- 1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of
- 2 public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf, and the North Dakota vision
- 3 services school for the blind; to amend and reenact sections 15.1-02-02, 15.1-18-10, and
- 4 15.1-21-02.6 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the salary of the superintendent of
- 5 public instruction, teaching licenses, and the North Dakota scholarship; to provide for a report to
- 6 the legislative assembly; to provide for a legislative management study; to provide exemptions;
- 7 and to declare an emergency.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

9	SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds
10	as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state

11 treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and

other income, to the department of public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf,

13 and North Dakota vision services - school for the blind for the purpose of defraying the

expenses of those agencies, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30,

The department of public instruction, school for the deaf, and North 5 Dakota vision services - school for the blind shall report to the appropriations committees of the 6 sixty-seventh legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium 7 beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021. 8 SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION - ESTIMATED INCOME - TUITION APPORTIONMENT. 9 The sum of \$377,764,000, included in the integrated formula payments line item in 10 subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, is from the state tuition fund in the state treasury. Any 11 additional amount in the state tuition fund that becomes available for distribution to public 12 schools is appropriated to the department of public instruction for that purpose for the biennium 13 beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021. 14 SECTION 4. ESTIMATED INCOME - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND. The 15 estimated income line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes \$111,200,000 from 16 the foundation aid stabilization fund in the state treasury, of which \$110,000,000 is for integrated 17 formula payments and \$1,200,000 is for a rewrite of the state automated reporting system, for 18 the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021. 19 SECTION 5. EXEMPTION - FUNDING TRANSFER - AUTHORIZATION. Notwithstanding 20 section 54-16-04, the superintendent of public instruction may transfer up to \$4,000,000 from 21 the integrated formula payments line item to the grants - special education line item, for the 22 biennium beginning July 1, 2017, and ending June 30, 2019, for the purposes of providing 23 special education grants. The superintendent of public instruction shall notify the office of 24 management and budget of any transfer made pursuant to this section. 25 SECTION 6. EXEMPTION - ADVANCED PLACEMENT PROGRAMS. Up to \$600,000 of 26 the unexpended amount remaining from the appropriation for integrated formula payments, as 27 authorized in subdivision 1 of section 1 of chapter 12 of the 2017 Session Laws, is not subject 28 to the provisions of section 54-44.1-11 at the end of the 2017-19 biennium, and may be 29 continued into the 2019-21 biennium for the purpose of providing advanced placement 30 examinations, advanced placement teacher training, and the college ready English and 31 mathematics programs.

SECTION 7. INTEGRATED FORMULA PAYMENTS AND SPECIAL EDUCATION

- **CONTRACTS EXPENDITURE AUTHORITY.** The superintendent of public instruction may
 3 expend funds included in the integrated formula payments and grants special education
 4 contracts line items in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act for paying grants for educational
 5 services that were due in the 2017-19 biennium but which were not filed, claimed, or properly
 6 supported by the education provider until after June 30, 2019. To be reimbursed under this
- section, claims must be properly supported and filed with the superintendent of public
 instruction by June 30, 2020.

SECTION 8. GRANTS - SPECIAL EDUCATION DEFICIENCY AUTHORIZATION. If funds provided to the superintendent of public instruction in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act for grants - special education, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021, are not sufficient to meet special education contract obligations, the superintendent of public instruction shall request supplemental funding from the sixty-seventh legislative assembly.

SECTION 9. GIFTED AND TALENTED PROGRAM - MEDICAID MATCHING FUNDING - DISTRIBUTION.

- 1. The sum of \$800,000, included in the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, must be distributed to reimburse school districts or special education units for gifted and talented programs upon the submission of an application that is approved in accordance with guidelines adopted by the superintendent of public instruction. The superintendent of public instruction shall encourage cooperative efforts for gifted and talented programs among school districts and special education units.
- 2. State school aid payments for special education must be reduced by the amount of matching funds required to be paid by school districts or special education units for students participating in the Medicaid program. Special education funds equal to the amount of the matching funds required to be paid by the school district or special education unit must be paid by the superintendent of public instruction to the department of human services on behalf of the school district or unit.

SECTION 10. TRANSPORTATION GRANTS - DISTRIBUTION.

