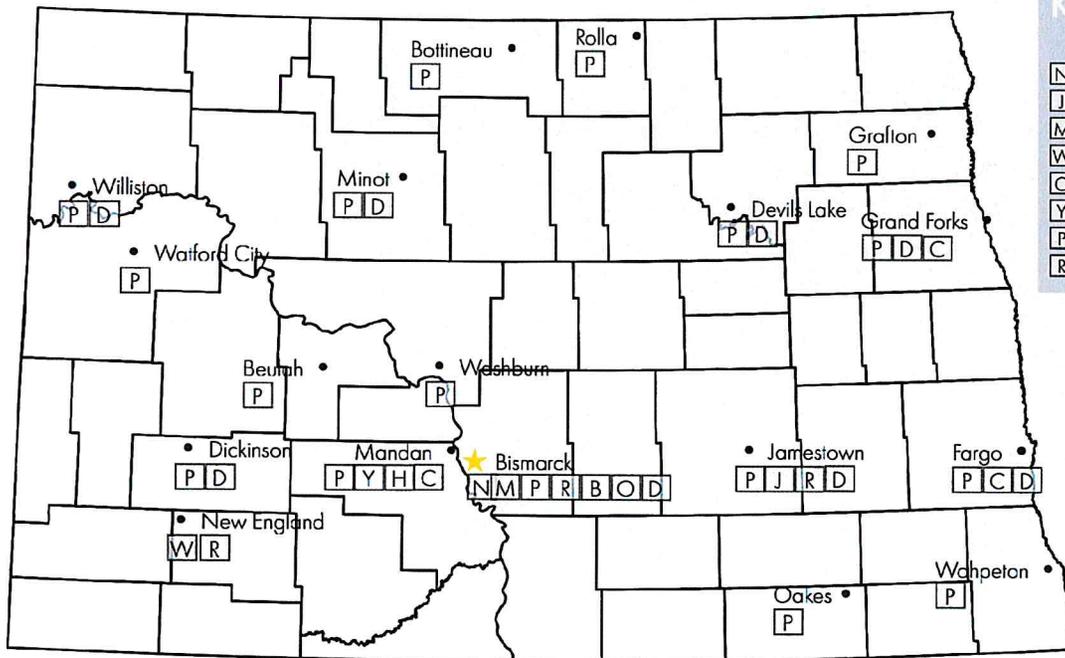

# Adult Facilities

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- Facilities – Capacity 1624 for men and 262 for women
  - North Dakota State Penitentiary – Maximum custody prison for men – Intake, Orientation, Behavior Intervention Unit, Infirmary, Unity Village (18 – 25-year-old unit)
  - James River Correction Center – Medium custody prison for men – Special Assistance Unit, JR Minimum Unit (formerly Tompkins), Akisni Warrior's Lodge (Native American Cultural focused unit)
  - Missouri River Correction Center – Minimum custody prison for men – Transitional Housing Unit
  - Heart River Correction Center – Minimum Custody facility for women
  - Contract – Dakota Women's Correction and Rehabilitation Center – All custody facility for women – Intake, Orientation, Special Management Unit, Infirmary

# Transitional Facilities and County Jails

- Contract Transitional Facilities (Over 200 people (inmates) being served)
  - Bismarck Transition Center
    - Women's Treatment and Recovery Unit: 88 women completed the program in 2024
  - Centre, Inc.: Mandan (all genders), Fargo (all genders) and Grand Forks (men)
  - Lake Region Residential Reentry Center (men)
  - Work Release Programs – Ward County and Southwest Multi-County Corrections (men)
- Increased population – Avg 209 to increase to 307
  - 25–27 Budget Request - \$22,194,701
- Northwest Region – 25 Bed Facility \$1,600,000
- Jail Rent – Avg 35 to increase to 233
  - 25-27 Budget Request- \$16 million plus \$1.5 million in programming
  - The total request for Transitional Facilities is \$22,194,701
  - Lake Region – Adding Substance Abuse Treatment

# Transitional Facilities SB 2128

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## FISCAL IMPACTS OF SB 2128:

- \$1,254,074 – Cost to bring residents currently in transitional facilities back in August 2025 to finish their sentences.
- \$6,836,990 – Eliminate resident access to transitional facilities. This is the incremental cost of paying for other DOCR facilities in place of transitional facilities.

## SOCIAL COSTS (est. per biennium):

- Residents will not be able to earn market wages
  - \$600,000 Lost Fines/Fees/Restitution
  - \$1,550,727 Lost Taxes (federal, state & Medicare)
  - \$1,923,470 Lost Child Support

# Transitional Facility Eligibility

## **Upon arrival at the North Dakota State Penitentiary or Dakota Women's Correctional Rehab Center:**

- 4-week orientation period including various validated risk assessments focusing on classification, criminogenic risk and treatment needs.
- Case planning committee establishes a case plan and the inmate's validated classification or risk level is set.

## **Adult Transition Program (ATP):**

- A treatment and work release program for adults in custody (inmates) offered through a transitional facility.

## **Eligibility and Acceptance requirements for ATP:**

- Minimum Custody
- Compliant with work, education, and treatment programming
- Within 12 months of release opportunity (parole hearing/parole release date/good time release date)
  - Those serving a minimum mandatory or 85% truth in sentencing sentence are only eligible for an ATP the last 6 months of their sentence.
- Case reviewed and approved by the Warden of Transitional Facilities (males), Women's Services Manager (females)
  - Institutional adjustment – Behavior choices while in custody
  - Past incarceration history
  - Victim impacts
  - Nature of current and past offenses
  - Acceptance by Transitional Facility

# Transitional Facility Eligibility

**Work Release:** (This program is for those sentenced under an 85% or minimum mandatory sentence.)

- Off-site work assignments for approved adults in custody at a rate commensurate with state labor laws.
- In 2011, HB 1028, amended 12-48.1-02 to allow for those with an 85% sentence or those with a minimum mandatory sentence who do not have the opportunity for parole to be eligible for up to 6 months work or education release.
- The law was passed in the 62nd Legislative Assembly in 2011 as a public safety and supervised transition from prison to the community program as people neared the end of their sentence.
- HB 1028 passed the House 92-0 and the Senate 44-0.
- This public safety tool has been used sparingly to reduce risk to the community with additional supports and accountability for those returning to our community.
  - Only 25% of eligible candidates in 2024 were approved for the program.

