This Bill requires the Department of Human Services to establish and operate a substance abuse pilot voucher payment program beginning 7-1-2011 and ending 6-30-2013.

The Bill requires the Department to establish and operate a pilot voucher system to provide substance abuse services. The program must allow a voucher to be submitted to the beneficiary's provider of choice for payment of services.

The potential fiscal impact on the Department for the pilot program is undeterminable and would be based on the dollar amount of any grant award received.

Explanation or reason for introduction of bill/resolution:

To provide for a substance abuse services pilot voucher payment program.

Minutes:

Senator Judy Lee opened the hearing on HB 1395.

Rep. Robert Kilichowski (District 16) introduced HB 1395. He explained that SB 2326 is almost identical except that the Senate bill spells out that the money comes from a specific grant. He figured the chairmen would get together and discuss what would be the better bill to move forward.

He urged that one of the bills is moved forward because there are people that need the help.

Senator Dick Dever asked if the bill started with money in it. He thought the appropriation was that they could accept gifts, grants, donations.....

Rep. Kilichowski replied that the Senate bill deals strictly with the grant money and a specific grant. The original bill had chemical dependency and mental health written in it and there was an appropriation of about \$5.5 million out of the general fund. That bill was killed in the House – that's when he had this one drawn up specifying it would be for chemical dependency and tied to grants so general fund money would be used.

There was no further testimony.

The hearing was closed.
