20	the skilled workforce loan repayment program fund and the skilled workforce scholarship fund;

- 1 to amend and reenact subsection 17 of section 1 of chapter 550 of the 2021 Special Session
- 2 Session Laws, relating to funding for hyperbaric oxygen therapy; to amend and reenact
- 3 sections 7, 8, and 9 of chapter 3 of the 2023 Session Laws, relating to transfers from the Bank
- 4 of North Dakota to the skilled workforce loan repayment program fund, the skilled workforce
- 5 scholarship fund, and to the state board of higher education for dual-credit tuition scholarships;
- 6 to repeal section 15-10-74 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the naming of the
- 7 Bismarck state college polytechnic center; to authorize the state board of higher education to
- 8 issue and sell bonds for capital projects; to provide for a transfer; to provide for the conveyance
- 9 of real property; to provide for a legislative management higher education funding review
- 10 committee; to provide for a report; to provide legislative intent; and to provide an exemption; to
- 11 provide for application; and to declare an emergency.

12 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from other funds derived from special funds and federal funds, to the state board of higher education and to the entities and institutions under the supervision of the board for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the state board of higher education and the entities and institutions under the supervision of the board, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2025period beginning with the effective date of this Act, and ending June 30, 2027, as follows:

SECTION 3. ADDITIONAL FEDERAL, PRIVATE, AND OTHER FUNDS -

APPROPRIATION. All funds, in addition to those appropriated in section 1 of this Act, from federal, private, and other sources for competitive grants or other funds that the legislative assembly has not indicated the intent to reject, including tuition revenue, received by the state board of higher education and the institutions and entities under the control of the state board of higher education, are appropriated to the board and those institutions and entities, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027. All additional funds received under the North Dakota-Minnesota reciprocity agreement during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027, are appropriated to the state board of higher education for reimbursement to institutions under the control of the board.

SECTION 4. USE OF EXTRAORDINARY REPAIRS FUNDING - MATCHING FUNDS.  - Any amounts remaining from the \$8,500,000 appropriated from other funds to
 Bismarck state college for the multipurpose academic and athletic center in section 2
 of chapter 638 of the 2023 Special Session Session Laws;
 - 3. Any amounts remaining from the \$1,500,000 appropriated from Bank of North Dakota profits for dual-credit scholarships in section 1 of chapter 3 of the 2023 Session Laws;
 - 4. Any amounts remaining from the funding appropriated from federal funds derived from the state fiscal recovery fund to the state board of higher education and institutions under the control of the state board of higher education in section 1 of chapter 548 and section 1 of chapter 550 of the 2021 Special Session Session Laws and continued into the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025, in section 42 of chapter 3 of the 2023 Session Laws.

Any proceeds from the sale of land pursuant to this section may be used only for deferred maintenance; and extraordinary repairs, or legislatively-authorized capital projects.

SECTION 43. EXEMPTION - SALE OF PROPERTY AUTHORIZED - USE OF PROCEEDS. The state of North Dakota, by and through the state board of higher education, may sell and convey certain real property located at the intersection of Demers avenue and

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- 1 forty-second street north, in the northwest corner, known as 4201 James Ray drive, the south 2 east corner of lot 1, block 1, estimated to be 2.74 acres, in the records of the city of Grand 3 Forks. If any real property authorized to be conveyed under this section is conveyed, the terms 4 of conveyance must be determined jointly by the state board of higher education or a designee 5 of the board and the commissioner of university and school lands. Sections 54-01-05.2 and 6 54-01-05.5 do not apply to the transfers authorized by this section. Any proceeds from the sale 7 of land pursuant to this section may be used only for deferred maintenance, and extraordinary 8 repairs, or legislatively authorized capital projects. 9 SECTION 44. UNIVERSITY OF NORTH DAKOTA SCHOOL OF MEDICINE AND HEALTH
 - SCIENCES UNIVERSITY OF NORTH DAKOTA PHYSICIAN ASSISTANT PROGRAM STUDENT RESIDENCY REPORT. The university of North Dakota shall develop and implement student recruitment and acceptance strategies to increase the number of resident students enrolled in the school of medicine and health sciences and to increase the number of resident students enrolled in the physician assistant program, with a goal for eighty-five percent of students enrolled at the school of medicine and health sciences and in the physician assistant program to be residents of the state by the fall 2030 semester. The university of North Dakota shall provide an annual report to the legislative management regarding strategies under consideration and implemented to increase resident student enrollment in the school of medicine and health sciences and in the physician assistant program, during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.

SECTION 45. HIGHER EDUCATION FUNDING REVIEW COMMITTEE - REPORT TO THE LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT.

30	1. The state	e board of higher education shall study the costs and benefits of a system of

- 2. It is the intent of the sixty-ninth legislative assembly that:

It is the intent of the sixty-ninth legislative assembly that wind energy technology and law enforcement courses be transferred to the career and technical education instructional program classification within the higher education funding formula.

SECTION 49. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - UNIVERSITY OF NORTH DAKOTA SCHOOL OF MEDICINE AND HEALTH SCIENCES - ALLIED HEALTH FACILITY. It is the intent of the sixty-ninth legislative assembly that an allied health facility expansion be completed at the university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences. It is further the intent of the sixty-ninth legislative assembly that the seventieth legislative assembly consider supporting the completion of the allied health facility project at the university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences.