## **Eligibility requirements:**

- Must have served 85% of the balance total per ND Law and eligible for transition the last 6 months of their sentence (per Century Code changes in 2011)
- Compliant with work, education, and treatment programming
- Within 6 months of release opportunity (parole/good time release date)
- Case reviewed and approved by the Warden of Transitional Facilities (males), Women's Services Manager (females)
- Reviewed and approved by the Director of the DOCR
- Reviewed and approved by the Parole Board depending on sentence length.

# ROI - Transitional Facilities

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- Inmates, Parolees and people on probation are served
- 92% of violent offenders who reenter society through a transitional facility do not commit another violent act returning them to a ND prison
- 98% of non-violent offenders who reenter society through a transitional facility do not commit a violent act returning them to a ND prison.
- 513 inmates attempted transition through a transitional facility and 306 received primary treatment
- 80% success rate...Meaning 10% returned to a prison for non-disciplinary reasons and 10% returned to prison for not complying with transitional program requirements

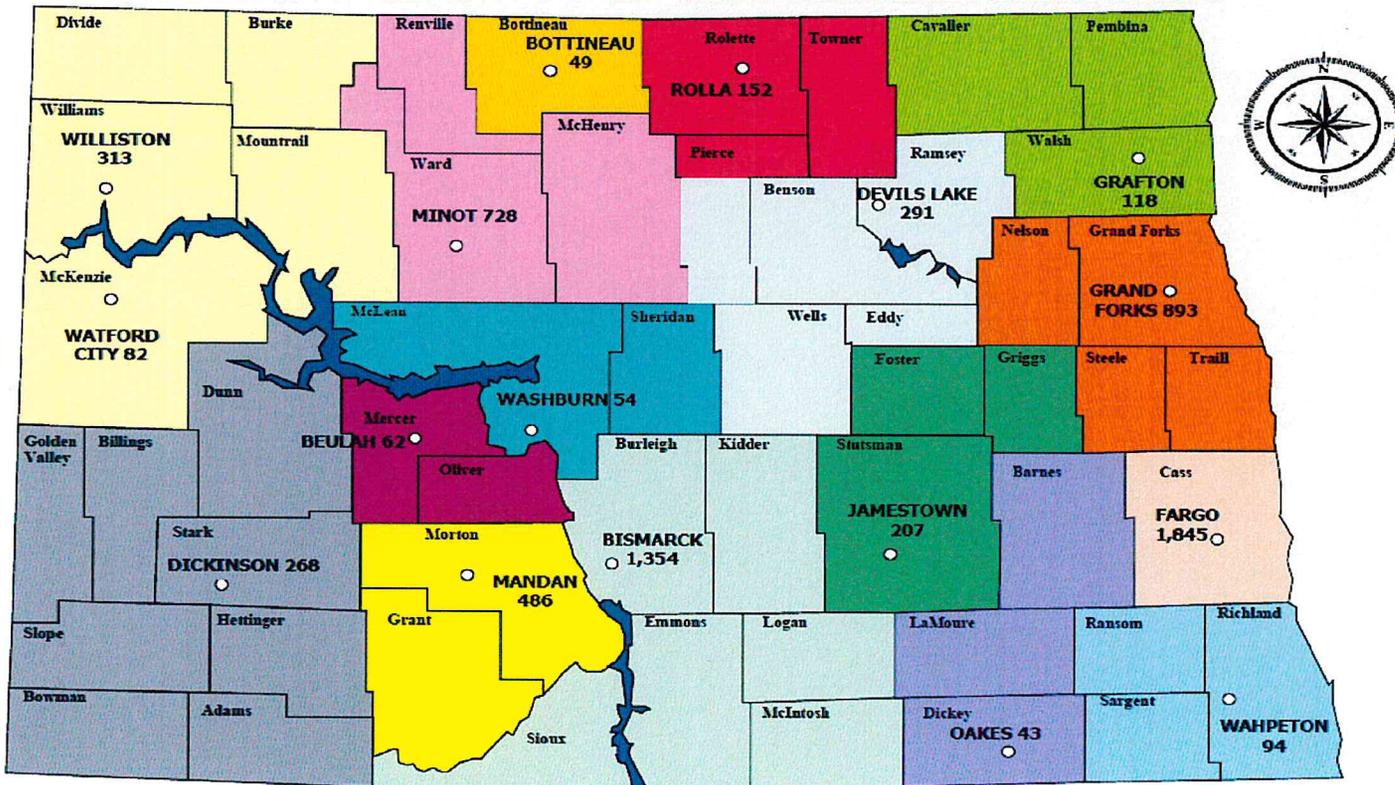

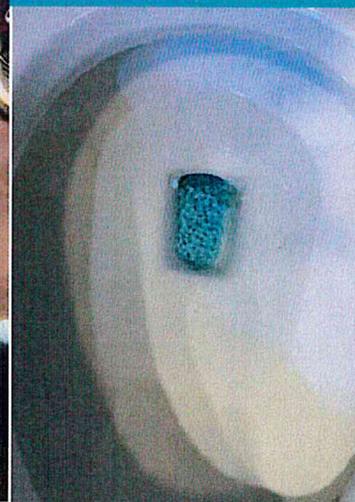

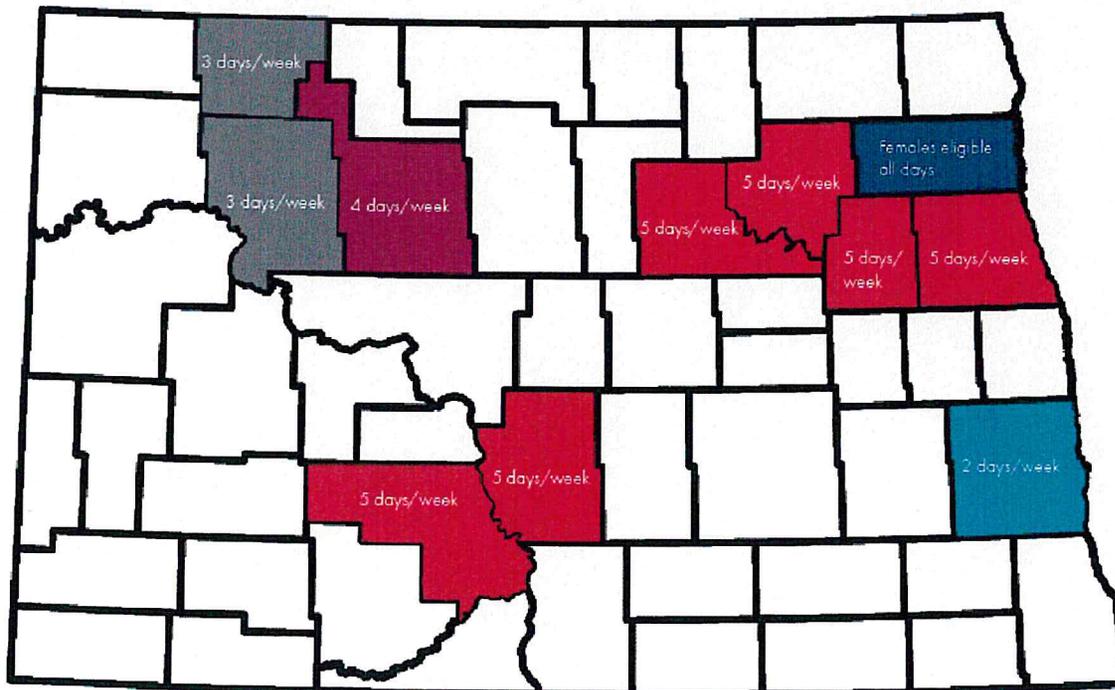

# Pretrial Services Locations

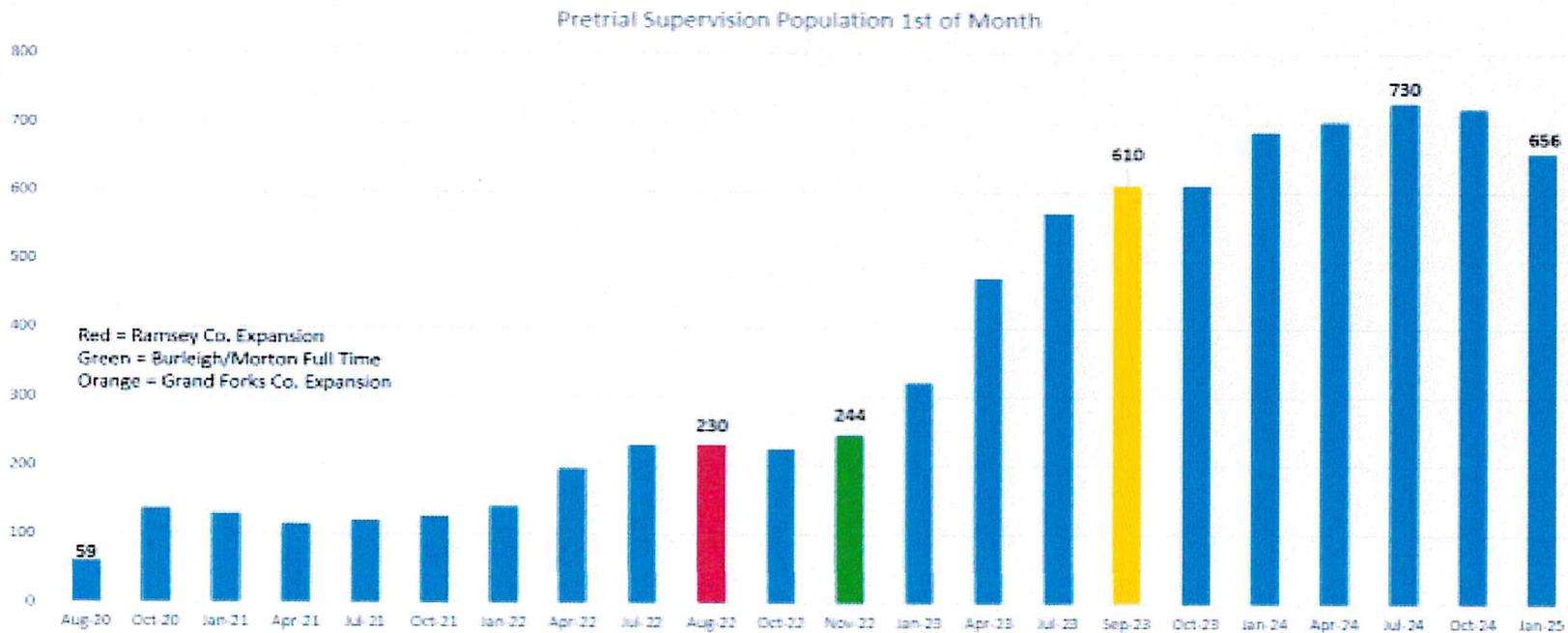

