Explanation or reason for introduction of bill/resolution:

Powers and duties of the Aeronautics Commission and the distribution of aviation fuel tax revenue

Minutes:

Chairman Bette Grande opened the hearing on HB 1132.

Larry Taborsky, Director, North Dakota Aeronautics Commission, appeared. Attachment 1.

Chairman Bette Grande: When you mention not using space in the capitol due to the space limits, I am well aware. I was part of the interim study that discussed those types of space limits. Where are you located?

Larry Taborsky: We are down at the airport.

Chairman Bette Grande: What is the reason for an emergency clause?

Larry Taborsky: If we do nothing, then it is going to go back to the original version. The rule we are operating under now for the 57-43.3-06 is going to expire so Legislative Council directed to put the emergency portion in there.

Rep. Lonny Winrich: The change at the bottom of Page 1 and then on to Page 2, is there any regular reporting structure that is in current practice other than the annual report to the Governor that is mentioned in the next section?

Larry Taborsky: There are no reports at this time. We have a close working relationship with the Department of Transportation. Even the part written to the Governor is at our option. We wanted to leave that in there if there was a reason in the future to do so.

Rep. Gary Paur: This section at the bottom of Page 4 and top of Page 5, was that passed last biennium? If that was passed so recent, why is it being taken out now?

Larry Taborsky: The portion that is unbolded is what is happening now with the expiration due for June 30, 2011. If that expires, if it sunsets, then the part that is blue, bolded, and struck out will go back into effect.

Chairman Bette Grande: Sometimes when we pass legislation we will put in a date certain or a certainty that something needs to happen, and we set in that date such as he uses the word sunset—and we put in sunset clauses—so that they will come in front of us yet again to say yes, that policy worked. No, that policy didn't work, we need to do it a little different here or there. It might be something we want to do temporarily. If you remember one of the first bills that we heard, we talked about this is language that goes into law and this language here is temporary language. That is what he is dealing with. There were given a time frame to work on something and now they are going to address that this is how it worked or this didn't. It is a way for legislators to have a review back on policy sometimes.

Rep. Gary Paur: I understand that.

Rep. Vicky Steiner: I have a question on the sunset as well. I don't have the background on this. Would the legislative body who has experience be satisfied that the sunset was met? What was the purpose of the sunset and was it met? Why would they want this to come back?

Larry Taborsky: Once again, it was before my time. What I could see in the legislative minutes on it was that the first point of issue was the Page 5, Line 3, the word matching. In the past, matching was meant to mean 50% of the funds could be met by the state and the local would have to make up the difference. In pursuing the word matching that could have meant to some people, 99%, some kind of one for one or 50%. It wasn't really defined, the matching portion. Then a proposal was that let's make it similar to the federal airports where if we get some kind of local buy in, in their case is 5%, the federal would put in their 95%. I was reading the minutes from the past session. It looked like it was somehow tied to the ARRA funding, the short duration, temporary influx of funds to the state when in fact it is not related to that. This is all state funds we are talking about. The last part I saw on that was well let us give it two years and then sunset it and go revisit it again.

Chairman Bette Grande: I happen to like the way he gave us his testimony. Isn't that nice? Thank you.

Rep. Roscoe Streyle: How does the process go for a nonfederal airport? Is there a commission that says yes, that's a good project? No, it isn't. For example, like the airport in Leeds where I grew up, if they want a new runway, is there a cost benefit analysis to say well, you had one plane in there in the last year, we are not going to match that 90%. How does that work?

Larry Taborsky: Excellent question. For that reason I put the final page on the pile there on the priorities of the North Dakota Aeronautics Commission. This is not a hard and fast but it gives us good guidance on where we are going to spend our funds. We get about four times as much requested funds as we have available. We count on our airport planner to be around the state. We do quite a bit of flying to visit places like Leeds to make sure

that they are doing okay. They have consultants that come up with a list of all their requirements or requests. Then we put it down into this list. The Code talks about 90%, but it is not a hard and fast. It is up to 90% because realistically there are some places that desperately need just a tractor. I think the last session Turtle Lake came up and their airport manager said we are going to close if we don't have a way to mow the lawn. We can't keep our 1945 tractor going anymore. Other places have more money. They get some more local contribution. That will vary.

