My Story

When I was young (late teens and early 20's) I had no idea what I wanted to do with my life, this may sound like all of us at one time. I thought, like all kids do, I knew everything. I felt if I just graduated college I would be offered a great job with great pay. Sadly, as we all know, this simply isn't what life is all about. That is the mentality I had though, and with that mentality I "cruised" through my undergraduate studies in art. I enjoyed the subject but I was incredibly ignorant on the value of a college education.

The story sounds familiar doesn't it? A lot of kids go through life not knowing what they really want; sometimes it takes trial and error, and a little kick in the pants to motivate them. I was the kid that didn't like school, who know everything, and thought I would put the world in my pocket one day. I ended up graduating with an average 2.7 GPA and thought that was just fine. Then I was thrown out into the cold world and was proven otherwise. I was stuck in a job I hated and had no goals to pursue. This is until I found education as a profession.

I enrolled in West Virginia University in 2003 and majored in Special Education: I found that I loved teaching. I became passionate about something and excelled in my program. I graduated with a 4.0 grade point average and would of gotten higher if I was allowed to.

I took my first job teaching Special Education in Florida to a very diverse group of students: rich white beach kids, Cuban immigrants, southern good ol' boys and girls, and African-American students. They were quite the collection indeed. I learned their culture, what makes them tick, and how to teach them. I learned a lot about what a teacher goes through, and learned I really loved the profession.



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I then moved to Colorado because honestly, Florida was too hot for me. I found a home in Colorado Springs at North Middle School. There I taught one year of Special Education to 8th grade students in a resource room. Again, I had the gambit of kids: LD, BD, MD, white, African-American, Mexican-American, Polish, German, and many others. North is an International Baccalaureate (IB) world school. They attracted all students, and with the U.S. Army and U.S. Air Force both having bases in the town the diversity had a wide breadth.

I taught several subjects that year: Mathematics, Language Arts, Reading, and U.S. History. I enjoyed this immensely, but at the end of the year I received a phone call from my current principal asking me if I would like to teach art. With my hours in art from my undergraduate degree I was Highly Qualified to do so in Colorado. I thought about it and said yes. The following year I set out to teach a new subject.


I found out art, like all subjects, was difficult to teach: with the materials, class sizes, and responsibility of putting on art shows and events the stress was taxing. But I also found out I was incredibly good at it, and loved it more than teaching Special Education. I loved the creative freedom, being able to teach the entire population of the school, and being able to still teach my Special Education students. It was a win-win situation. What aided me the most was I was able to draw on my Special Education training and directly implement strategies in differentiated instruction and classroom management to make the transition smooth and painless. I finally found a passion and I thrived.

I taught art, and coached football and basketball at North Middle School for five years. I met my wife (a North Dakota native), got married, and had a little boy. I was living the dream, but realized I had other goals and passions to pursue. So, I applied to the UND Doctoral Program in Educational Leadership. I was accepted and we made the choice to move back home.

I made quite the turn around: from a kid who really didn't like school and barely got by, to a man that found his passion in education and who is now excelling in a doctoral program. I would now enjoy being able to do what I love here in North Dakota until I can find a leadership position in a school. To be able to teach art here would be beneficial in a few areas. First, I would have a few more options in pursuing work. I know Special Education is a high demand field and I shouldn't have trouble finding a position, but art is where my true passion lies. Second, if I could find a position teaching art in a school I would feel very comfortable solely based on my previous five years of experience. And lastly, I've gotten very good at teaching art and I would like to utilize my skills.

Thank you again for reading my story and proposal. I appreciate your time and I know it is valuable. Please also know that I know the rules are in place for reasons: they are for the best interest of students. I feel that granting me an art endorsement will coincide with that principle and ultimately benefit the students of North Dakota.

My Proposal

In all good will, my request is to be issued a license to teach K-12 Mulit-Category Special Education, and to have a K-12 Art endorsement. I have outline why I feel I should be given this endorsement below.

Rationale:

- 1) I have a Bachelor of Arts degree in Art from West Liberty State College, a Master of Arts degree in Special Education from West Virginia University, and I am currently in the UND Doctoral Program pursuing my Educational Doctorate in Educational Leadership.
- 2) I have spent the past five years (2006-2011) North Middle School teaching art in Colorado Springs, Colorado. As an art teacher I taught all aspects of the visual arts such as: ceramics, sculpture, painting, drawing, computer art, and fiber art. I have also developed and implemented my own art curriculum, assessments, personal projects, and school murals.
- 3) I have completed the Colorado Teacher Induction Program in Art (2009). Essentially the Colorado Teacher Induction Program is a program that a teacher must complete to obtain their five-year professional teaching license. In the program I documented a years worth of lessons, in which I demonstrated pedagogy, differentiation, and assessment strategies. See certificate.
- 4) I have completed International Baccalaureate (IB) Visual Arts training I and II.
 - I: For new teachers; introduces them to IB philosophy, best practices and how to implement program. (June 19-21, 2006)
 - II: For experienced teachers; teaches in-depth techniques and pedagogy in teaching the visual arts. (January 26-29, 2007)
- 5) I have had two student teachers in art. First, Phil Wassel (2009-2010), had a year long practicum to receive his Master's in Teaching from Colorado College, in Colorado Springs, CO; the second, Hanna Pelican (2010-2011) was a high school senior receiving dual college credit through the University of Colorado, Boulder. Her study was also a year long, culminating in student teaching at the end of the 2011 school year.

In working together throughout the three years that I've been the IB program coordinator at North Middle School, I have found Joey to be an energetic and creative teacher and an advocate for his students. His classroom management style is effective for students with a variety of commitments to learning and his lessons are engaging. The atmosphere he creates in his classroom welcomes students, motivates them, and creates interest in his subject matter.

Joey has been a wonderful colleague to work and learn with. He is an effective team member that shares ideas and weighs in on tough issues.
