Senator Krauter: Written testimony in support of the bill.

Dave Kemnitz, President of the AFL-CIO: In support of the bill. We've seen erosion of the jobs; I am concerned and feel it is time to revisit the tax code. We need to talk about those industries that try to stay here and shop union made or at least American made. We protect our own first and we will build our economy.

Senator Andrist: I agree with the message of the bill. As I understand companies have moved overseas and the manufacturer and they don't have to pay any taxes until the product comes back into the United States?

Dave: What I call it is a false store front at constitutional avenue, the corporations that lobby are congress for tax breaks and incentives aren't based in the United States. They take all their protections or their assets or their ability to compete globally out of the market globally from our ability to assert over a global market. In our armies in our defense mechanisms, in our bases in foreign countries to protect and stabilize their markets. Then they don't pay any taxes or revenue to help us that global influence or stability, democracy and market probability. It's wrong.

The question is should we be creating an incentive through the tax code. I don't know exactly how the tax code works but if in fact we are creating an incentive for American companies to ship jobs overseas through the tax code we should not be doing it. We should do things that are in the best interest of the American public.

Danieta Wald, General Counsel for the State Tax Department: As far as North Dakota is concerned we are a worldwide combined reporting state. So from our perspective this doesn't impact what and how much income is being taxed. It's very complicated.

John Risch: John Risch with United Transportation Union. We just want to weigh in in support of the resolution. Bipartisan or non-bipartisan, we think it's a good idea. Certainly companies are going to continue to invest overseas in search of lower wages, but we shouldn't create an incentive by this through the tax code. I think it was explained well. If you leave your profits overseas, you're not taxed on them. You are only taxed when you bring it back into the United States. It actually creates an incentive to leave them overseas and do more investing overseas. I would urge the committee to recommend a do pass on the resolution. I think it's a good idea to try and keep as many jobs as we can in this country.

Senator Aaron Krauter Testimony in support of SCR 4022

Mr. Chair, members of the committee, I rise today in support of SCR 4022. This resolution tells Congress and the President of the United States that the people of North Dakota want them to repeal a misdirected tax subsidy that not only allows, but encourages American companies to move their manufacturing operations overseas. The US tax code contains provisions known as Sub Part F, which has been a part of US tax code since January 1, 2004, creates an unfair system. This provision allows an American company to shut down its manufacturing plant in the states, lay off hundreds or thousands of employees, start up overseas, then turn around and sell their goods to Americans and not pay any taxes on their profits. This is called a deferral. The company won't pay any taxes on any of those profits until the money comes back to the United States. This becomes even more problematic when the money is shifted and reshifted between offshore accounts; it becomes difficult to prove when the profits from selling to Americans are returned to America.

As the code is currently written, American taxpayers are essentially subsidizing and rewarding companies that fire American employees and move their operations offshore. Also, it places loyal American companies at a competitive disadvantage because they are required to pay taxes on their profits right away. Companies like Huffy Bikes and Radio Flyer little red wagons, that close their American operations, move offshore, pay these employees near slave wages, and then get a tax break, are the companies that are competing with loyal American companies. This competitive advantage can result in American companies being driven to a smaller share of the market and could lead to an eventual closing of another American factory. For those of you who think this is a small problem; it is estimated that fixing this problem in the tax code could save the American people \$15 Billion over the next decade.

Last year, 2.6 million jobs were eliminated in an effort to cut operating costs. According to the Department of Labor, 791,000 of those jobs were in the manufacturing sector. This has broad ranging impacts on the economy as a whole. With those factories shutting down the economy begins to spin out of

control affecting other shops that those former manufacturing employees can no longer support because they don't have a pay check. More than 4 million US manufacturing jobs have been lost since the end of 2000. In total there were 11.1 million jobs that were lost in 2008.

Many people in ND feel that we are isolated from the national economy because we are one of the few states that actually has a surplus. I would like to point out that the slaughter house in Harvey has been closed, the American Express call center in Linton has closed, Bobcat has extended its shutdown period another two weeks, not to mention that it is now owned by a company from South Korea. These are only a few examples of how the downturn in the national economy is spreading to North Dakota. North Dakota is competing in the same global market as the rest of the world and we aren't isolated. We need to stop rewarding companies that ship jobs overseas and reward companies that want to stay and grow in the United States.

Rather than accelerating the national downturn by shipping millions of American and North Dakotan jobs overseas, we should be looking at ways to keep American jobs in America and continue to grow the economy of North Dakota.

This resolution will tell Congress and the President that we, as North Dakotans, do not approve of these policies. Mr. Chair, members of the committee, I strongly urge your support of this resolution.

Mr. Chair, members of the committee, I rise today in support of SCR 4022.
