Minutes:

Chairman DeKrey: We will open the hearing on HB 1538.

**Rep. William Kretschmar:** Sponsor, support. In the 1999 session, the legislature passed the proposed constitutional amendment to allow the legislative assembly to determine how vacancies in the legislative assembly were filled. That was constitutional resolution and it was approved in the June election of 2000. So in 2001 session, the current law was met by the legislative assembly which allowed in certain instances for the appointment of legislators by the district political committees and their respective parties. I just don't think that is a good system. We've had it now for quite a few years. HB 1538 would change that system to allow the appointment of a legislator if the vacancy occurred during the legislative session. If the vacancy, under the bill, occurred during the time the legislature was not in regular session, then it would be up to the Governor to call a special election if he so desired, or if there is another regular session before the termination of that vacancy, the term of the person who created the vacancy, the Governor would have to call a special election to fill the vacancy so that there would be a legislator in place for the next regular session. It wouldn't have to be for the Senate, because now everyone has a four year term. So this would occur with every vacancy. The Governor could still call a special election if he so desired, even if there wasn't a

session. Basically it gets the system back to electing legislators. LC has prepared a list of all of the vacancies since 1980. There have been a number of vacancies that have occurred under the current system, whereby a person who was appointed as a legislator, and never survived an election. They never served one day in a session of the legislature. This is not a good system. Further, I have suspicions that some may be using this as a way to enhance the political fortunes of some. I think we should go back to a system of electing members of the legislative assembly. We can do that each two years in elections, and we should do that with the majority of vacancies. As I have served in this legislative assembly, there have only been two vacancies that occurred during session due to death (?). I would like to see this passed by our committee, the House.

Chairman DeKrey: Will this affect any Democrats that might go to the Obama administration.

Would this bill affect them?

Rep. Kretschmar: Yes, if this does become law would not affect them until the 1st of August.

Chairman DeKrey: Would you recommend an emergency clause.

Rep. Zaiser: The way the bill is written, is this the way it was prior to 2000, when it was put into language where the leadership decided.

Rep. Kretschmar: Yes, before the year 2000, if a vacancy occurred in the legislative assembly it would be filled by a special election or at a general election.

Rep. Koppelman: In the handout, it doesn't seem to square with what you said about people that have been appointed to fill vacancies by the party but not survived the subsequent election.

Rep. Kretschmar: There have been some that survived; the special election coincided with a general election.

**Rep. Koppelman:** Would you revisit your point when you talked about the Governor appointing under your bill and you said he/she would have some latitude on whether to call for the election; whether or not to call for a special election, why would you leave that open. Why not just have it prescribed that if a special election is called for.

**Rep. Kretschmar:** Say a vacancy occurred in February or March, there wouldn't be a need to call for a special election.

**Rep. Koppelman:** So the latitude the Governor would have is the timing or whether or not to call for a special election first.

**Rep. Kretschmar:** If there is going to be another legislative session when they start a term, then he can call for a special election.

Rep. Koppelman: If not.

**Rep. Kretschmar:** Then you can wait and have the election normally.

Rep. Koppelman: Why would you leave that open, why not just say to have the election?

Rep. Kretschmar: Okay.

Chairman DeKrey: Thank you. Further testimony in support.

Al Jaeger, Secretary of State: Neutral. We always want to make sure that when a special election is called, that the county has it tied in with other elections. I haven't figured out yet if there is a concern. We are always concerned in our office about how these are going to coincide.

**Rep. Kretschmar:** As far as I know, I hope that's the way it is in the bill, if the Governor were to call a special election, unless it coincided with a general election that the normal laws that call for a special election would still be in place, for the deadlines, etc.

**Rep. Klemin:** One of the things that is deleted on page 1, is the 828 day provision. I think I was on GVA committee when this came through the first time, can you remind us why it's 828 days.

Al Jaeger: That date was picked because it coincided with the final deadline of an election. It had to be so many days ahead of time that the vacancy occurred; after that, there wasn't enough time to hold an election before the session started. That was the reason, so that as Rep. Kretschmar said, if a vacancy occurred during the session, what happens is you have a pre-session and the election is November 4<sup>th</sup> and all of a sudden you have a vacancy on November 5. All the timelines set up to have an election would end up being held in the middle of the session. So the 828 was to make sure that that type of situation did not happen, so that an election would be held so that the person that would be filling that vacancy would take their place at crossover time. That's the background.

Chairman DeKrey: Thank you. Further testimony on HB 1538. We will close the hearing.
