1	Indirect practice without a license for foreign practitioners.
2	A foreign practitioner may provide veterinary services in this state which fall within the
3	scope of practice designated by the foreign practitioner's license and by this chapter without
4	obtaining a license from the board if the services are provided through telehealth and are a
5	continuation of a previously established veterinarian-client-patient relationship as defined under
6	this chapter.
7	SECTION 29. A new section to chapter 43-29 of the North Dakota Century Code is created
8	and enacted as follows:
9	Specialized or holistic animal trade - Exceptions.
10	1. This chapter does not apply to an individual who engages in the practice of a
11	specialized or holistic trade on an animal, requiring manual skills and special training.
12	2. An individual practicing under the exception of this section:
13	a. Shall disclose the individual is not a licensed veterinarian or veterinary technician
14	to the client; and
15	b. May not:
16	(1) Provide a diagnosis or prognosis:
17	(2) Prescribe a medication; or
18	(3) Perform a surgical treatment.
19	3. For purposes of this section, "specialized or holistic trade" includes:
20	a. An accepted livestock management practice;
21	b. Acupuncture or accupressure;
22	c. Grooming:
23	d. Horseshoeing or farrier work;
24	e. Massage therapy:
25	f. Microchip implantation;
26	g. Nonveterinarian dentistry; and
27	h. Training or conditioning.
28	SECTION 30. REPEAL. Sections 43-29-09, 43-29-10, 43-29-11, and 43-29-12.1 of the
29	North Dakota Century Code are repealed.