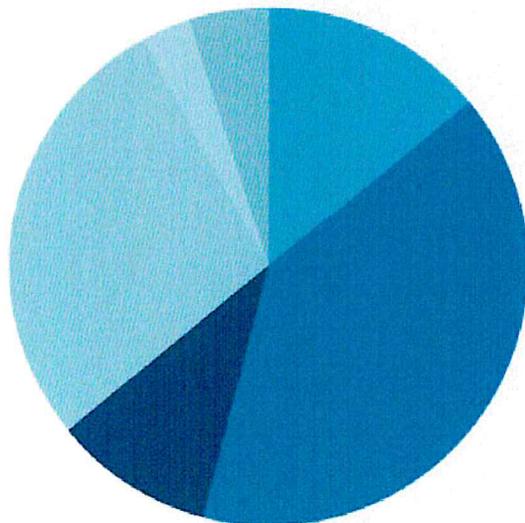

# Pretrial Services = Positive Jail Capacity

- Burleigh/Morton Detention - 60% of inmates are **pre-sentence** and average 12 days of incarceration.
  - 403 people on Pre-Trial services x 60% = 242.
  - 303 current population + 242 = 545. Resulting in 10 under capacity.
- Cass County Detention Center – 85% of inmates are pre-sentence and average 45 days of incarceration.
  - 80 people on Pre-trial x 85% = 68.
  - 321 current population + 68 = 389. Resulting in 41 **over** capacity
  - Cass County would theoretically need to house inmates in another jail costing approximately \$4100 per day.
- Grand Forks Detention Center – 70% of inmates are pre-sentence and average 22 days of incarceration.
  - 52 people on Pre-trial services x 70% = 36.
  - 216 current population + 36 = 252. Resulting in **over** capacity by 26 inmates.
  - Grand Forks County would theoretically need to house inmates in another county jail costing approximately \$2600 per day.
- Lake Region Detention Center – 83% of inmates are pre-sentence and average 12 days of incarceration.
  - 73 people on Pre-Trial services x 83% = 61.
  - 57 current population + 61 = 118. Resulting in 13 **over** capacity.
- Ward County Detention Center – 93% of inmates are pre-sentence and average 13 days of incarceration.
  - 77 people on Pre-trial services x 93% = 71.
  - 159 current population + 71 = 230. Resulting in 56 under capacity.

