MINUTES:

Chairman RaeAnn Kelsch: We will open the hearing on HB 1445.

Vice Chair Lisa Meier: I passed out an amendment to HB 1445. Basically what the amendment does is on line 18 it removes line 18 and then it will for any new student that is starting at a university from out of state, the institution that the individual is starting at will have to pay back 50% of the amount that it subsidizes for out of state. What is does is it takes new students that will be attending universities instead of all students. It starts in year 2011. With that I move amendment.

Rep. Mike Schatz: Second.

Chairman RaeAnn Kelsch: We will try a voice vote. Motion carries.

Voice vote: Motion carries

Vice Chair Lisa Meier: There was a question on the amendment. Instead of taking all the students from out of state it would just be effective for those new students. It would be just 50% going back into the general fund. The bill sponsor had some concerns over the appropriation and therefore he thought this would be a little more acceptable for the committee. I stated to him that I would propose the amendment.

Rep. Brenda Heller: I think it is an awesome idea but I can see the university system coming in and saying we need x amount more dollars to cover costs. I don't know if there will be any ground gained with this.

Vice Chair Lisa Meier: Basically in explanation with the bill sponsor he felt it would make the bill more passable and the amount would be a lot less. We had a short conversation about this and we did not discuss that.

Rep. Joe Heilman: Can somebody explain to me what the whole bill as amended is doing?

Vice Chair Lisa Meier: The bill states that for all new out of state students, currently the state subsidizes money out of the institutions for out of state students. What the bill states

is that now any new students coming into an institution, 50% of that money that is subsidized would come back into the general fund.

Chairman RaeAnn Kelsch: Really that is what he thought it was doing in the first place because if you are going to allow nonresident students into your campuses and as example that he gave he was saying that if UND charges 15 thousand for an out of state student, the general fund dollars that they receive amounts to 6,200 and that UND would be able to retain 8,800 and they have to turn back the 6,200 plus any of the fees that it collects.

Rep. Joe Heilman: I have some numbers relating to some parts of discussion around this issue, not necessarily this bill but the issue. Part of the argument for something like this is why we are spending money like this and then the students just leave. The data I have is counter to that if the committee wants me to present it in some form. What we have to have nonresident students come in and we can retain them. What that helps do is balance what we lose after graduation. The net loss is almost zero and I can provide that.

Chairman RaeAnn Kelsch: I will tell you that I thought it was interesting when I visited with a doctoral class and I asked them about how many of them had started their lives in North Dakota and half of them raised their hands. The other half had come to North Dakota to go to college and have jobs here and that is why they stayed. I thought that was interesting because I don't know if that happens very often when you look at a class like that.

Vice Chair Lisa Meier: I think it is great info what Rep. Joe Heilman has. I would like to allow him more time to put that together and pass out to the committee.

Rep. Joe Heilman: If it helps make the decision I can give it now.

Rep. Phillip Mueller: I think numbers were given up here that about 22,000 students being from North Dakota and about 18,000 being from elsewhere. What I think Rep. Joe Heilman's numbers will verify is that we are keeping the 22,000. Everyone pretty much comes back into our state be it in the form of a body either in state students or out of state students. I think that is an important number when looking at retention.

Rep. Mike Schatz: We could typically raise money for what we charge for out of state students and still have a flood of students. To say because we raised out of state tuition that is not to say we won't have an increase in out of state students.

Chairman RaeAnn Kelsch: But what will happen is we can only take so many and then we can't do any more than that. I think some of our campuses are pretty close to capacity already.

Rep. Dennis Johnson: How many WICHE states are involved in that compact?

Chairman RaeAnn Kelsch: I think it is around 20.

Rep. Dennis Johnson: We have a compact with all these states of 150% and no less or no more. How would all that be affected by this?

Chairman RaeAnn Kelsch: I think that is the question that the chancellor doesn't know at this point. We do have agreements with those states. I don't know if you can go in and renegotiate those. I think the thing to do was to ensure that students could go to the proper state for what they wanted for their education.

