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1	A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 15.1-06 and a new section to
2	chapter 15.1-32 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to school purchases of gifts or
3	gratuities and permitting private tutors on public school premises; to amend and reenact
4	sections 45.1-01-0115.1-01-03, 15.1-07-25.4, and 15.1-07-26, subsection 8 of section
5	15.1-15-02, subsectionsubsections 2 and 6 of section 15.1-19-10, section 15.1-27-03.1,
6	subsection 4 of section 15.1-27-03.2, sections 15.1-27-04.1, 15.1-36-02, and
7	15.1-36-04, and subsection 5 of section 15.1-36-08 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating
8	to the state board of public school education members, virtual learning, a policy to revert a
9	reorganized school district back to separate districts, school district enrollment, the definition of
10	"probationary teacher", a school district's policy governing possession of a weapon, the
11	definition of "dangerous weapon", modification of weighting factors and transition maximums.
12	loans from the coal development trust fund, evidences of indebtedness, and an increase in per
13	student payments; to provide for a legislative management study; to provide a report; to provide
14	an appropriation; to provide for an exemption; to provide for a transfer; and to provide an
15	effective date; and to declare an emergency.

16 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

17	SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-01-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is							
18	amended and reenacted as follows:							
19	15.1-01-01. State board of public school education - Composition.							
20	1. The state board of public school education consists of the superintendent of public							
21	instruction and:							
22	a. An individual representing Barnes, Cass, Grand Forks, Griggs, Nelson, Steele,							
23	and Traill Counties legislative districts ten, eleven, thirteen, sixteen, twenty-one,							
24	forty-one, forty-four, and forty-six;							

1		b. An individual representing Benson, Bottineau, Cavalier, McHenry, Pembina,
2		Pierce, Ramsey, Renville, Rolette, Towner, and Walsh Countieslegislative districts
3		nine, fifteen, seventeen, eighteen, nineteen, twenty, forty-two, and forty-three;
4	-	c. An individual representing Dickey, Emmons, LaMoure, Logan, McIntosh,
5		Ransom, Richland, and Sargent Countieslegislative districts twelve, twenty two.
6		twenty-four, twenty-five, twenty-seven, twenty-eight, twenty-nine, and forty-five;
7		d. An individual representing Burleigh, Eddy, Foster, Kidder, McLean, Sheridan,
8		Stutsman, and Wells Counties legislative districts seven, eight, thirty, thirty-one.
9		thirty-two, thirty-four, thirty-five, and forty-seven;
10		e. An individual representing Burke, Divide, McKenzie, Mountrail, Ward, and
11		Williams Countieslegislative districts three, four, five, six, fourteen, thirty-three,
12		thirty-eight, and forty; and
13	-	f. An individual representing Adams, Billings, Bowman, Dunn, Golden Valley, Grant,
14		Hettinger, Mercer, Morton, Oliver, Sioux, Slope, and Stark Counties legislative
15		districts one, two, twenty-three, twenty-six, thirty-six, thirty-seven, and thirty-nine.
16	2.	All board members other than the superintendent of public instruction must be
17		qualified electors and must reside in one of the counties districts they represent.
18	3.	The governor shall appoint new board members from a list of three names submitted
19		by a committee consisting of the president of North Dakota united or the president's
20		designee, the president of the North Dakota council of educational leaders or the
21		president's designee, and the president of the North Dakota school boards association
22		or the president's designee. Two of the state board members must be members of the
23		North Dakota school boards association. Two of the state board members must be
24		employed by a North Dakota school district and be active members of the North
25		Dakota association of school administrators.
26	4.	Appointees serve for six-year terms, staggered so that the terms of two members
27		expire on June thirtieth of each even-numbered year.
28	5	If a vacancy occurs, the governor shall appoint an individual to serve for the duration
29		of the unexpired term.
30	6.	Each member of the board is entitled to receive, from the biennial appropriation for the
31		superintendent of public instruction, compensation in the amount of sixty-two dollars

and fifty cents per day and reimbursement for expenses, as provided by law for state officers, if the member is attending board meetings or performing duties directed by the board. The compensation provided for in this section may not be paid to any member who receives a salary or other compensation as an employee or official of this state if the individual is serving on the board by virtue of the individual's state office or state employment.

