Explanation or reason for introduction of bill/resolution:

Senator Judy Lee opened the hearing on SB 2094.

Tom Nehring, director of the Division of Emergency Medical Services and Trauma for the ND Department of Health, testified in support of SB 2094. Attachment #1

Senator Judy Lee asked how it became out of sync with the state fiscal year.

Mr. Nehring explained that this year is particularly troublesome. He explained that there was funding in 2005 and additional funding in 2009. However the Office of Management and Budget determined that the extra added in 2009 was one time funding.

Senator Judy Lee asked if there was an advantage to the dept. and emergency services personnel to have an emergency clause on this.

Mr. Nehring said it would simplify things.

A short discussion took place on the relationship of this bill with HB 1044.

Ken Tupa, representing the EMS Association, addressed the committee and explained that 1044 is proposing changing the grant system. They are looking at funding areas instead of services. They are looking at how many systems in ND are going to be sustainable in the future. He also talked about the funding.

Senator Judy Lee asked if both bills are needed.

Mr. Tupa said probably not if 1044 passes as it currently is.

There was no opposing or neutral testimony.

The hearing on SB 2094 was closed.

Senator Gerald Uglen moved to adopt an amendment adding an emergency clause.

Explanation or reason for introduction of bill/resolution:

A bill relating to the deadline by which an emergency medical services operator must file its application for funding with the state department of health; and to declare an emergency.

Testimony #1

Chairman Weisz: Opened the hearing on SB 2094.

Tom Nehring, Director of the Division of Emergency Medical Services and Trauma for the ND Department of Health. (See testimony #1). I am here in support of this bill.

Rep. Paur: The bill doesn't change the deadline. It just removes the deadline.

Tom Nehring: It removes the deadline to allow us to establish a new deadline through rules as of May 1st of the year. What we have just run into is the states physical year ends on June 30, 2012. We have funding for staffing grants that we were only able because we don't know what is going to happen as of July 1 what the amount of money will be so we were only able to issue a six month staffing grant. That causes a lot of confusion with the ambulances services because they are use to at least in one year to apply for a yearlong grant and in these years where we end up with a changing biennium we only know how much money we will have for that six month period of time. It causes confusion for them sending in applications even though it is stated this is for a six month period of time. They are normally use to dealing with a year's period of time. They make mistakes and do it for a year's period of time instead of six months so it has to be returned and it slows the process down.

Rep. Paur: So basically you want to change the time frame.

Ken Tupa, ND EMS Association: We don't have a problem with this bill. You recall HB 1044 before this committee previously. That changes the grant process a little bit. It would actually repeal this section at the end of this year; Section 23-40. Passing this bill is probably not a bad thing because we don't know what the end result of 1044 is going to be.

Good morning, Chairwoman Lee and members of the Human Services Committee. My name is Tom Nehring, and I am the director of the Division of Emergency Medical Services and Trauma for the North Dakota Department of Health. I am here today to testify in support of Senate Bill 2094.

Senate Bill 2094 removes the November 1 application deadline for the Emergency Medical Services Staffing Grant. Currently, emergency medical services personnel apply for the staffing grant by November 1 and are awarded the grant on January 1. To close out the fiscal records for the state fiscal year, however, these contracts end on June 30, while the grant period continues for an additional six months. This results in the need to issue new contracts for the remaining six months.

The removal of the November 1 deadline in Senate Bill 2094 will allow the Department of Health to align the grant timelines with the state fiscal year, eliminating the need to issue multiple contracts during a 12-month period. The Department of Health plans to institute the deadline of May 1 for grant applications, with the grants awarded July 1 of each year.