Rep. Gary Paur: When you are talking about the sunset clause on Page 4, I think you are speaking of Line 8, right?

Larry Taborsky: Yes.

Rep. Gary Paur: What I was asking about was Line 23. You are asking to remove a section which must have just recently been adopted, and it is suppose to be going into effect. After June 30, that's what I was heading for.

Larry Taborsky: I understand the question. That was put in there to revert back to the original way it was written so the Lines 8-22 was put in for now and then they put the effective date after. If nothing was done, we would still have a way of operating. Then it would go back to the original version which starts on 23.

Chairman Bette Grande: What happens is the paragraph up on the first piece is what they operated under. If he didn't come in front of us before then, that would go away and this would have happened. He is saying I don't want to go back to that, I want to keep this.

There was no one neutral or in opposition of this bill.

The hearing was closed.

Rep. Lonny Winrich made a motion for a Do Pass.

Rep. Karen Karls seconded the motion.

Rep. Bill Amerman: I have no problem with the bill. I just wanted to make an observation I have seen in other bills. At the bottom of Page 1 where it is in Code, where it is law, but because an agency or whatever said we haven't been doing anything, let's get rid of it. I kind of seen that in kind of a trend from some other agencies they haven't been following the law so to speak so they come to us so let's get rid of it. That way we won't get in trouble. I think it is a good bill.

Chairman Bette Grande: Duly noted.

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Larry Taborsky: Director of NDAC. See attached testimony #1.

Chairman Dever: Is the Aeronautics Commission a different agency?

Larry Taborsky: Yes. Most of our funding is done by fuel taxes, registration fees, ect.

Chairman Dever: The DOT has an interest in the AC but not authority over.

Senator Nelson: What are all the repealers?

Larry Taborsky: Anywhere where there is a strike through. 205-06-04, I have to get back to you.

Senator Cook: You are eliminating the distribution of language. How will the revenues be distributed?

Larry Taborsky: The previous way was 50% match. If an airport wanted something done they would need to come up with 50% of the funds. As it is changing we can come up with 90% of the funds.

Senator Cook: What we are deleting would require you to deposit it with the state treasurer and then vouchers would be submitted and vouchers appear to be approved by OMB. We are striking that language and there is no oversight as far as how you disperse those funds to the airports.

Larry Taborsky: Page 4 line 9, similar language and the difference being up to 90% of a project cost.

Senator Nelson: If we hadn't extended the sunset we would go back to how it was done. By taking the sunset off you are replacing the old plan with the new plan.

Mr. Taborsky then explained the repealing sections.

Senator Cook: Bottom of page 2 I see we are bringing in the aero museums in the state. Are we assuming any financial responsibility for the success of these museums?

Larry Taborsky: No

Senator Cook: We are exempting the excise tax. Are we, through these 2 bills, assuming the financial responsibility of these museums?

Larry Taborsky: We take them as part of our assets and put it in the general category of enabling others of aviation in the state.

There was no further discussion and Chairman Dever closed the public hearing on HB 1132.

Executive Summary of House Bill no. 1132

Good morning!

I am Larry Taborsky, and I have been the director of the Aeronautics Commission for a year and a half. As a new director, I met with the commissioners, reviewed the statutes which guide us, and developed an administrative clean-up bill. The following bill handles the following two categories:

- 1) items which are no longer valid,
- 2) areas where we could use clarification

With that in mind, this bill updates the director's and commission's duties, the assistance to airports, the definition of a warbird, and the details of aircraft registration.

The last portion of this bill addresses the distribution of revenue. This section was amended last session and will expire on June 30, 2011. The change was made to allow non-federal airports projects to be funded up to 90% by the state. This is in line with the money available to the communities with federal airports, which receive 95% federal funding for airport projects. Although we receive grant requests for four times as much as we can provide, this bill gives the option of funding a project which has a high priority and could not be completed without the state help.

Included in your handout is the Aeronautics Commission policy on grant priorities. This gives guidance on allocation of our limited resources. For your reference, there is also a state map showing the federal and non-federal airports.

The Aeronautics Commission is directed to represent the state on aviation matters, and to assist others in all aviation activities. Approval of this bill will ensure that we are most effective at that duty.

If construction will be in the current year, no hundreds digit is added, so earthwork on a runway this year would rank a "12"

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
