Pat Seaworth, Council for Higher Education, testified in favor of SB 2082, which changed the eligibility of residency for college admissions. Any veteran applying for college admission would be granted "resident" status and subsequently "resident tuition". (See attachment #1)

Senator Flakoll asked to clarify if the recipients would have to be veterans of U.S. Military, and not specifically "on our side" in said war.

"Tory Schucharo

Pat Seaworth clarified through another specific section in the Century Code to clarify "veteran" means veteran of the United States Military.

Chairman Freborg recommended DO PASS on SB 2082, 5-0.

Pat Seaworth, General Counsel, North Dakota University System, appeared in support.

(See Attachment 1.)

Rep. Lyle Hanson: You just mentioned tuition. How about fees? Sometimes the fees are

pretty high too.

Pat Seaworth: Generally the fees are the same across the board. Residents and

nonresidents alike pay the same fees.

Rep. Jerry Kelsh: On page 2, Line 2, regarding the part about removing spouse, I am

assuming he could still be alive and his spouse would not then be eligible. If he died, he would

be widowed. If he was a prisoner of war, he could still be alive or even declared missing in

action, he could still be alive. I was just wondering if we remove all doesn't it take away some

of the benefits that she would have had under those three circumstances?

Pat Seaworth: The only reason for striking the word spouse on page 2 in Line 3 is that it

would become redundant with the change on page 1. The spouse of the veteran is also

eligible.

Rep. Bob Hunskor: You indicated that many other states are contemplating this type of thing.

You have any idea on numbers?

Pat Seaworth: No I don't have a number or list. When I drafted this I noticed several. Texas comes to mind. The Texas Board of Regents is just considering a couple of months ago considering something. I noticed there were news articles on several other states that I noticed during my research.

Rep. Bob Hunskor: Bordering states—Minnesota, Montana, South Dakota?

Pat Seaworth: I don't know. This will not affect residents of Minnesota because we have a reciprocity agreement with Minnesota and that agreement says that Minnesota residents pay this tuition rate which is slightly more than the North Dakota resident rate because it is based on tuition at Minnesota institutions. Minnesota residents attending North Dakota institutions pay the Minnesota tuition rate at Minnesota institutions and vice versa. The Minnesota residents comprise the largest percentage of our nonresident students.

Chairman Kelsch: Pam can look and see if South Dakota or Montana have done anything.

Although South Dakota, this is their budget section year so they may not have dealt with any policy issues like this.

Pat Seaworth: The impetus for this was the new GI Bill because of the enhanced benefits and capping the benefit at the resident tuition rate so consisting with that a number of system institutions thought it may sense to make veterans eligible for resident tuition rates at those institutions.

There was no opposition.

Chairman Kelsch: By way of information, there was somewhat of an anomaly with this type of legislation with our definition that we have in code regarding who is an eligible veteran. Ron Otto will explain further. We have a situation where we have a widow and young family that moved into the state of North Dakota. They have lived here for quite some time, established residency here, and her children are now college age and are not eligible to receive the tuition

waivers. Normally, if her husband would have been a resident here or would have died here, their family would have been eligible. I am drafting an amendment that obviously would have to come before this committee. It is germane to this piece of legislation and we will look at it. I am going to have Ron come up and explain it to you a little bit. It is my understanding that he did talk to the board of higher ed. and the board of higher ed. is fine with it. We want to establish that the widow has lived in the state and establish residency for at least five years which is a little bit more than some of these other tasks which are three years.

Ron Otto, Morton and Oliver County Veteran Service Officer, appeared. There was a lady who lost her husband. She lived in an area of a state that was not conducive to raising a family. She did some research and found our area here was one of the best areas in the country to raise children. She had two very young daughters. She has lived here for just about 14 years, bought a home, pays taxes, and when it came time to send her children to college, she came to the office and discussed tuition waiver with me knowing full well that children in receipt of Chapter 35 benefits which is the survivors' benefits for education through the VA. Chapter 35 is a benefit for surviving dependents when a veteran has passed away or died of a service connected disability or was killed in service. We found out that her children were not eligible for the tuition waiver because the veteran died in another state and there is no way through the laws we have in place right now that we can find an avenue with which to make her children eligible. We thought this would be a good companion bill. I don't want to take away from 2082. The GI Bill has been pretty stagnant for a lot of years. With the new GI Bill coming down the pike, they are finally trying to do some catch up from action in World War II days and give the benefits that the World War II veterans had coming out where they could go to any institution in the United States. If she sent her children to the state where her husband died, her children would get the tuition waivers. The coordinating council who is the

consolidation of the people in the veterans' group that has the responsibility for putting this stuff together, voted on this issue, said yes we want to do this, and basically something happened along the way. It was forgotten about and was not introduced so now we are at this particular point in time where we have to find a vehicle and get this through for this particular family. It is not going to be the only time. This will happen particularly with the wars we have going on now. We have to take care of those people and make this an attractable place to come and raise their children

Vice Chair Lisa Meier: How long ago had this individual come in to visit with you about this situation?

