Sen. Wanzek, district 19, testified in favor of the bill.

Sen. Wanzek- We discussed this issue quite a bit this session with the bill that we had on it. I think that a lot of people are afraid to talk about sustainable agriculture. This is something that looking forward with population growth and demands and needs on our resources in producing food, it seems pretty obvious that it is always going to be an issue. We have a shrinking land mass per capita, we need to find more efficient ways, and there's many research studies done. In the last 50 years, population growth has almost tripled, but at the same time we have actually tripled the amount cereal grain production in the world not with more farmable acres but with new methods and technologies that have allowed us to be way more efficient and still be good stewards of other resources. I think that it is something that is going to be even more important in the next 50 years, I think that this is something worth making a statement about.

Woody Barth: What we are saying is that Congress took a stab yet those definitions aren't clearly in place under USDA's rules of sustainability.

Representative Kingsbury: Do you have a fear of regulations that might come forward? **Woody Barth:** Our concern is that all forms of agriculture are brought together when clearly defining sustainability.

Representative Uglem: I think the purpose of the resolution is to get the word to Washington that using modern technology and management is sustainable. Whereas a lot of people from larger cities think organic is sustainable. This would help define sustainable.

Woody Barth: I don't think there is agreement amongst anybody of what is sustainable. Understanding what the cost structures are and that the yields are greater too.

Representative Boe: You wouldn't support this as it is written. How would you write it to make you more comfortable?

Woody Barth: I think you alluded to the fact that these are some components. Modern technologies have increased production. Not enough research has been done. We need to bring all forms together. Which groups and which practices to define sustainable should be part of this resolution before it is forwarded on to the Secretary of Agriculture and our Congressional delegation.


