The court has put this bill in and what it is is a bill to amend the statute for the state auditor. Since January of 2001, the clerk of court services are delivered two ways in North Dakota. We have clerks of court who are employed by the state and directly under the control and direction of the state. But the vast majority of those 42 are county employees. What we do is we contract with the county, not with the individual clerk of the county for those services. Part of what we do is to monitor how they handle their finances as they relate to the court. With the state employee clerks we are able to refer any issues if we find them right to the state auditor. County wise we don't. You will notice that in the bill in the bill we didn't have that authority so

we are doing is requesting that. State Auditor Peterson has no objection to this amendment.

Good morning, Chairman Grande and members of the House Government and Veterans Affairs Committee. My name is Sally Holewa. I am the state court administrator.

I am here today to present House Bill 1148 and to testify in favor of its passage.

The bill before you is to allow the state court administrator to request the state auditor to perform an audit of those clerk of court offices that remain under the county system.

Since January 2001, clerk of court services are delivered two ways in North Dakota. In eleven counties, the personnel is employed by the state and perform their duties under the direction of the supreme court. In the remaining 42 counties, the state contracts with the county to perform those duties. Although they are required by law to follow the policies and procedures established by the supreme court when performing clerk of court duties, in all other respects, they remain under the employ and direction of the county.

The supreme court, through our finance and accounting department, establishes financial procedure and routinely monitors clerk of court accounts. However, the clerk of court does not work in isolation. A significant amount of funds flows to them from the county sheriff in the form of bond payments. In the contract counties, the clerks deposit all monies into the county's account, and payments from that account are made through the county treasurer. This amendment would allow us to make a direct request to the state auditor in the event we felt there was a need for a professional audit of the records. We are currently able to do this for the clerk of court offices that are under state employment. I have discussed this with the state auditor and he has no objection to the amendment.
