- (1) Bismarck state college, Dakota college at Bottineau, Dickinson state university, Lake Region state college, Mayville state university, Minot state university, North Dakota state college of science, Valley City state university, and Williston state college for projects dedicated exclusively to the advancement of academics; and

- (2) University of Jamestown and university of Mary for projects dedicated exclusively to student scholarships."

Page 2, line 2, after the first comma insert "university of Jamestown."

Page 2, line 2, after the second comma insert "university of Mary."

Page 2, after line 2, insert:

"SECTION 5. AMENDMENT. Subdivision a of subsection 2 of section 15-10-49 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

- a. If any available dollars have not been awarded by the board before January first of each odd-numbered year, in accordance with subsection 1, any institution listed in paragraph 1 of subdivision a of subsection 1 may apply for an additional matching grant."

SECTION 6. AMENDMENT. Section 23-01-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

23-01-02. Health council - Members, terms of office, vacancies, compensation, officers, meetings.

The health council consists of nine members appointed by the governor including four persons from the health care field, and five persons representing consumer interests. The governor may select members to the council from recommendations submitted by trade, professional, and consumer organizations. On the expiration of the term of any member, the governor, in the manner provided by this section, shall appoint for a term of three years, persons to take the place of members whose terms on the council are about to expire. The officers of the council must be elected annually. Any state agency may serve in an advisory capacity to the health council at the discretion of the council. The council shall meet at least twice each year and at other times as the council or its chairman may direct. The health council shall have as standing committees any committees the council may find necessary. The chairman of the council shall select the members of these committees. The members of the council are entitled to receive ~~sixty-two dollars and fifty cents~~ as compensation per day at the rate set for a member of the legislative assembly under subsection 1 of section 54-03-20 and their necessary mileage and travel expenses as provided in sections 44-08-04 and 54-06-09 while attending council meetings or in the performance of any special duties as the council may direct. The per diem and expenses must be audited and paid in the manner in which the expenses of state officers are audited and paid. The compensation provided for in this section may not be paid to any member of the council who received salary or other compensation as a regular employee of the state, or any of its political subdivisions, or any institution or industry operated by the state.

SECTION 7. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH. During the 2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the roles of the state health officer, health council, medical advisory board, and governor as they relate to the administration of the state department of health. The study must include consideration of the role of the health council if the governor seeks to terminate the appointment of the state health officer or to adjust the salary of or take punitive action against the state health officer. Additionally, the study must include whether the orders of the state health officer regarding public health directives have primacy over orders issued by the governor. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. A new section to chapter 47-16 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

Certain deductions prohibited - Breach.

1. The deduction or recovery of losses incurred in the sale or disposition of natural gas produced under an oil and gas lease from the proceeds of oil production attributable to royalty interests or overriding royalty interests under the lease is prohibited unless expressly and unambiguously provided otherwise by the lease, provided the losses:
 - a. May be offset or applied against a subsequent net gain in the sale or disposition of natural gas in accordance with the lease;
 - b. May not be offset by the gains from one well to another well; and
 - c. May not be carried forward from one well to the gains or losses of another well.
2. A person found to be in violation of subsection 1, if lease cancellation is not sought, shall pay interest at the applicable annual rate set by the state court administrator pursuant to section 28-20-34 on the portion of oil or gas royalties that were not timely paid to the owner of the royalties on account of the violation until paid. The district court for the county in which the oil or gas well is located has jurisdiction over all proceedings brought under this section. The prevailing party in any proceeding under this section is entitled to recover any court costs and reasonable attorney's fees.

SECTION 2. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - POSTPRODUCTION COST DEDUCTIONS. During the 2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying deductions for postproduction costs under oil and gas leases.

1. The study must include:
 - a. Consideration of the methods used to calculate the value of oil and gas, the point of sale used to determine the value, oil and gas sales in the absence of an arm's-length contract, any deductions or incentives applied to the value, and the methods used to report any deductions or incentives on mineral royalty statements;
 - b. Input from representatives from the oil and gas industry, representatives from an organization representing royalty owners,

the department of mineral resources, the department of trust lands, and the attorney general's office; and

- c. An analysis and review of state-mandated natural gas capture targets, federal land permitting restrictions, the effectiveness of using onsite flare mitigation technologies and the infrastructure necessary to enhancing oil and natural gas value.
2. The study may include consideration of the desirability and feasibility of expanding the use and market access of natural gas, including value-added energy opportunities within the state.
3. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly."