- 155 admissions to DJS custody caseload each year
- Division of Juvenile Services supervises all cases over a variety of placement settings.
  - Youth Correction Center – 100 admissions each year, plus 90 detention admissions each year
- **Analysis in 2024 of all youth released in 2022 show 46% had no further arrests in the 2-years post discharge.**
- Of those who were arrested, about half were charged with a misdemeanor
- Non-custodial services provided include operation of the Interstate Compact for Juveniles, in-home family therapy, and school-based treatment programs

## WHAT IS THE IMPACT OF ALL THIS TURNOVER?

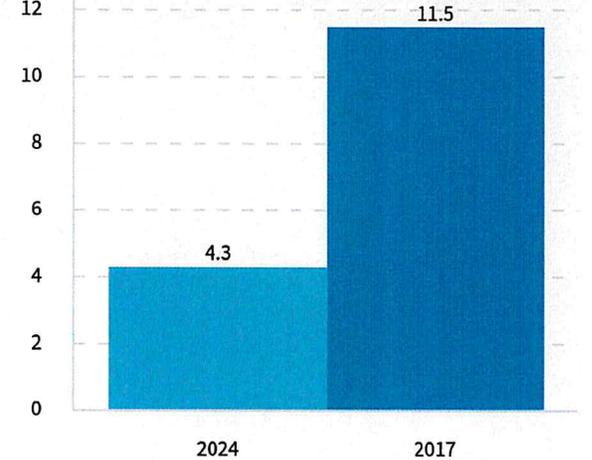
CO and PO Years of Service P&P Officer

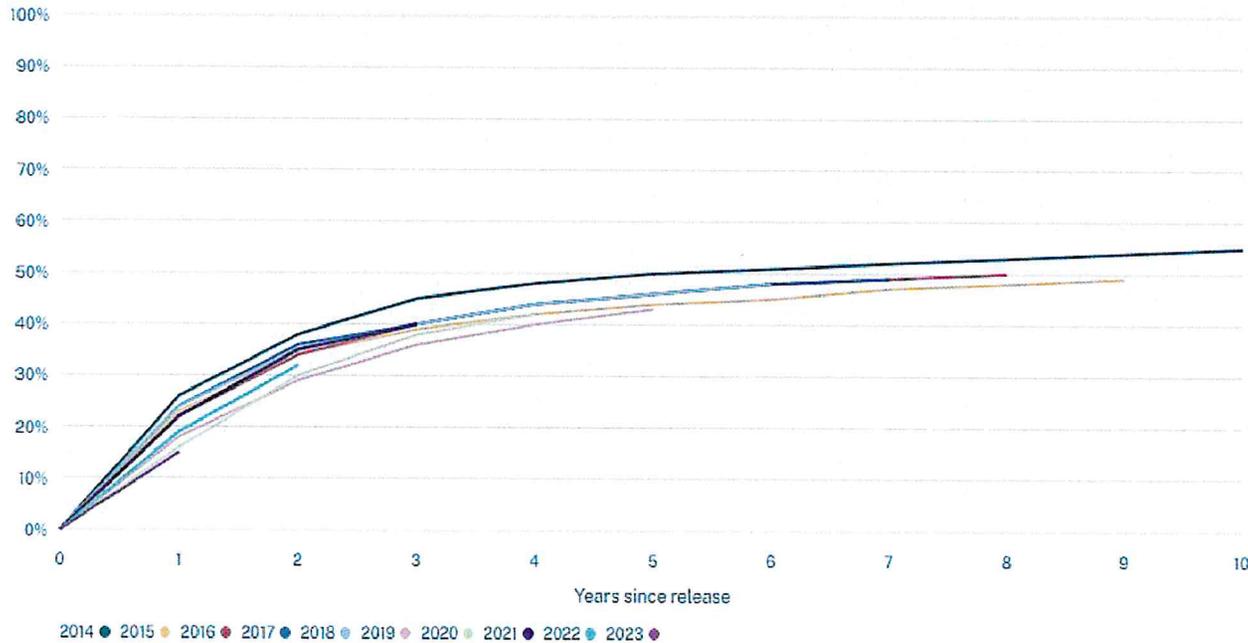
## Facility and Community Operations:

# Re-Entry

- In 2023, the 68th Legislative Assembly passed House Concurrent Resolution (HCR) 3026, which authorized an interim study to assess the landscape of reentry services in the state and identify research-based strategies to improve reentry outcomes. Technical assistance provided by the Bureau of Justice Assistance and the Crime and Justice Institute.
- Key Findings:
  - North Dakota's prison population is growing at an alarming rate, against national trends. As the number of incarcerated adults in the U.S. declined by approximately 25 percent between 2011 and 2021, North Dakota's prison population increased by over 18 percent
  - Admissions are largely comprised of community supervision violations (48 percent in 2023) and alcohol and drug offenses (36 percent in 2023).
  - Significantly, Black and Native American individuals are entering DOCR and beginning community supervision at higher rates, as well as have higher percentages of supervision revocations.
  - Unmet behavioral health needs drive most community supervision revocations as well as admissions to prison.
  - It was estimated that if changes across the systems do not occur, by 2035, the projected prison growth will cost the DOCR \$27.2 million.