1. During each year of the 2019-21 biennium, the superintendent of public instruction shall calculate the payment to which each school district is entitled based on the state

31	FUNDIN	G - [DISTE	RIBUTION. The grants - program grants line item in subdivision 1 of section 1

- 1 of this Act includes \$1,500,000 for a program grant pool. The superintendent of public
- 2 instruction shall use the funding provided for various grant programs, including up to \$125,000,
- 3 or so much of the sum as may be necessary, for continuing education grants, for the biennium
- 4 beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021.
 - The superintendent of public instruction shall award grants in amounts up to \$1,200 to eligible recipients in chronological order, based on the date of an individual's application. An eligible recipient must:
 - a. (1) Be licensed to teach by the education standards and practices board;
 - (2) Have taught in this state during each of the last three school years; and
 - (3) Be enrolled at an institution of higher education in this state in either a master of education program in educational leadership or a program leading to a specialist diploma in educational leadership;
 - Be pursuing the requirements for a certificate in career development facilitation;
 or
 - c. Be pursuing a school counselor credential.
 - If any of the amount appropriated for this purpose remains after the superintendent of
 public instruction has awarded grants to all eligible recipients, the superintendent shall
 distribute that amount as an additional per student payment on a prorated basis,
 according to the latest available average daily membership of each school district.

SECTION 12. PASSTHROUGH GRANTS - APPLICATION - DISTRIBUTION -

REPORTING. The grants - passthrough grants line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes \$2,863,764 for passthrough grants. The superintendent of public instruction shall determine the manner in which each passthrough grant is distributed but no more than one-half of the funding may be provided each year of the biennium. Annually grantees, as a condition of receiving the grant, must establish performance measures to be reviewed by the superintendent of public instruction. Grantees shall report annually to the superintendent of public instruction regarding performance based on the measures. The superintendent may not distribute the grant payment for the second year of the biennium until the grantee submits the annual report for the first year of the biennium. The superintendent of public instruction shall report to the appropriations committees of the sixty-seventh legislative assembly regarding funds granted,

- performance measures established for each grantee, and whether grantees met performance
 expectations.
- 3 SECTION 13. REGIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATIONS GRANTS- DISTRIBUTION.
- 4 The integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes
- 5 \$500,000 from the general fund for the purpose of providing annual grants to regional education
- 6 associations for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2021. An annual
- 7 grant of \$35,714 is provided to each regional education association that exists as of July 1,
- 8 2019. Regional education associations that merge during the 2019-21 biennium are entitled to
- 9 the annual grants that would have been paid to each of the member associations.
- 10 **SECTION 14. EXEMPTION INDIRECT COST ALLOCATION.** Notwithstanding section
- 11 54-44.1-15, the department of public instruction may deposit indirect cost recoveries in its
- 12 operating account.
- 13 SECTION 15. STATE AID TO PUBLIC LIBRARIES. The grants line item in subdivision 2 of
- section 1 of this Act includes \$1,737,528 for aid to public libraries, of which no more than one-
- half may be expended during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020.
- 16 SECTION 16. EXEMPTION SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF HIGHER EDUCATION
- 17 INTERPRETER GRANT PROGRAM DISTRIBUTION. The grants line item in subdivision 3 of
- 18 section 1 of this Act is for the purpose of providing grants to assist institutions under the control
- 19 of the state board of higher education with the cost of interpreters and real-time captioning for
- students who are deaf or hard of hearing, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2019, and ending
- June 30, 2021. Moneys appropriated for this program are not subject to section 54-44.1-11.
- 22 Funds must be distributed pursuant to the provisions of this section:
- 1. The school for the deaf shall develop a formula to determine the grant amount for
- which an institution is eligible. The formula must be based on an uniform hourly
- 25 reimbursement.
- 26 2. To obtain a grant under this section, an institution shall submit to the school for the
- deaf, at the time and in the manner directed by the school, invoices showing the
- amount expended for interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf
- or hard of hearing.
- 30 3. The school for the deaf may not distribute more than fifty percent of the amount
- appropriated during the first year of the biennium.

- If any grant moneys remain undistributed at the end of the biennium, the school for the
 deaf shall provide additional prorated grants to institutions that incurred, during the
 biennium, hourly expenses in excess of the formula reimbursement level.
 - 5. At the request of an institution under the control of the state board of higher education, the school for the deaf shall consult with the institution and provide advice regarding the provision of services most appropriate to meet a student's needs.
- SECTION 17. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-02-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:
- 9 **15.1-02-02. Salary.**

- The annual salary of the superintendent of public instruction is one hundred sixteen—thousand nine hundred three dollars through June 30, 2016, and one hundred twenty thousand—four hundred ten dollars thereafter one hundred twenty-two thousand eight hundred ten dollars—through June 30, 2020, and one hundred twenty-five thousand eight hundred eighty dollars—thereafter.
- **SECTION 18. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-18-10 of the North Dakota Century Code as amended in section 5 of Senate Bill No. 2265, as approved by the sixty-sixth legislative assembly, is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 15.1-18-10. Specialty areas Teacher qualification.
- Notwithstanding the requirements of this chapter:
 - 1. An individual may teach art, business education, computer education, a foreign language, music, physical education, special education, and technology education at any grade level from kindergarten through grade eight, provided the individual:
 - a. Is licensed to teach by the education standards and practices board;
- b. Is approved to teach in that area by the education standards and practices board; and
 - c. Meets all requirements set forth in rule by the superintendent of public instruction.
 - 2. An individual may teach Native American languages provided the individual is an eminence-credentialed teacher.
 - An individual may teach in the areas of trade, industry, technical occupations, or health occupations, provided the individual has been issued a license to teach in such areas by the education standards and practices board.