- 7. The superintendent of public instruction shall serve as the executive director and secretary of the board. The superintendent shall call meetings as necessary, carry out the policies of the board, and employ personnel necessary to perform the board's duties.
- 8. The board shall annually elect one member to serve as the chairman.

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-01-03 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15.1-01-03. State board of public school education - Powers and duties.

- 1. The state board of public school education shall:
 - a. Assist county committees in carrying out their duties.
 - Provide county committees with clerical assistance, plans of procedure,
 standards, data, maps, forms, and other materials, information, and services.
 - c. Appoint members to the county committee, if the county superintendent does not fulfill this duty, as provided for in section 15.1-10-01.
 - d. Provide oversight for regional education associations as required by chapter 15.1-09.1.
 - e. Establish and certify a North Dakota learning continuum to allow a district-approved, mastery framework policy to award units required under sections 15.1-21-01 and 15.1-21-02 and to waive unit instructional time requirements under section 15.1-21-03, upon the recommendation of the kindergarten through grade twelve education coordination council.
 - f. Develop a policy and procedures for a school district formed by the

 reorganization process under chapter 15.1-12 to revert to individual school

 districts. For a reorganized school district to be eligible for the reversion process,
 the reorganized school district must have been formed by school districts located

1	in two or more communities, including a rural community, and may not have been							
2	formed by school districts that were located in the same city. The board shall							
3	develop the policy and procedures on or before January 1, 2024.							
4	2. The state board of public school education may adopt rules in accordance with							
5	chapter 28-32.							
6	SECTION 2. A new section to chapter 15.1-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is created							
7	and enacted as follows:							
8	Purchase of gifts or gratuities - Gift fund.							
9	1. A public school or school district may create a gift fund. The gift fund may not include							
10	state funds.							
11	2. A public school or school district may use funds from the gift fund to purchase an item							
12	as a gift or gratuity for an individual, including a school district employee, an individual							
13	who speaks or performs at a school function, or a guest on the school premises.							
14	3. For purposes of this section, "gift" includes:							
15	a. A beverage, food item, or refreshment;							
16	b. For parent-teacher conferences, beverages, food items, or refreshments, costing							
17	no more than twenty-five dollars per teacher;							
18	c. A catered meal costing no more than fifty dollars per meal:							
19	d. Pens, notepads, or other promotional materials;							
20	e. An item of cultural significance, including a quilt, basket, beadwork, sage, or							
21	quillwork;							
22	f. An award or incentive, as approved by the superintendent of public instruction or							
23	the superintendent's designee; and							
24	g. Any other item of de minimis value.							
25	SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-07-25.4 of the North Dakota Century Code is							
26	amended and reenacted as follows:							
27	15.1-07-25.4. Virtual learning - School district policy - Report to legislative							
28	management and legislative assembly.							
29	The board of a school district or governing board of a nonpublic school that operates a							
30	physical school plant may adopt a policy to allow students to engage in virtual instruction and in							
31	the case of a school district, qualify for average daily membership in the district. The							