# Re-Entry

- The North Dakota Justice Reinvestment Initiative Reentry Study Work Group focused on the front-end of the system and the back end of the system. As a result, these five overarching goals were created:
  - Expand Pathways to Alternatives to Incarceration;
  - Decrease the Number of Individuals Entering Prison Due to a Drug or Alcohol Offense, or Revocation from Supervision;
  - Reduce Racial Disparities in the Criminal Justice System;
  - Further Support Successful Transition Back into the Community; and
  - Increase Cross-agency Collaboration Between System Partners.
- These 5 goals are encompassed in three bills that will be introduced in this session: 1425, 1417, and 1549
  - HB 1425 targets the "front-end" of reentry, including strengthening the continuum of deflection, diversion, and pretrial services to expand pathways to alternatives to incarceration
    - \$1,000,000 (FTE & contracting with 3rd party)
    - \$55,000 (consulting svc for the study)
  - HB 1417 focuses on supervision violations and indigent defense (public defenders)
    - \$1,500,000 loss of special fund revenue (SB 2015)
  - HB 1549 focuses on "back-end" of reentry, including stronger collaborations that support successful transitions back into the community.
    - Fund a temporary coordinator; however, no fiscal note.

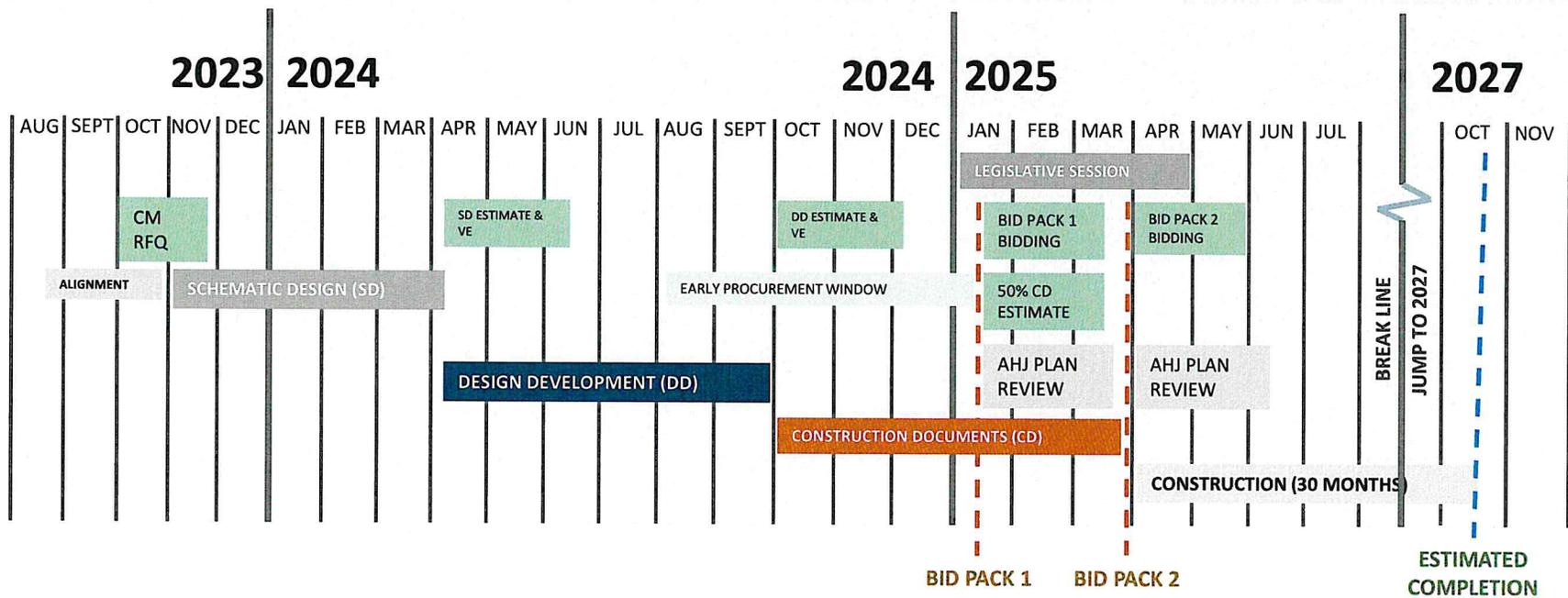

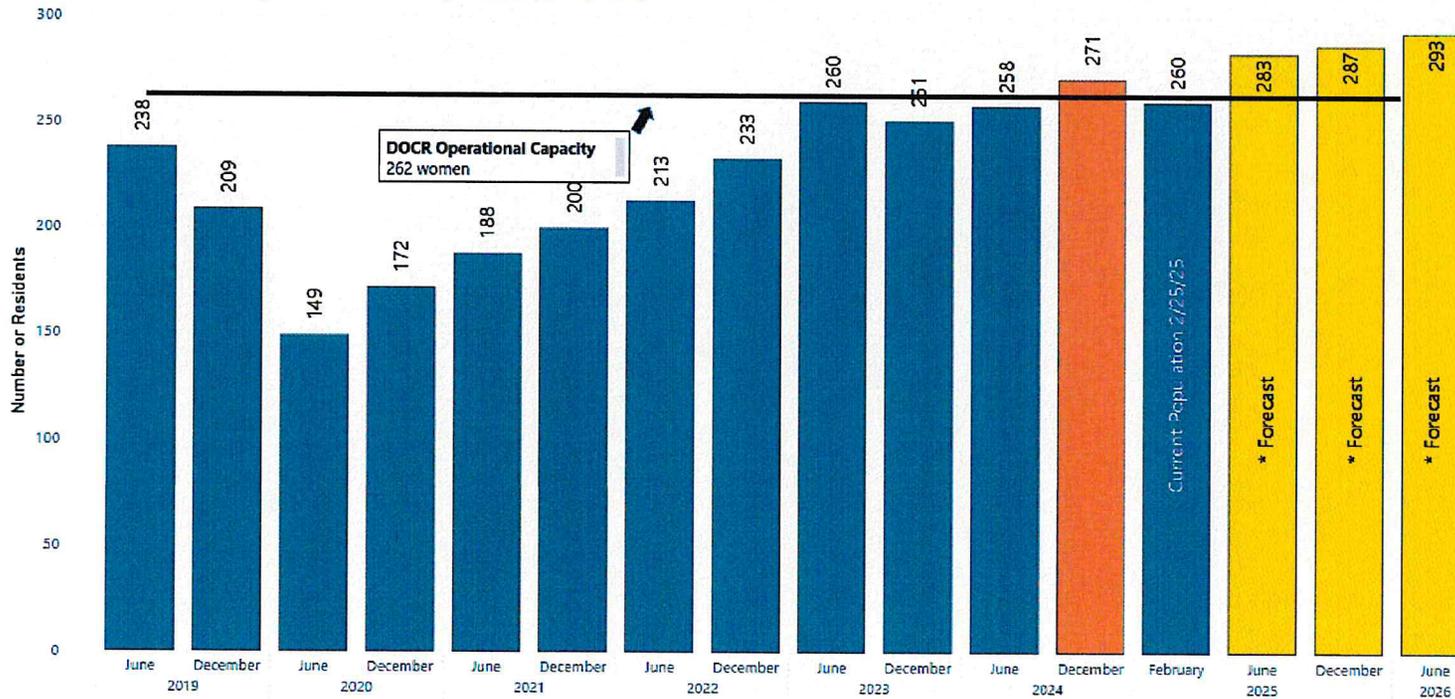
### PROJECT TIMELINE

## Count of Female Residents and Physical Contraints

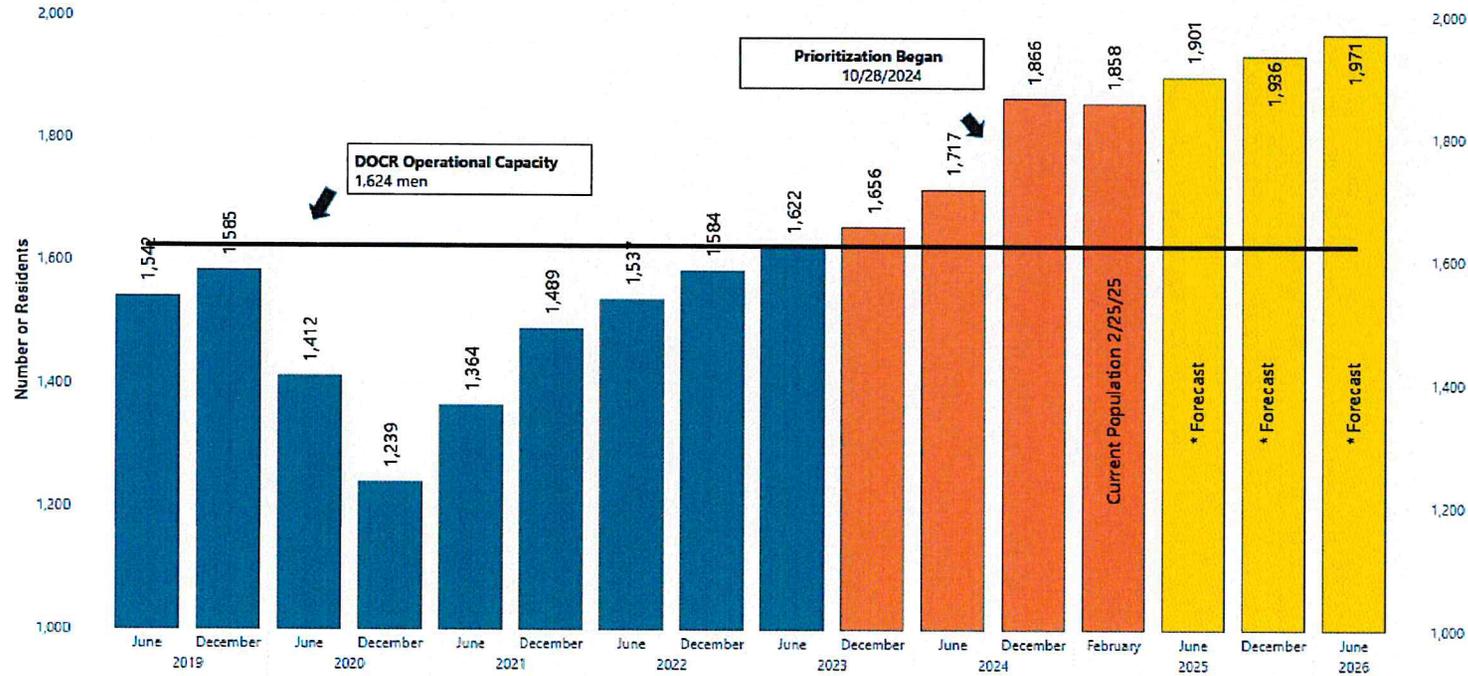
Month End Count, Budgeted Count & Operational Capacity

