Minutes:

Representative Dennis Johnson, District 15, introduced HB 1438. He explained that there is a need to be able to get temporary workers a CDL. There are currently about 100 applicants. The way this is now is creating problems for the harvesters. There are amendments added to this bill. Texas, Nebraska, Kansas, and South Dakota have come up with a temporary CDL so that the applicant could take their test without a Social Security number. We have put this bill together so that the DOT said that they could issue the license without the Social Security number. The second part of the bill addresses that fact that many foreign workers are returning more than one year. Then when they come back again, we want to give them the opportunity to pick up their license for a small fee without having to go through the testing process again. The harvesters and the Motor Vehicle Department are comfortable with the way the bill came together.

Representative Delmore: If they don't have a Social Security number, what proof will they have of who they are and their driving records, so that we know that they should be licensed?

Representative Dennis Johnson: The workers have work permits and this will have to coincide with the work permit numbers that allow them to come into the United States.

Representative Gruchalla: The other states that you mentioned, have they formulated a program just like this that allowed them to get a CDL?

Representative Dennis Johnson: Their language addresses what I started out to do here with a temporary CDL. I believe that the Motor Vehicle no longer needs the Social Security number.

Linda Butts, Deputy Director of Driver and Vehicle Services at the North Dakota DOT, spoke I support of HB 1438. See attachment #1. Linda reviewed the amendments.

Representative Delmore: Could we assume that all of these people wouldn't have a passport?

Cindy Worral, DOT: Every applicant that comes in would have to have a passport and an I-94 card, which is an immigration document that has their work status here in the United States.

Representative Weiler: Is the need to show the passport and I-94 card spelled out in the federal portion?

Cindy Worral: That is in state statute where they have to provide proof of legal name and date of birth. So, we would have to insure that they are legal to be here, which we do now, if the license would expire the same time that their valid duration stay is in (inaudible).

Chairman Ruby: Is the \$20 fee adequate?

Cindy Worral: Yes.

Chairman Ruby: Are the people normally in the county more than a year?

Cindy Worral: Normally, it runs about eight months for that work visa.

Chairman Ruby: If they come back two months later, do they have to go through all the testing process again?

Cindy Worral: Currently, and is also in the amendment, if they come back and it hasn't been more than one year past the expiration date, then they can get the license back.

This bill would allow for a non-resident to obtain a temporary non-resident commercial license for a fee of \$20.00.



This bill has been amended twice. However, the amendments have no impact on the original fiscal note.

Section 2, Paragraph 1 allows for the DOT to issue a temporary non-resident commercial license for a fee of \$20.00. This will require software modifications to input and print the licenses.

This bill has been amended twice. However, the amendments have no impact on the original fiscal note.



Page 1, line 2, remove "temporary"

Page 1, line 3, replace "section" with "sections 39-06.2-02," and after "39-06.2-08" insert ", and 39-06.2-09"

Page 1, line 4, after "a" insert "nonresident"

Page 1, after line 5, insert:

"SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 39-06.2-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

39-06.2-02. Definitions. As used in this chapter, unless the context or subject matter otherwise requires:

- 1. "Alcohol" means any substance containing any form of alcohol, including ethanol, methanol, propanol, and isopropanol.
- 2. "Alcohol concentration" means:
 - a. The number of grams of alcohol per one hundred milliliters of blood;
 - The number of grams of alcohol per two hundred ten liters of breath;
 or
 - c. The number of grams of alcohol per sixty-seven milliliters of urine.
- 3. "Commercial driver's instruction permit" means a permit issued under subsection 4 of section 39-06.2-07.
- 4. "Commercial driver's license" means a license issued under this chapter which authorizes an individual to drive a class of commercial motor vehicle.
- "Commercial driver's license information system" means the information system established under the Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Act to serve as a clearinghouse for locating information related to the licensing and identification of commercial motor vehicle drivers.
- "Commercial motor vehicle" means a motor vehicle or combination of motor vehicles designed or used to transport passengers or property:
 - a. If the gross combination weight rating is twenty-six thousand one pounds [11794 kilograms] or more provided the towed unit has a gross vehicle weight rating of more than ten thousand pounds [4536 kilograms];
 - If the vehicle has a gross vehicle weight rating of more than twenty-six thousand pounds [11793.40 kilograms] or such lesser rating as determined by federal regulation;
 - If the vehicle is designed to transport sixteen or more passengers, including the driver; or

