Rep. Lisa Wolf, District 3, Minot, appeared and introduced HB 1463. It creates a North Dakota Youth Council. Some of the things they would do is look at outmigration, our educational system, college, employment opportunities and quality of life issues within our state. There is a fiscal note of \$83,600.

Rep. John Wall: How often would they meet per year?

Rep. Wolf: Four times a year.

Senator Tom Seymour, District 5, Minot, appeared in support of the bill. It is a topic that has been around but we need to bring it out and put it a little bit higher on the radar screen so we can continue to do this and continue to look for remedies in the topics discussed.

Rep. Lee Myxter appeared. He imagined some wondered why we need another council. It appears to him that there is one important group that is not given a place by a council or commission and that is our young people. He realized from many years of teaching just like adults, the majority of students don't know or care about politics or lawmaking unless it affects them. He also coached student congress and debate. He found those students are thoughtful, intelligent young people that have good ideas to contribute to society. As a member of the interim workforce committee, they had many meetings discussing how to prevent these young people from leaving our state. One of the most successful meetings took

place at Jamestown College in which college and high school students were invited to meet with them and convey to them their thoughts and concerns. This council could be one step in allowing North Dakota young people to express themselves and maybe some changes could come about that would allow them to stay.

There was no opposition.

The hearing was closed.

Rep. David Rust wondered about getting students together with student councils and student congress.

Rep. Lee Myxter: Student councils, close up, and so on do meet. Is there input into the legislative body? Does anything come out of that to come to us?

Rep. David Rust: Basically the major focus of close up is the legislative process. This organization would be more closely tied to the legislative thing than student council. I can't imagine you couldn't get some of these types of organizations together to talk about these issues. There must be similar type organizations as well on the college level.

Rep. Lee Myxter: I am sure there are. I am not sure how well organized they are.

Most of them are concerned with national concerns or problems.

Rep. Mike Schatz: There is a North Dakota close up too.

Chairman Kelsch: A lot of Class B schools attend that. Dr. Sanstead was asked if Class A schools participate. He responded that there are Class A schools involved but the activity level of Class B schools is greater.

Rep. David Rust mentioned that Rick Heidt within the Council of Educational Leaders has close up as part of his portfolio.

Rep. Bob Hunskor: The focus of close up is education of the young people more than potential legislation that could be good or bad for North Dakota. There is a little difference between close up and this. How many legislative issues are brought forth from close up? Kids get educated, they learn about government, they participate in the government process at their level, but do they really focus on what this would focus on?

Rep. Mike Schatz stated that in light of having the North Dakota close up, he thinks we are kind of duplicating something here. Rep. Mike Schatz moved a Do Not Pass. Rep. Brenda Heller seconded the motion.

Rep. Lee Myxter disagreed on this. This is a different approach. We talk about keeping young people in North Dakota. This is one easy attempt to try.

Rep. Jerry Kelsh: I am not going to support the motion. Maybe we could do with half the money and half the number of meetings. Involve the young people somehow. There is some merit to this bill.

Rep. Corey Mock: I concur with that last approach. I find it strange that we require face to face meetings many times when conference calls can more than suffice the requirements.

North Dakota close up and other programs such as student congress, debate, and speech are great programs but are geared toward education. This is geared toward problem solving. I think if this motion fails, our committee can look at it and possibly reduce the appropriation and make it so that it is two meetings a year. Then rely on avenues such as conference calls and listers considering the audience. I am going to vote against the motion and encourage the committee to reduce the appropriation and make this youth council work.

Rep. David Rust: I found it interesting that there was no testimony other than the sponsors.

Is there support out there for it?

Rep. Lyle Hanson: Last week we received a printout of schools that have close up. There

were a dozen or so. That might be a dead issue too.

Rep. Phillip Mueller: I think the points made about close up and the other organizations are

well taken. I don't think they necessarily lead to state policy. The part we haven't talked about

is up to 25 years of age. That age group has something to say to state policymakers about

what it is that may keep them here, what they want in terms of employment, entertainment,

and the culture thing. To dismiss it on hand is a mistake.

Rep. Mike Schatz withdrew his motion for a Do Not Pass. Rep. Brenda Heller seconded it

to withdraw the Do Not Pass.

Chairman Kelsch: Rep. John Wall and I served on the interim higher ed. committee and also

serve on round table. At round table discussions, we have young people that are represented

from each of the campuses. We had the student body representative that is on the board of

higher ed. They were very articulate and very well informed young individuals. I have issues

with 16-year olds and up to 25-year olds, who actually have different agendas. The makeup

kind of makes me a little bit curious. I see it as another duplication.

Rep. Dennis Johnson made a motion for a Do Not Pass. Rep. Karen Karls seconded the

motion.

Rep. Lee Myxter: This is pretty much patterned after one that has been working in Colorado.

Rep. Bob Hunskor: Do we have any youth groups in North Dakota that function to promote

what it says at the bottom of page 2?

Vice Chair Lisa Meier: I think student government on college campuses work with individuals

to develop policy to bring forward as recommendations.

Rep. Dennis Johnson: State FFA is another avenue.

Vice Chair Lisa Meier mentioned a bill that was similar last session that was passed.

Rep. John Wall: Having taught high school age kids many years, I find they do have great ideas. I think their voices for the most part do go unheard. That is bothersome. There are some problems with the bill I do have. One of the positive things I see about the youth council would be getting young people who are very interested in politics. They want to know what is going on and how the system works. We will all need to be replaced someday so this might be a great investment in the future.

