## **HOUSE BILL NO. 1150**

- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact three new sections to chapter 12.1-30 of the North Dakota
- 2 Century Code, relating to Sunday closing laws; to amend and reenact section 12.1-30-04 of the
- 3 North Dakota Century Code, relating to Sunday closing laws and retail agreements; and to
- 4 provide a penalty.

## 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- 6 **SECTION 1.** A new section to chapter 12.1-30 of the North Dakota Century Code is created 7 and enacted as follows:
- 8 <u>Business or labor on Sunday Exemptions Classification of offenses.</u>
- 9 <u>1. Except as otherwise provided in sections 2 and 3 of this Act, it is a class B</u>
- misdemeanor for any person between the hours of twelve midnight and twelve noon
- 11 <u>on Sunday to:</u>
- 12 <u>a. Engage in or conduct business or labor for profit in the usual manner and</u>
- 13 location.
- b. Operate a place of business open to the public.
- 15 <u>c.</u> Authorize or direct that person's employees or agents to take action prohibited
  under this section.
- 17 <u>2. The prohibition in subsection 1 does not apply to a person who in good faith observes</u>
- a day other than Sunday as the Sabbath, if that person refrains from engaging in or
- conducting business or labor for profit and closes the place of business to the public
- between the hours of twelve midnight and twelve noon on the day observed as the
- Sabbath.
- 22 <u>3. The attorney general, a state's attorney, a mayor, a city manager, or a city attorney</u>
- 23 may petition a district court, for the district where a violation is occurring, to enjoin a
- 24 violation in this section.

- 1 **SECTION 2.** A new section to chapter 12.1-30 of the North Dakota Century Code is created
- 2 and enacted as follows:
- 3 <u>Items prohibited from sale or rental on Sundays.</u>
- 4 Except for items sold at hobby shows, craft shows, fairs, exhibits, occasional rummage
- 5 sales, including garage sales or other sales for which a sales tax permit is not required, and
- 6 tourist attractions that derive at least fifty percent of the attraction's annual gross sales from
- 7 seasonal or tourist customers, the sale or rental of any of the following items between the hours
- 8 of twelve midnight and twelve noon on Sunday is prohibited:
- 9 <u>1. Clothing other than work gloves and infant supplies.</u>
- 10 <u>2.</u> <u>Clothing accessories.</u>
- 11 <u>3. Wearing apparel other than that sold to a transient traveler under emergency</u>
- 12 <u>conditions.</u>
- 4. Footwear.
- 14 <u>5.</u> <u>Headwear.</u>
- 15 <u>6. Home, business, office, or outdoor furniture.</u>
- 16 <u>7. Kitchenware.</u>
- 17 <u>8. Kitchen utensils.</u>
- 18 <u>9.</u> <u>China.</u>
- 19 <u>10.</u> <u>Home appliances.</u>
- 20 <u>11.</u> Stoves.
- 21 <u>12.</u> Refrigerators.
- 22 13. Air conditioners.
- 23 <u>14.</u> <u>Electric fans.</u>

- 27 **SECTION 3.** A new section to chapter 12.1-30 of the North Dakota Century Code is created
- 28 and enacted as follows:

- 1 Businesses allowed to operate on Sunday Limitations.
- 2 Subject to the limitations of this section and section 2 of this Act, a business specified in this
- 3 section may operate in the business's usual manner, location, and for its usual purpose. The
- 4 <u>businesses authorized under this section to operate on Sunday include:</u>
- 5 <u>1. Restaurants, cafeterias, or other prepared food service organizations.</u>
- 6 <u>2. Hotels, motels, and other lodging facilities.</u>
- 7 <u>3. Hospitals and nursing homes, including the sale of giftware on the premises.</u>
- 8 <u>4.</u> <u>Dispensaries of drugs and medicines.</u>
- 9 <u>5.</u> <u>Ambulance and burial services.</u>
- 10 <u>6.</u> <u>Generation and distribution of electric power, water, steam, natural gas, oil, or other</u>
- 11 <u>fuel used as a necessary utility.</u>
- 12 <u>7.</u> <u>Distribution of gas, oil, and other fuels.</u>
- 13 <u>8. Telephone, telegraph, and messenger services.</u>
- 14 <u>9. Heating, refrigeration, and cooling services.</u>
- 15 <u>10.</u> Railroad, bus, trolley, subway, taxi, and limousine services.
- 16 <u>11.</u> <u>Water, air, and land transportation services and attendant facilities.</u>
- 17 <u>12.</u> <u>Cold storage warehouse.</u>
- 18 <u>13.</u> <u>Ice manufacturing and distribution facilities and services.</u>
- 19 <u>14.</u> <u>Minimal maintenance of equipment and machinery.</u>
- 20 <u>15.</u> Plant and industrial protection services.
- 21 <u>16.</u> <u>Industries where continuous processing or manufacturing is required by the very</u>
- 22 nature of the process involved.
- 23 <u>17.</u> Newspaper publication and distribution.
- 24 <u>18.</u> Newsstands.
- 25 <u>19.</u> Radio and television broadcasting.
- 26 <u>20.</u> <u>Motion picture, theatrical, and musical performances.</u>
- 27 <u>21. Motor vehicle service stations that sell motor fuel and motor oil, and which customarily</u>

- 29 motor vehicle:
- a. Air-conditioning system.
- b. Batteries.

- 3 **SECTION 4. AMENDMENT.** Section 12.1-30-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is 4 amended and reenacted as follows:
- 5 12.1-30-04. Retail business leases or agreements Penalty.
- 6 A retail business may not be required to be open on Sunday as a part of a lease agreement,
- 7 franchise agreement, or any other contractual arrangement entered and executed before
- 8 January 1, 2019. A violation of this section is a class A misdemeanor.
