Good morning, Madam Chair and members of the Senate Human Services Committee. My name is Barb Schweitzer, and I am the director of Newborn Screening for the North Dakota Department of Health. I am here to support Senate Concurrent Resolution 4014, which would recognize October 15 as Pregnancy and Infant Loss Remembrance Day.

Every year in North Dakota, approximately 50 infants younger than the age of 1 die. The causes of these deaths include premature birth, low birth weight, birth defects, accidents and sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS). An average of seven infants die every year from SIDS. The North Dakota Department of Health, in compliance with Century Code 23-01-05, provides information to the surviving family of a child whose cause of death is suspected to have been from SIDS. Providing education and awareness to all North Dakotans is also an important component to our SIDS program.

No matter the cause of death, family members and friends will experience grief when a baby dies. Grief is very personnel and is the combination of sorrow, strong emotion and the resulting confusion that comes from losing someone important to you. From the educational resources and visits we provide to family members and other caregivers through our SIDS program, we know what a positive effect support and recognition can have on the healing process.

Every life, even the tiniest and shortest-lived, needs to be acknowledged and remembered. Declaring October 15 as Pregnancy and Infant Loss Remembrance day will ensure the recognition deserved for all babies who have died too soon, whether from early pregnancy loss or infant death.

Chairman Lee and Members of the Senate Human Services Committee:

My name is Burnie Kunz. I have been a chaplain at Medcenter One for 22 years and presently serve as Pastoral Care Coordinator for the department. I have been in ministry for 40 years, serving in parishes and institutions.

I am here to ask your support of Senate Concurrent Resolution 4014. This resolution will support North Dakota families to resolve their grief related to the loss of a pregnancy or infant.

I have dealt with many births and deaths over the years, however the death of an infant or child is one of the most painful occurrences life can bring for parents.

Grandparents experience a double grief one for their adult child and one for their deceased grandchild.

In 2002, Medcenter One looked at how we could better meet the needs of those who grieve the loss of an infant/child. As a result, the Garden of Peace with the Angel of Hope was dedicated on October 7, 2007. It was the 74th Angel of Hope in the nation. (Please note brochure.) Grand Forks and Fargo also have an Angel of Hope. Each year a burial/memorial service is held at the Garden of Peace in Fairview Cemetery on October 15, the national Pregnancy and Infant Loss Remembrance Day. We also have a Christmas Remembrance Service every December 6 where families put an ornament with their infant/child's name on a tree. This began with the remembrance of 34 infants/children in 2004. This last December, we remembered 93 babies with over 100 people in attendance.



This past Christmas, one parent called from Ohio to have her ornament sent to her. Another family had moved to Montana and had a friend place their three Christmas ornaments on the tree. A woman who had lost her 45 year old son this past summer placed a bulb on the tree for her "baby". People, who have lost infants or children 40-50 years ago, now find a way to acknowledge their grief.

Grief heals us. We've all experienced cuts to the skin, whether a minor paper cut, a gash suffered while chopping vegetables, or something even more serious. Observe the process: sudden, sharp pain, followed by blood flow. Then, the need to attend to the still-painful wound and await healing, fostered by proper follow-up care.

Loss and grief follow a parallel process on the emotional level. We feel the sharp pain of loss when a loved one dies. Our tears flow. Then we need to "tend to our wound," which is what the process of grieving is all about. The wound still hurts, at times sharply, but if we are patient and attentive, healing does come - slowly, organically, in the same way that a physical wound heals.

Grief, well attended, encourages our healing. This resolution is part of the healing process. I support this resolution for the sake of grieving parents, siblings, and other family members and friends living in North Dakota. I am here today to ask for your support.







My name is Misty Schafer. On April 13th 2007, my husband and were overcome with grief when our daughter, Kassidy Rayann was stillborn at 23 weeks and 5 days. She weighted 11 ounces and was 9 ½ inched long. The days following the birth of a child are suppose to be filled with joy and time spent getting to know your new addition, but not ours, they were filled with grief, confusion and funeral arrangements. It was the hardest time of our lives, but we made it through one day at a time and with the support of family, friends and strangers. We received cards and guest book signings from people who we did not even know, but had been thru the same thing and wanted us to know they were there for us if we needed them. You do not realize how many families suffer the loss of a child until it happens to you. I have found many moms like myself who after losing a child, have the urge to reach out and help someone else.

I spent a lot of time reading on the internet and that is where I ran across the website for October 15th, Pregnancy and Infant Loss Remembrance day. I found myself feeling a little better knowing that I was not alone and that there were those who had suffered such a loss that were reaching out to help others who are going thru the same thing.

I had this feeling that I needed to do something to help, although I did not know what that was, until one day I found myself in Chaplin Bernie Kunz's office at Medcenter

One, she is the contact for the Infant and Child Bereavement Program. From that moment I have been involved with the program and we are dedicated to continue to develop the program by creating local resources for those families who are grieving.

It has been almost two years since we lost our little girl, but everyday she is with me, and every time I hear that infant loss happens to another family, my heart breaks. Having October 15th recognized in North Dakota, would help to ease the grief of those families like mine. I urge the House Human Services Committee to support Senate Concurrent Resolution 4014.