Month End Count & Operational Capacity



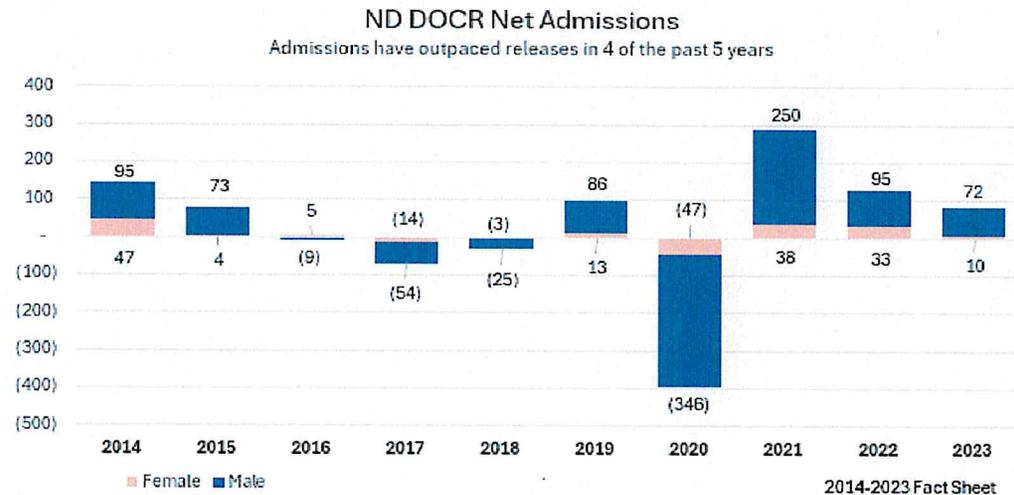

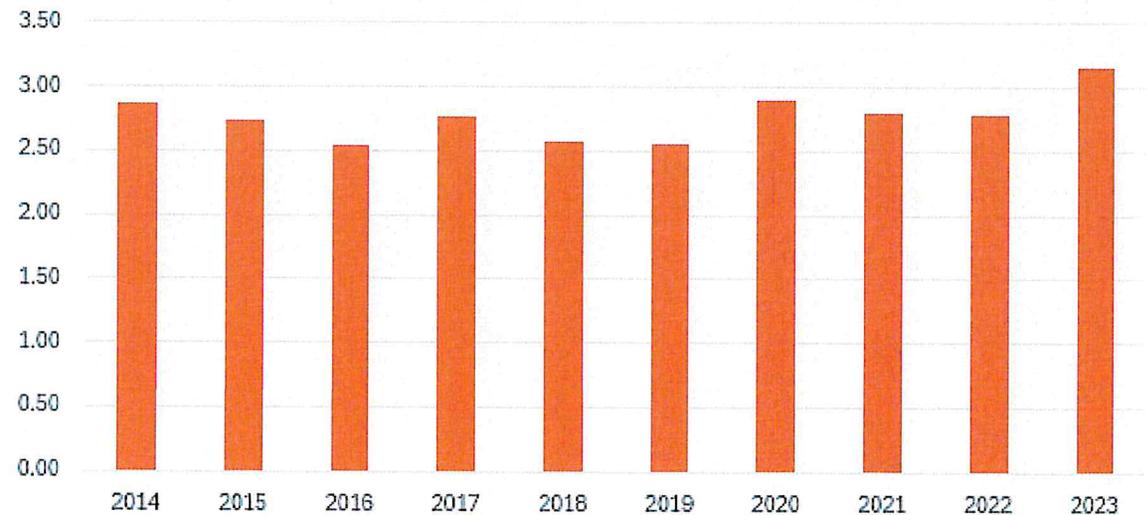


# Prison Population Average Length of Stay

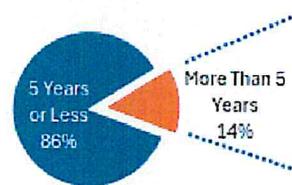


# Prison Population 5 Years or More

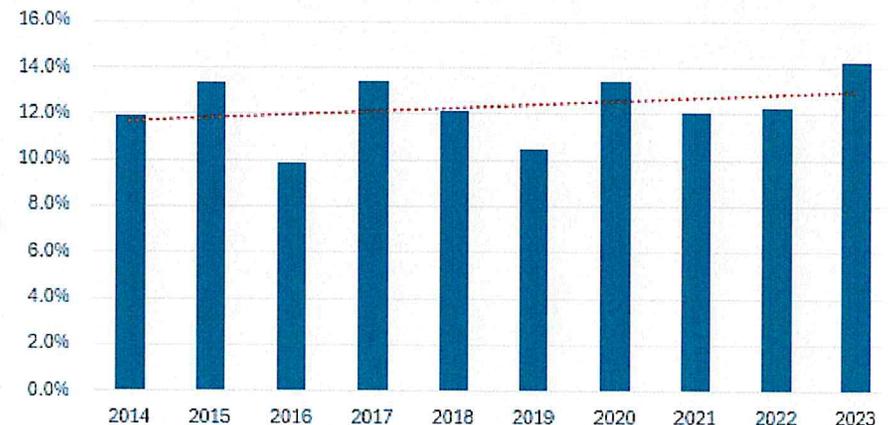

New Admissions



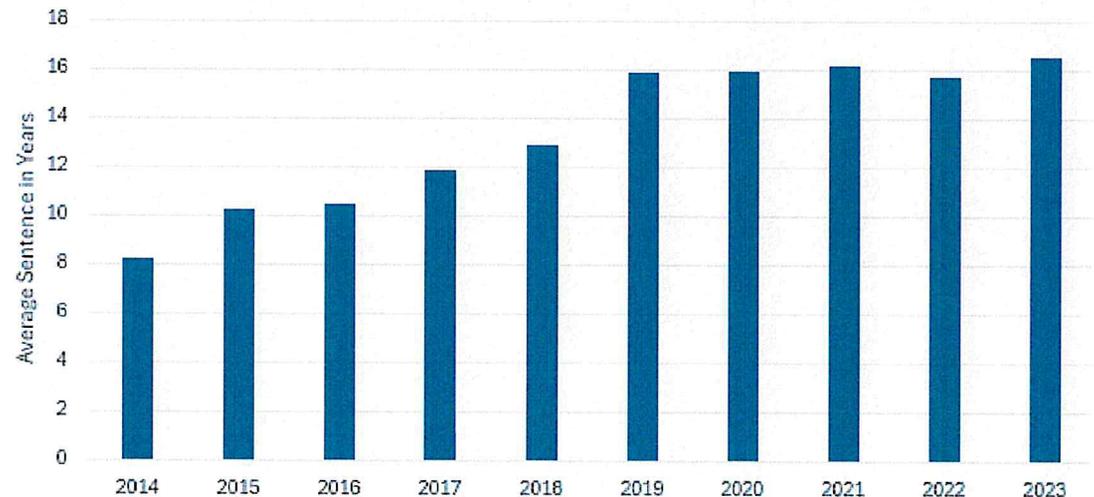