Rep. Jerry Kelsh: A lot of those 16-year olds have some pretty definite ideas. Just about every county has ITV that could be set up. Even if their parents did have to come with one or two of them, they may be honored that their youngster was involved with this. We need that diversity in thought on what public policy should be in the future.

Rep. Lee Myxter: We put the part in about the parent being there because we didn't want the committee worrying about the 16-year olds running around in motels.

Rep. Corey Mock: This is a piece of legislation that can be worked with perhaps even in a subcommittee.

DO NOT PASS FAILS, 7-7. A subcommittee was formed of Rep. Karen Karls, Rep. Mike Schatz, and Rep. Jerry Kelsh. The subcommittee was to be ready with some type of amendment by February 11, 2009.

This is for a videoconference--they charge \$25 per event, \$50 for recurring events, \$3.50 per phone line per hour. They estimated if we chose the first alternative it would be a committee meeting would cost \$82. If we chose the cheaper alternative we could get the costs way down. Our amendments do. . .

Chairman Kelsch: So you are changing the age from 16 to 17, and your are meeting twice instead of four times and they would be able to do it by videoconference and to provide reports by September 2010.

Representative Karls: Then the Legislative Counsel would decide which interim committee that information would go to.

Chairman Kelsch: You are just enacting 3 new sections instead of 5 new sections.

Chairman Freborg opened the hearing on HB 1463. All members were present.

Representative Lisa Wolf introduced the bill. It provides for the creation of a North Dakota Youth Council with 4 youth per quadrant of the state for a total of 16. They would apply for the positions and would be appointed by the Governor. There would be one member appointed by the minority and majority leaders of the House and Senate and the Lt. Governor would act as chair. The original bill called for them to meet in person but it had a fiscal note of \$80,000. The engrossed bill calls for the meetings to be conducted via ITV or IVN so there is no fiscal note. She would like to see a wide range of socio-economic groups represented. It would be an opportunity for youth to give their opinions on our educational programs, higher education, job prospects, out migration, health care, entertainment and other issues important to our youth. The group would report at the next legislative session. Senator Flakoll asked what the executive order is that is referred to on page 2, lines 2 and 3. Representative Wolf said that is the order that separates the state into four quadrants.

Senator Taylor asked if the work can be accomplished by meeting via conference or if face to face

Repesentative Wolf said she thinks face to face meetings would be much better. She would even prefer if their first meeting could be face to face. She wants the bill to pass, though, and in the House, she was told it would not pass with the fiscal note.

Senator Flakoll asked if there was any discussion on the House side about giving them spending authority in case they would get a grant to pay for a face to face meeting.

Representative Wolf said she did not hear any discussion of it.

Senator Bakke asked who would be the overseeing agency? Who would prepare the minutes, draft any necessary legislation?

Representative Wolf said it is not specified, she would see Legislative Council overseeing the group.

Senator Bakke said she would encourage some of the young people in the room to testify.

Nick Larson, a high school student from Underwood, testified in favor of the bill. Many young people leave the state and return when they are 30 and are lower key. This might help keep people in the state.

Senator Flakoll asked if he thinks his voice is heard as much as that of a 45 year old.

Nick Larson said no.

Senator Freborg asked if he would like to serve on such a council.

Nick Larson said yes.

James Hirsch, Director, Workforce Development Division, Department of Commerce submitted written testimony in favor of the bill which is attached.

Chairman Freborg closed the hearing on HB 1463.

Senator Flakoll said he would like time to do some research and compare some prior legislation. He may want to have an amendment drafted. The fiscal note is zero now and it would not be his intent to change that.

Senator Bakke asked if he wants to add one face to face meeting.

Senator Flakoll said he trusts and believes in the earlier comment about death by fiscal note. He is considering giving them spending authority in the case of a grant or donation for one face to face meeting. It would help the process and a face to face meeting would be a better situation.

Senator Bakke said in working with kids as much as she has, they can be hesitant to speak in large groups. Perhaps a regional meeting twice a year would help them speak up. It would build confidence and give them a voice. She will visit with Senator Flakoll.

Chairman Freborg closed the discussion on HB 1463.

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee, my name is James Hirsch, Director of the Workforce Development Division with the North Dakota Department of Commerce.

For clarification, I want you to be aware that there is a North Dakota Youth Development Council established as a Standing Committee of the North Dakota Workforce Development Council.

The North Dakota Youth Development Council is a requirement under the Workforce Investment Act of 1998.

I have attached a side-by-side comparison of the role of the North Dakota Youth Development Council and what I understand to be the role of the State Youth Council.

The scope of work identified for the State Youth Council and the North Dakota Workforce Development Council are distinctly different.

The proposed State Youth Council <u>does not</u> duplicate the role of the North Dakota Youth Development Council (NDYDC). Findings of the

State Youth Council related to perceptions of careers available, services to disadvantaged youth and services to at-risk youth would be of interest to the North Dakota Youth Development Council.

The mission and purpose of the Council's are distinctly different. The proposed State Youth Council <u>does not</u> duplicate the role of the North Dakota Youth Development Council (NDYDC). The NDYDC would have an interested in findings of the State Youth Council specifically as it pertains to perceptions of careers available in North Dakota, perception of services to disadvantaged and at risk youth to assist them with graduation and transition to postsecondary or careers.

The strength of the proposed State Youth Council is that a majority of its membership is youth ages 16-24, membership from North Dakota's Legislature, and being chaired by the Lieutenant Governor.