Rep. Dennis Johnson: There is certainly more to that compact organization and being a member of that organization. The competition is fierce out there.

Rep. David Rust: There was talk about a study in regards to this. I don't know if I've been over served information. For the most part in my life I have espoused that if you have a simple answer you probably don't understand the question. I'm beginning to think that more about out of state tuition. At this point in time I think we may need more information and maybe something of an in-depth study. I'm normally not prone to do studies, but I think in this case we do need the in-depth information.

Rep. Dennis Johnson: I move to do not pass as amended.

Rep. Mark Sanford: Second.

Rep. David Rust: So we have a do not pass as amended on HB 1445. Does that mean if the do not pass passes, that we will have a study on it?

Chairman RaeAnn Kelsch: It gives us time to think of what we want in those studies, what happens with the compacts if you default on your obligations in that compact, and how do we or can we get out of the compact. I'm not sure if Chancellor Goetz knows either on what the consequences would be.

Rep. David Rust: Maybe the question I should have asked is if you have a student from Montana that wants to come to North Dakota and will pay out of state tuition, is that dollar figure less than if they had stayed in Montana and gone to a Montana school? Another point I wonder about is when I hear a number like 18,000 out of state students, it is obvious there have to be costs here. You need more buildings, instructors etc. What did we do with high school districts as they got smaller? We closed them down and encouraged consolidation.

Chairman RaeAnn Kelsch: One thing to remember is that of that 18,000 it includes online as well.

Rep. David Rust: That's what I mean. There is more to this than meets the eye.

Chairman RaeAnn Kelsch: One issue is the 18,000 could be because BSC has all these online courses they are teaching to out of state students. That is an issue. Of that 18,000 we don't know how many are physically here taking classes or those that are online and out of state taking those classes.

Rep. David Rust: It would be interesting to know some of that.

Chairman RaeAnn Kelsch: Just so you are aware. An out of state student that is taking an online course at UND pays for the wellness center even though they aren't utilizing it. I know this because I had a son taking online classes and paying those fees. We will take the roll.

Chairwoman Kelsch, members of the Education Committee, for the record my name is Representative Mark Dosch representing the 32nd district of the Great State of ND. I came before you today to ask your support of HB 1445

The bill is simple. It states that no state general fund dollars will be used to support nonresident students.

First I would like to make certain you understand exactly what the bill does NOT do.

It does not change in any way the tuition collected, or the amount the tuition collected by the institution from the student. The only thing that this bill does is require the institution to return to the state, the state general funding it receives if the student is not a resident of ND or from a bordering state in which we have a reciprocity agreement in place. The institution keeps the difference between out of state tuition and GF dollars, and any other fees it collects including room and board, parking, activities fees etc. Example UND charges \$15,091 for an out of state student. The states GF dollars amount to \$6,254. Thus UND would retain \$8,837 dollars (15,091-6,254) plus any other fees it collects.

I believe, if they receive no state money for out of state students, it will make them think twice before they expand its infrastructure to mainly accommodate more out of state students.

The real benefit of this bill however will be that the \$100 Million that ND taxpayers are currently paying to subsidies the 18,000 out of state students could be used to expand the states scholarship program. In fact given that there are approx 22,000 ND students, this money could be given back to ND students in additional scholarships of up to \$4,000 per student. What better way to use the states resources than on ND students.

The Cost of Attendance reflects average expenses incurred by a student to attend medical school for one year. It is adjusted annually based on student surveys and the consumer price index (CPI). It does not include expenses for individuals other then the student (with the exception of daycare costs), or expenses incurred during periods of non-enrollment.

Other necessary expenses such as daycare costs, health insurance premiums, emergency car repairs, medical/dental bills not covered by insurance, and the purchase of a computer may be included in the Cost of Attendance, if incurred during the academic year. Students may request consideration for a Cost of Attendance increase by submitting a Request for Re-evaluation form and supporting documentation to the Medical School Student Financial Aid Office.

The total amount of a students financial aid award cannot exceed the Cost of Attendance.