- d. If the vehicle is transporting hazardous materials and is required to be placarded in accordance with 49 CFR part 172, subpart F.
- 7. "Controlled substance" means any substance so classified under section 802(6) of the Controlled Substances Act [21 U.S.C. 802(6)], and includes all substances listed on schedules I through V, of 21 CFR part 1308, as they may be revised from time to time.
- 8. "Conviction" means an unvacated adjudication of guilt, or a determination that a person has violated or failed to comply with the law in a court of original jurisdiction or an authorized administrative tribunal, an unvacated forfeiture of bail or collateral deposited to secure the person's appearance in court, the payment of a fine or court cost, or violation of a condition of release without bail, regardless of whether or not the penalty is rebated, suspended, or probated.
- 9. "Disqualification" means a withdrawal of the privilege to drive a commercial motor vehicle.
- 10. "Drive" means to drive, operate, or be in physical control of a motor vehicle.
- 11. "Driver" means any person who drives, operates, or is in physical control of a commercial motor vehicle, or who is required to hold a commercial driver's license.
- 12. "Driver's license" means a license issued by a state to an individual which authorizes the individual to drive a motor vehicle.
- 13. "Drug" means any drug or substance or combination of drugs or substances which renders a person incapable of safely driving, and includes any controlled substance.
- 14. "Employer" means any person, including the United States, a state, or a political subdivision of a state, who owns or leases a commercial motor vehicle, or assigns a person to drive a commercial motor vehicle.
- 15. "Fatality" means the death of a person as a result of a motor vehicle accident.
- 16. "Felony" means any offense under state or federal law which is punishable by death or imprisonment for a term exceeding one year.
- 17. "Foreign jurisdiction" means any jurisdiction other than a state of the United States.
- 18. "Gross vehicle weight rating" means the value specified by the manufacturer as the maximum loaded weight of a single or a combination (articulated) vehicle. The gross vehicle weight rating of a combination (articulated) vehicle (commonly referred to as the "gross combination weight rating") is the gross vehicle weight rating of the power unit plus the gross vehicle weight rating or actual weight of the towed unit or units.
- 19. "Hazardous materials" means any material that has been designated as hazardous under 49 U.S.C. 5103 and is required to be placarded under subpart F of 49 CFR part 172 or any quantity of a material listed as a select agent or toxin in 42 CFR part 73.
- 20. "Imminent hazard" means the existence of a condition that presents a substantial likelihood that death, serious illness, severe personal injury, or a substantial endangerment to health, property, or the environment may

occur before the reasonably foreseeable completion date of a formal proceeding begun to lessen the risk of that death, illness, injury, or endangerment.

