Williston Fast Facts

Population: Within Five Years, if Growth Continues, Williston Will Become The Fourth Largest City In North Dakota.

2010: According to the 2010 Census, Williston (14,716) has the ninth largest population in the state of North Dakota.

2011: Given the number of building permits in 2010 and building permits to date in 2011, Williston will be the sixth largest population in North Dakota outpacing and moving ahead of Jamestown (15,427), Dickinson (17,787), and Mandan (18,331).


2014: Within three years, another 11,000 plus units will be built in Williston. Williston will likely become North Dakota's fifth largest population outpacing and moving ahead of West Fargo (25,830).

2016: Within five years, given industry growth projections, anticipated building, and with additional city annexations, it would be reasonable to forecast that Williston will be the fourth largest city in the state of North Dakota surpassing Minot's population of 40,888.

Minot and Dickinson will be experiencing growth. But even with that growth, forecasts are conservative. The actual population of Williston today is 22,000. And given the level of building and anticipated city annexations, it would be reasonable to expect another 18,000 to 38,000 people living within the city limits by 2016.


Williston is home to over 350 oil service companies.




Housing

Hotel Development

Man Camps

Williams County Temporary Housing is calculated at over 9,200 sleeping units.

August 9, 2011: Watford City Council says no more man camps will be allowed within the city and including the one - mile jurisdiction.

September 12, 2011: In response to the growing demand and applications, the Williams County Commission issues a six-month moratorium on man camps.
