Increased filing deadlines.

House Bill 1383 - School District Election Precincts (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 170)

Removed cap on precinct population.

House Bill 1499 - 527 Organizations (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 193)

Created a campaign finance reporting requirement for these organizations.

Senate Bill 2194 - Recall in a Political Subdivision (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 392)

Extended the dates for recall elections.



Senate Bill 2230 - Mail Ballot Elections (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 198)

Allowed counties to conduct all mail elections.

Senate Bill 2231 - President Only Ballot (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 201)

Added telephone contact information to president only ballot affidavit.

Senate Bill 2232 - Absentee Voting (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 192)

 Standardized ballot preparation times for all elections, aligned state law with federal law for uniformed and overseas voters, and allowed early voting in a public facility with consent of county commission.

Senate Bill 2233 - Voting Systems (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 190)

 Updated ballot initialing process, removed townships from the electronic voting authorization, and reduced the number of postings required in a polling site.

Senate Bill 2234 - Primary Elections (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 197)

 Clarified ballot names, added telephone contact information, added a statement of understanding qualifications by candidates, and allowed electronic poll books.

Senate Bill 2235 - Voting System Security (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 191)

Provided for a test of the voting system following an election.

Senate Bill 2236 - Municipal Elections (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 350)

 Disallowed simultaneous candidacy for city president/mayor position and council/commission positions, and extended filing deadlines for municipal elections.

Senate Bill 2237 - Central Voter File (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 187)

 Changed designation of protected files in central voter file and refined information required in poll books.

Senate Bill 2238 - Election Officers (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 189)

Allowed counties to hire election clerks based on their technical skills.

Senate Bill 2239 - General Election Provisions (2007 Session Laws, Chapter 200)

Removed requirement for voter to disclose disability when requesting assistance.



Chapter Twelve

Public Printing

Public printing relates to publishing the hardbound copies of the North Dakota Century Code (N.D.C.C.) and the state's constitution; N.D.C.C. replacement volumes; N.D.C.C. supplements; the laws of North Dakota as passed by each legislative assembly (commonly known as session laws); the North Dakota Administrative Code and its monthly supplements; the bound copies of the House and Senate journals; binding one set of the enrolled copies of the bills passed by each Legislative Assembly, and a limited number of other publications.

Early in the state's history, the Secretary of State had a very active role as it related to these publications. However, since the establishment in 1945 of the predecessor to today's Legislative Council, the role of the Secretary of State has evolved to that of a distributor of these publications. Now, according to various provisions of Chapter 46-03 of the North Dakota Century Code, the Legislative Council establishes the editorial content, specifications, and contractual arrangements for most of these publications. Nevertheless, even with the Secretary of State's minimal involvement with the contractual process, the legislature appropriates the funding for Public Printing expenditures to the Secretary of State's budget from which they are paid.

In fulfilling the distribution duties provided in state law, the Secretary of State distributes, without cost, the various Public Printing publications to the state's constitutional officers, justices of the supreme court, judges of district courts, state departments, state boards, state agencies, officers of the legislative assembly, county officers, libraries, and schools as directed. Some of the publications are sold to federally funded agencies and direct to the public. Still other copies of the publications are used primarily for archival purposes.

Historically, the appropriation for Public Printing was included in a separate subdivision of the Secretary of State's budget having its own identity. However, beginning with the 1991-1993 biennium, the Legislative Assembly included Public Printing in the Secretary of State's general fund appropriation also used for the agency's general office operations. Unfortunately, the inclusion proved to be very misleading in any analysis of the Secretary of State's budget because it intertwined those portions of the appropriation over which the Secretary of State had direct control for the operations of the agency and those portions of the budget (public printing) where the Secretary of State had very limited control in how the funds were spent.

Fortunately, the 1995 Legislative Assembly acknowledged and recognized the problem. Therefore, beginning again with the 1995-1997 biennium, the Legislative Assembly once again provided Public Printing with its own distinct subdivision within the Secretary of State's budget. Accordingly, the appropriation for Public Printing in this biennial report (Chapter 6 (A)) is separated from those line items that relate directly to the agency's office operations, which are under the direct control of the Secretary of State.

Due to the fact that the Legislative Assembly meets in the last quarter of the biennium and because of the resulting publishing deadlines, a sizeable portion of the funds appropriated for Public Printing are expended during the first quarter of the biennium immediately following the one in which the laws were originated.