- 21. "Motor vehicle" means every vehicle that is self-propelled, and every vehicle that is propelled by electric power obtained from overhead trolley wires but not operated upon rails, except vehicles moved solely by human power and motorized wheelchairs.
- 22. "Noncommercial motor vehicle" means a motor vehicle or combination of motor vehicles not defined by the term commercial motor vehicle.
- 23. "Nonresident commercial driver's license" means a commercial driver's license issued by a state to an individual domiciled in a foreign country meeting the requirements of 49 CFR 383.23(b)(1).
- 24. "Out-of-service order" means a temporary prohibition against driving a commercial motor vehicle.
- 24. 25. "Serious traffic violation" means a conviction when operating a commercial motor vehicle of:
 - Excessive speeding, involving a single charge of any speed fifteen miles [24.14 kilometers] per hour or more, above the posted speed limit;
 - Reckless driving, as defined under section 39-08-03 or local ordinance, including charges of driving a commercial motor vehicle in willful or wanton disregard for the safety of persons or property, improper or erratic traffic lane changes, or following the vehicle ahead too closely;
 - A violation of any state or local law related to motor vehicle traffic control, other than a parking violation, arising in connection with a fatal accident;
 - d. Driving a commercial motor vehicle without obtaining a commercial driver's license;
 - e. Driving a commercial motor vehicle without a commercial driver's license in the driver's possession. An individual who provides proof to the enforcement authority that issued the citation, by the date the individual must appear in court or pay a fine for such violation, that the individual held a valid commercial driver's license on the date the citation was issued, is not guilty of this offense; or
 - f. Driving a commercial motor vehicle without the proper class of commercial driver's license or endorsement, or both, for the specific vehicle group being operated or for the passengers or type of cargo being transported.
- 25. 26. "State" means a state of the United States or the District of Columbia.
- 26. 27. "United States" means the fifty states and the District of Columbia."

39-06.2-09. Commercial driver's license.

- Centent of license. The commercial driver's license must be marked "commercial driver's license", and must be, to the maximum extent practicable, tamper proof. It must include the following information:
 - a. The name and residential address of the person;
 - b. The person's color photograph;
 - c. A physical description of the person, including sex, height, weight, and eye and hair color;
 - d. Date of birth;
 - e. A distinguishing number assigned to the person which upon request may be a number different from the person's social security number;
 - f. The person's signature;
 - g. The class or type of commercial motor vehicle or vehicles which the person is authorized to drive together with any endorsements or restrictions;
 - h. The name of this state; and
 - i. The dates between which the license is valid.
- 2. The director may issue a nonresident commercial driver's license pursuant to the limitations of 49 CFR 383 including waiving the social security number requirement. The face of the license must be marked "nonresident" in accordance with 49 CFR 383.153(b).
- 3. Glassifications, endersements, and restrictions. Commercial driver's licenses may be issued with the following classifications, endorsements, and restrictions; the holder of a valid commercial driver's license may drive all vehicles in the class for which that license is issued and all lesser classes of vehicles except motorcycles. Vehicles for which an endorsement is required may not be driven unless the proper endorsement appears on the license. The requirements of placarding vehicles transporting hazardous materials under subparagraph b of paragraph 3 of subdivision a and the endorsement required under paragraph 1 of subdivision b do not apply to a person who is the operator of a farm vehicle, provided such vehicle is controlled and operated by a farmer and used to transport hazardous materials in the form of farm supplies within one hundred fifty miles [241.40 kilometers] of the farm, and not used in the operations of a common or contract carrier.
 - a. Classifications:
 - (1) Class A. Any combination of vehicles with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than twenty-six thousand pounds [11793.40 kilograms], provided the gross vehicle weight rating of the vehicles being towed is in excess of ten thousand pounds [4535.92 kilograms].

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- (2) Class B. Any single vehicle with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than twenty-six thousand pounds [11793.40 kilograms], and any such vehicle towing a vehicle not in excess of ten thousand pounds [4535.92 kilograms].
- (3) Class C. Any single vehicle with a gross vehicle weight rating of twenty-six thousand pounds [11793.40 kilograms] or less or any such vehicle towing a vehicle with a gross vehicle weight rating not in excess of ten thousand pounds [4535.92 kilograms] comprising:
 - (a) Vehicles designed to transport sixteen or more passengers, including the driver; and
 - (b) Vehicles used in the transportation of hazardous materials which requires the vehicle to be placarded under 49 CFR part 172, subpart F.

b. Endorsements and restrictions:

- (1) "H" authorizes the driver to drive a vehicle transporting hazardous materials.
- (2) "T" authorizes driving double and triple trailers.
- (3) "P" authorizes driving vehicles carrying passengers.
- (4) "N" authorizes driving tank vehicles.
- (5) "X" combinations of tank vehicles and hazardous material vehicles.
- (6) "S" authorizes driving a schoolbus.