ND DOCR Percentage of New Admissions

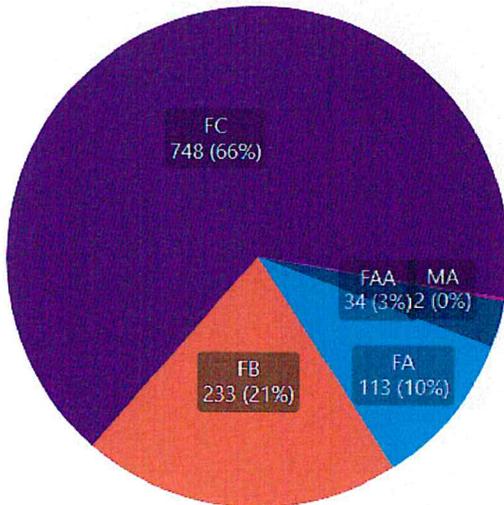

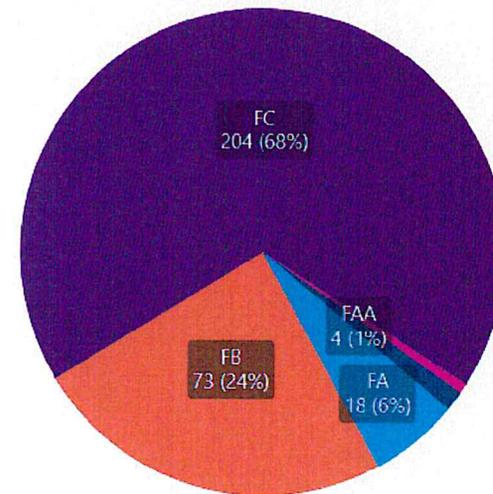


# Admissions by Offense Class

ND DOCR 2023 Female Admissions by Offense Class

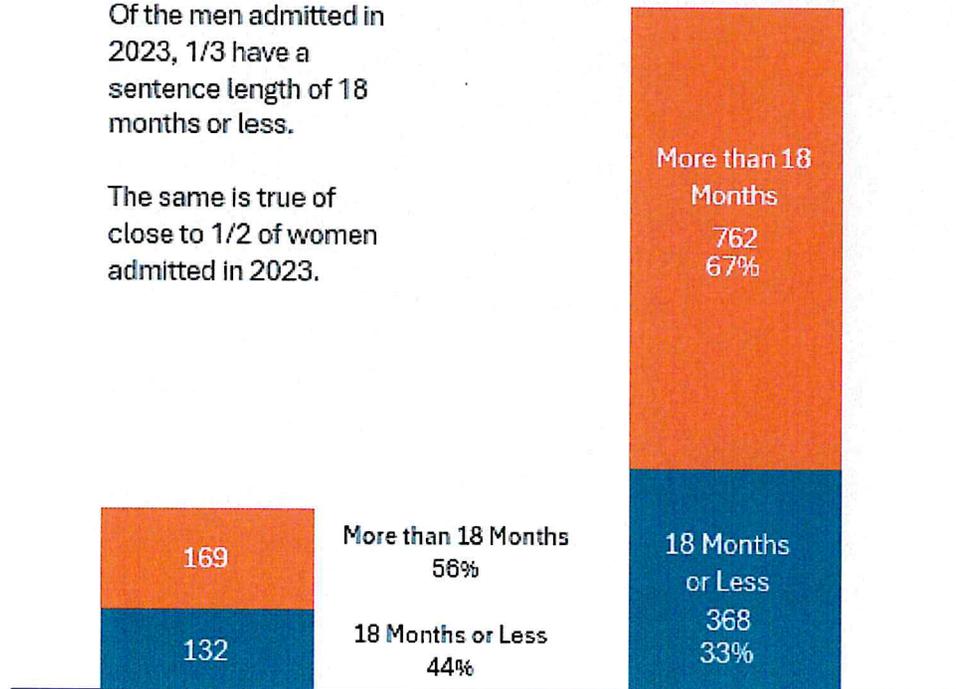

## ND DOCR 2023 Admissions Controlling Sentence Length

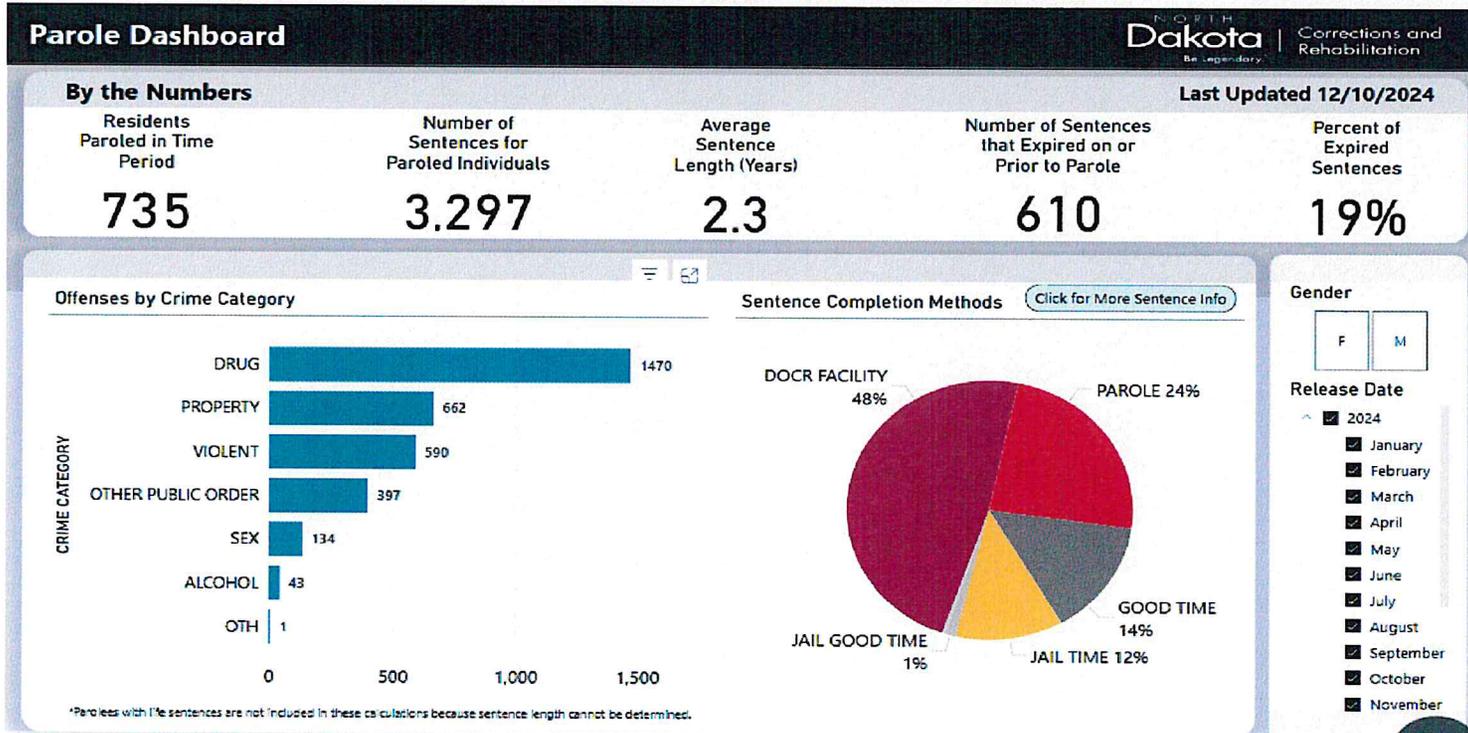
