- 1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact section 23-01-44 of the North Dakota Century Code,
- 2 relating to the needle exchange program.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

4 SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 23-01-44 of the North Dakota Century Code is

5 amended and reenacted as follows:

6 **23-01-44. Syringe or needle exchange program - Authorization.**

7 1. As used in this section:

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8 a. "Program" means a syringe exchange program established and operated under
9 this section.

10 b. "Qualified entity" means:

- (1) A local health department;
- (2) A city that operates a program within the boundaries of the city; or
- 13 (3) An organization that has been authorized to operate a program by the state
 14 department of health, the board of county commissioners, or the governing
 15 body for the operation of a program within the boundaries of the city.
- 16 c. "Supplies" mean needles, syringes, stericups, danispoons, and cotton filters for
 17 syringes.
- The state department of health, in collaboration with the department of human
 services behavioral health division, shall design a syringe exchange program. The
 state department of health shall administer the program.
- 3. The state department of health may authorize a qualified entity to operate a program
 in a county if:
- a. The area to be served is at risk of an increase or potential increase in prevalence
 of viral hepatitis or human immunodeficiency virus;

1		b.	A syringe exchange program is medically appropriate as part of a comprehensive
2			public health response; and
3		C.	The qualified entity conducted a public hearing and submitted a report of the
4			findings and an administration plan for the program to the state health officer.
5	4.	Αq	ualified entity operating a program under this chapter shall:
6		a.	Register the program annually in the manner prescribed by the state department
7			of health;
8		b.	Have a pharmacist, physician, or advanced practice registered nurse who is
9			licensed in the state to provide oversight for the program;
10		C.	Store and dispose of all syringes and, needles, and supplies collected in a safe
11			and legal manner;
12		d.	Provide education and training on drug overdose response and treatment,
13			including the administration of an overdose reversal medication;
14		e.	Provide education, referral, and linkage to human immunodeficiency virus, viral
15			hepatitis, and sexually transmitted disease prevention, treatment, and care
16			services;
17		f.	Provide addiction treatment information and referrals to drug treatment programs,
18			including programs in the local area and programs that offer medication-assisted
19			treatment that includes a federal food and drug administration approved
20			long-acting, non-addictive medication for the treatment of opioid or alcohol use
21			disorder;
22		g.	Provide syringe, needle, supply, and injection supply distribution and collection
23			without collecting or recording personally identifiable information;
24		h.	Operate in a manner consistent with public health and safety; and
25		i.	Ensure the program is medically appropriate and part of a comprehensive public
26			health response.
27	5.	The	e state department of health may terminate a program for failure to comply with any
28		of tl	ne provisions in this section.
29	6.	A state agency may not provide general fund moneys to a program to purchase or	
30		othe	erwise acquire hypodermic syringes, needles, or injection supplies for a program
31		und	ler this section.

1	7.	A law enforcement officer may not stop, search, or seize an individual based on the	
2		ndividual's participation in a program under this section. Syringes and, needles, and	
3		supplies appropriately collected under this section are not considered drug	
4		paraphernalia as provided in chapter 19-03.4 or possession of a controlled substance	
5		under section 19-03.1-23.	
6	8.	Each program shall file a semiannual report with the state department of health	
7		containing the following information listed on a daily basis and by location, identified by	
8		the postal zip code, where the program distributed and collected syringes and,_	
9		needles, and supplies:	
10		a. The number of individuals served;	
11		 The number of syringes and, needles, and supplies collected; 	
12		c. The number of syringes and needles distributed; and	
13		d. Any additional information requested by the state department of health.