Other restrictions may be placed upon a commercial driver's license, as provided in section 39-06-17. The applicant shall pay a fee of three dollars for each endorsement.

- 3. 4. Applieant record check. Before issuing a commercial driver's license, the director shall obtain driving record information through the commercial driver's license information system, the national driver's register, and from each state in which the person has been licensed.
- 4. <u>5.</u> Notification of license issuance. Within ten days after issuing a commercial driver's license, the director shall notify the commercial driver's license information system of that fact, providing all information required to ensure identification of the person.
- 5. 6. Expiration of license. A commercial driver's license issued under this chapter expires in the manner provided for operator's licenses under section 39-06-19.
- 6. 7. License renewal precedures. Every person applying for renewal of a commercial driver's license must complete the application form required by subsection 1 of section 39-06.2-08, providing updated information and required certifications. If the applicant wishes to retain a hazardous materials endorsement, the written test for a hazardous materials endorsement must be taken and passed."

An individual who provides proof to the enforcement authority that issued the citation, by the date the individual must appear in court or pay a fine for such violation, that the individual held a valid commercial driver's license on the date the citation was issued, is not guilty of this offense; or
 - f. Driving a commercial motor vehicle without the proper class of commercial driver's license or endorsement, or both, for the specific

Commercial driver's licenses may be issued with the following classifications, endorsements, and restrictions; the holder of a valid commercial driver's license may drive all vehicles in the class for which that license is issued and all lesser classes of vehicles except motorcycles. Vehicles for which an endorsement is required may not be driven unless the proper endorsement appears on the license. The requirements of placarding vehicles transporting hazardous materials under subparagraph b of paragraph 3 of subdivision a and the endorsement required under paragraph 1 of subdivision b do not apply to a person who is the operator

of a farm vehicle, provided such vehicle is controlled and operated by a farmer and used to transport hazardous materials in the form of farm supplies within one hundred fifty miles [241.40 kilometers] of the farm, and not used in the operations of a common or contract carrier.

a. Classifications:

- (1) Class A. Any combination of vehicles with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than twenty-six thousand pounds [11793.40 kilograms], provided the gross vehicle weight rating of the vehicles being towed is in excess of ten thousand pounds [4535.92 kilograms].
- (2) Class B. Any single vehicle with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than twenty-six thousand pounds [11793.40 kilograms], and any such vehicle towing a vehicle not in excess of ten thousand pounds [4535.92 kilograms].
- (3) Class C. Any single vehicle with a gross vehicle weight rating of twenty-six thousand pounds [11793.40 kilograms] or less or any such vehicle towing a vehicle with a gross vehicle weight rating not in excess of ten thousand pounds [4535.92 kilograms] comprising:
 - (a) Vehicles designed to transport sixteen or more passengers, including the driver; and
 - (b) Vehicles used in the transportation of hazardous materials which requires the vehicle to be placarded under 49 CFR part 172, subpart F.

b. Endorsements and restrictions:

- (1) "H" authorizes the driver to drive a vehicle transporting hazardous materials.
- (2) "T" authorizes driving double and triple trailers.
- (3) "P" authorizes driving vehicles carrying passengers.
- (4) "N" authorizes driving tank vehicles.
- (5) "X" combinations of tank vehicles and hazardous material vehicles.
- (6) "S" authorizes driving a schoolbus.

Other restrictions may be placed upon a commercial driver's license, as provided in section 39-06-17. The applicant shall pay a fee of three dollars for each endorsement.

3. 4. Applicant record check. Before issuing a commercial driver's license, the director shall obtain driving record information through the commercial driver's license information system, the national driver's register, and from each state in which the person has been licensed.

Chairman Lee opened the hearing on HB 1438 relating to a non resident commercial driver's license; relating to an application for a nonresident commercial driver's license.

