Formerly a polling place was open on the 2nd Tuesday of each even #'d year. This bill makes it possible for irrigation districts to have mail in ballots.

depreciation in the land, and the renter is allowed to deduct special assessment payments.

After the renter pays of the special assessment they own the equipment and get their water rights back.

Chairman Wrangham, members of the Political Subdivisions Committee, I am Loren DeWitz, Assessor for the Central Dakota Irrigation District.

Thank you for this opportunity to present information on HB1321 that would allow an irrigation district to hold mail ballot elections.

Some people confuse irrigation districts and irrigation associations.

Irrigation districts are government entities. Irrigation associations are organized mainly for education and promotion of irrigation development.

Irrigations Districts in North Dakota-

- Irrigation districts are government entities organized under
 Chapter 61 of NDCC, with broad powers to construct and finance irrigation works.
- Electors are land owners in the district with irrigation on land subject to assessment by the district.
- Landowners have one vote for each twenty acres of land subject to assessment.
- Present law requires that elections be held on the second
 Tuesday of February on each even numbered year.

Central Dakota Irrigation District (CDID)—

- CDID was established in 1996.
- In 1997 through the ND Bond Bank, with the backing of North Dakota's bond rating, we were able to bond for \$3,270,000.
- In 1998 CDID took out a loan for another \$2,605,200.

- With that funding, we were involved in developing 71 center pivots and 3 storage warehouses. These works were located in Kidder, Stutsman and Logan Counties.
- The landowner members live in these three counties plus Moorhead, MN, Bathgate, ND and Underwood, ND.
- At present we are involved with 37 center pivots and one warehouse.
- In 2010, 12 more center pivots are scheduled to be paid off.

When CDID first organized, members had some concerns with the future success of the district and how it would be managed. As time has passed and the district has continued to operate in a strong manner, electors have confidence in the district. With more pressing priorities currently facing them, as well as great distances to the polls for some electors, the result has been a lower voter turn out at election time. Mail ballots will give electors an opportunity to stay involved without taking a day to go to the polls.

In visiting with members and officers from other districts, they, too, believe the mail ballot election is a good option for members.

We ask for a do pass vote from this committee.

To Read:

An elector entitled to cast more than one vote must be provided separate ballots for each vote to which the elector is entitled, and a return envelope with instructions sufficient to keep those ballots secret.