Ron Otto: Right after the last session.

Vice Chair Lisa Meier: Her daughter has been in college for a couple of years?

**Ron Otto**: Her first daughter I believe is either a junior or senior in college. The way she heard about it, quite frankly, was the stepchild provision that we put into tuition waiver. That hit the paper. That was what peaked her curiosity.

**Rep. Phillip Mueller**: We are talking about in state tuition versus tuition waivers. I am not getting connection here.

Chairman Kelsch: I did run it by Anita. I asked her if it was germane to any of the higher ed. bills right now in committee. She said this would be the bill that would be germane because it does deal with veterans' benefits and it does deal with definitions of veteran 3701 and it does deal with resident and nonresident tuition. She felt as though the germaneness was there but this would be the only bill that we had.

Pat Seaworth: I just wanted to confirm that Mr. Otto did call me a year or so ago. He explained what the situation was, and I said I can't imagine that we would have any reason to oppose that. I would certainly recommend that the board of the university system support that

bill. As you heard, it didn't get it done. Then he did come up and see me yesterday. I said again speaking for myself, I certainly don't have any reason to oppose this. I have not discussed it with the board or the chancellor. Whether you want to attach it to this particular bill or some other one, that is your decision. We could adapt.

Rep. Phillip Mueller: How do the waivers work?

Pat Seaworth: For these waivers, there is a waiver by statue that says dependent children of veterans killed in action or died of service related conditions or who were POWs, those children are eligible for full tuition and fee waivers at university system institutions. If they enroll at one of our institutions, it is tuition and fee free except for limited fees such as aviation or flight fees that they do have to pay. There is no appropriation for that so for those students who are eligible for that entitlement, the institutions just absorb the cost. It is not a large number. I think it is somewhere between 12 and 20 students maybe system wide each year.

Chairman Kelsch: It is meant that they had to have died. It is not currently serving that they receive the waiver. They are POW or ...

Pat Seaworth: Killed in action, disabled, service related disability or died from a service related disability or a former POW. It doesn't necessarily have to be a veteran who has died. Children of a disabled veteran are eligible for the tuition and fee waiver.

The hearing was closed.

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO SENATE BILL NO. 2082

In lieu of the amendments adopted by the House as printed on pages 891 and 892 of the House Journal, Senate Bill No. 2082 is amended as follows:

Page 1, line 1, replace "section" with "sections 15-10-18.2 and"

Page 1, line 2, remove "eligibility of veterans for resident" and after "tuition" insert "and tuition waivers for veterans and their dependents"

Page 1, after line 3, insert:

"SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 15-10-18.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

#### 15-10-18.2. Definitions.

- "Dependent" for purposes of section 15-10-18.3 means:
  - a. A child, stepchild, spouse, widow, or widower of a resident veteran, as "veteran" is defined in section 37-01-40, who was killed in action or died from wounds or other service-connected causes, was totally disabled as a result of service-connected causes, died from service-connected disabilities, was a prisoner of war, or was declared missing in action; or
  - b. A child or a stepchild of a veteran, as defined in section 37-01-40, who was killed in action or died from wounds or other service-connected causes, was totally disabled as a result of service-connected causes, died from service-connected disabilities, was a prisoner of war, or was declared missing in action, provided the child's other parent has been a resident of this state and was a resident of this state at the time of death or determination of total disability of the veteran; or
  - c. A child or a stepchild of a veteran, as defined in section 37-01-40, who was killed in action or died from wounds or other service-connected causes, was totally disabled as a result of service-connected causes, died from service-connected disabilities, was a prisoner of war, or was declared missing in action, provided the child's other parent establishes residency in this state and maintains that residency for a period of five years immediately preceding the child's or stepchild's enrollment at an institution under the control of the state board of higher education.
- 2. "Resident veteran" means a veteran who:
  - a. Was born in and lived in this state until entrance into the armed forces of the United States;
  - b. Was born in, but was temporarily living outside this state, not having abandoned residence therein prior to entrance into the armed forces of the United States;

- c. Was born elsewhere but had resided within this state for at least six months prior to entrance into military service and had prior to or during such six-month period:
  - (1) Registered for voting, or voted in this state;
  - (2) Being an unemancipated minor during such period of residence, had lived with a parent or person standing in loco parentis who had acquired a residence as set forth in this section; or
  - (3) If not registered for voting in this state, not registered for voting in another state; or
- d. Has been a resident of this state for the ten years prior to the request for tuition waiver."