1	superintendent of public instruction shall adopt rules governing policies under this section. A								
2	policy adopted by a school district under this section must comply with the rules adopted by the								
3	superintendent of public instruction. The superintendent of public instruction shall provide								
4	biennial reportsan annual report to the legislative management regarding in even-numbered								
5	years and the legislative assembly in odd-numbered years comparing the academic								
6	performance metrics of students participating in virtual instruction with students not participating								
7	in virtual instruction under this section using the statewide prekindergarten through grade twelve								
8	strategic vision framework goals. If the superintendent of public instruction does not have								
9	access to academic performance reports of a school district's virtual instruction subgroup								
10	because of low group size, the district shall provide the annual report required under this								
11	section for the district's comparison data.								
12	SECTION 4. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-07-26 of the North Dakota Century Code is								
13	amended and reenacted as follows:								
14	15.1-07-26. School district demographicsenrollment - Long-term planning								
15	processReview - Report.								
16	1. Between January first and June thirtieth of every even-numbered year, the board of								
17	each school district shall invite the public to participate in a planning process review								
18	addressing the effects that demographics might decreasing or increasing enrollment								
19	will have on the district in the ensuing three-year and five-year periods, and								
20	specifically addressing potential effects on:								
21	a. Academic and extracurricular programs achievement including progress toward								
22	state academic goals adopted by the statewide prekindergarten through grade								
23	twelve education strategic vision steering committee;								
24	b. Instructional and administrative and ancillary staffing;								
25	c. <u>Co-curricular or extracurricular programs;</u>								
26	d. Facility needs and utilization; and								
27	d.e. District property tax levies.								
28	2. At the conclusion of the planning process review, the board shall prepare a report,								
29	publish a notice in the official newspaper of the district indicating that the report is								
30	available submit the report to the superintendent of public instruction, make the report								

available on the district website, and make the report available upon request.

- If the report under subsection 2 is not received by the superintendent of public
 instruction by August first of each even-numbered year, the superintendent of public
 instruction shall withhold state aid payments to the school district until the report is
 received.
- 4. The superintendent of public instruction shall provide an aggregate report on these plans to the legislative assembly.

SECTION 5. AMENDMENT. Subsection 8 of section 15.1-15-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

8. For purposes of this section, "probationary teacher" means an individual teaching for less than two years in the school district.

SECTION 6. AMENDMENT. Subsection 2 of section 15.1-19-10 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

- 2. The policy must prohibit:
 - a. Prohibit the possession of a dangerous weapon or a firearm by a student on school property and at school functions and provide for the punishment of any student found to be in violation. Punishment must include immediate suspension from school and expulsion. A
 - Require a student who possesses a firearm in violation of this section must be expelled for at least one year. The school district firearms policy must authorize
 - c. Authorize the school district superintendent or the school principal, if the school district does not have a superintendent, to modify an expulsion for firearms possession under this section on a case-by-case basis in accordance with criteria established by the board. Before expelling a student, a school board or its designated hearing officer, within ten days of the student's suspension, shall provide the student with a hearing at which time the school board or its designated hearing officer shall take testimony and consider evidence, including the existence of mitigating circumstances. If a designated hearing officer orders that a student be expelled, the student may seek a review of the decision by the school board, based on the record of the expulsion hearing.
 - d. Include a referral mechanism to the criminal justice or juvenile delinquency system for a student who possesses a firearm in violation of this subsection.

10	<u>e. "Weapon" includes any switchblade or gravity knife, machete, scimitar, stiletto.</u>						
11	sword, dagger, or knife with a blade of five inches [12.7 centimeters] or more; any						
12	throwing star, nunchaku, or other martial arts weapon; any billy, blackjack, sap,						
13	bludgeon, cudgel, metal knuckles, or sand club; any slungshot; any bow and						
14	arrow, crossbow, or spear; any weapon that will expel, or is readily capable of						
15	expelling, a projectile by the action of a spring, compressed air, or compressed						
16	gas, including any such weapon, loaded or unloaded, commonly referred to as a						
17	BB gun, air rifle, or CO2 gun; and any projector of a bomb or any object						
18	containing or capable of producing and emitting any noxious liquid, gas, or						
19	substance. The term does not include a spray or acrosol containing CS, also						
20	known as ortho-chlorobenzamalonitrile; CN, also known as alpha-						
21	ehloroacetophenone; or other irritating agent intended for use in the defense of						
22	an individual, nor does the term include a device that uses voltage for the						
23	defense of an individual, unless the device uses a projectile and voltage or the						
24	device uses a projectile and may be used to apply multiple applications of voltage						
25	during a single incident, then the term includes the device for an individual who is						
26	prohibited from possessing a firearm under this title.						
27	SECTION 8. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-27-03.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is						
28	amended and reenacted as follows:						
29	15.1-27-03.1. Weighted average daily membership - Determination.						
30	1. For each school district, the superintendent of public instruction shall multiply by:

