1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new subsection to section 12.1-27.1-01-and two, a new 2 sections to chapter 12.1-27.1, a new section to chapter 15.1-07, and a new section to 3 chapter 40-38 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the definition of a public library, 4 required safety policies and technology protection measures, and the state's attorney's review 5 of public libraries, and school districts, and state agencies for compliance with statutes 6 protecting minors from explicit sexual material, and compliance with the Children's Internet 7 Protection Act; to amend and reenact subsection 5 of section 12.1-27.1-01, subsection 2 of 8 section 12.1-27.1-03.1, and sections 12.1-27.1-03.5 and 12.1-27.1-11 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to obscenity control; to provide for a report to the legislative 9 10 management; and to provide a penalty.

# Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA)

The Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA) was enacted by Congress in 2000 to address concerns about children's access to obscene or harmful content over the Internet. CIPA imposes certain requirements on schools or libraries that receive discounts for Internet access or internal connections through the E-rate program – a program that makes certain communications services and products more affordable for eligible schools and libraries. In early 2001, the FCC issued rules implementing CIPA and provided updates to those rules in 2011.

## What CIPA requires

Schools and libraries subject to CIPA may not receive the discounts offered by the E-rate program unless they certify that they have an Internet safety policy that includes technology protection measures. The protection measures must block or filter Internet access to pictures that are: (a) obscene; (b) child pornography; or (c) harmful to minors (for computers that are accessed by minors). Before adopting this Internet safety policy, schools and libraries must provide reasonable notice and hold at least one public hearing or meeting to address the proposal.

Schools subject to CIPA have two additional certification requirements: 1) their Internet safety policies must include monitoring the online activities of minors; and 2) as required by the Protecting Children in the 21st Century Act, they must provide for educating minors about appropriate online behavior, including interacting with other individuals on social networking websites and in chat rooms, and cyberbullying awareness and response.

Schools and libraries subject to CIPA are required to adopt and implement an Internet safety policy addressing:

- Access by minors to inappropriate matter on the Internet;
- The safety and security of minors when using electronic mail, chat rooms and other forms of direct electronic communications;
- Unauthorized access, including so-called "hacking," and other unlawful activities by minors online;
- Unauthorized disclosure, use, and dissemination of personal information regarding minors; and
- Measures restricting minors' access to materials harmful to them.

Schools and libraries must certify they are in compliance with CIPA before they can receive E-rate funding.

- CIPA does not apply to schools and libraries receiving discounts only for telecommunications service only;
- An authorized person may disable the blocking or filtering measure during use by an adult to enable access for bona fide research or other lawful purposes.
- CIPA does not require the tracking of Internet use by minors or adults.

# Sexually Explicit Material/Pornography

# Senate Bill 2307

# Pornography Causes Depression and Mental Health Problems

- Youth who are depressed or have delinquent tendencies are known to have higher levels of pornography exposure.
- Pornography use is a recognized predictor of depression.2
- Younger age at first pornography viewing is associated with frequency of adult mental health problems.3

# Pornography Causes Permissive Sexual Attitudes and Behaviors

- Pornography use, even when infrequent, is associated with abnormal behaviors.4
- In males, early exposure to pornography predicted "permissive sexual norms, sexual harassment perpetration" and various forms of sexual behavior.5
- Even when controlling for other factors, pornography consumption influences sexual behaviors.6
- Adolescents who are exposed to pornography are more likely to have multiple sexual partners.7
- Early exposure to pornography is associated with initiation of sexual behavior at a younger age.5
- In young men, pornography viewing is associated with higher rates of sexual coercion and violent or abusive behavior.8
- Pornography consumption is associated with negative gender attitudes.8
- Pornography exposure is associated with substance abuse.7

# Pornography Contributes to Poor Academic Performance

- Exposure to pornography has been shown to interfere with working memory in a way not seen with exposure to other stimuli, including negative stimuli.9
- Sexually explicit images affect the brain's emotion/attention processing.10
- In early adolescent boys, pornography exposure was associated with reduced academic performance.11

#### References

American Library Association (ALA)

The ALA has a list of Top 10 Most Challenged Books. The books on the 2023 list have been challenged because they contain sexually explicit graphics and/or language, profanity, violence, perversion material, depictions of rape and incest, and drug use. These books are widely available in public libraries and schools across ND (see attached). The ALA promotes these books during a "Banned Books Week" where they spotlight the books and promote activities and

ways for people to get involved to keep them accessible.[1]

Two examples of these books are *Let's Talk About It* by Erika Moen & Matthew Nolan (targeted for children ages 14 and up) and *Sex is a Funny Word* by Cory Silverberg (not on the list, but available in ND libraries and targeted for children ages 8-11). These books contain graphic images and language normalizing STIs and sexting, encouraging and teaching sexual behaviors, and likening pornography to a "fun, sugary treat." (*LTAI* p.165)

The ALA is not interested in protecting children. A statement on their website says, "The ALA stringently and unequivocally maintains that libraries and librarians have an obligation to resist efforts that systematically exclude materials dealing with any subject matter, including sex, gender identity, or sexual orientation. [2]" Another states, "The American Library Association opposes all attempts to restrict access to library services, materials, and facilities based on the age of library users.[3]"

The ALA is not a friend of parents either. As stated in an article from Daily Citizen[4], "instead of taking parents' concerns seriously, the organization's Office for Intellectual Freedom has advice for librarians about how to fight back against parents who believe certain books might be inappropriate for children.[5] It dramatically labels parents' involvement "censorship" and "book banning." The ALA believes children should be able to check out whatever books they want and that they deserve "privacy and confidentiality"- including from parents - in those decisions.
