Emergency Commission Request August 10, 2012 Continuation of Part E: Narrative Motor Fuel tax enforcement program federal grant

The Tax Department is expecting to receive \$115,000 in additional federal funds for the Department's motor fuel tax enforcement program. The Department already is receiving federal funds for this program so this request is for additional federal fund spending authority for an existing grant program.

The Tax Department may use the additional federal funds for the following activities:

- expand efforts to enhance motor fuel tax enforcement which may include training, travel, the purchase of specially-equipped vehicles, testing equipment and supplies necessary for conducting compliance checks;
- supplement motor fuel tax examinations and criminal investigations;
- evaluate and implement registration and reporting requirements for motor fuel taxpayers;
- analyze and implement programs to reduce tax evasion associated with other highway use taxes;
- address issues related to Indian tribes and State motor fuel taxes; and
- analyze and implement programs to reduce tax evasion associated with foreign imported fuel.

North Dakota Parks and Recreation Department Emergency Commission Request September 10, 2012


This request, if approved, will provide housing at Lewis & Clark State Park for the recently transferred Park Ranger, Proposed funding is \$150,000 other funds utilizing state park generated revenues. Funding will include costs for a foundation and modular home. The home is a modest 1,060 square feet, ranch style, 2 bedroom, 1 bathroom and kitchen on the main floor. The square footage is consistent with all other state park residences in which park rangers reside. The residence will be placed on a full unfinished basement. Costs for connection to utility services are included in the budget. See attached floor plan drawing. Proposed construction dates would begin immediately upon approval with completion projected for spring 2013.

Background information includes the following factors which contributed to the decision to transfer a position to Lewis & Clark State Park.

In June of 2012, the interpreter at Cross Ranch accepted another position out of state. At that time we re-evaluated department needs and decided a Ranger was needed to assist the Lewis & Clark Park Manager, the only FTE currently residing within the park. The position was reclassified and transferred as a Park Ranger. The addition has helped reduce the law enforcement/security work load of the park manager. All FTE park rangers in the system are required to live in the state park. Housing is made available to ensure 24 hour/day coverage of law enforcement/emergency services between the 2 FTE law enforcement staff.

- Increase in visitation of 150% from 2006 to 2011, due to the growing interest in recreation as well as oil traffic in the western part of the state. In correlation to that increase in visitation, Lewis & Clark State Park revenues have increased 300% since 2010.
- Camping nights have increased from 436 in 2003 to 1,901 in 2012, an increase of 336%.
- Our seasonal staff put in an average 4486 hours per year in 2009 and as of August 2012 they have put in 5658 hours with 5 more months before the year is over. Our manager and ranger have put in 425 hours for law enforcement patrol in 2011, increasing to 480 in 2012 hours. Those increased hours included:

We ask for your favorable consideration regarding this request to address oil impact concerns within Lewis & Clark State Park.

Addendum – narrative for Secretary of State request dated August 31, 2012

On June 12, 2012, the Emergency Commission granted approval for a line item transfer of \$295,000 from the agency's operating line to the salaries line and authorization for three additional FTE positions. Since then, all three FTE have been hired. The last two FTE begin their duties on September 4. It was also possible to retain a long-time FTE with 39 years of experience who is a person essential to the agency's technology project.

Since the approval of that request, the agency has refined its projections for its salary requirements to the end of the biennium, which is the reason for this request.

To fund these salary requirements, the agency is requesting increased spending authority of \$196,000 for its General Services Fund special account (N.D.C.C. § 54-09-08) and for the salary line. Based on current revenue projections for the special fund and because of the receipt of significant revenue of almost \$189,000 for the special fund in July, the agency will exceed its special fund spending authority by the end of the biennium. The increased spending authority for the special fund will allow the agency to utilize the extra revenue to fund the salary requirements. No general fund dollars are involved.

The funds will be used for temporary full-time employees and to pay overtime for the agency's FTE's.