- The superintendent of public instruction shall determine each school district's weighted average daily membership by adding the products derived under subsection 1 to the district's average daily membership.
- **SECTION 9. AMENDMENT.** Subdivision o of subsection 1 of section 15.1-27-03.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
 - o. For districts paid based on September tenth enrollment in the prior year, 0.701.00 the number of students determined by deducting the number of students in the prior year's September tenth enrollment, adjusted for students that will generate average daily membership, from the prior year's average daily membership, increasing the factor annually by 0.10, not to exceed 1.00. If the prior year's September tenth enrollment exceeds the prior year's average daily membership, then a deduction of 0.501.00 the number of excess students, increasing the factor annually by 0.10, not to exceed 1.00.
- **SECTION 10. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 4 of section 15.1-27-03.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
 - 4. The school district size weighting factor determined under this section and multiplied by a school district's weighted average daily membership equals the district's weighted student units. For the 2022-23 school year, for school districts that operate multiple-kindergarten through grade twelve buildings at least nineteen miles [30.58 kilometers] apart, or multiple buildings at least nineteen miles [30.58 kilometers] apart with no replicated grades, the superintendent of public instruction shall determine the school-size weighting factor for each building separately. The superintendent of public instruction shall multiply the school size weighting factor for each building by the school district's weighted average daily membership to determine each building's weighted student units. The superintendent of public instruction shall combine the weighted student units of all buildings in the school district to determine the school-district's weighted student units.

SECTION 11. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-27-04.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

- b. For any school district that becomes an elementary district pursuant to section 15.1-07-27 after the 2017-18 school year, the superintendent shall adjust the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit used to calculate state aid. The superintendent shall divide the district's baseline funding determined in subsection 1 by the district's weighted student units after the school district becomes an elementary district to determine the district's adjusted baseline funding per weighted student unit. The superintendent shall use the district's adjusted baseline funding per weighted student unit in the calculation of state aid for the first school year in which the school district becomes an elementary district and for each year thereafter.
 - c. Beginning with the 2021-22 school year and for each school year thereafter, the superintendent shall reduce the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit. Each year the superintendent shall calculate the amount by which the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit exceeds the payment per weighted student unit provided in subsection 3. The superintendent shall reduce the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit by fifteen percent of the amount by which the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit exceeds the payment per weighted student unit for the 2021-22 school year. For each year thereafter, the reduction percentage is increased by an additional fifteen percent. However, the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, after the reduction, may not be less than the payment per weighted student unit provided in subsection 3.
- a. For the 2021-222023-24 school year, the superintendent shall calculate state aid as the greater of:
 - The district's weighted student units multiplied by ten thousand one hundred thirty-sixfive hundred forty-fourninety-five dollars;
 - (2) One hundred two percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as established in subsection 2, multiplied by the district's weighted student units, not to exceed the district's 2017-18 baseline weighted student units, plus any weighted student units in excess of the

18			2022-23 school year and the reduction percentage increasing by fifteen
19			percent each school year thereafter until the difference is reduced to zero,
20			and then the difference added to the amount determined in paragraph 1.
21	C.	The	superintendent also shall adjust state aid determined in this subsection to

During the 2023-24 interim, the legislative management shall establish a teacher shortage and military families task force facilitated by the superintendent of public instruction to examine employer recruitment needs, applicable state regulations, and benefit options for kindergarten through grade twelve educators within the state, including potential barriers to military personnel and spouses teaching in the classroom. The task force shall identify immediate and long term public policy strategies to address teacher shortage and support for military families and spouses. The task force shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation necessary to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-ninth legislative assembly.