SB 2082: Education Committee (Rep. R. Kelsch, Chairman) recommends AMENDMENTS
AS FOLLOWS and when so amended, recommends DO PASS (14 YEAS, 0 NAYS,
0 ABSENT AND NOT VOTING). SB 2082 was placed on the Sixth order on the
calendar.

In lieu of the amendments adopted by the House as printed on pages 891 and 892 of the House Journal, Senate Bill No. 2082 is amended as follows:

Page 1, line 1, replace "section" with "sections 15-10-18.2 and"

Page 1, line 2, remove "eligibility of veterans for resident" and after "tuition" insert "and tuition waivers for veterans and their dependents"

Page 1, after line 3, insert:

"SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 15-10-18.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

#### 15-10-18.2. Definitions.

- 1. "Dependent" for purposes of section 15-10-18.3 means:
  - a. A child, stepchild, spouse, widow, or widower of a resident veteran, as "veteran" is defined in section 37-01-40, who was killed in action or died from wounds or other service-connected causes, was totally disabled as a result of service-connected causes, died from service-connected disabilities, was a prisoner of war, or was declared missing in action; er
  - b. A child or a stepchild of a veteran, as defined in section 37-01-40, who was killed in action or died from wounds or other service-connected causes, was totally disabled as a result of service-connected causes, died from service-connected disabilities, was a prisoner of war, or was declared missing in action, provided the child's other parent has been a resident of this state and was a resident of this state at the time of death or determination of total disability of the veteran; or
  - A child or a stepchild of a veteran, as defined in section 37-01-40, who was killed in action or died from wounds or other service-connected causes, was totally disabled as a result of service-connected causes, died from service-connected disabilities, was a prisoner of war, or was declared missing in action, provided the child's other parent establishes residency in this state and maintains that residency for a period of five years immediately preceding the child's or stepchild's enrollment at an institution under the control of the state board of higher education.
- 2. "Resident veteran" means a veteran who:
  - a. Was born in and lived in this state until entrance into the armed forces of the United States;
  - b. Was born in, but was temporarily living outside this state, not having abandoned residence therein prior to entrance into the armed forces of the United States;

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- c. Was born elsewhere but had resided within this state for at least six months prior to entrance into military service and had prior to or during such six-month period:
  - (1) Registered for voting, or voted in this state;
  - (2) Being an unemancipated minor during such period of residence, had lived with a parent or person standing in loco parentis who had acquired a residence as set forth in this section; or
  - (3) If not registered for voting in this state, not registered for voting in another state; or
- d. Has been a resident of this state for the ten years prior to the request for tuition waiver."

# **Senate Education Committee Testimony on SB 2082**

Chairman Freborg and members of the Senate Education Committee:

SB 2082, introduced at the request of the State Board of Higher Education, amends North Dakota Century Code section 15-10-19.1 by adding all veterans to the list of those who qualify as residents for tuition purposes at North Dakota University System institutions. With this amendment, anyone who served on continuous active military duty for 24 months (or the full period for which the person was ordered to active duty, if less than 24 months) and who was discharged under other than dishonorable conditions, would qualify for resident tuition rates, regardless of legal residency.

This legislation recognizes veterans for their service and may encourage veterans from other states considering higher education options to include NDUS institutions in their considerations. It is a logical response to the Post-9/11 Veterans Education Assistance Act of 2008 (the "New GI Bill"). That act provides expanded educational benefits, including payment of full tuition, not to exceed the most expensive state institution resident tuition rate. A number of state higher education systems and institutions in other states have taken or are considering similar action.

Although it is difficult to calculate a good estimate of fiscal impact, we believe the impact will be small. Veteran's status is not a required field on admissions applications and we don't have solid data on numbers of veterans now enrolled. Students can disclose this status voluntarily and based on self-disclosures, we know that at least 1,600 current students are veterans, of whom more than 1,000 are North Dakota residents. Many of the other veterans are residents of Minnesota or other states in the region with tuition rates established under a reciprocity agreement or regional educational compact.