15-10-18.3. Free tuition in North Dakota institutions of higher education. Any dependent, as defined in section 15-10-18.2 upon being duly accepted for enrollment into any undergraduate degree or certificate program of a North Dakota state institution of higher education, must be allowed to obtain a bachelor's degree or certificate of completion, for so long as the dependent is eligible, free of any tuition and fee charges; provided, however, that the bachelor's degree or certificate of completion is earned within a forty-five-month or ten-semester period or its equivalent; and further provided that tuition and fee charges shall not include costs for aviation flight charges or expenses. Once a person qualifies as a dependent under sections 15-10-18.2 and 15-10-18.3, the dependent may not be disqualified from the benefits of this section due to such an occurrence as the return of the prisoner of war or person missing in action.

15-10-18.4. Definitions. For purposes of section 15-10-18.5:

- 1. "Firefighter" means a person who is a member of a paid or volunteer fire department that is a part of, or administered by, this state, any political subdivision of this state, or a rural fire protection district.
- 2. "Peace officer" means any person who is employed by a state law enforcement agency or a political subdivision of the state who is charged with the prevention and detection of crime and the enforcement of the criminal laws of the state, and who has full power of arrest.
- 3. "Survivor" means the children under the age of twenty-one and the spouse of a firefighter or peace officer at the time of the firefighter's or peace officer's death.

15-10-18.5. Free tuition in North Dakota institutions of higher education for survivor of firefighter, emergency medical services personnel, or peace officer. If a firefighter, an emergency medical services personnel as defined under section 23-27-04.3, or a peace officer dies as a direct result of injuries received while engaged in the performance of official duties under circumstances dangerous to human life, the survivor, upon being duly accepted for enrollment into any undergraduate degree or certificate program of a North Dakota state institution of higher education, must be allowed to obtain a bachelor's degree or certificate of completion, for so long as the dependent is eligible, free of any tuition and fee charges; provided, however, that the bachelor's degree or certificate of completion is earned within a forty-five-month or ten-semester period or its equivalent; and further provided that tuition and fee charges may not include costs for aviation flight charges or expenses.

15-10-19. Nonresident student for tuition purposes defined - Exceptions. Repealed by S.L. 1993, ch. 166, § 2.

15-10-19.1. Nonresident and resident student for tuition purposes defined.

- 1. A "nonresident student" for tuition purposes means any student other than a resident student.
- 2. A "resident student" for tuition purposes means:
 - a. A person whose guardian, custodial parent, or parents are legal residents of this state and have resided in this state for twelve months, or a dependent child whose custodial parent moved into the state with the intent to establish legal residency for a period of years within the last twelve months immediately prior to the beginning of the academic term;
 - A person of age eighteen or over who is a legal resident of this state and has resided in this state after reaching age eighteen for twelve months immediately prior to the beginning of the academic term;
 - A person who graduated from a North Dakota high school;

- d. A full-time active duty member of the armed forces, a member of a North Dakota national guard unit, or a veteran as defined in section 37-01-40;
- A spouse or dependent of a full-time active duty member of the armed forces or a member of a North Dakota national guard unit or of an employee of any institution of higher education in this state, and a spouse of any other resident for tuition purposes;
- f. A person who was a legal resident of this state for at least three consecutive years within six years of the beginning of the academic term; or
- g. A child, widow, or widower of a veteran as defined in section 37-01-40 who was killed in action or died from wounds or other service-connected causes, was totally disabled as a result of service-connected causes, died from service-connected disabilities, was a prisoner of war, or was declared missing in action.
- 3. A temporary absence from the state for vacation or other special or temporary purposes may not be considered an abandonment of residency in this state, provided a residence is maintained in this state during the temporary absence. However, a student who leaves the state and resides in another state for a period of months is not considered a resident of this state during those months if the student does not maintain a place of residence in this state during the student's absence.

In addition, the board may enter into agreements with institutions of higher learning in other states and regional education compacts for the acceptance of students from other states in North Dakota institutions of higher learning.