SECTION 18. APPROPRIATION - DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION - GRANTS FOR FREE MEALS. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$6,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of public instruction for the purpose of providing grants to school districts to defray the expenses of providing meals, free of charge, for all students enrolled in public school at or below two hundred percent of the federal poverty guideline, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025. The superintendent of public instruction shall develop guidelines and reporting requirements for the grants.

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1 SECTION 19. APPROPRIATION - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND - DEPARTMENT OF 2 PUBLIC INSTRUCTION - SCIENCE OF READING - REPORT. There is appropriated out of any 3 moneys in the public instruction fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum 4 of \$1,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of public 5 instruction for the purpose of supporting professional learning related to the science of reading 6 and implementing systematic direct literacy instruction, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, 7 and ending June 30, 2025. The superintendent of public instruction shall collaborate with the 8 regional education associations to ensure continuity of access to science of reading training 9 opportunities and develop support processes to deepen science of reading implementation. The 10 superintendent of public instruction shall provide quarterly reports to the legislative management on the implementation and effectiveness of this appropriation on improving 12 educational outcomes, including the number of teachers trained, an anticipated timeline of 13 results trends, and any results trends available.

SECTION 20. APPROPRIATION - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND - DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION - DYSLEXIA IDENTIFICATION TRAINING. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the public instruction fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$279,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of public instruction for the purpose of providing training in identification of dyslexia characteristics to one educator in every school that instructs students in kindergarten through third grade for one year, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025.

SECTION 21. APPROPRIATION - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND - DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION - READING LEARNING PLATFORM TRAINING. There is appropriated out of any moneys in the public instruction fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$558,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of public instruction for the purpose of providing training in a reading learning platform approved by the superintendent of public instruction to one educator in every school that instructs students in kindergarten through third grade for two years, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025.

SECTION 22. EXEMPTION - TRANSFER - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND.

Notwithstanding section 54-44.1-11, if, after the superintendent of public instruction complies with all statutory payment obligations imposed for the 2021-23 biennium, any moneys remain in

- 1 the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of chapter 13 of the 2021 2 Session Laws, the lesser of \$1,000,000 or the remaining amount must be continued into the 3 2023-25 biennium and the office of management and budget shall transfer this amount into the public instruction fund for the purpose of funding professional learning related to the science of 4 5 reading and implementing systematic direct literacy instruction as appropriated in section 4019 6 of this Act. 7 SECTION 23. EXEMPTION - TRANSFER - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND. 8 Notwithstanding section 54-44.1-11, if, after the superintendent of public instruction complies 9 with all statutory payment obligations imposed for the 2021-23 biennium, any moneys remain in 10 the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of chapter 13 of the 2021 11 Session Laws, the lesser of \$887,000 or the remaining amount must be continued into the 12 2023-25 biennium and the office of management and budget shall transfer this amount into the 13 public instruction fund for the purpose of funding a higher education reading program, training in 14 identification of dyslexia characteristics, and reading training for kindergarten through grade 15 three teachers as appropriated in sections 20 and 21 of this Act. 16 SECTION 24. TRANSFER - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND TO SCHOOL 17 CONSTRUCTION ASSISTANCE REVOLVING LOAN FUND. The office of management and 18 budget shall transfer the sum of \$75,000,000 from the foundation aid stabilization fund to the 19 school construction assistance revolving loan fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, 20 and ending June 30, 2025. 21
 - SECTION 25. EFFECTIVE DATE. Section 59 of this Act becomes effective on July 1, 2024.
- 22 SECTION 26. EXPIRATION DATE. Section 13 of this Act is effective through June 30,
- 23 2025, and after that date is ineffective.

SECTION 27. EMERGENCY. This Act is declared to be an emergency measure.