Representative Dennis Johnson introduced the bill and an emergency amendment to the bill. He said the bill deals with applications for nonresident commercial driver's license and the concern is the commercial drivers that come in from foreign countries particularly for the custom harvest crews. When these foreign drivers come over, there is a time crunch to get license that are legal and to get them to Texas or Oklahoma to start harvesting. The process in the past is that we need their social security number before they can get a driver's license. This causes delays and problems. What he tried to do with this bill is get a temporary driver's license without a social security number. The other part of the bill they wanted to change is at the end of the season they can turn their driver's license in and next summer when they come over if they are within one year they can get the CDL reissued to them without going through the whole testing process. The emergency clause is so we could utilize this provision this coming spring for the workers coming over.

Senator Nodland asked if this was mainly relates to custom combiners going out of state.

Rep. Johnson said that is what he is most familiar with. It seems it is the ones that come over for the harvest that are in the time crunch.

Senator Nodland asked why they didn't get a CDL like everyone else.

Rep. Johnson said these are the work force that come from South Africa, Australia, and New Zeeland, Denmark etc. to help with the harvest. They have to do their license in the base state where they come to be employed. He said these folks have to have the same CDL to operate on the roads driving these trucks. It is a time issue.

Senator Lee asked if there could be others moved into this group other than the combine groups.

Rep. Johnson said he really wouldn't know if there would be any other groups but maybe the Department of Transportation could answer that. I am just familiar with the custom harvesters.

Senator Lee said it would be non Canadian and non Mexican because he thought they had a

Rep. Johnson said the Department of Transportation would be able to answer that too.

Senator Nething asked why a custom combiner would need this kind of license.

Rep. Johnson gave the history on CDL license.

reciprocal agreement.

Linda Butts, Deputy Director for Driver and Vehicle Services at the ND Department of Transportation testified in support of Engrossed HB 1438 with amendments. Written testimony #2.

Senator Nodland asked if they would have this CDL and if they went from custom harvesting to the oil field will that CDL work for that.

Linda answered yes, they would have the same competency requirements, same testing, same vision, and road tests, everything required for a regular CDL. The differences are that

they don't need their social security number to give the license to them and they will someday leave this country and the license will expire.

Senator Nething when the license is issued is there a time of its effectiveness.

Syndi Worrel, ND Department of Transportation explained the non-resident CDL (15:43). She said when they apply for this they will have to have proof of name and date of birth, the documents required are their immigration papers. They cannot have a license for longer than they can be in this country. The non-resident CDL would not be restricted to just custom harvest purposes only it is a CDL.

Senator Lee asked if they don't have a SS number in the system how the Department of Transportation references them.

Syndi we obtain a group of pseudo SS numbers from American Association of Motor Vehicle

Administrators, so applicants would have their specific number. That is the number that will be put in the system. SD issues a non-resident CDL and they also work through the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators for the list of numbers.

Senator Nodland asked if other states were doing this.

Syndi replied that Kansas and SD are doing it and ND would be the third. It is patterned somewhat after them but this bill makes it even more efficient and user friendly by not requiring the SS number. Federal legislation exempts the SS requirement all together and that is how this bill is patterned.

Senator Potter thought the FN was high.

Chairman Holmberg called the committee hearing to order on HB 1438 relating to a nonresident commercial driver's license (CDL).

Rep. Dennis Johnson, District 15

This bill was introduced to address the custom harvesters with non-resident help here in the summer time. We need a Social Security Number and more for the folks to apply for a CDL license. We went through the committee as far as policy, and it all came together. The timeline is really why we need the bill because these folks come over in the spring to start harvesting. We're really pushed on time to get their license and start working. We're looking at maybe one hundred applicants at \$5/person and that generates \$2000. The people at the Department of Transportation felt that they needed \$6000 to implement the program and provide the services. That's the fiscal note. This is an excellent tool for the guys that need licenses.

Chairman Holmberg: Is there any requirement in this bill that these folks are legal residents of the United States, or here legally because if I was someone who snuck across the border, I would be a resident of a foreign jurisdiction, which could be Mexico or Guatemala, and then they would issue them that license?