Although not related to this request, because of space limitations, the agency moved eight FTE off of the capitol campus and they are now located in the lower level of the North Dakota Association of Counties building on Capitol Way in Bismarck.

In the narrative for the June request, I reported that 1,300 new contractor licenses had been issued by this agency since the first of the year. Now, three months later, that number has increased by 1,100 to approximately 2,400 new contractor licenses that have been issued since the first of the year. In its database on August 30, 2011, the agency had 7,533 active contractor licenses. On August 30, 2012, the number of active contractor licenses is listed as 11,354, an increase of 3,812 or 51% in one year.

I also reported that the average number of business registration filings through April had increased 70% from the beginning of the biennium compared with the entire previous biennium. That percentage changed because at the end of June, the monthly average during the first year of the biennium had increased by 92% compared with the monthly average for the entire previous biennium. The accompanying graph shows the registration history and that it increased significantly beginning last July, which coincides with the Minot flooding disaster.


All of this activity is reflected in the revenue generated by the agency for the state's general fund. When the agency's budget was submitted in 2010, the agency had estimated general fund revenue for the biennium of \$7,900,000. At the end of July, the agency had already generated revenue of \$6,365,304 and was over the estimated revenue budget at the end of July by \$2,086,138. This is noteworthy because the agency's fees have remained mostly unchanged since 1993.

To allow staff to have essential time to decrease the turnaround on the processing of business registrations, the agency changed the hours it was open from nine to six hours a day beginning in April. When this change was implemented, the turnaround was approximately six weeks.

After implementation, the agency was still able to accommodate walk-in traffic and also achieve the goal of having uninterrupted time to process documents. It worked. On August 30, 2012, the turnaround was approximately two weeks, which is equivalent to the agency's standards prior to the significant increase in registrations and processing beginning a little over a year ago.

This progress was made possible by the dedication and hard work on the part of the agency's FTE who have done an outstanding job of providing services under very challenging circumstances. On September 4, the agency returned to its regular open hours with the goal of maintaining the processing of documents and licensing within the two week time frame. With the additional FTE and support already authorized and with this request, it is anticipated that this will be possible to maintain as nearly as possible to that goal. However, it will take time to train the new personnel in the filing of the many and varied legal business documents.

I. Municipal Facilities

1 FTE

Job Duties:

Public Water System Inspections

Operator Training/Compliance Outreach

Enforcement/Investigations Citizen Complaint Follow-up

This FTE will be responsible for in the field oversight of public water system treatment, storage and distribution facilities located in the oil development area. Daily duties will include facility inspections, operator training and enforcement activities associated with the federal/state Safe Drinking Water and Clean Water Acts. Recent escalation in the number of public drinking water systems concurrent with a declining number of certified operators in the oil development area has resulted in an increasing number of violations.

In addition, this FTE will be required to investigate citizen complaints, coordinate activities with local health units and collect evidence for potential enforcement action.

II. Water Quality

1 FTE

Job Duties:

Spill Response/Remediation Oversight

Citizen Complaint Response

This FTE will be responsible to work with the spill response team (SRT) to investigate and provide cleanup oversight as needed of accidental and illegal oilfield waste releases. Release oversight may be required during normal business hours, nights and weekends. Oversight is required to ensure the appropriate response, reporting and cleanup has been implemented by the responsible party or remediation consulting firm.

In addition, this FTE will be required to investigate citizen complaints, coordinate activities with local health units and collect evidence for potential enforcement action.

III. Water Quality

1 FTE

Job Duties:

NPDES Wastewater Treatment Inspections

Septic Tank Hauler/Land Application

Citizen Complaint Response

This FTE will be responsible to ensure the proper implementation of septic tank hauler regulations in the field. This will include, but not be limited to, conducting investigations ensuring the proper handling, storage, treatment and disposal of wastewater generated by crew camps, drilling rigs, RV parks and small communities.

In addition, this FTE will be required to investigate citizen complaints, coordinate activities with local health units and collect evidence for potential enforcement action.