- 1 An individual may teach in any subject, except elementary education, special 2 education, mathematics, science, language arts, and social studies, if the individual: 3 a. Has a permit issued by the board and has a high school diploma; and 4 b. Possesses at least four thousand hours over five years of relevant work 5 experience in the subject area to be taught; or 6 (2) Possesses a certificate, permit, or degree in the subject area to be taught; 7 Or 8 (3) Achieves a passing score on the Praxis content test. 9 SECTION 19. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-21-02.6 of the North Dakota Century Code is 10 amended and reenacted as follows: 11 15.1-21-02.6. North Dakota scholarship - Amount - Applicability. 12 The state board of higher education shall provide to any student certified as 13 being eligible by the superintendent of public instruction either a North Dakota 14 academic scholarship or a North Dakota career and technical education 15 scholarship in the amount of seven hundred fifty dollars for each semester during 16 which the student is enrolled full time at an accredited institution of higher 17 education in this state, maintains a cumulative grade point average of 2.75, and 18 maintains progress toward degree completion. 19 b. The state board of higher education shall provide to any student certified as 20 being eligible by the superintendent of public instruction either a North Dakota 21 academic scholarship or a North Dakota career and technical education 22 scholarship in the amount of five hundred dollars for each quarter during which 23 the student is enrolled full time at an accredited institution of higher education in 24 this state, maintains a cumulative grade point average of 2.75, and maintains 25 progress toward degree completion. 26 2. The state board shall monitor each scholarship recipient to ensure that the student 27 meets the academic and other requirements of this section. Upon determining that a 28 recipient student has failed to meet the requirements of this section, the board shall
 - 3. A student is not entitled to receive more than six thousand dollars under this section.

1 The state board of higher education shall forward the scholarship directly to the 2 institution in which the student is enrolled. 3 5. a. (1) This section does not require a student to be enrolled in consecutive 4 semesters. 5 (2) This section does not require a student to be enrolled in consecutive 6 quarters. 7 A scholarship under this section is valid only for six academic years after the b. 8 student's graduation from high school and may be applied to a graduate program. 9 6. A scholarship under this section is available to any eligible resident student who fulfills 10 the requirements of section 15.1-21-02.4 or 15.1-21-02.5 and who: 11 Graduates from a high school in this state; a. 12 b. Graduates from a high school in a bordering state under chapter 15.1-29; 13 Graduates from a nonpublic high school in a bordering state while residing with a C. 14 custodial parent in this state; or 15 d. Completes a program of home education supervised in accordance with chapter 16 15.1-23. 17 7. For purposes of North Dakota scholarship eligibility under this section, "full-time" a. 18 has the same meaning as the term is defined by the institution the student is 19 attending. 20 A student who is enrolled less than full-time may retain scholarship eligibility if the b. 21 student is in the final semester or quarter before graduation. The waiver of the 22 full-time enrollment status requirement for scholarship eligibility may not apply to 23 a student more than once. 24 For the purpose of North Dakota scholarship eligibility under this section, 25 "progress toward degree completion" means earning the following minimum 26 number of credits after each semester or quarter term disbursement to qualify for 27 the subsequent disbursement: 28 Twenty-four credits after disbursement two; (1) 29 (2) Thirty-nine credits after disbursement three: 30 (3) Fifty-four credits after disbursement four; 31 (4) Sixty-nine credits after disbursement five;

1	(5) Eighty-four credits after disbursement six; and
2	(6) Ninety-nine credits after disbursement seven.
3	SECTION 20. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - TRANSPORTATION. During the
4	2019-20 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying school transportation,
5	including district routes, expenditures, reimbursement, and possible efficiencies. The legislative
6	management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation
7	necessary to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-seventh legislative assembly.
8	SECTION 21. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - DUAL-CREDIT - ADVANCED
9	PLACEMENT - DISTANCE EDUCATION COURSES. During the 2019-20 interim, the
10	legislative management shall consider studying dual-credit, advanced placement, and distance
11	education courses. The study must include a review of early enrollment placement testing and
12	the qualifications for dual-credit and advanced placement courses. The study also must include
13	a review of the costs and amounts of funding necessary to provide all students access to
14	dual-credit, advanced placement, and distance education courses, as well as the types of
15	courses available and the delivery methods necessary to provide all students with access. The
16	legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any
17	legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-seventh legislative
18	assembly.
19	SECTION 22. EMERGENCY. Section 5 of this Act is declared to be an emergency
20	measure.