Rep. Johnson: This is addressed in the policy. They have to have their Visa, their work

permit and all proper documentation. When they go back home at the end of the season in

the United States, they turn in that CDL that they acquired here and it all times out with the

court permits for being here. When they come back the following year, they can get that

license back again, because it's on file, without going through the testing procedure again and

taking up DOT's time, the harvester's time and their time.

Chairman Holmberg: This 49 CFR in the bill, is this a federal regulation?

Rep. Johnson: I believe it is.

Kent Braathen, Board of Directors Member, US Custom Harvesters

We are an organization of about 300 custom harvesters across the United States and are made up of silage harvesters, combine, and small grain harvesters. My past experience with

the social security number issue with this driver's license; we try to get the health care and

South Africa is where we get our help from. They go through the consulate in South Africa and

have their passports and work visas in order. Everyone is legal. It takes 3-4 weeks to get the

Social Security number. The way the driver's license works now is that you need to have that

number in hand before you can start the testing process. But those 3-4 weeks gets us out to

where we need to be in Texas harvesting. Sometimes we have to leave them behind because

they haven't been able to get their license in time and that leaves us short of help to start the

season. It's more expense to get back down to Texas. This change would simplify the

process. They still need to get their Social Security number to be in the country in order for us

to issue their 1099s to them. This would help the beekeepers and farmers who use the H2A

visas. It's not just the custom harvesters alone.

Senator Fischer: Is the H2A visa specific to South Africa?

Kent Braathen: Yes, that's an agricultural visa.

Kent Braathen: Yes. South Dakota has already eliminated the Social Security number for the

license, and also Nebraska, Kansas and Texas.

Tom Balzer, North Dakota Motor Carriers Association

Testified in favor of HB 1438. No written testimony.

The Association doesn't have a problem with the bill. The folks from South Africa have the

exact same requirements as the Motor Carriers do; drug testing, random drug testing,

background checks.

Linda Butts, Deputy Director of Driver and Vehicle Services, North Dakota Department

of Transportation - testified in favor of HB1438. Written attached testimony # 1.

The department is in support of this bill and has been working with Rep. Johnson to draft this

piece of legislation so that it would be in compliance with the federal rules and regulations.

This bill will allow or enable North Dakota to enact something that the federal government has

already authorized and is allowing states to do. We will probably be the third, fourth or fifth

state that will allow this. The testing and requirements would be the same for all CDL drivers.

There are only two major differences. These folks would not have to have a social security

number for the license, and then when they leave the country, we would take back the North

Dakota license, probably shred it, and if they come back within one year, they don't have to be

retested. We can simply give them their license once again and they can become productive

employees.

Senator Krauter: Are you ready for a motion?

Chairman Holmberg: Even though the folks from Grand Forks are not from my district, we will

take a motion.

HB 1438

Good afternoon, Mr. Chairman and members of the committee. I'm Linda Butts, Deputy Director for Driver and Vehicle Services at the North Dakota Department of Transportation. Thank you for giving me the opportunity to present information to you today.

The North Dakota Department of Transportation supports this bill. The federal commercial driver's license regulations permit states to issue non-resident commercial driver's licenses to individuals domiciled in a foreign country. These are individuals who reside temporarily in North Dakota on immigration work visas, generally in the custom harvesting or agricultural business. This federal regulation, if adopted by a state, allows the issuance of this particular license without requiring a social security number. The federal regulations allow this to accommodate drivers from foreign jurisdictions who do not have a social security number.

As with all applicants, documentation to prove name and date of birth is required and the knowledge, vision, and road tests must be passed. Documentation in this case consists of the foreign passport and appropriate immigration document. The difference in the application and issuance process for a non-resident commercial driver's license is the social security number requirement and length of validity. It is valid only during the period of time of the applicant's authorized stay in the United States. The front of the license must also state "Non-resident Commercial Driver's License".

We have worked with Rep. Johnson on these amendments so that we can the issue a nonresident commercial driver's license and yet stay in compliance with the federal commercial driver's license regulations.

North Dakota Department of Transportation supports this bill with amendments.

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