SECTION 50. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - SEPARATION AGREEMENTS. It is the intent of the sixty-ninth legislative assembly that the state board of higher education not enter into any separation or early retirement agreements with a cost to the state or the institutions under the control of the state board of higher education during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.

SECTION 51. TUITION RATE INCREASE LIMITATIONS.

- Except as provided in this section, notwithstanding any other provision of law, the state
 board of higher education may not increase tuition rates for resident students
 attending institutions of higher education under its control during the 2025-26
 academic year by more than four percent as compared to the tuition rate in effect
 during the 2025 spring semester.
- 2. Except as provided in this section, notwithstanding any other provision of law, the state board of higher education may not increase tuition rates for resident students attending institutions of higher education under its control during the 2026-27 academic year by more than four percent as compared to the tuition rate in effect during the 2026 spring semester.
- 3. Tuition rates charged for high-cost undergraduate differentiated tuition programs and for graduate level programs, including programs offered through the university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences, the university of North Dakota school of law, or the North Dakota state university school of pharmacy, may be increased by up to five percent for the 2025-26 academic year as compared to the tuition rate in effect during the 2025 spring semester.
- 4. Tuition rates charged for high-cost undergraduate differentiated tuition programs and for graduate level programs, including programs offered through the university of North Dakota school of medicine and health sciences, the university of North Dakota school of law, or the North Dakota state university school of pharmacy, may be increased by up to five percent for the 2026-27 academic year as compared to the tuition rate in effect during the 2026 spring semester.
- 5. This section does not apply to tuition rates for nonresident students attending institutions of higher education under the control of the state board of higher education. For purposes of this section, the residency of students for tuition purposes must be determined under section 15-10-19.1.
- 6. This section does not apply to tuition rates determined under tuition reciprocity agreements entered into by the state board of higher education with other states or state education compacts.
- 7. For purposes of this section, an institution must calculate a resident tuition rate increase based on the tuition rate paid by an average full-time resident student.

- SECTION 52. APPLICATION. Section 21 of this Act applies to individuals initially entering a professional student exchange program in veterinary medicine, dentistry, or optometry after June 30, 2026.
- SECTION 53. EMERGENCY. The capital assets line items in section 1 and sections 4, 5, 10, 11, 12, 13, 19, 39, 42, and 43 of this Act are declared to be an emergency measure.

Senate Bill No. 2003 - Other Changes - House Action

This amendment also:

- Identifies \$186,496,814 from the strategic investment and improvements fund (SIIF) is included in Section 1 for various projects and programs.
- Adds a section to direct the North Dakota University System office to transfer \$342,000 to Lake Region State College for the cost of an early retirement agreement.
- Adjusts sections relating to the University System capital building fund to reduce the transfer from SIIF to the fund by \$5 million, to provide a total of \$26.5 million from SIIF for Tiers II and III of the University System capital building fund. Tier III matching fund requirements are adjusted to require \$1 of matching funds for every \$1 from Tier III of the University System capital building fund for campuses excluding the University of North Dakota (UND) and North Dakota State University (NDSU). The House provided for Tier III matching requirements for UND and NDSU to remain \$2 of matching funds for every \$1 from Tier III.
- Adjusts allocations from the higher education challenge matching grants program to provide \$2,125,000 for Dickinson State University, the same level of funding as Bismarck State College, Minot State University, and the North Dakota State College of Science.
- Provides for the State Board of Higher Education to establish a committee, guidelines, and application process for the administration of the workforce education innovation grant program.

- Adds a section to allow any institution under the control of the State Board of Higher Education to offer dualcredit courses in the county in which the institution's primary campus is located.
- Adds a section requiring repayment of professional student exchange program funding by students who do not return to work in the state.
- Adds a section to clarify the authority and responsibility for the appointment of institution presidents, including
 who determines and selects a consultant to assist in the recruitment of applicants to be an institution president.
- Adds a section regarding the terms of the contract for the Commissioner of Higher Education, including the source of funds for a position at an institution under the control of the State Board of Higher Education awarded as a term of the contract.
- Amends House Bill No. 1437, as approved by the 69th Legislative Assembly, relating to academic tenure policy at institutions of higher education.
- Adjusts the higher education funding formula to increase the pharmacy program professional credit weight from 9 to 14. The Senate increased the pharmacy program professional credit weight to 25.
- · Adjusts the qualification requirements for the scholars program.
- Repeals North Dakota Century Code Section 15-10-74, relating to the naming of the Bismarck State College polytechnic center the Larry C. Skogen polytechnic institute.
- Restricts the use of revenue generated from the sale of land by UND to deferred maintenance and extraordinary repairs.
- Adds a section to direct UND to develop and implement student recruitment and acceptance strategies to
 increase resident student enrollment at the School of Medicine and Health Sciences and in the physician
 assistant program.
- · Adds a section to provide for a report to the Legislative Management regarding Praxis core testing performance.
- Adds a section to provide for the hiring of a new Commissioner of higher education and to direct the State
 Board of Higher Education to study the costs and benefits of a system of higher education led by a chancellor
 compared to a commissioner.
- Adds a section of legislative intent to express support for the completion of an allied health facility expansion at the UND School of Medicine and Health Sciences.
- Adds a section to provide legislative intent that the State Board of Higher Education not enter into any separation or early retirement agreements with a cost to the state and its institutions.
- Adds a section to limit tuition rate increases.
- Adds an emergency clause for capital project, bonding, and land sale sections in the bill.
